Socorro HS students complete 'Texas Bunkhouse'

When parents of some Socorro High School students asked "What did you do at school today?" For some of them the answer was "Built a log cabin." They nicknamed the project the "Texas Bunkhouse". For two years, a group of students worked together to craft the cabin. Drafting students designed it, welding students constructed the frame, it was wired by electrical students and carpentry students did all the woodwork, including rustic pine knot flooring. Media technology students videotaped the entire process.

Their hard work paid off earlier this year when they completed the one-bedroom, one-bath log cabin. Some of the students were sophomores and freshmen when the project started in 2005, like senior Manuel Calderon who remembers spending his days working on the cabin during El Paso's hot summer.

"It was hard work, but we enjoyed it," says the 17-year-old. "This project really helped us expand our skills. I am really proud of our work. We showed that we can do this if we work hard."

Calderon worked on the cabin's inside walls, siding, cabinets and porch. Joining the project last year was junior Daniel Tellez who joined the Building Trades class his sophomore year to develop his building skills.

"I wanted to do something more challenging," says Tellez who had been doing wood-working since middle school. "For this project, I worked on the roof, cabinets, the tile in the kitchen and installing the air conditioners. I

hope this will help me find a career in construction when I graduate."

In addition to learning about roofing and installing tile, the students also had to do some problem solving to get the job done.

"Sometimes we didn't have the right products, but the students used what we had and adapted them to work for our project. We also had to learn how to make our own color stain for the wood," says John Kilgore, Advanced Building Trades Instructor. "I was impressed with what these kids accomplished. The cabin turned out better than I imagined."

Horizon residents going home from work or just driving down Eastlake Drive will see an unusual sight the week of Sept. 17. The log cabin will be sitting in front of the Socorro ISD central offices. Students in the Socorro ISD Career and Technology program made a special presentation to the Board of Trustees on Sept. 18. Trustees will be among the first to tour the 12 by 32 foot log cabin. Students who worked on the project will be on hand to give tours of the one-bedroom, one-bath cabin, while culinary arts students will provide snacks for visitors during the tour.

Allen Long, Director of Career and Technology says there are plans to auction the 384 square foot cabin. Auction details will be published as soon as they become available. The cabin was opened to the public on Wednesday, Sept. 19 and Thursday, Sept. 20. Long says he plans to take the cabin and students to the annual home show that takes places at the Judson F. Texas' immunization rate drop concerns TMA physicians

More Texas children are at risk of contracting disease than before, according to the just-released 2006 National Immunization Survey. Texas Medical Association (TMA) physician leaders are voicing concern that Texas fell to 34th nationally in immunizing children ages 19 months to 35 months.

"This is tragic — Texas needs to start going in the right direction. With low immunization rates Texas will see a comeback of once-rare diseases, and we will be victims of our past success," said Jaime Fergie, MD, advisor for TMA's "Be Wise — Immunize" SM vaccination program. "It's unfortunate that parents don't think about the danger of childhood diseases because of how well immunizations work, but it's dangerous to let our guard down." Dr. Fergie specializes in treating pediatric infectious diseases in Corpus Christi.

Texas' 2006 vaccination rate of 74.7 percent dropped the state to 34th place from its 24th-place spot in 2005. Texas vaccinated 76.8 percent of its youngest children in 2005. The 2.1 percent rate decrease led to the 10-place fall.

Texas' low child immunization rates inspired TMA physicians to create the "Be Wise — Immunize" program three years ago. The program produced landmark results in 2005. Texas physicians and TMA Alliance members (civic-minded physician-members' spouses) administered more than 25,000 shots to Texas children that year. The program contributed to Texas' surge from 41st in 2004 to the 24th-place score in 2005. In 2005, Texas also rose above the national average for the first time since the survey began in 1994. In the latest survey, Texas fell back below the 77 percent national average rate of child immunization.

