Crime Stoppers

Two murders in the outlying areas of El Paso County late last year remain unsolved. The El Paso County Sheriff's Office is asking for help from the public to bring these cases to a successful conclusion, making this the Crime Stoppers "Crime of the Week." On Saturday, Oct. 17, 2009, about 9:00 a.m., 22-year-old Victor Escudero was found to be suffering from multiple gunshot wounds in his home in the 400 block of Hartley Road in San Elizario. He died from his wounds later that month. CID Crimes Against Persons Detectives have been working the case ever since, but are asking the public to provide additional information to help bring a conclusion to this case. Just 10 days later, on Sunday, Oct. 25, 2009, Sheriff's Deputies were dispatched to the 3900 block of Desert Meadows in the Montana Vista area in reference to a welfare check. Upon arrival, Deputies discovered the body of 25-year-old Daniel Arceo. It was determined that he died of gunshot wounds at some time during the previous night. Both crimes remain unsolved, and they are not believed to be related. Sheriff's detectives are certain that someone saw or heard something unusual or out-of-the-ordinary on those nights. They ask that those persons contact Crime Stoppers immediately so that the victims' families may have closure. Clint residents jump on water project

CLINT — It has been said that it takes a village to educate a child.

If that is true, then the town of Clint has proven the truth of that adage in another regard altogether.

In a "sweat-equity" project, nearly 200 people of the Lower Valley community took matters into their own hands. They came together, worked together, literally in the trenches, and laid a water line that will improve their quality of life.

Clint Mayor Dale Reinhardt says the work of citizens of Clint is nothing short of "amazing." Under terms of the \$321,000 Texas Small Towns Environment Program (STEP) grant, they had two years to accomplish the project. Apparently the town did not see the need to drag it out for the two-year period.

Reinhardt says construction started the weekend of Jan. 30/31. After four weekends of work — taking time off for Super Bowl Sunday — the project is 90 percent complete, the mayor says.

"The people are not waiting for a handout; they are helping themselves."

Another amazing aspect, according to the mayor is that 1,000 feet of pipeline was laid the first weekend. Approximately 3,700 feet of pipe have been laid from Texas 20/Alameda along Pioneer, Williams and Langford. What remains is hooking up to the trunk line on Alameda and bringing in the water lines to eight homes from the newly-laid water line.

And Esteban Olivas, whom the mayor calls the "sparkplug/coordinator" for the project, says he plans to finish up this weekend.

Exuding confidence, Olivas says he had no doubts about completing the project in a short period of time. He said it was a matter of "being positive."

Olivas said he brought his own knowledge and experience as a heavy machinery operator to the table. He also thanks his brother Rene who operated the back hoe in digging the trench. "He was my good right hand." Olivas also thanks his boss, Jimmy Menchaca, owner of Hertz Equipment Rental, for supplying

the necessary heavy equipment needed to complete the project.

However, as Olivas and Reinhardt point out, thanks goes out to other important people who helped bring it together. They weren't working in the trenches, but they were pitching in by supplying food and drinks to the workers, supplying clerical help, working on a telephone committee and providing babysitting services.

He estimates about 150 people were involved in the project.

Olivas also thanks the mayor and his staff for their support. "We are so grateful."

The mayor points out that the new water lines will benefit the entire town of Clint, not just the eight families. He explains that it completes the water loop in the town and better balances the water pressure for the entire town.

The mayor reports that another Eagle Scout project is in the offing, one that will benefit the town.

Mario M. Rodriguez, a senior patrol leader in Boy Scout Troop 338, is planning to paint and spruce up the gazebo/pavilion in front of the Clint police station. The project, involving the help of other Boy Scouts in the troop, is expected to get under way in a few weeks.

A previous Eagle project led by Ruben Paredes, Jr., also of Troop 338, benefited Clint. It involved painting safety posts and park benches, and planting fruit trees.

In other developments:

- The mayor says the Easter Bunny will be coming to Puddle Duck Park from 3-4 p.m. on April 1. There will be a drawing for an Easter basket for a boy and girl.

