Canutillo bus program

Canutillo Independent School District (CISD), will pilot a pre-kindergarten bus program for the 2009-2010 school year, beginning with the first day of classes, Monday, August 24. The pilot program encourages parents to send older siblings on the same bus with their younger brother or sister. Juan M. Miranda, Transportation Supervisor, who recently came to CISD from Socorro ISD, is hoping to provide a feeling of security and support for these young students as they transition from home to school. In addition, all pre-kindergarten buses have an adult bus monitor assigned to each route. "In cooperation with the elementary principals, we will monitor all the routes to ensure that this pilot program is meeting the needs of the students," said Miranda. Pay raise

The Canutillo Independent School District Board of Trustees approved, during its regular School Board meeting held Tuesday, August 11, a compensation package for the 2009-10 school year that will provide a state-mandated pay increase of \$1,025 for teachers, librarians, counselors, speech language pathologists, and nurses, plus a step increase if applicable. This now sets a beginning teacher's salary in the CISD at \$42,175. Additionally, as part of the CISD compensation package, all district employees will receive a two percent pay increase at midpoint across the board. District officials agree the bump in pay will allow CISD to remain competitive with other area school districts. "Last year, only teachers received a state-mandated pay increase; therefore. this year the district is weighing its options to provide an equitable pay raise for all employees. As a district, our compensation must remain at the same level as our competitors in order to attract quality educators," said Renee O'Donnell, CISD Executive Director for Human Resources.

Socorro ISD construction continues

Superintendent Dr. Xavier De La Torre and Trustee Michael A. Najera joined members of the Citizen's Oversight Committee on Saturday, August 1 to tour 2004 bond projects and see recent progress in construction and housing developments first-

"It is amazing to see how much our District has grown in recent years," said Herb De La Rosa, Chair of the COC. "I was really impressed with and proud of the progress the District has made."

Along the route, the group walked construction sites for the new Eastlake High School, the new Pebble Hills 9th Grade School, and the new KEYS Academy. Eastlake, the District's fifth comprehensive high school, and the Pebble Hills 9th Grade School are scheduled to open in 2010. Work for the new KEYS Academy is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2009.

The group also toured the new Chester E. Jordan Elementary School. Opened this year, the campus is the area's first school designed and built to meet Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) certified green school standards. Developed by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC), LEED is an internationally recognized green building certification system that creates benchmarks for the design and construction of new schools to ensure they are healthy for children, comfortable for teachers and operate efficiently.

"We are proud to be leaders in progress and innovation in our schools," said Superintendent Dr. Xavier De La Torre. "Not only are we setting new standards in academic and extracurricular achievement, we are also committed to improving our operational efficiency and being good environmental citizens."

> Passed by voters in January 2004, the 2004 bond program has enabled the District to build seven new schools, improve existing campuses, upgrade technology and proactively pursue land to meet the demands of future growth. Since the passage of the bond, the District's enrollment has grown from 32,241 to over 41,000 this year. Figures show that in the 2012-2013 school year, the student population will grow to 48,053.

> "Our children deserve clean, modern and safe facilities that will allow them to focus on their studies and afford teachers the resources needed to meet the high demands of modern education," Dr. De La Torre added. "As the District continues to grow and our pioneer campuses continue to age, we as a community must find ways to maintain pace so that all of our students' and teachers' needs are met."

Tornillo ISD high school built with eye on future

TORNILLO — Construction of the new Tornillo High School suits TISD Superintendent Paul Vranish to a "T."

With an eye to the future, Vranish explains the plan for the "T"-shaped high school's completion which is expected by the end of September 2009.

Vranish, 53, sits behind his desk wearing a black shirt with the district logo and the inscription "Kids Come First." As if he were signaling for a time out in a football game, he puts his hands together in the familiar sign. He then rotates his hands downward until the edge of his hand representing the top/crossbar of the "T" rests on the desk top.

That top part, which will house classrooms and administrative offices, will be the first occupied portion of the new \$14 million facility.

The other part of the "T" will be virtually hollow and unused — for the time being at least. He expects that to change with the construction of the new international bridge in the Tornillo area.

Although it is a little tight now, he can accommodate the present student population comfortably.

However, with an anticipated influx of new business to support the bridge operation, he expects growth in the school district, "rapid growth." So, rather than scrambling to provide adequate new facilities after the fact, he is building ahead in the present to make it to have classrooms more quickly in the future.

Vranish has good news for Tornillo taxpayers.

