Horse and burro adoption in Canutillo

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is has new dates for its wild horse and burro adoption in Canutillo. The event will be held April 21- 23 at the Rio Grande Valley Ranch Arena. The three-day event will feature over 50 spectacular animals. These are adult and yearling horses and burros

that once roamed free on public lands in the west. The BLM periodically removes excess animals from the range in order to maintain healthy herds and to protect other rangeland resources. The adoption program is essential for achieving these important management goals.

Adoption Schedule:

Adoption begins with a competitive bid Thursday, April 21, at 2 p.m. First-come-first-served adoptions follow until 6 p.m., then

again Friday, April 22, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Saturday, April 23, from 8 a.m. to noon.

Adoption Qualifications:

Application approval is required and can be done on site. To qualify to adopt, one must be at least 18 years old with no record of animal abuse. Adopters must have a minimum of 400 square feet of corral space per animal, with free access to food, water and shelter. A six-foot corral fence is required for adult horses and five feet for yearlings. All horses must be loaded in covered stock-type trailers with swing gates and sturdy walls and floors. BLM staff will be on hand to assist with the short application process, answer any questions and load horses.

Adoption Fees:

The standard adoption fee is \$125, as set by law. Bidding will start at that amount.

\$500 Adoption Incentive:

BLM pays a one-time \$500 care-and-feeding allowance to adopters of horses at least four years old. The allowance is paid in full after one year when adopters receive official ownership title for their horse(s). All standard adoption conditions and fees apply. A limited number of eligible horses will be available at Canutillo. Younger horses, burros and trained animals are not eligible for this incentive.

Wild horses and burros – iconic symbols of America’s western heritage – are renowned for their strength, endurance, agility and intelligence, characteristics bred into them in the wild that make them ideal for work or recreation. Since 1973, the BLM has placed more than 220,000 of these “living legends” in approved homes across the country.

Northwest Early College students place first In Moot Court Tournament

Northwest Early College High School (NECHS) students took top honors during the Law School Preparation Institute’s (LSPI) Second Annual High School Moot Court Tournament held recently in the Liberal Arts Building on the University of Texas at El Paso campus.

NECHS sophomores Ember Sikorski and Christina Collazo tied for the top advocate award in the Saturday morning competition. NECHS juniors Aimee Olivas and Roberto (Nick) Ballesteros were the second place team.

This year, about 60 high school students from local school districts participated in the tournament. “With the help of attorneys from the local bar association serving as judges, this competition gave students

a chance to demonstrate their ability to construct sound legal arguments and exercise their presentation abilities,” stated LSPI officials.

The Moot Court Tournament pitted participants in a legal case currently making its way through the U. S. Supreme Court process. The Supreme Court judges are being asked to rule on a California law that seeks to ban the sale and rental of violent games to children, marking the first time a case involving the interactive medium itself has gone before the nation’s highest court.

The law, signed by Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger in 2005, was declared unconstitutional last year by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco.

Ken Holzman, NECHS history and geography teacher, helped prepare 20 NECHS students for the legal contest.

VA health system software upgrade

It's been called VistA, which stands for Veterans Integrated System Technology Architecture, and it is the backbone of the electronic health record system for the Department of Veterans Affairs. VistA has allowed health-care providers to read and update a patient's records with just a few keystrokes. It can keep track of prescriptions and tests ordered by any VA medical facility, keep special diets straight, handle nursing notes and improve overall efficiency. Veterans who wish to sign up can get prescription refills ordered online, access their records and send messages to their health team.

It's part of the Open Source Electronic Health Record, and the VA wants to update it.

Therefore the VA has taken the initial steps to award "custodial services" to put an open-source version of VistA in all its many facilities and to upgrade the software. In tech-talk, "open source" means that the software itself is out there in the public domain, and the VA is hoping that others will create complementary software that will work with

VistA. The custodial agent will be the gatekeeper through which all new parts and pieces flow.