- With a Justice Assistance Grant of \$44,898.51, through the state's Criminal Justice Division, the Clint Police Department will be purchasing a fully-equipped police car.

- The town is applying for a \$23,000 energy efficiency and conservation block grant.

AG offers tips to avoid tax scams

According to the Internal Revenue Service, as many as 1.2 million individuals earn fees for preparing Americans' tax returns. Over the years, the Office of the Attorney General (OAG) has received numerous complaints about tax preparers who fail to file tax returns on time, charge excessive fees, fail to secure anticipated refunds and fail to return personal financial documents to customers. Texans have also voiced concerns about tax preparers making errors on their customers' tax returns or disappearing after returns are filed.

To avoid becoming a tax return scam victim, the OAG urges Texans to take four quick steps before hiring a tax return preparation professional:

- Ask for the tax preparer's credentials.
- Check with the Better Business Bureau for complaints against the tax preparer.
- Verify whether the tax preparer is a certified public accountant.
- Make sure the business is open year-round in the event clients need to ask follow-up questions about their returns.

Texans should make sure they know the exact fee for a preparer's services and insist on a date by which their returns will be filed with the IRS. Clients also should make arrangements to have the tax preparer return personal financial papers used during preparation of the returns.

More importantly, Texans should confirm the basis for all tax deductions the tax preparer claims on their returns. Taxpayers are ultimately subject to accuracy and fraud penalties, plus accrued interest, for any income tax underpayment caused by filing incorrect tax returns.

Taxpayers can generally get information from the IRS about their refund 72 hours after IRS acknowledges receipt of an e-filed return, or three to four weeks after mailing a paper return.

Finally, Texans should not respond to e-mails that appear to be from the Internal Revenue Service. Fraudulent e-mails typically direct a taxpayer to a Web link that requests personal and financial information, such as Social Security, bank account or credit card numbers. Taxpayers should also verify the identification and documentation of anyone claiming to be a IRS agent.

Texans may forward such bogus e-mails to the IRS at phishing@irs.gov or file a complaint with the Office of the Attorney General at (800) 252-8011 or online at www.texasattorneygeneral.gov.

Did VA shred your claims documents?

It appears that the shredding of veterans claims documents is worse than originally thought. A popular veterans Web site, the VA Watchdog (www.vawatchdog.org), not only read the entire September 2009 report by the Veterans Administration Office of the Inspector General, but went to the trouble of doing a Freedom of Information Act request for all the related documents the VAOIG didn't release with its report. The Watchdog site's owner gave links to those documents.

The most devastating documents are the employee statements, many given in the employee's own handwriting. Here are just a few highlights.

One VA employee reported seeing "drop mail" being shredded. (Drop mail is directly related to claims and needs to be "dropped" into the file folder of the veteran.) This "drop mail" consisted of supporting documents such as death certificates, award letters and applications, all necessary to veterans' claims. The employee doing the shredding later gave a statement saying that the supervisor had given instructions to shred in small amounts so it wouldn't be noticed and to "keep quiet" about the assignment.

Other employees were told, concerning the shredded items, that if the veterans "really need it, they can send another copy."

Employees gave statements saying that on many occasions when they left for the weekend, there would be huge quantities of mail on their desks or in the surrounding area. On Monday morning it would all be gone.

At least one employee (one doing a lot of shredding) was promised a bonus for "being so cooperative and handling the team shredding."

El Paso County needs higher voter numbers

Hola mi gente, by the time this article is published, the 2010 primary election will be over and, except for possible run-offs, we will know who is running for office in the November election. Without knowing the final results and based on past primaries, our vote count should be in the neighborhood of 14 to 15%. That is, the number of El Paso voters who participated in the primary was equal to or less than 15% of the total number of registered voters.

My projection is based on the results of the 2006 and 2002 primary elections. Early voting in both of those elections was at about 6% of the total number of registered voters. In those two elections, the total number of votes cast turned out to be around 15% of the total.

Compare those numbers with the 2008 primary which included presidential races. The number of votes cast doubled in the primary. There was a dynamic in that primary that has been absent in most. Whether it was the message, the messenger or voters just being fed up, something motivated more people to vote.

