### Medicare deadline

If you didn't sign up for Medicare Part B medical insurance when you first became eligible for Medicare, you now have an opportunity to apply - but time is running out. The deadline for applying is March 31, 2008. If you miss the deadline, you will have to wait until 2009 to apply. Medicare Part B covers some medical expenses not covered by Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), such as doctors' fees, outpatient hospital visits and other medical supplies and services that are not covered by Medicare Part A. When you first become eligible for hospital insurance (Part A), you have a seven-month period (your initial enrollment period) in which to sign up for medical insurance (Part B). After that, you have to pay a higher premium — unless you were covered through an employer's group health plan or a group health plan based on a spouse's employment. You are given another opportunity to enroll in Part B during the general enrollment period, from January 1 to March 31 of each year. But each 12-month period that you are eligible for Medicare Part B and do not sign up, the amount of your monthly premium increases by 10 percent. 

events are informed more about city and county government actions. State agencies generally do not receive as much press but they do impact our lives tremendously.

One of my priorities as your state representative has been to provide a conduit to those agencies for the constituents in District 75. As the elected state official, I get the ear of the agency directors who in turn help me assist you.

I am sure that many of you have seen articles in the newspaper or reports on television news broadcasts about Medicare Advantage Plans. My office talked to many seniors who were not happy with certain sales techniques, agents or plans. While the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), a federal agency, oversees the marketing of Medicare Advantage Plans, the Texas Department of Insurance (TDI) has the responsibility of enforcing laws regard-

Hola, mi ing the sale of insurance policies.

I have to give the Department a big kudo for service over and beyond the call of duty. The staff in Austin has attacked the problem with a fervor that they did not have before the influx of complaints to my office in the last half of 2007.

Prior to that time, the agency considered itself subservient to the policies of CMS. However, with the growing number of complaints and a national trend to changing the state role over Medicare Advantage Plans, Commissioner Mike Geeslin directed the TDI staff to thoroughly investigate every complaint that came from El Paso or any other location in

He also signed a new memorandum of understanding with CMS that would for the first time establish a database of complaints about agents and companies. This would be useful in future regulatory actions by TDI. Under his direction, the great staff in Austin could feel good about fulfilling its role as the advocate for senior victims of improper sales techniques.

The department will inform us, the legislators, about any possible legislation that it would like passed in order to enhance its ability to protect seniors and others who receive Medicare benefits. My office has already met with a TDI staffer during an El Paso visit just last week.

Before I end this column, let me be clear about one thing. It is not the intention of this office or of the TDI to stop the availability of Medicare Advantage Plans or to inhibit the ability of good agents who sell the product. We just want to make sure that the process of informing the clients includes a clear and complete disclosure of how the client will benefit or not benefit. Too often, the process is tilted to portraying the plans as wholly beneficial and better than any other plan. That is wrong!

I shall try my best to sponsor and pass legislation that protects our seniors when they consider a change to a Medicare Advantage Plan.


- Until the end of 2010, small business taxpayers are allowed to writeoff up to \$125,000 (indexed for inflation) of capital expenditures subject to a phase-out once capital expenditures exceed \$500,000 (indexed for inflation).
- The package would double the amount that small business taxpayers may write-off to \$250,000 for capital expenditures incurred in 2008 and would increase the phase-out threshold to \$800,000 in 2008.

### **Temporary Bonus Depreciation:**

- The package would allow businesses to quickly recover the costs of capital expenditures made in 2008 by allowing these businesses to write-off fifty percent of the cost of depreciable property (e.g., equipment, tractors, computers) acquired in 2008.
- In subsequent years, businesses Temporary Enhanced Small will continue to depreciate the remaining cost of depreciable property under the current law-depreciation schedule.





#### **FAIR HOUSING STATEMENT**

The Town of Anthony hereby declares its support of fair housing practices. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the locality to bring about, through fair, orderly, and lawful procedures, the opportunity of each person to obtain housing without regard to race, color, creed, religion, sex, national origin, physical or mental handicap, marital status, parenthood, or age.