Dr. Peter Levin, adviser to the secretary and chief technology officer of the VA, described in a long article the "13,000 kinds of medical diagnoses, 6,000 medicines, and 4,000 possible procedures" necessary for them to practice medicine. He says that opening up the source code can "ensure cyber security by exposing code to large communities of technical reviewers." He concludes that "vendors will have a clear path to the enormous federal healthcare IT market."

Are you nervous yet?

Inquiring minds want to know how these "custodians" will be selected, and what criteria they'll use to "ensure" the cyber security of the information that the software will handle.

Term limits amendment

U.S. Term Limits President Philip Blumel praised Senator Jim DeMint (R-SC) and 10 Senate Republican cosponsors for introducing an amendment to the U.S. Constitution which would set term limits on members of Congress.

The Constitutional Amendment would allow members of the House of Representatives to serve a maximum of three terms of two years, and Senators would be limited to two terms of six years each.

"The waves of change that have hit Washington, DC over the past couple of election cycles would be meaningful if those who lead Congress and its committees weren't standard political insiders with little connection remaining to those who they were elected to serve. Today, Senator DeMint and 10 Senate

Republicans have taken a bold step to change the culture of corruption and entitlement in our nation's capitol."

78 percent of Americans support congressional term limits according to a September 2010 FoxNews Public Opinion Dynamics poll of registered voters. Enjoying overwhelming bipartisan support, 74 percent of Democrats polled favored term limits with 84 percent of Republicans indicating support.

The poll showed that support has jumped by eight percent from the last nationwide poll conducted by the same firm in March 2009 poll registered that 70 percent of Americans supported congressional term limits.

"The myth that professional legislators are needed to deal with the complexity

of government today is exposed by the \$14.3 trillion national debt hole that has been created by the very professional politicians who make this argument. We can no longer afford career politicians who defer tough decisions to commissions and other non-elected bodies. Limiting terms will allow citizen legislators to come to Washington, DC, fix the problems and then go home to resume their lives, instead of becoming encamped in the cloistered world inside the DC Beltway," Blumel concluded.

Passage of the Constitutional Amendment requires a two-thirds vote of both the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives followed by passage in 37 states. It is anticipated that a companion bill will be introduced in the House of Representatives.

"We began preparing at least a month before the tournament," said Holzman. "We formed ten teams, two students per team, and then we divided into five teams for the ban and five teams against the ban," he explained.

According to the NECHS teacher, one group of teams built a case to support California's measure that would regulate games more like pornography than movies, prohibiting the sale or rental of games that give players the option of "killing, maiming, dismembering, or sexually assaulting an image of a human being" to anyone under the age of 18.

"The other group prepared to defend the federal court's ruling that said the law violated minors' constitutional rights under the First and Fourteenth amendments and the state lacked enough evidence to prove violent games cause physical and psychological harm to minors," said Holzman, who is also an attorney.

The moot court tournament is one of several activities coordinated by UTEP's LSPI program. Initiated in 1998, LSPI provides a variety of law and prelaw-related programs that serve undergraduate and high school students as well as the general community. The pre-law program offers students the opportunity to participate in summer and internship programs, a high school law camp each summer, and other educational and community outreach efforts.

"The Moot Court tournament is a great way to teach high school students how to think on their feet, how to be analytical in their thinking, and how to present their ideas logically," said NECHS Principal Peggy Gustafson about her students' participation in the

