## Fabens ISD to open 'college high school'

FABENS — A brighter and wider academic portal to the future, once thought unattainable, now beckons to more high school students.

Cotton Valley Early College High School is the newest portal that will open its doors in August and academically challenge 75 ninth-grade students drawn from the Fabens, Fort Hancock, and Tornillo school districts.

Karen Blaine is the principal of the new high school which will be located in O'Donnell Elementary School in the Fabens Independent School District.

The Cotton Valley program is the fourth such partnership arrangement offered through El Paso Community College. The Socorro, Ysleta and Canutillo school districts already offer this program to their students.

At the heart of the program are dual credit courses that allow students to work toward and receive not only a high school diploma at the end of four years, but an associate's degree as well.

A regular high school curriculum is offered plus college-level courses taught by specially certified teachers.

"This is a great opportunity for students," says Jasminka Speer, principal of the Fort Hancock Middle School. Five students will come from Fort Hancock.

Rounding out the first freshman class will be 40 students from Fabens, and 15 from Tornillo. The final 15, according to Blaine, will come from an open enrollment process.

Speer says the district is going through a process in which applicants go before an academic review committee

for final selection. "The students are very interested, very motivated," she adds, "about the opportunity being offered."

The educational opportunity comes without cost, Blaine points out. The program is free — no cost for tuition and textbooks. Funds from the Texas Education Agency and participating school districts cover the cost of the new program.

"The purpose of this collaboration," Blaine points out in a press release, "is to provide a program through which students from Fort Hancock, Tornillo and Fabens will have an opportunity to graduate from high school and complete an associate's degree in four years.

"The goal of the program," she notes, "is to attract and better prepare students for higher education, assure students of the support necessary to be successful in college and provide Cotton Valley Early College High School students a seamless transition between high school and college."

The El Paso Community College homepage adds that the early college high school is a "bold approach... a powerful motivation for students to work hard and meet serious intellectual challenges."

Underscoring EPCC's message, Blaine emphasizes that the program reaches out to those motivated students (current eighth-graders), who have the desire and willingness to embark on a new educational path to a brighter future.

In effect, Blaine says, the Fabens students will be picked through a lottery arrangement. Selection will not be based on previous academic achievement. If, for example, 60 successfully apply for the school from Fabens, they will have an equal chance to for selection as one of the final 40.

In promoting the program, she has "made the rounds" of the school districts and talking to parents and students. Particularly she is reaching out to those economically disadvantaged students, students at risk and those families who children have not advanced beyond high school.

"We want this opportunity for all of our students," she says simply.

Starting out with a freshman class, the early college high school will add a grade each subsequent year. Academically they will be a part of Fabens ISD, but will be able to maintain athletic allegiances with their own school districts.

Blaine says that the incoming freshman class will meet for half days for two weeks in June to get acquainted with each other and adjust to their new academic surroundings. They will select a mascot, school colors and discuss various school activities and student government.

As for Blaine, who comes to Fabens from Region 19 Education Service Center, this is a dream job. "I have been smiling the whole time."

# State services take hit while economy recovers

Hola mi gente. There are definitely signs that our ravaged economy is beginning to come back to life. If some recovery does occur, we might not have to face as dour an outlook next January when the next legislative session convenes. I hope that turns out to be the case.

The Texas Comptroller has issued revenue reports showing the decline in sales tax receipts is slowing, if not stalling, and starting to increase. There is still time before the next session for a strong rebound to

reduce a deficit that some say could be as high as \$10 billion. We faced that size of deficit in 2003, my first year as a state representative.

There were not many solutions to the deficit back then other than to make severe cuts in spending across the board. Unfortunately for the less fortunate in El Paso, the cuts were made to many programs that help sustain families. Service

personnel who took applications and serviced those seeking state assistance were cut and replaced by a phone in system. This resulted in discouraging people from applying because of the difficulty in getting their applications processed.

We also did away with some agencies. One example was the state air transportation pool. There was actually a small fleet of planes made available for state officers to avoid private airlines or costly private jets.