Just because we are not in a presidential cycle is no reason for voter participation to go down. It is just not healthy for elected officials to be put into office with such a small percentage of voters.

How can we increase the percentage of registered voters who actually vote? What can possibly be the solution to eliminating the apathy that so many voters have?

One technical solution is to be certain that our total number of registered voters is correct. I

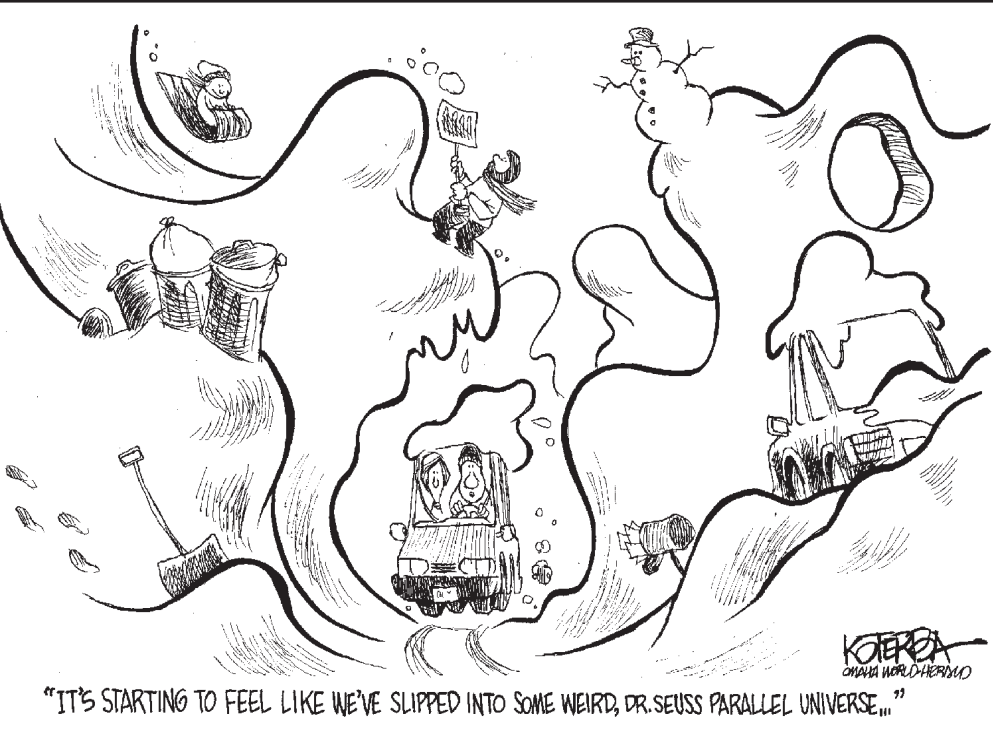
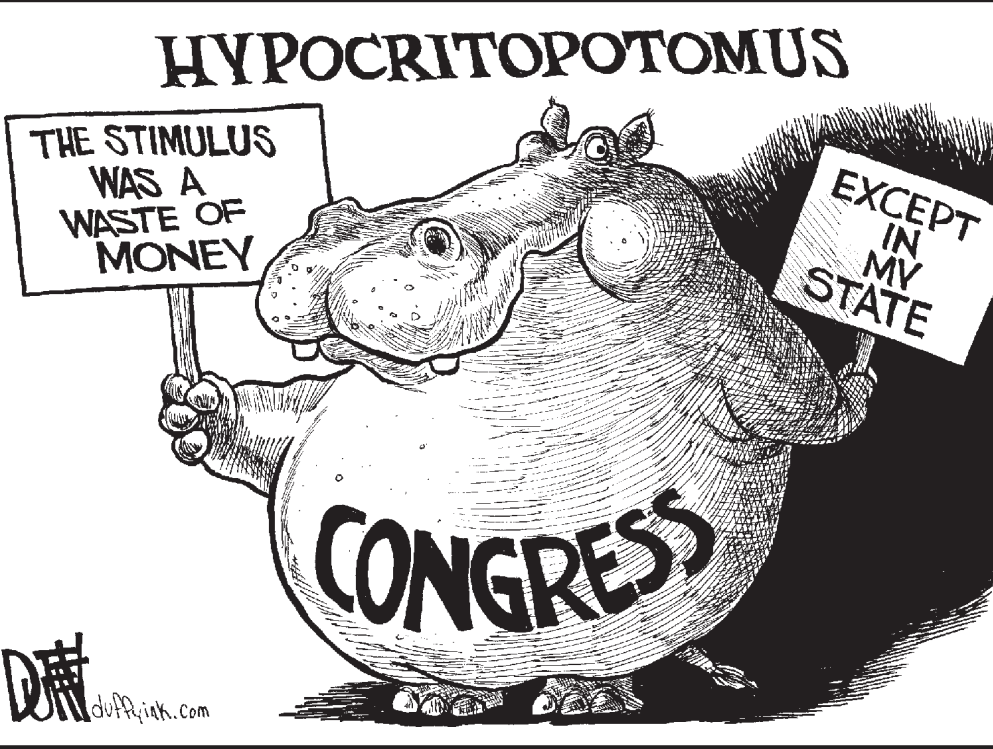