"Complete vaccination is complete protection," said Dr. Fergie, noting that patients not completing their vaccine series is part of the reason why Texas immunization rates remain low. For example, the fourth dose of the vaccine for diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (DTaP) is recommended before a child turns 19 months of age. Ensuring parents follow through continues to be the biggest challenge to increasing vaccine coverage levels, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services. "It's a shame that some parents don't take full advantage of opportunities to vaccinate their child, or start to and then don't complete the vaccine series," added Dr. Fergie. He notes that patients are not fully protected if they do not complete the recommended series.

In three years, "Be Wise — Immunize" program participants, TMA Alliance members, county medical societies, and community coalitions have given more than 90,000 shots to Texas children. Funded by TMA's philanthropic arm, the TMA Foundation, the program is able to provide physicians and volunteers important resources for hosting weekend or after-hour clinics. "Immunization programs like Be Wise have contributed a great deal to the overall education and awareness of the importance of immunizations," said Dr. Fergie. "Such programs have done well for Texas patients, but we have more work to do."

Children who dance

One of the wonderful things about little kids is they don't care one bit about what other people think. Lack of inhibition can be a little boorish in adults, but when we see it in kids it gives us an opportunity to remember what it was like to simply be ourselves.

This is especially true when it comes to dancing.

There's a popular saying these days that we should "dance like no one is watching." That's pretty much how kids dance, even if they know someone is watching.

In 1909, German Expressionist artist Emil Nolde painted an entrancing image entitled *Wildly Dancing Children*. They appear to be mostly girls, with flying hair and dresses as they jump in a circle, hands clasped. The lack of clarity and detail in expressionistic art can sometimes be a little frustrating for a realist like myself but this painting somehow captures the freedom and spirit of kids just having a good time.

I like to watch other people's kids dancing ballet, and folklorico, and African kids doing their native dances are downright adorable.

Better still, though, are photos and memories of those that are your own. I've got a snapshot of my second

grandson dancing at a dress-up function when he was two. He's really getting down, out there on the dance floor all by himself, alone in his enjoyment of the music.

Now that he's six, he likes to dance with me.

I don't know how long this is going to last, but I'll ride this pony as long as it'll run.

Another good thing is, he's pretty good at it.

He was with me recently at a rodeo which was followed by a dance. I was undecided as to whether I wanted to stay up for it or whether I was going to do the wise thing and just go on home to bed.

So I asked him what he wanted to do. "Let's go to the dance, Granny," he said. "I like to dance."

That's all it took.

"Me, too," I said.

The dance was in this big, dusty county fair barn, with poor acoustics and some picnic tables set up around the edges for spectators. The music was pretty good, as country bands go who play for county fairs. They don't have a record contract but nobody at this dance cares about that.

So we went in and coughed up our admission and the girl at the door put paper bands around our wrists as our receipt. He was real proud of his band

since he didn't get one at the rodeo because he was underage and I didn't have to pay for him.

As soon as the band tuned up he tugged on my hand.

"C'mon, Granny, let's dance," he said.

The only problem with dancing with a young man that is only slightly higher than your waist is that he's supposed to be leading but he can't see around you. After I danced backward into a friendly couple sitting on a bench, I started keeping a closer eye on where we were going.

There is no place on earth where kids get dirtier or enjoy themselves more than at the rodeo grounds. He was so dusty already that his eyes and mouth stood out in marked contrast to his face.