After all was said and done, many worthwhile programs were reduced in funding while some others that had no impact on the lives of needy Texans were sustained. During the debate for the appropriations bill in 2003, many amendments were offered that took monies

from programs like the county court house renovation project and inserted those monies to programs that sustained the health of women and children. Time after time, our efforts were rejected.

We did end up with a balance budget and the state survived only to have a similar deficit this year.

One option that was considered in 2003 and never passed was gambling. Every time we have a big budget deficit, gambling is touted as the only new revenue source that will generate huge sums of money. In 2003, the leadership of the legislature was way too conservative to give gambling a second thought. Today, there is very serious consideration for some sort of gaming bill to be passed. Judging from private conversations I have had and public comments made by among others the governor, the most likely bill to pass would allow video lottery terminals (VLTs) at racetracks.

VLTs are nothing more than a slot machine similar to those in Las Vegas. There are some differences but more similarities. Should they be legalized, Speaking Rock would be able to open with the same machines.

While the comments are positive, there are forces of which many are not aware that would work against legalized gambling. After all there are four states on our borders which have legal gaming that would lose a lot of Texas gamblers. Working stealthily behind the scenes, advocates of those states helped kill gambling bills in the past.

If gaming fails to pass in some way, we only have two viable alternatives to raising revenues. Property tax increases would most likely have to occur. For one thing, the statewide leadership would not be seen as responsible for the increase. A statewide sales tax increase would be different.

I have filed and supported gambling bills in the past because they were good for El Paso. Let us hope that we finally get over the hump and do it so the likelihood of property tax increases will be significantly reduced.

### Gulf War and health

The Institute of Medicine of the National Academies has released its newest report, Volume 8 of an ongoing study: "Gulf War and Health." This time it looked at the progress of existing illnesses and new ones as well.

It was the unexplained illnesses — chronic fatigue, rashes, forgetfulness, muscle and joint pain and headache, to name a few — that first prompted the Department of Veterans Affairs to ask for the study in 1998. Not only were there the oil-well fires, but there were chemical exposures to sarin, depleted uranium and more, including the vaccinations for botulinum toxoid and anthrax that might have caused the symptoms in service personnel.