Malign neglect

You've put the kids through college and then saved for decades, putting away a nest egg for those Golden Years when retirement would dictate trips to Europe, extended play on the golf course, more time for what matters most, and a new devil-may-care lease on life. Everything is rosy, and it's good to be alive. Then it strikes you or your significant other, chipping away steadily at financial resources that were originally set aside to see you both through the rest of your journey on earth, until the Almighty beckoned. Currently, millions of people, 5.5 million in the United States, to be exact, and 35 million worldwide, and those who care for them, have been grimly awakened by a malady created by a medical science that has given us longevity. Alzheimer's disease reigns, bringing minds to a halt immediately and hearts subsequently, within 3 to 9 years after diagnosis. To make matters worse, we should beware of what we wish for, namely, a ripe old age, as the incidence of the disease doubles every 5 years after 65 years of age. The good news is that studies on centenarians have shown that Alzheimer's disease is not necessarily the outcome of aging. The bad news is that as the aging population increases, the prevalence of the disease will approach 13 to 16 million cases in the United States by mid-century. With medical costs continuing to spiral out of control, the bitter pill we will need to swallow is the malign neglect that will be afforded to those and their families who wander the physical world, in complete sensorineural oblivion, without the creature comforts and medical care that a life's worth of savings was earmarked to provide but fell hastily into the red.

So, as is usually the case today, we are left with many questions and very few answers. Alzheimer's disease is a strange one, at best, and we haven't even scratched the surface of its causes, let alone therapies to cure, correct, or reverse its devastating effects. While ignorant bliss is perhaps the coin of the realm for those afflicted, it is the spouses and children of Alzheimer's victims who bear the brunt of the financial and emotional pain surrounding the disease. There is no end in sight either, as unlike other chronic illnesses such as diabetes and heart disease, the biochemical and physiologic mechanisms of the malady have as yet to be elucidated. Yet, although we know neither the causes nor how to stop the devastation of dementia, we learn more each year about combating the small losses in brainpower that often occur after age 50. There are even some brain benefits of getting older.

Speed is the name of the game, when it comes to nerve impulses, which can travel as slow as a tricycle or faster than a NASCAR racecar. Reaction time often slows with age,