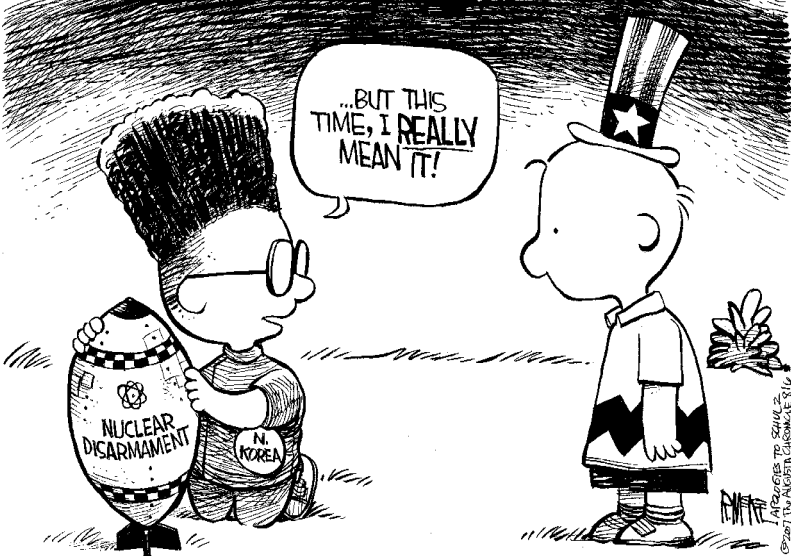
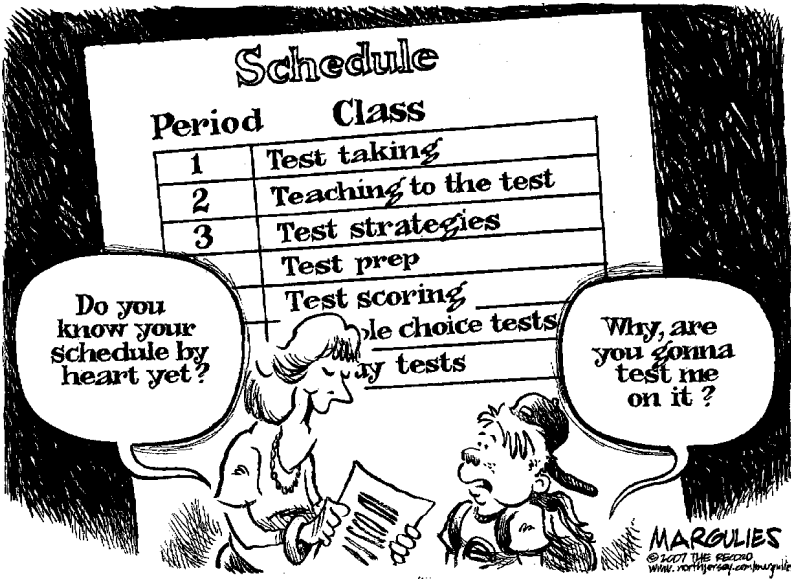
He gamely held onto my belt loop and we went the rounds to several songs, but I noticed that his bootscoot was becoming more of a bootshuffle, and his bright eyes were getting more droopy with every pass around the floor.

After awhile we unrolled a sleeping bag under one of the tables and he laid down on it. Within seconds, my dancing partner had deserted me for dream-land.

I grew up dancing with people of all sizes, shapes, sex and age. I danced with my parents, sisters, brothers, girl-cousins, boy-cousins, aunts, uncles and friends. I think it is a loss to our society if children aren't exposed to community events in which people of all ages gather to have a good time. It's a shame if they grow up thinking that dancing is something you do after you are old enough to look cool and only with the best looking people your own age.

There will come a time in my grandson's life when I won't be his first choice as a dancing partner, which is perfectly understandable, and by then, I'll probably be glad because I won't be able to keep up with him anyway.

For this moment, though, as I looked at his dusty boots protruding from beneath the table, so much bigger than they were even as little as a month ago, I couldn't help but think how glad I am to be around children who dance.

Amendments on ballot

Hola, mi gente,

Every November is an election month. This year is no exception. Although the November 6th election is not for a multitude of candidates, it is for 16 important amendments to the Texas constitution.

During the 80th legislative session (Jan. '07 through May '07), the representatives and senators passed joint resolutions which are now on the November ballot. In order for these resolutions to be placed on the ballot for your vote, each house must have passed the measure with a two thirds majority. This makes it more difficult to change our constitution. However, only a majority number of votes (50% plus 1) is needed to pass the measure in the November election.