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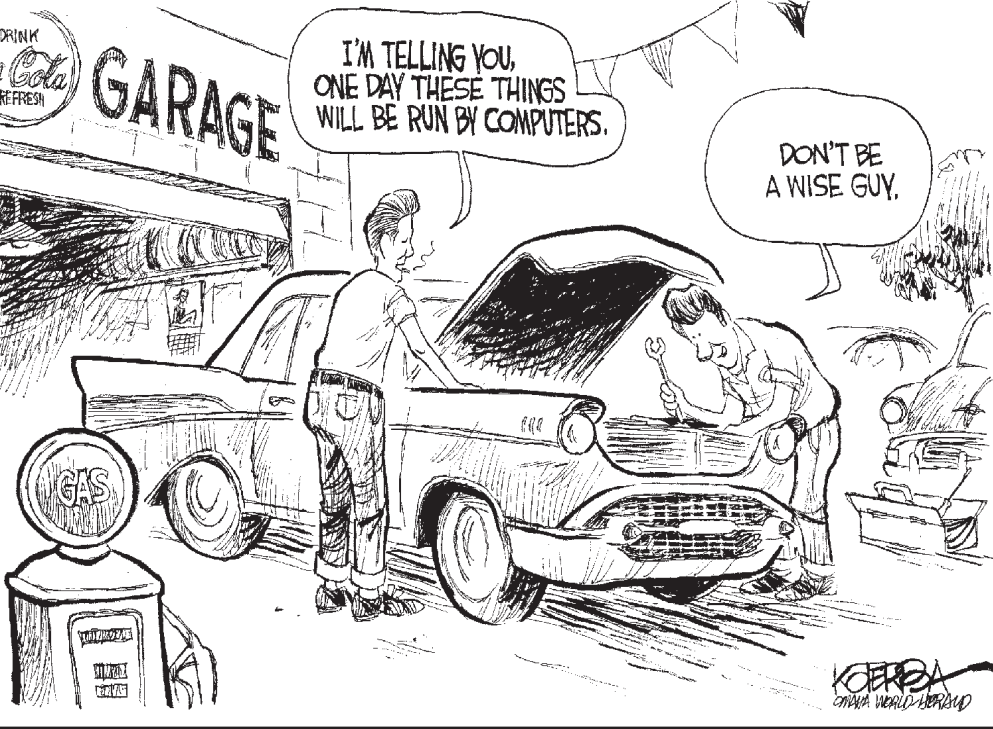
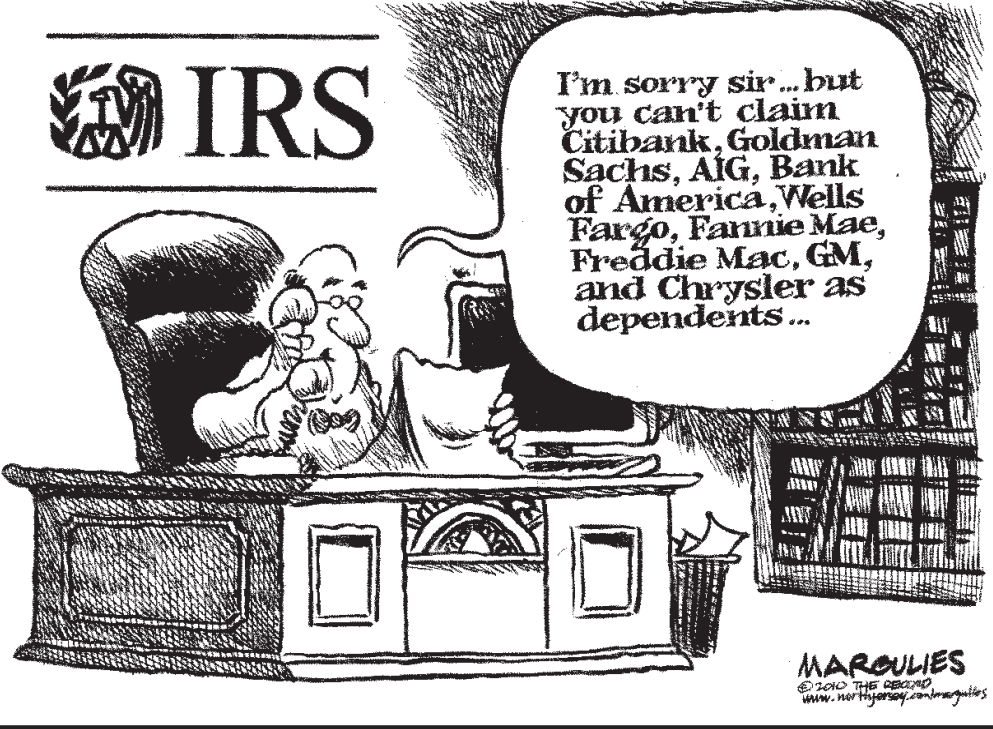

# Screen saver?

For years now, doctors, nurses, health educators, and patients have sung the praises of screening and subsequent early detection, aggressive therapy, and increased longevity for breast and prostate cancers. They may have gotten it all wrong, however! In fact, recent retrospective studies done at the University of California at San Francisco (UCSF) and the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio, and published in the October 21, 2009 issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA), have demonstrated the ineffectiveness of 20 years worth of screening for breast and prostate cancers, which currently account for over 25 percent of annual cancer diagnoses in the United States, in significantly reducing the death rates from those maladies. So, perhaps doctors should refrain from teaching their patients how to perform breast self-exams, until their efficacy can be proven. If that were not all, in November 2009, a federally appointed panel of experts, known as the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, all but panned baseline mammograms at age 40 in women with neither risk factors nor family history of breast cancer. The rationale behind the task force's pronouncement from on high was an end not justifying a means, with the risks of mammograms before age 50 outweighing the benefits of early detection of breast cancer. New recommendations, that women aged 50-74 years without symptoms or risk factors of breast cancer undergo mammography every other year, instead of annually, have unleashed a wave of accusations, criticisms, finger-pointing, and protests that the federal government is now rationing health care, to the detriment of its citizens. Nonetheless, evidence continues to mount that screenings are neither savers nor saviors, and even the American Cancer Society (ACS), one of the staunchest supporters of cancer testing, has had to reevaluate its position and scale back support of mass breast and prostate cancer screenings.