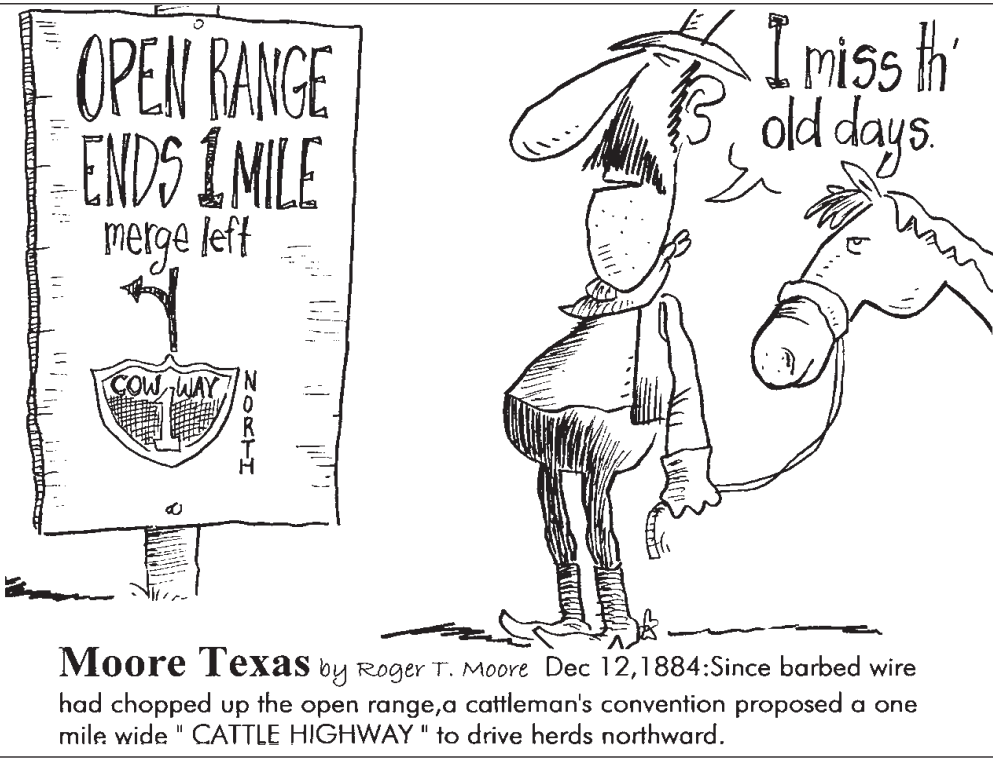
but, with practice, the elderly can improve their mental speed by more than 50 percent. Scientists have been stunned to find full-blown Alzheimer's disease on brain scans of people in their 70s who continue to get top scores on memory and IQ tests. In fact, in some studies, up to 20 percent of people autopsied who had no major memory problems were found to have had Alzheimer's. So, what is going on? What dictates damnation or relative impunity to the long arm of the disease? Why does the brain continue to function efficiently in some cases, despite changes that should cause severe disability? Perhaps the answer lies in what is called "cognitive reserve," which is the sum total of a person's innate abilities plus the additional brainpower that comes from challenging one's mind. No malign neglect there! Studies have shown mentally stimulating tasks increase brain cells, improve connections between those cells, and help bypass age- or disease-related trouble spots in the brain. In short, the more we work our minds, the greater our cognitive reserve; and the greater our cognitive reserve, the greater our ability to mitigate the inevitable challenges of aging.

Despite a youth-oriented culture that wants to bury us before our time, we can take comfort in a body of scientific knowledge indicating that accumulated knowledge, expert skills, wisdom, and emotional savvy all increase with age. Furthermore, higher-order decision making, such as choosing the best investments, and learned skills, such as driving, usually do not decline with age, unless, of course, one is afflicted with Alzheimer's. Not all silver linings are 100 percent, however, and memory for events, short-term memory, and brain speed all suffer with age. The most likely explanations for such deficits are loss of neural connections, blockages of blood supply, and decreases in nerve transmission chemicals.

With no answers forthcoming on the causes and cures of Alzheimer's, and with no stopping the march of time, what can we do to stop, or at least slow, malign neglect? The rule of ten applies here, as we make the best of what doesn't have to be a losing hand, and, namely, boost our brain health by finding stimulating walking partners, varying our daily routines, becoming lifelong learners, playing games with several levels of difficulty, de-stressing with meditation or exercise, getting enough sleep, increasing creativity through new hobbies, socializing and making new friends, following healthy diets rich in fruit, vegetables, whole grains, and fish, and, finally, watching our blood pressure, weight, blood sugar, and cholesterol numbers.

Ignorance is bliss only for the ignorant and those too far gone to care or notice. For the rest of us, it is downright dangerous!

