A warrant was issued for Long, who was later picked up in East El Paso County and booked into the El Paso County Downtown Detention Facility, charged with Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon, with bond set at \$20,000.

EAST EL PASO COUNTY — It didn't matter to Sierra Vista Elementary fifth grader Adrienne Nicole Tellez that she had had a liver transplant only a year ago, the second one in her 11-year life. All she wanted to do is compete for herself and her school.

"I feel good about today," she says. "I want to win a gold medal in the Special Olympics. I hope my school wins a lot."

Jacob Martinez of Lujan-Chavez Elementary had someone to help him for his 10-meter assisted race. But when he saw his parents waiting at the finish line and he heard the starting gun go off, Jacob took off without any help,

Socorro acts to stop high-density residential construction

SOCORRO — In order to eliminate or ease the overcrowding of neighborhoods in Socorro, the City Council has begun the process of creating an ordinance to address that concern.

On April 20, during the regularly scheduled council meeting, the first reading on and amendment to Ordinance No. 76 to eliminate Section 8.4 from Socorro's Zone District Regulations, relating to high-density residential con-

struction. The ordinance states all future applications for residential designations shall be limited to single family residential and medium density residential.

Also, all districts currently designated as high density residential will be re-designated as medium density. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval of this amendment. City Council approved the first reading and will be calling for a public hearing before the second reading can be approved. This was an item placed on the agenda by Mayor Willie Gandara, Jr.

Knock-knock warrant arrest program increased county collections last week

EL PASO COUNTY — Following publica- at: http://www.co.el-paso.tx.us/sheriff tion in area newspapers of the names and addresses of persons with outstanding warrants — and an offer of amnesty — from the El Paso County Sheriff's Department, the El Paso County Auditor reports collecting \$160,000 during the week of April 17 compared to \$91,000 collected during the previous week, an increase of \$69,000.

The last day of amnesty period is Friday, April 28.

The Traffic Warrant Arrest Operation is sponsored by the El Paso County Sheriff's Office in conjunction with the constables. The published list included approximately 20,623 warrants with an approximate value of \$4,124,600. This is based on an average fine of \$200 per outstanding warrant. The list is available for review on the Sheriff's website

The El Paso County Sheriff and constable offices will conduct a Justice of the Peace Traffic Warrant Arrest Operation starting on April 29. If the traffic fine is paid by April 28, the Justice of the Peace will waive the "Fail to Appear" fine.

Persons will have two weeks to pay all fines. If you know that you have an outstanding ticket that has not been paid or if your name is on the list, immediately contact the Justice of the Peace whose jurisdiction the citation was issued in. After April 28, County Law Enforcement Officers will begin the "knock, knock — we have a warrant for your arrest" campaign on those individuals who still have an outstanding warrant.

Those on the list were encouraged to clear up their fines during the amnesty program to avoid County law enforcement officers arresting you at your home, job site or place of employment.

Horizon code enforcement to begin neighborhood sweeps, residents urged to comply voluntarily

HORIZON CITY — The Horizon City Police Department will be stepping up its enforcement of city ordinances and will be conducting neighborhood sweeps for inspection and enforcement of city ordinance violations in order to enhance the quality of life for all residents of the Town of Horizon City, according to Horizon City Police Chief Antonio Aguilar.

The neighborhood sweeps will concentrate on existing city ordinance violations such as the following:

- Noxious weeds and other rank vegetation
- Accumulation of rubbish, trash, refuse, junk and other abandoned materials such as tires, metals or lumber.
- Any condition which provides harborage for rats, mice, snakes, spiders and other
- Any building or other structure which is in such a dilapidated condition that it is unfit for human habitation, or kept in such an unsanitary condition that it is a menace to the health of people residing in the vicinity thereof, or presents a more ordinarily dangerous fire hazard in the vicinity where it is
- Motor vehicles which are abandoned or dilapidated and boats, RVs, trailers, etc. with expired registration or safety inspection
- Motor vehicles, large trucks or recreational RVs parked in neighborhoods on landscape, dirt, or grass in violation of City Ordinance #0093.
- Alarm Ordinance pertaining to permits and false alarms (City Ordinance No. 103).
- Other ordinances that will be strictly enforced are loose or unrestrained animals and registration violations.

"There are other numerous ordinances that pertain to the above issues, but the most common ones which have become central issues of complaints by our citizens are the ones listed above," Chief Aguilar said. "Once the Code Enforcement Officer or Police Officers issue an official notice of the violation, compliance is required within 72 hours for some violations such as trash and weeds or 15 days for abandoned or dilapidated vehicles.

"We encourage all Horizon residents to voluntarily comply with these ordinances. Our ultimate goal of the neighborhood sweeps is voluntary compliance. However, if people refuse to comply or cooperate, then we will take alternative measures such as issuing citations, summons to court or removing abandoned or dilapidated vehicles through impoundment if necessary," he said.

Failure to comply with city ordinance violations, such as the Nuisance Ordinance No. 0017, may result in fines of up to \$2,000. Each separate occurrence of a violation or each day that a violation continues constitutes a separate offense.

Citizens having questions concerning any city ordinance violation may call the Horizon City Police Department at 852-1047 or Code Enforcement at 852-1875.

These are all stacked up with bicycles and tricycles our kids used that we are keeping for our grandkids — won't it be wonderful for baby Amanda to ride the same trike that her Aunt Cassie did?