In an unusual occurrence, an item that normally would have been on the November election was placed on the May ballot for your vote. That amendment allowed the tax rate on school funding to be lowered and

locked at that rate for households which qualify as a senior or disabled household. The measure passed easily.

Of the sixteen items on the ballot, four have minimal relevance for you here in El Paso County. The subjects for those amendments are as follows:

- Proposition One: It places Angelo State University under the funding umbrella of Texas Tech University.
- Proposition Five: It allows smaller cities (10,000 population or less) to temporarily freeze property taxes under certain conditions of redevelopment.
- Proposition Ten: It deletes any reference to the county office of hides and animals (clearly an outdated and unnecessary office).
- Proposition Fourteen: It allows any judges who have reached the mandatory retirement age to complete the current term on the bench.

I am sure that you will agree the four amendments have little impact on your everyday lives. In contrast to those items, the remaining items include four amendments authoriz-

ing general obligation bonds (potential increase in state debt), one amendment that would cap property appraisal values, one amendment revising home equity loan provisions, one amendment providing additional funding for economically distressed areas and other subjects.

The November 6th election is just six weeks away. During the next four to five weeks, I shall present you information about the amendments. In the next issue of the Courier, I shall dedicate the entire article to Amendment Number Three, providing an annual ten percent cap on increases in homestead taxable value. None of the articles will provide a recommendation to you, the voters. I shall only provide the information that I have received, in a balanced format, that has been provided to my office by the House Research Organization.

I hope the articles assist you in understanding the amendments.

Anthony pioneer, Mrs. Johnnie Beeson, dies at 84

ANTHONY — Johnnie Shumaker Beeson, 84, of Anthony, Texas, will be memorialized with a special service on Saturday, Oct. 22, at 10 a.m. in the West Valley Fire Department, 510 E. Vinton Road, in Vinton.

Mrs. Beeson died in El Paso on Aug. 28, 2007 after a lengthy struggle with lung disease.

Born March 14, 1928 in Mississippi, Johnnie moved to New Mexico as a small child, accompanied by her parents, Lloyd and Thelma Shumaker, her siblings, and other relatives, traveling mostly on dirt roads. They settled in Anthony where her father, Lloyd Shumaker, became foreman of the Haas Farms. She attended school in Las Cruces and Anthony where she graduated from Valley High School.

She worked for various businesses in the Anthony area and later with her husband, Paul Beeson, in their electrical business in Alamogordo, N.M.

When her husband suffered a stroke, she returned to Anthony, finally working as branch manager for the First National Bank and for Western Bank, both of which have since changed ownership and name.

Mrs. Shumaker is preceded in death by her husband, Paul Beeson, her parents, Lloyd Shumaker and Thelma Shumaker Harbert, and her brother, James Winborn “Jake” Shumaker, who was killed in combat in Germany during World War II.

She is survived by her son, Russell Beeson and wife Nancy, of Anthony; three grandsons, Jared, Jody and Joshua Beeson of Tulsa, Oklahoma; two sisters, Marleen Shipp of Anthony and Beth Berry of Alamogordo; her sister-in-law, Faye Shumaker Pulis of Las Cruces, six nephews and three nieces.

The service for Mrs. Shumaker will be conducted by E. Yates Folk, Jr., minister for the Church of Christ of Anthony, assisted by Guy W. Pierce. A reception and visitation will follow the service.

Her cremated remains will be buried at the foot of her husband’s grave in the Anthony Community Cemetery.

Immigrants – legal or not – must be able to call for help

Recently, the Otero County New Mexico sheriff began scouring the town of Chaparral, NM for undocumented immigrants. Local law enforcement acting as the border patrol is a bad idea.