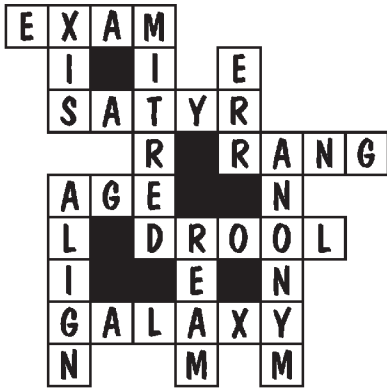
Canutillo FFA’s Ag Field Day a big success

CANUTILLO — Elementary school students in the Canutillo district were thrilled to learn about agriculture and experience fun physical activities during Ag Field Day, held recently at Canutillo High School (CHS). The FFA Chapter at CHS, in connection with National FFA Week, planned the full day of activities in hopes of increasing agriculture awareness to elementary students in the Canutillo Independent School District. Students from each elementary school in the district were transported by school bus to the Ag Field Day, held on the soccer field at CHS. According to FFA students, who planned the event, it was a day in which CISD elementary students were able to experience agriculture first hand.

The event provided students the chance to see live demonstrations with animals and learn about agriculture through interactive displays. Students had the opportunity to view how the dairy industry works through a mobile dairy; see goats and llamas through the live animal petting zoo; witness the shoeing of horses; and experienced hands-on learning activities through the mobile learning barn. There is no defense for NBA’s theft king Alvin Robertson

Back in the late1980s and early 1990s the NBA’s San Antonio Spurs and then the Milwaukee Bucks each had Alvin Robertson on their roster.

Though he wasn’t exactly a big-name star in the league, he was a double-figure scorer who could put up 20 points on any given day.

Robertson spent 10 years in the league and averaged 14 points, five rebounds and five assists per game.

He appeared in four NBA all-star games, he was named the league’s Defensive Player of the Year in 1986 and is one of only four players in history who has recorded a quadruple-double.

In other words, the guy made a pretty good living for a decade.

Robertson has been pretty much totally out of the limelight since he retired, except for his knack for proving how strong he is — to weaker women.

What I mean by that is Robertson is quite the coward in a crowd of men. But put a woman in front of him and he becomes Mr. Tough Guy and has no problem smacking them around.

Case in point, Robertson was sentenced to a month in jail for beating his then-wife in 1990. He then pled no contest in 1997 after he was arrested and charged with four counts of abusing his girlfriend.

And though his past misdeeds have resulted

This time Robertson has been arrested for the alleged sexual assault of a child, trafficking an underage girl for purposes of sex and forcing a sexual performance by a child.

Seems the former NBA player is part of a ring that kidnapped a 14-year old girl from San Antonio and forced her to have sex with clients and to dance at a strip club in Corpus Christi.

How did the authorities get wind of all this ugliness? The girl escaped her captors and ran straight to the police.

How ironic, Robertson still holds the record for steals in a single season with 301.

He’s obviously still at it, only this time he’s stealing childhoods.

We can only hope that Mr. Robertson’s basketball career goes on for another 25-30 years at the nearest penitentiary. He wore number 21 as an NBA player.

I wonder if his jail uniform will have enough material for his new number, something like 21569263.

It’s not war, it’s the Olympics

You can learn a lot — and argue a lot, too — watching the Olympic Games, and that was certainly the case with this year’s Winter Olympiad.

Really, the Olympic Games are the greatest things that the world does in concert. Some would argue

the World’s Fair or World Cup, but taken in its entirety it cannot match the pageantry or the sheer spectacle the Games provide. The World’s Fair ceased to be relevant at around the same time the ice-cream cone was invented, and a city chosen as a World Cup venue doesn’t feel

the impact either economically or psychologically that an Olympic host city experiences. The only time you see the world come together, all at once, holding the flag of their country and smiling is at the Olympic Games. The only other time the human race comes together en masse holding a flag, it’s a war — and they’re really there to shoot you.

And, unlike war, the cities aren’t pillaged. Most cities use

the Olympics as a springboard to civic improvements. They attract businesses, they build parks and entertainment districts, and they also get a bevy of sports facilities that they’d otherwise never think of building, such as a bobsled track or a cross-country track with a shooting range attached.