Never mind that by the time Amanda gets her own tricycle, she's going to prefer the new updated version with fluorescent spokes and seats that can be changed to match her outfit.

> The deadline to enroll for coverage next year without penalty is May 15, 2006. If you decide not to enroll on May 15, there are annual open enrollment periods from Nov. 15 to Dec. 31. However, a late-enrollment fee is imposed, through which your premium cost will go up at least one percent per month for every month you wait to join. For example, if you join in November of 2006, you will be subject to an extra fee of at least six percentage points. Like other insurance, you will have to pay this penalty as long as you have Medicare prescription drug coverage.

The bills will now move on the Senate for approval and if the tax plan is approved a joint House-Senate committee will then resolve any differences.

In the Senate, I applaud Senators Eltife (R) and Ellis (D) for their senate bill that would raise public schoolteachers' pay by \$3,000 annually and would restore the \$1,000 health insurance stipend that was cut in 2003. I am hopeful Senate Bill 24 will reach the house or will be successfully attached as an amendment to one of our House Bills. I believe the Governor will call a charge and include a teacher pay raise and bring Senate Bill 24 to fruition.

I agree and stand by with all those Texans that agree real property relief is overdue. However, this special session I believe we must address both property cuts

The 1040 form is one of the most commonly used forms by taxpayers who need to report interest and dividend income, itemized deductions, and capital gains. It is estimated that it takes the average taxpayer using these forms 37.8 hours when using a computer and tax preparation software. Even if you are using the socalled "short" form, you need to allot at least 12 hours using your computer. The self-employed and small business owners spend approximately 80 hours on average to complete their taxes.

In 2005, the 1040 instruction manual was 142 pages long — more than triple its length from 1975 and 71 times larger than in 1935 when it was only two pages. Additionally, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) now prints more than 1,000 publications to help clarify your uncertainty. More taxpayers than ever are turning to

A survey conducted by the National Society of Accountants found that the cost of using a tax professional to file the simplest 1040 would be \$110 and climbs to \$201 when you add in itemized deductions.

Many Americans hire a professional tax preparer because they are simply flabbergasted by the amount of paperwork associated with the filing process. In 1995, Congress passed the Paperwork Reduction Act in an attempt to reduce this burden. However, since this law was enacted, this burden has increased by more than 20 percent. Several laws have been passed in Congress to reduce the financial burden for middle class taxpayers such as the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997, the Economic Growth

Growth Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2003. Despite these efforts, the Tax Foundation estimates that in 2005 individuals, businesses and non-profits will spend over 6 billion hours complying with the federal income fax

American taxpayers deserve a fairer, simpler tax system. Therefore, I believe that we should abolish the IRS as we know it. Americans now face the highest tax burden since World War II. I strongly support a reduction in tax rates to ease this burden on taxpayers.

By simplifying the tax process, fewer Americans would run afoul of the IRS, fewer would suffer undue tax burdens and a more fair and balanced system would be in place. Families in Texas should not have to pay so much of their hard earned money in taxes or be hassled by a burdensome tax code.

Amend Section 3.14 (C) (1) and (D) (2), Ordinances in General:

- (C) Effective Date
- (1) Every ordinance shall become effective when approved and passed by City Council on second reading or at any later date specified therein; AND
- (D) Publish Defined

(2) The ordinance or the caption of an adopted ordinance that summarizes the purpose of the ordinance and any penalty for violating the ordinance.

have 14 classrooms plus two science labs. Twelve portables will be removed to make way for the new wing. Two other portables will be demolished.

No timelines have been established for the projects, but Longoria hopes construction can be completed by the summer of 2007.

The assistant superintendent also addressed trustees about two quality of life projects involving the county Commissioners Court and SEISD.

Trustees approved an interlocal agreement between the two entities involving new lighting for Alarcon Park and upgrades to athletic fields and other park amenities to an area behind Excell Academy.

The agreement calls for the county to install a new lighting system at a cost of \$75,000 at the park across from Alarcon in the downtown area. The school district will maintain the park and the lighting system which is used by students during the day and by members of the community in the after-school and evening hours.

Longoria said Commissioner Miguel Teran is looking at the county building a skateboard park in that

area. It would also include canopies, school. They can walk on sidewalks community members for the position. benches and possibly a playground. rather than on the road. The Texas Longoria says he'd like the two baseball fields upgraded to official size. He also has hopes for a soccer field as well.

Longoria pegs the price tag for these improvements at approximately \$280,000, a cost which would be borne by the county. He hopes work on the two joint projects can get under way within the next month.

Longoria had still more good news. A sidewalk project three years in the discussion stage is finally moving ahead at Borrego Elementary. It will mean a safer walking environment for students going to and from


Department of Public Safety (TXDOT) will build the sidewalk with \$201,000. Funding comes from a state grant, a part of its Safe Routes to School program, Longoria says. Five feet wide, the sidewalk will run 3,350 feet from Borrego along Chicken Ranch Road to Saltillo Road. Longoria says the project will be going out to bid next month.

In other action, trustees discussed how to fill the board vacancy caused by the resignation of Terry Alarcon in December of 2005. After discussion, it was agreed that board members would solicit applications from If there are none, then the board would then appoint a replacement.


In a related action, the board approved cancellation of the school board election scheduled for May 13 because no one had applied for the post.