In general, law enforcement strives to gain the trust of the public. In fact, the Otero County Sheriff’s website uses the word “trust” many times. By playing border patrol, local law enforcement erodes whatever trust they have in the community. Soon this will spread to other public services like hospitals, fire departments, and schools.

The ramifications can spread even to non-immigrant Latinos because incidents of racial profiling by local authorities are bound to rise. Ultimately, the safety of the public at-large will be negatively affected. Gang activity will be on the rise. Extortion against immigrants who fear the police will happen more and more.

Sound too far fetched?

We have already seen the growth of gang problems in Texas-New Mexico border communities. This behavior by the Otero County Sheriff will shut the door on victims and complainants.

It may look good on paper for the Otero County Sheriff to enforce immigration law, but it is in direct conflict with the goals of community-oriented policing. I’m sure the Otero County Sheriff is interested in diversity and expanding community relationships. This behavior puts those efforts in jeopardy.

Complicating the issue is the fact that many family members are of mix immigration status. Some are citizens, other residents, and still others are undocumented. The Immigration Policy Center said in a recent national study, roughly 4.9 million children in the United States live in households headed by undocumented immigrants. About 3.1 million of these children are U.S. born. Families become split in traumatic ways.

I say, let’s educate law enforcement on the reasons for not inquiring about immigration status. They should be educated on the protections under immigration law for crime victims such as survivors of domestic violence and human trafficking. Authorities need to realize that if they

enforce immigration law, a civil violation, they subject victims of crime to further trauma. Victims of domestic violence will not call.

Fear of law enforcement will inevitably affect you and me in very direct ways. Your neighbor will not call police if he sees suspicious behavior outside of your home or if your house is on fire. Assaults and rapes may go unreported.

Also, enforcement of immigration law by local law enforcement has the potential civil rights lawsuits. Many

communities across the nation have seen how expensive it can be to mount a defense to subsequent lawsuits.

We want to keep everybody safe. For that reason, law enforcement needs to stay close to the community, including immigrant communities. They cannot alienate themselves if they depend on people to help solve crime and investigate terrorism.

Finding of No Significant Impact

It has been determined that such a request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and, accordingly, the town has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190). The reason for the decision not to prepare such a statement is based upon the fact that all environmental concerns could either be minimized or mitigated.

The town has made an Environmental Review Record for the proposed project, which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such a statement is not required. The Environmental Review Record is on file at the Anthony Town Hall and is available for public examination and copying, upon request, between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 4:30 P.M., Monday through Friday.

Public Comments on Findings

All interested agencies, groups, and individuals disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the Town of Anthony, at the address set forth above. Such written comments must be received at the address specified within sixteen (16) days after this publication; all comments so received will be considered, and the town will not request release of funds or take administrative action on the project prior to the end of the that 16-day period.

Release of Funds

The Town of Anthony will undertake the activities described above with a grant from the Texas Capital Fund Program administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). That grant was issued from Community Development Block Grants funds under Title I from the 2007 Program Year, under the provisions of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The Town of Anthony is certifying to the Texas Department Agriculture that the Honorable Art Franco, in his official capacity as Mayor of the Town of Anthony, consents to accept the jurisdiction of the federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental review, decision-making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that, upon its approval, the Town of Anthony may use the Block Grant funds and it will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. TDA will accept an objection to its approval only on one or more of the bases and the procedures described in 24 CFR Part 58.75. Objections are to be addressed to the Texas Capital Fund Program, Texas Department of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12847, Austin, TX 78711.

Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by TDA. No objections received later than thirty-three (33) days after this publication will be considered.

School board notes

EL PASO COUNTY—The County Courier provides highlights of the September board meetings of the Canutillo and San Elizario Independent School Districts:

Canutillo ISD: Sept. 11

Trustees postponed approval on construction of a field house for Canutillo High School. Alfredo Vasquez, public information officer for the district, later explained that funding for constructing the field house came from a \$1.975 million 2006 bond issue that also included additional bleachers at the football stadium.