That track, by the way, is used for the Biathlon, a competition that strikes many people in America as being a bit weird. Curling, we

already knew was weird, but it at least reminds us of shuffleboard. For many, the concept of the Biathlon is just too foreign a concept. At least in some parts of the country or, as I learned a few weeks ago on a radio show I hosted, college campuses.

“The Biathlon is the most ridiculous sport there is,” charged the liberal, tenured professor, aptly positioned to my left. “Skiing with guns. What’s next? Hand grenades and ice dancing?”

Having once dated a mountain girl, I reminded him that skiing and shooting were a perfect combination. I knew of hunters who cross-country skied while hunting grouse, for instance. There used to be a deer-hunting event in the Olympics, too. And there is little doubt that those in the biathlon are athletes.

“These are the best hunters in the world. If we lived near the ice cap, these are the guys you want to have with you — someone who can outlast their prey and take it down with one neatly placed bullet,” I observed, rather astutely. Plus, I argued, target shooting was very sporting, and hunting was a great recreational pursuit.

“Well, I’m vegetarian,” said the young student on the discussion panel. “Why would we need guns if we didn’t kill animals?”

Well, duh... to fight wars. Silly question.

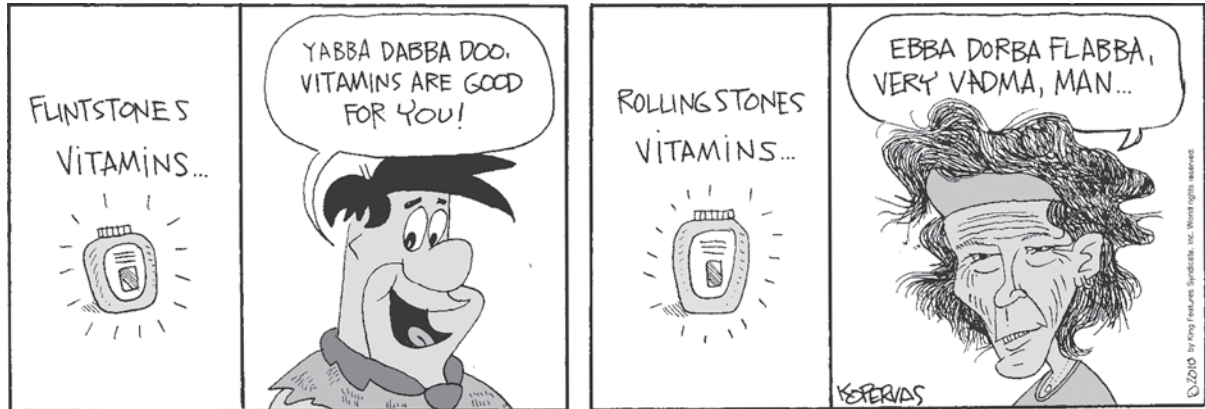

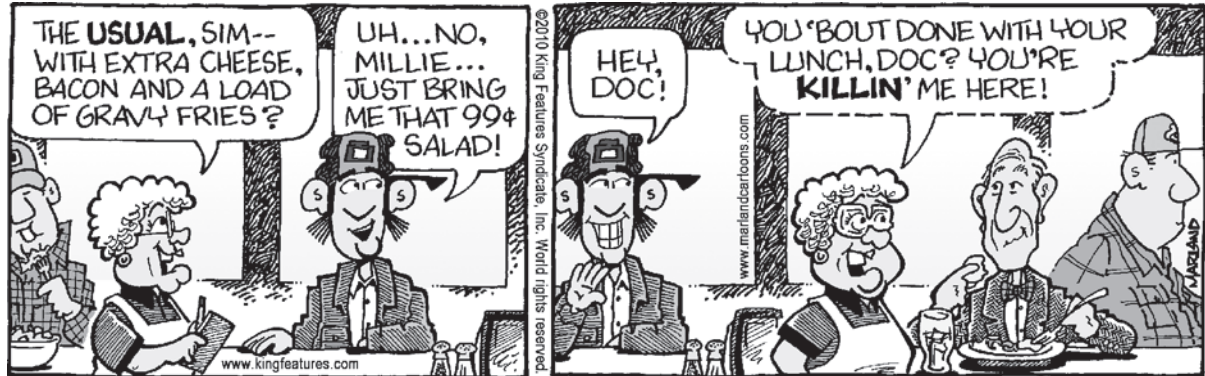

Your good health By Paul G. Donahue, M.D.