The change in position of the ACS and other former supporters of early, regular, and frequent screening stems from the increased detection of small, slow-growing breast tumors that may never cause harm, at the expense of aggressive tumors that arise and grow rapidly between screenings. Were that not all, repeated exposures to screening radiation, false-positive diagnoses of breast cancer, and overtreatment and extensive procedures for slow-growing tumors that may never cause problems place

women and their families in the precarious positions of being "damned if they do" and "damned if they don't." On the prostate side, controversy is no less evident, with neither the ACS nor the Preventive Services Task Force recommending or justifying routine screening for prostate cancer via prostate-specific antigen (PSA) blood tests, in the face of the most common cancer in men presiding over an increased mortality risk of only 3 percent. So, satisfactory answers are not immediately forthcoming, and each patient must rely on introspection and personal health philosophy to guide judgment on the wisdom and benefits of detecting small, slow-growing, non-aggressive, and/or only remotely lethal tumors, in exchange for peace of mind that may not outweigh the burden of knowledge, the potential complications and drawbacks of overtreatment, and the financial hardships imposed. It makes no sense to inflate unnecessary screenings in these times of shrinking health care dollars.

This medical piece would not be complete, without some final affirmations and a bit of advice to the readers. While regular breast cancer screening is warranted in patients over 50 years of age with no risk factors, it does not mean annual mammograms. Women aged 50-80 with low or average risk may be screened by mammography every other year, with those over 80 perhaps no longer requiring mammograms. Worrisome are the patients who go five or more years without a mammogram, not those screened every one or two years. Self-discovery of a lump or abnormality in a breast, however, no matter how recent the mammogram, mandates immediate visit to a physician.

In the "non-fairer" sex, on the other hand, the jury is still out on routine annual PSA testing to screen for prostate cancer. For every man who avoids prostate cancer, 50 will be treated unnecessarily with subsequent incontinence and impotence resulting, due to a test that fails to distinguish slow-growing cancers that will never cause problems from the aggressive kind.

A screen saver works just fine in the inanimate, but when it comes to the living and breathing, too much of the scientific community's best of intentions does not always make for a happy ending. In fact, quite the contrary!

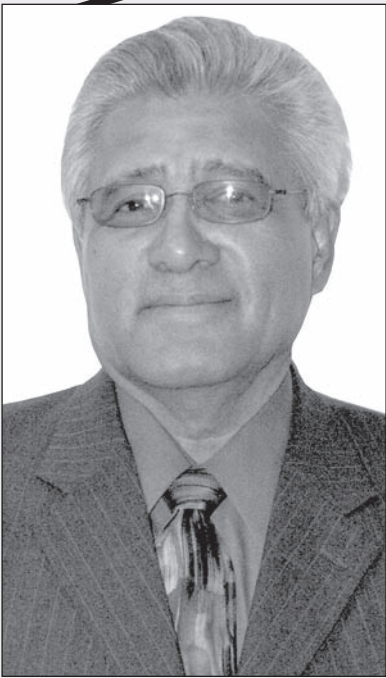

It’s gotten so bad out there that whenever an athlete does something utterly ridiculous, the media actually holds round table discussions on whether the penalty he or she received was too harsh.

It’s like we’ve become immune to the severity of their depravity.

And this brings me to an athlete that really caught my eye a few months ago. Not because of anything bad — but because of his extraordinary accomplishments and his decent behavior.

But hurray for the Titans who dared to give a young man of such character and knowledge a chance to make the team.