Vasquez said the administration would later go before the board for approval of what he said was a new and revised “guaranteed maximum price” amendment. He explained that the nearly \$2 million approved would not cover the cost of both the new field house and the new bleachers as originally envisioned.

The revised, pared-back design plan would call for construction in two phases. He emphasized that the

changes were necessary to stay within budget.

The first phase would be the field house with storage facilities and locker rooms. The second phase would cover the new bleachers. No date has been set for construction to begin.

Armando Rodriguez, chairman of the facilities and planning committee, updated the board on Garcia Elementary School renovation project as well as on land purchase negotiations for Arellano Elementary School.

Al Perez, vice president of sales and service for Government Employees Credit Union, reported on its new branch office which opened at the high school at the beginning of the school year. (This was reported in a recent Courier article.)

High school senior Erica White, a student-employee of the GECU branch, said she was thrilled and thankful for the opportunity to work there. She added that her work experience has given her more confidence.

A formal grand opening of the high school branch of the credit union will be held at 9:30 a.m. Monday, Oct. 1.

Prior to the board meeting, a reception was held with U.S. Rep. Sylvestre Reyes honoring Miriam Garcia who served as a page in the U.S. House of Representatives this past summer. A high school senior, she is the daughter of Ruben and Martha Garcia. She is currently ranked second scholastically in her class.

San Elizario ISD: Sept. 12

The new park in the SEISD will be named for Alexandra Flores, the five-year-old girl who was kidnapped and killed six years ago.

Two names were finalists for the park located behind Excell Academy had been forwarded to the committee established to review proposed names and make the final selection. The other name was Grand Valley Park. Another name initially proposed for the park was for Jose Jorge Perez, an early teacher in the school district.

George Luevano, director of support services, said the park was about 80 percent complete. Work remains on playground equipment, planting

grass and aligning athletic fields. He expected dedication of the park would take place in October.

Flores was abducted from a Wal-Mart in November of 2001.

“She was beautiful, really a sweetheart,” remembered Christine Jaksch, who was assistant principal at Loya Primary where Flores was a student.

Borrego was recognized at the board meeting for achieving Recognized status by the Texas Education Agency.

Luevano also said work was progressing on construction projects at Alarcon Elementary and Garcia-Enriquez Middle School.

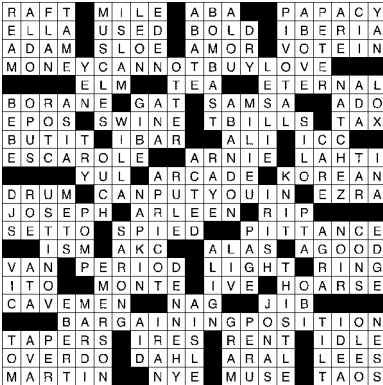
The \$3.1 million cafeteria/gym project at Alarcon is 59 percent complete and should be finished by the end of October. The work on the Garcia-Enriquez involves a new 18-room classroom wing and library. The cost is \$5.2 million. It is 68 percent complete. Completion date is pegged at the end of November.

Both projects have been delayed by what Luevano terms unexpected “earthwork issues.” It involved unearthing old septic systems and retention tanks and dealing with additional excavation of leeching fields. He said those issues have been resolved.

The board also honored the top students at San Elizario High and Garcia-Enriquez Middle schools.

The top high school students for the 2006-07 year were Eddie Barragan, 12th grade; Joey Valencia, 11th grade; Valerie Onzures, 10th grade and Perla de la Torre, ninth grade.

The top three middle school students were Sam Cardona, eighth grade; Cassandra Martinez, seventh grade; and Erin Morales, sixth grade.

Of course, he didn’t say whether it would be used the next time the team’s played — oh, and I’ve got a rather obvious question. If the video of the opposing coaches didn’t give you an advantage, THEN WHY DO IT?
Goodell fined the Patriots another \$250,000 and Belichick’s decision will cost the team one of their two first-round draft choices next year if they make the playoffs this year.