DEARDR. DONOHUE: My father is 88 and quite headstrong. He has taken a daily dose of mineral oil for years and years. He says it keeps him regular. Should he continue to do this? Could it harm him? — K.H.

Mineral oil was once a favorite treatment for constipation and for its prevention. It's not a great way to combat either. It interferes with the absorption of vitamins A, D, E and K, and it can block absorption of other nutrients. He should take it before eating or before taking any medicines or vitamins. If it goes down the wrong way — into the lungs rather than the stomach — it causes pneumonia.

Your dad is 88. I take it he is in reasonable health. He's been taking mineral oil for years and years without facing any consequences. I would mention to him that this isn't a good idea. However, he is at an age when he can do most anything he wants. If he objects, I wouldn't push matters too hard.

The booklet on constipation and its treatment deals with this common problem in depth. Readers can order a copy by writing: Dr. Donohue — No. 504W, Box 536475, Orlando, FL 32853-6475. If food or anything else gets caught in the windpipe (the trachea), a solo person can dislodge it by bending over a sturdy chair so the abdomen, just above the navel (bellybutton), rests on the top of the chair. A kitchen chair with a wooden back is a good choice. Then the person pushes the abdomen with an inward and slightly upward thrust against the top of the chair. It should generate a burst of air through the windpipe to dislodge whatever is stuck there. Repeat the thrust as many times as necessary. If a chair is unavailable, then make a fist with one hand and cover it with the other hand. Put the fist in the same location, above the navel, and make a forceful inward and upward thrust. Repeat as needed.

The forced vomiting idea isn't a good one. Vomited material leaves the stomach and enters the mouth through the esophagus. It doesn't unblock the trachea.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Do you lose more nutrients from vegetables when you cook them in a microwave than when you cook them on a stove? — A.T.

You lose fewer vitamins and minerals when you microwave vegetables than when you cook them on top of a stove. Little water is needed when microwaving, so nutrients don't pass out of the vegetables and into the water.

Social Security Q&A

Q: I recently applied for a replacement Social Security card, but I might be moving before it arrives in the mail. What do I do if I move before I get it?

A: Once we have verified all your documents and processed your application, it takes approximately 10 to 14 days to receive your replacement Social Security card. If you move after applying for your new card, notify the post office of your change of address and the post office will forward your card to your new address. If you do not receive your card, please contact your local Social Security office. To get another replacement, you will have to resubmit your evidence of identity and U.S. citizenship, or your lawful immigration status and authority to work. You can learn more at www.socialsecurity.gov.

remember a few years back there was comment that the voter roles included the names of deceased individuals. That number was estimated to be around 50,000 voters.

The real solution is to get more people to vote in primary and general elections. That is easier said than done, of course.

Part of the solution is the responsibility of candidates. Campaigns must be positive and issue based. Negative campaigning has been shown to discourage voters from participating.

The best impetus for increasing voter participation can only come from our community. El Paso County as a whole has to promote voter participation.

How many big El Paso companies or corporations get involved in promoting walkathons or marathons benefiting various health issues? How many of those same companies sponsor sporting events? How many of those companies promote the civic duty to vote?

It is not unreasonable to imagine companies like the El Paso Times, Helen of Troy or Western Refining spending some money to promote voting in a non-partisan effort. Even if big companies do nothing more than encourage those employees who haven’t voted in the past to start doing so, that would make a big difference.

The responsibility to change the apathy of most registered voters in El Paso goes far beyond the political parties. Voting has to be encouraged and rewarded by our community as a whole. Year after year of lamenting low voter turn-out must be now be changed to a community wide effort to get the vote out.