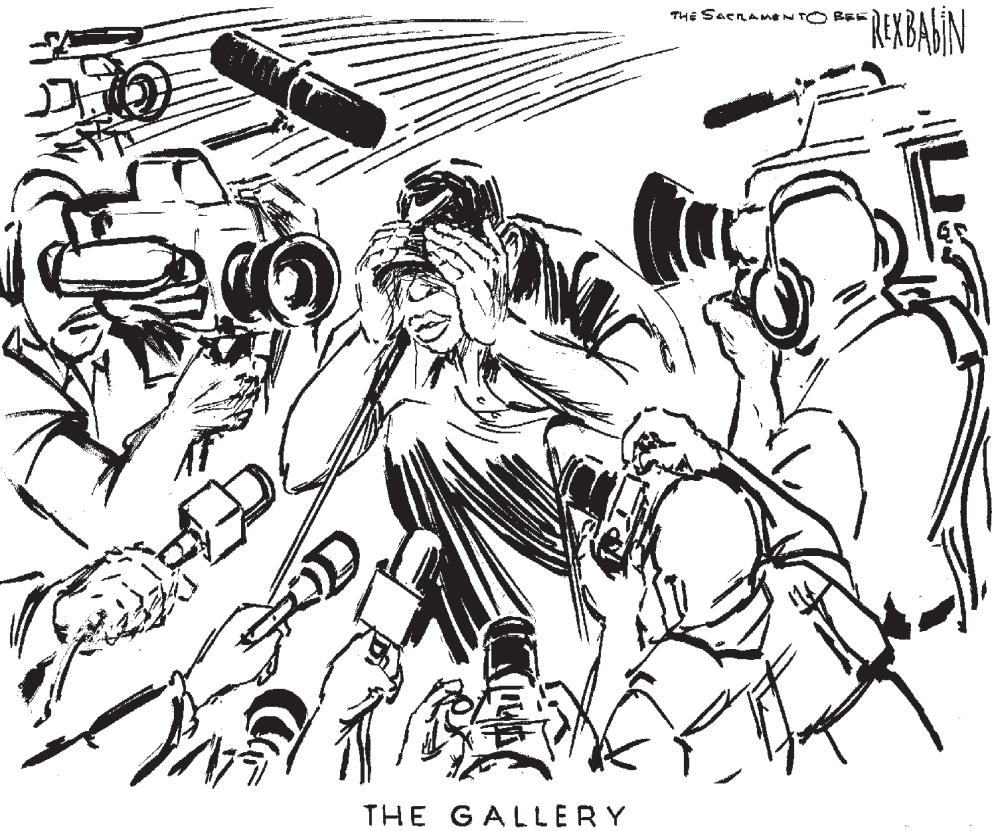
Imagine what an influence Rolle can be on any team to the number of young men who considered academics a burden on the way to what they really wanted — a big NFL contract.

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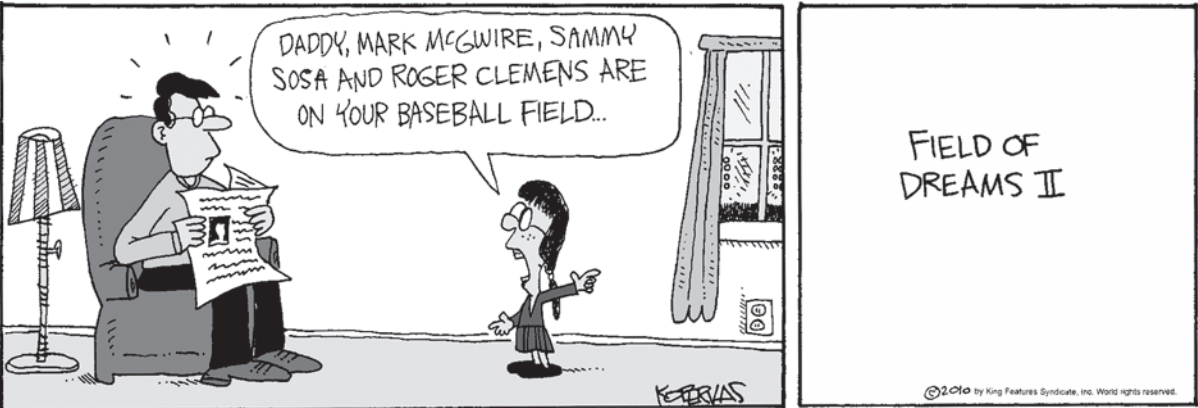

Your good healthBy Paul G. Donahue, M.D.