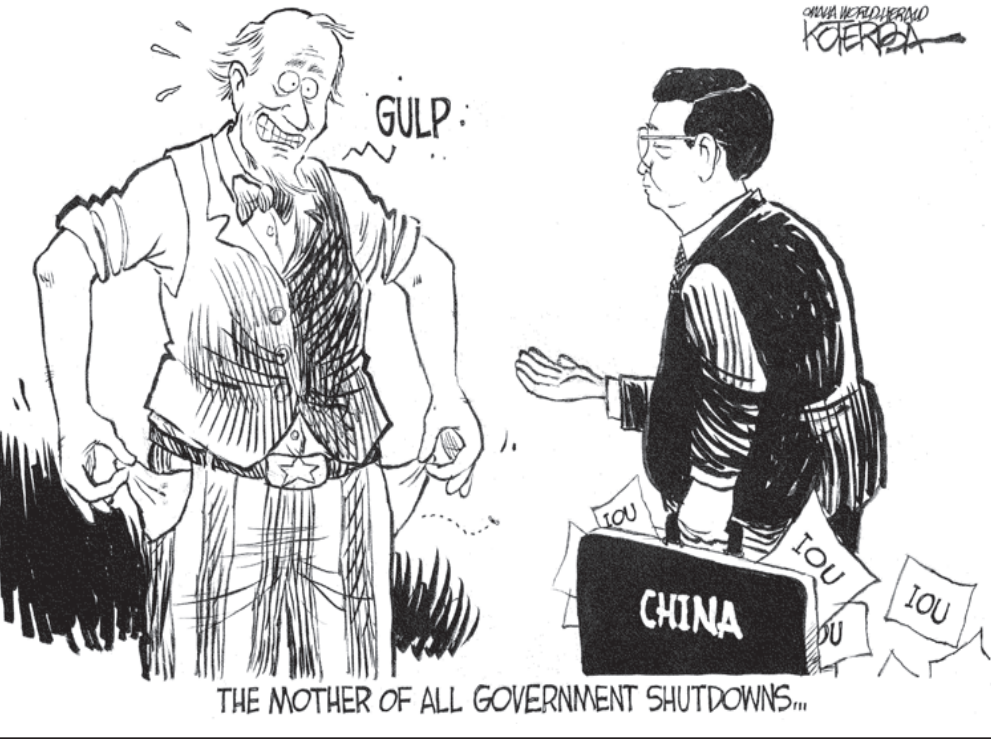
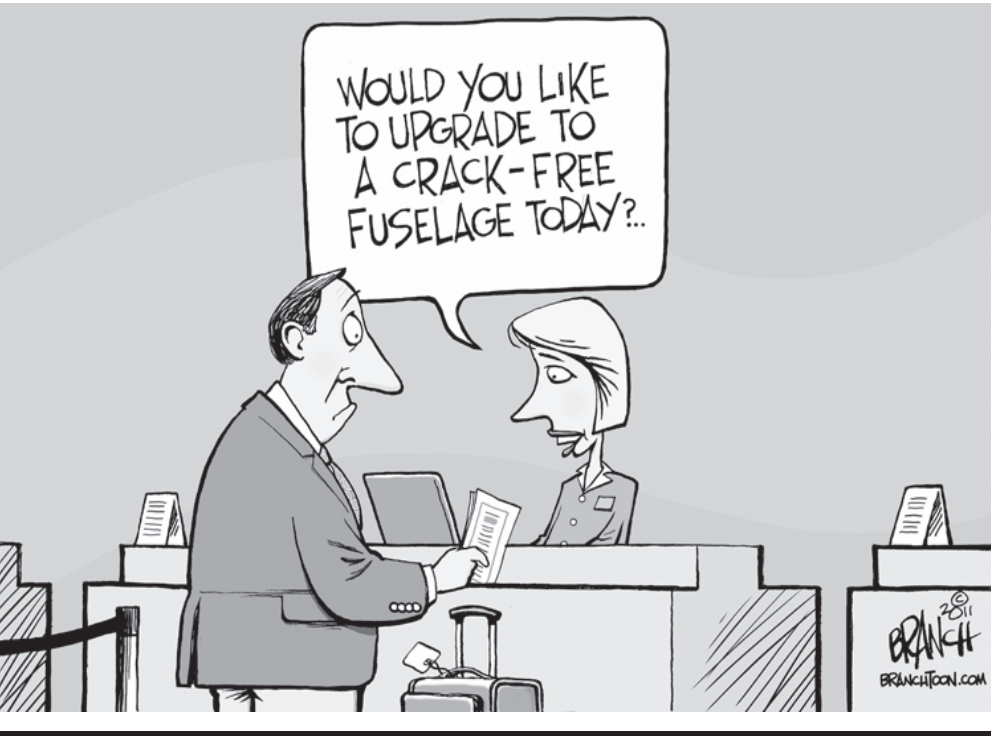

Redistricting

Hola mi gente. The chairman of the redistricting committee released the proposed map of redistricting for the state of Texas. Although there were changes, the boundaries for the five El Paso House members remain relatively unchanged.