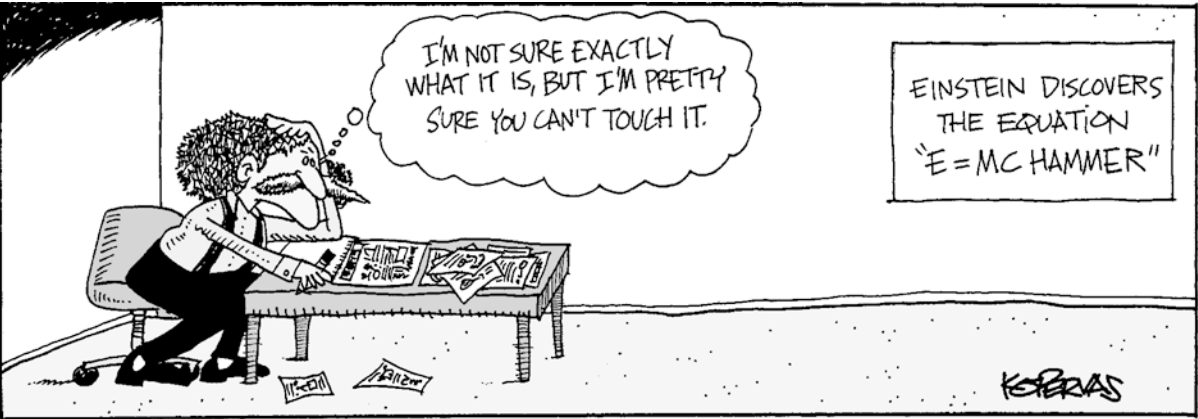

Attention, high-school seniors, it's time to go over the All-Important College Application Checklist.

Figured out which colleges you'd like to attend? *Check.*

Forgotten about those colleges and decided where you might actually have a chance? *Check.*

Realized you've got a problem with those schools too and added appropriate "safe" schools to your list, including the Kalamazoo College for Klueless Kids? (Warning: This school has recently gotten a lot tougher.) *Check.*

Completed error-free application and admission essay? *Check.*

You fell for it, didn't you? All those years of schooling have rotted your brain to the point where you can't even spot an obvious set-up.

Accuracy is out, my friends! Mistakes are in. (Mistakes is in?)

The following absolutely true headline appeared on MSNBC.com: "A typo may help your college admission."

It continues: "Steven Roy Goodman, an independent college counselor, tells clients to make a small mistake somewhere in their application — on purpose."

All that stuff teachers have been drilling into your head for the past 12 years about spelling and accuracy? Forget about it. (Forgeddabout it?)

According to the story, "What Goodman is going for is 'authenticity' — an increasingly hot selling point in college admissions."

But it's not as easy as it sounds. In yet another quote I'm not making up, Goodman said, "There's a little bit of an arms race going on. If I'm being more authentic than you are, you have to be more authentic next month to keep up with the Joneses."

So while earlier students may have cut the academic mustard with a typo or two, this year's ap-

plicants have be prepared to turn in complete gibberish.

Here's the problem. Many of you otherwise promising young scholars (skolars?) are woefully unskilled at faking authenticity, despite years of delivering straight-faced whoppers to your parents.

You need someone to make careless errors for you.

This is where I can help. As a trained professional journalist, I can take your embarrassingly perfect copy and turn it into something incomprehensible. For further authenticity, I can make up stuff out of whole cloth.

Here, for example, is typical college essay:

"If I am accepted into Prestigious University, it will help me reach my goal of becoming a caring and productive member of our society. In addition I will bring about world peace, end poverty and hunger, and produce worthwhile TV reality shows."

But college admission officials aren't dumb. They know no one's going to produce worthwhile reality TV. Plus, all those correctly spelled words will be a dead giveaway that you're not college material.