*DEAR DR. DONOHUE:* What can you tell me about a low sodium level? My visiting friend (from England) was refused embarkation on his cruise because he was acting belligerent and confused. The ship’s doctor sent him to a hospital. He had scans, an EEG and numerous blood and urine tests. Everything was normal except he had low sodium. His insurance carrier sent a doctor from England to accompany him on a flight back to London. He has since seen his own doctor. His sodium level has risen. What happened to him? — B.L.

Sodium has many functions. It keeps body fluids at the right level. It maintains blood pressure. It’s essential for muscle contractions. It participates in generating the heartbeat. It carries a positive electric charge, so it balances the negatively charged body substances.

A drop in blood sodium leads to fatigue, nausea and weakness. If the level dips farther, people become confused and dizzy. At very low levels, they could have a seizure and lapse into a coma.

Your friend’s doctor has the task of finding out why your friend’s sodium level fell. In quite a few instances, it comes about from an inappropriate release of a body hormone called ADH, antidiuretic hormone. This hormone stops kidney urine production. The result is too much water in the body. The extra water dilutes sodium and produces a low reading. Liver diseases, troubles with the adrenal glands and a sluggish thyroid gland are other causes for a lowering of blood sodium.

Restoring the body’s sodium content is not too difficult. Tracking the reason why it dropped is.

Has your friend’s mental function normalized now that his sodium level has returned

to normal? If it has not, then his doctor has to look for explanations of his erratic behavior that have nothing to do with his sodium.

The booklet on sodium and potassium explains why these minerals are so important and what happens when they are out of kilter. *DEAR DR. DONOHUE:* I have been eating ice cream and cookies sweetened with Splenda for about four years, enjoying them very much and not experiencing any bad side effects. Then someone told me that Splenda is really bug poison and that it has made a lot of people sick, so I stopped using it. I have noticed no improvement, but I didn’t have anything wrong in the first place. I miss Splenda foods. What is your opinion? — N.B.

Splenda is not bug poison. It’s made from sugar. It’s a product that is 600 times sweeter than sugar. It is not absorbed, so it contributes no calories to those who eat it. It’s FDA-approved, and I trust the people at the Food and Drug Administration more than I trust your informant. There’s no reason for you not to use it.

Some people delight in passing on alarming information. Your “someone” has to be one of them.

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Social Security Q&A

Q: I am 61 and my ex-wife is 64. We had been married 38 years. I have always worked but she has never worked. I understand that she will be eligible for 50% of my social security benefit. If I continue to work, when will she be eligible? Is she eligible now or will her benefit be based on my age benefit. I was born in 1949.

A: You are right. At her full retirement age, 66; she will be eligible to receive 50% based on the amount you would be eligible to receive at your full retirement age, also age 66. Under Independently Divorced Spouse's Benefits, when you turn age 62, because you were married over 10 years, provided that the divorce has been in place for 2 years and provided she has not remarried, she is entitled to file off your social security record even though you are still working. Of course her social security benefits would be subject to a reduction because she is not of full retirement age.

Q: My wife doesn't have enough work under Social Security to qualify for Social Security retirement benefits or Medicare. But I am fully insured and eligible. Can she qualify on my record?

A: Yes. The question you've raised applies to husbands as well as wives. Even if your spouse has never worked under Social Security, she (or he) can, at full retirement age, receive a benefit equal to one-half of your full retirement amount. If your spouse will receive a pension for work not covered by Social Security such as government employment, the amount of his or her Social Security benefits on your record may be reduced. Your wife is eligible for full spouses benefits at her full retirement age, or reduced spouses benefits as early as age 62, as long as you are already receiving benefits. Q: I recently received my annual Social Security Statement in the mail, and I noticed my taxes are only "estimated". How did you calculate the amount?

A: The Internal Revenue Service collects your Social Security and Medicare taxes. At Social Security, we do not keep a record of those taxes; we record only your earnings because your earnings are what we use to calculate your benefits. To estimate the total tax amounts we show on your Statement, we multiplied your reported earnings for each year that you worked by the tax rate for that year. We then added all the years together. If you had both wages and self-employment earnings in the same year, we estimated the taxes for that year as if the total amount was wages. If you had both Social Security earnings and government earnings that qualified for Medicare in the same year, we estimated the combined Medicare taxes you paid.