It is further declared that such policy is established upon the recognition of the inalienable rights of each individual to obtain housing and further, that denial of such rights is detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of the inhabitants of the locality and constitutes an unjust denial or deprivation of such inalienable rights which is within the power and the proper responsibility of government to prevent.

The locality has a Fair Housing Policy that may be examined and copied by interested groups or individuals during office hours. The month of April has been proclaimed "Fair Housing Month"; copies of the official proclamation are available at the Anthony Town Hall between the hours of 8:30 A.M. and 4:30 P.M., Monday through Friday.

### POLICY STATEMENT ESTABLISHING NONDISCRIMINATION **BASED ON HANDICAPPED CONDITIONS**

The Town of Anthony announces that it has adopted a policy of nondiscrimination based on handicapped conditions concerning access, participation, and benefit of programs and activities operated or conducted by the locality. The established complaint procedures are an element of the local Citizen Participation Plan, and meet the requirements of USHUD Section 504 (24 CFR) concerning nondiscrimination based on handicapped conditions.

I wonder why most teams don't revert to that simple game of basketball that includes passing, good shooting, rebounding and defense.





# Supplemental Security Income and other income

You may be able to receive Supplemental items. Security Income (SSI), even if you have other income?

SSI is a federal program that provides monthly payments to people who have little or no income and who don't own many things. SSI is for elderly people, as well as blind or disabled people of any age, including children. To get SSI, you must be 65 or older, be totally or partially blind, or have a medical condition that keeps you from working and is expected to last at least one year or result in death.

In addition, to be eligible for SSI, you also must be a U.S. resident and have resources worth less than \$2,000 for an individual or \$3,000 for a couple. The resources usually do not include the home you live in, vehicle you drive, funds set aside for burial, or personal

Some people believe that if they have other income, they cannot apply for SSI. The fact is that you can apply, as long as your current income is limited. The type and amount of additional income you receive may have an effect on your SSI amount.

Right now, the maximum monthly payment for SSI is \$637 for an individual and \$956 for a couple.

For SSI purposes, we look at your monthly income. For unearned income, such as Social Security benefits, unemployment, worker's compensation or insurance payments, we do not count the first \$20 you receive each month. So, if you get a check for \$200, only \$180 would be counted as income for SSI purposes. After the \$20 exclusion, the remaining money

### **Busts**

U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officers working at ports of entry in El Paso, West Texas, and New Mexico seized \$406,130 in smuggled currency last week. In addition to the currency, CBP officers seized almost two tons of illegal drugs, identified nearly 100 immigration violations, and uncovered dozens of other violations during the week. CBP officers made two outbound currency seizures this week. The largest was made March 2 at the Bridge of the Americas when CBP officers discovered \$389,070 hidden in the quarter panels of a 2008 Seat Altea SUV that was attempting to leave the United States. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) special agents arrested the driver, 22-yearold Alan Eduardo Salas Delgado, of Chihuahua City, Chihuahua, Mexico. Individuals are permitted to carry any amount of currency or monetary instruments into or out of the U.S. However if the quantity is \$10,000 or higher, they must formally report the currency to CBP. During the past week, area CBP officers made 40 drug seizures. CBP officers seized 3,879 pounds of marijuana in 38 busts and a small quantity of cocaine in two additional seizures.

counts dollar-for-dollar against your SSI. So in this example, \$180 would be deducted from the base amount of your SSI payment.

For earned income (like wages or self employment) we exclude an additional \$65 per month. If your only income besides SSI is wages or self-employment and there is no unearned income, the additional \$20 exclusion is added on. This means your exclusion for earned income would be \$85 per month.

When your income is from work, as in this case, we only subtract 50 cents for every dollar you earn out of your SSI check base amount. So in this example, even though you worked and earned \$200, your SSI payment would only be reduced by \$57.50.

It is important to remember that we use your gross income, not your net income, to compute the monthly amounts. Also, there are some sorts of income which we do not count at all, such as food stamps, food from churches and soup kitchens, and shelter you receive from most private, non-profit organizations. We also exclude most home energy assistance.