One thing that is not a part of the new school is a science lab. It is not an oversight, but done deliberately to save taxpayers' money. The Tornillo superintendent has \$411,000 in grant money waiting in the wings to be used to build

Billed as "A Night of Winners" the 2009-2010 Teacher of the Year Gala held on August 15 at the El Paso Convention Center was a memorable awards ceremony recognizing outstanding teachers from school districts throughout Region 19. Representing San Elizario Independent School District were Delia Dominguez, San Elizario High School science teacher and Virginia Solis-Cera, 5th grade teacher at Sambrano Elementary. Both were already considered winners in San Elizario ISD with Dominguez being nominated as Secondary Teacher of the Year and Solis-Cera nominated as Elementary Teacher of the Year back in May. Among the 21 nominees honored for their excellence in teaching, Solis-Cera was selected as the Education Service Center - Region 19 Elementary Teacher of the Year. 

Vicente Rivas

Community may remember well. In July 2008 Rivas, along with several other accomplices, terrorized a m o b i l e home park in Montana

Vista. He has previously and repeatedly threatened law enforcement officers. Rivas is 5'7" tall and weighs 170 pounds. His hair is black and eyes are brown. He has many tattoos. On his left arm he has MOB, Live For Money Die For Money, skulls, \$\$\$ and drawings of females. Rivas' chest has a woman labeled Irma. He has a tribal tat, two women and a clown with skulls on his neck. Rivas has an extensive violent criminal history and is known to carry handguns with him at all times. Rivas continues to elude capture and is believed to remain in El Paso. In April 2009 Deputies arrested Rivas after a hit and run, finding a black box belonging to Rivas containing a 9mm Taurus handgun, two magazines and extra 9mm ammunition. They also found a plastic bag of cocaine (30.5 grams). Rivas was subsequently arrested for Possession of A Controlled Substance and Unlawful Carrying Weapons. Rivas bonded out a short time later and has not been seen since, never reporting for court. Sheriff's Officials are asking the Public if anyone has seen or knows the whereabouts of Rivas to call Crime Stoppers of El Paso at 566-TIPS (8477). Callers will remain anonymous and may be eligible for a reward if the information provided leads to the apprehension of the individuals featured. Do not approach this man. He is violent and carries weapons.

The vehicle was found a few days after her disappearance, within two blocks of her residence. On Friday, July 31, Marmolejo's body was found in the desert area off Artcraft Road in Santa Teresa, New Mexico. Her death was ruled a homicide. At this time, investigators are asking for the public's help in solving this violent crime. 

the science lab. Through grant funds, the cost of the lab is taken off the backs of the taxpayers.

He sees it as getting more bang for the education buck, likely getting a better science lab than if it had been a part of the original construction plan.

Vranish spoke of good news and bad news for the Tornillo Independent School District.

The good news is that recent TAKS test scores are up for the district which already has highly-rated schools. "They jumped dramatically," he says. The elementary school was rated Exemplary by TEA,

the Texas Education Agency. The intermediate school earned Recognized status, only two percentage points shy of Exemplary. The junior high school was Recognized.

The bad news is that the individual school ratings were insufficient to achieve Recognized status for the district, says Vranish. The reason, he adds, is "completers."

The new "completers" program, mandated now by the state, requires districts to track those who drop out of school and see if they completed high school elsewhere. A rate of completion is compiled. TISD's low completion rating denied them Recognized status.

Vranish says that many of those who have dropped out of TISD classes have returned to their homes

in Mexico where it is impossible to track them.

He feels it is unfair for TISD to be penalized for not being able to track those students. He has appealed the state ruling, but is not optimistic about winning.

Vranish, in his eighth year as superintendent, says a new effort will focus on boosting the district's athletic programs. He explains that the new effort will apply the same principles — finding the same passion — that brought academic excellence to TISD.

"I love my job." From his posted resume on the Internet, he adds. "This is true primarily because I love the opportunities provided by this job to help people — both staff and students - realize their goals and make their dreams come true."

Chosen each year by members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America, any player who has been retired for five years is eligible to be elected into the Hall, and a player must receive at least 75 percent of the vote to do so. Those that don't receive the votes after 15 years are then referred to the Veterans Committee, made up of living Hall of Famers, and the process is about the same (only grumpier).

According to Major League Baseball rules, "voting shall be based upon the player's record, playing ability, integrity, sportsmanship, character and contributions to the team(s) on which the player played." For the past few decades, milestones have dominated the way writers voted — 300 wins and you're in; 500 smacks and you get a plaque; 2,632 consecutive games and you're in the Hall of Fame.

And then came the steroids era. In apparent enforcement of the "integrity" and "character" clauses of the eligibility requirements, those players having been outed as steroid users have not been voted into the Hall and a class act. to wit, Mark McGwire and Jose Canseco.