Here's the same essay, after I have "authenticized" it. (It's a new word I just made up.)

"If you losers dont admit me into PU, I will take up a life of armed robbery, probly on the PU campus. YOU HAVE BEEN WARNED!!"

This essay accomplishes a couple of things: 1) It offers a solid reason not to overlook your application, and 2) It establishes right off that you are "authentic," perhaps dangerously so.

Then you can pick the school of your choice.

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Social Security Q&A

Q: Where can I go to find general information about Medicare benefits?

A: Social Security determines whether people are entitled to Medicare benefits, but the program is administered by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). You can visit the Medicare website at www.medicare.gov/, or call them at 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227). Online or on the phone, you can find answers to all your Medicare questions at CMS.

Q: I'm getting married later this month and plan to change my name.

What documents do I need to apply for a new Social Security card with the correct name?

A: To change your name in Social Security's records, and on your Social Security card, you'll need to provide proof of your U.S. citizenship (if you have not previously established it with us) or immigration status. You'll need to show us evidence of your legal name change by showing us documentation of your old and new names. Such documents could include a court order for a name change, marriage document, divorce decree or Certificate of Naturaliza-

tion. Finally, you'll need to show us proof of identity. Visit our website about your Social Security card and number at www.socialsecurity.gov/ssnumber/ where you can get more information and fill out your application. Or call us at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778).

Q: I have both Part B and Part D Medicare coverage. What if my monthly Social Security benefit isn't enough to cover multiple premiums at one time?

A: If your monthly Social Security benefit isn't enough to cover multiple premium payments at one time, the premiums won't be deducted. Your plan will bill you directly and you can pay them directly. You also can ar-

range with your plan for the premiums to be automatically withdrawn from your checking or saving bank account. It appears you might be eligible for extra help with your prescription cost. Contact your local Social Security Office or visit our website www.socialsecurity.gov for more information.

Q: My son has been disabled since he was little. Now that he's an adult, can he get Social Security, even though he never worked?

A: If your son was disabled before reaching age 22 and is currently not able to work due to a disability, he may be eligible for Social Security disabled adult child benefits. Texas Gas Service Company (the "Company") hereby gives notice that on August 31, 2007 it filed a Statement of Intent to Increase Rates in the Cities of El Paso, Anthony, Clint, Horizon City, Socorro and Vinton, which together with the environs areas comprise the Company's El Paso Service Area ("EPSA"). The Company seeks to implement a new schedule of natural gas service rates and terms and conditions of service for all classes of customers. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 183,494 residential, 11,872 commercial, 47 industrial, 764 public authority, 34 transportation and 2 stand by customers within these Cities.

The Company's proposed rate schedules will increase base rate revenues by \$4,724,571 for the EPSA. Additionally, the Company requests recovery of revenue-related taxes as a line-item on the bill rather than recovering these taxes as part of base rates as previously done. This change will produce additional revenue of \$725,689, for a total annual revenue increase for the entire EPSA of \$5,450,250. The proposed change in rates does not constitute a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition, the Company requests reimbursement of all Company and City rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the system-wide average monthly bill for each customer class will increase by the amount and percent shown in the table below:

Other proposed tariff changes include revisions to the Rules of Service, including new or increased service charges. Also, the Company proposes changes to the Cost of Gas Clause to provide for recovery of uncollectible gas costs through the Cost of Gas rather than through base rates. The Company also proposes a new Transportation Schedule, T-1, and revisions to the Transportation General Charges and Provisions. This change addresses commodity imbalance provisions and upstream pipeline balancing service costs. In addition, the Company proposes a new Cost of Service adjustment clause, Rate Schedule COSA, to provide for an annual review by the Cities of the Company's expenses, revenues and plant investment and a corresponding adjustment to the Company's rates to reflect annual changes (increases or decreases) in these categories. Finally, TGS proposes a gas conservation program and tariff to authorize the program.