Before going further on redistricting, I would like to commend Representative Pickett's office for handling the responsibility of drawing our maps. Eddie Miranda, the Chief of Staff, did most of the leg work tweaking maps after input from members. It was not an easy task but he did an excellent job of coordinating the drawing for Representative Pickett.

With a lopsided majority, some were fearful that the Republican majority was going to draw maps that were unreasonable. Had there been the atmosphere of 2003 to 2007, the likelihood of an unreasonable map would have been greater. Chairman Solomons allowed the delegations to design their boundaries. That resulted in very few concerns.

As a matter of fact, before the map was released, there were comments from some of the more conservative members about the process being too generous with Democrats.

In the redistricting process, there inevitably arises a situation where sitting members are placed into the same district. That is referred to as "pairing". There were eight districts drawn that resulted in pairings. Only one paired Democrats. The other fourteen members were Republican.

The leadership put six newly elected Republican members, swept in by the teaparty excitement, into the pairing process. Of those, only two are guaranteed a district because the others are paired with incumbents.

The proposed map also paired four long time members. One pairing of members in the panhandle won't be a contested race if the plan remains the same. There has already been an announcement by one of leaving the legislature.

The other pairing of longtime members is not one that is easily called.

The final pairing of Republicans involves one member who switched parties this past year. I will let you decide who has the advantage in that race.

On Friday the fifteenth of April, the Redistricting Committee had its first hearing on the proposed boundaries. There were a few members who discussed concerns at the hearing. The members of the southern Rio Grande area and members in a certain Houston area presented their concerns.

The longest testimony was given by the Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund(MALDEF). Their concern was primarily creating more Latino districts. The map they presented also redrew the boundaries for the El Paso delegation. I was not very pleased with their El Paso County map. We have requested information from them to determine their reasoning. I think it is important to address that issue because if MALDEF succeeded in court, El Paso County would not benefit.

The five house members of the El Paso delegation contributed to the map proposed by Chairman Solomons. If MALDEF agrees to leave El Paso county with the boundaries in that map, then there will be no concerns if there is some litigation against the statewide redistricting.

Sexual Assault Awareness Month

This month, the Texas Attorney General's Office, law enforcement officials and crime victim advocacy groups throughout the country will observe Sexual Assault Awareness Month. The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) has long been committed to preventing sexual violence and serving crime victims through quality assistance to Texas victims and survivors. In addition to offering funding and technical assistance to sexual assault programs throughout the State, our Sexual Assault Prevention and Crisis Services (SAPCS) Program certifies Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANEs).

For sexual assault survivors, a SANE nurse's role is often the epitome of patient support. SANEs are registered nurses who have been specifically trained to provide comprehensive care to sexual assault survivors during a medical forensic examination. SANEs, as health care professionals, offer not only medical care, but also provide critical assistance to law enforcement by collecting and preserving forensic evidence that prosecutors may need to hold perpetrators accountable for their sexual assault-related crimes.

To become an OAG-certified Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner, SAPCSP requires a registered nurse to complete classroom and clinical training components.

SANE programs help sexual assault survivors by ensuring that a victim receives appropriate medical treatment – while at the same time ensuring that forensic evidence is properly collected. Crime victim advocacy groups note that survivors recover more quickly when they have been properly treated by a professional sexual assault nurse examiner.

Additionally, a sexual assault victim who has received compassionate treatment from the same SANE throughout the exam is more likely to help authorities pursue the perpetrator. Adult sexual assault victims decide for themselves whether to report the crime to law enforcement authorities. SANEs are trained to provide effective courtroom testimony if a victim chooses to report the crime and press legal charges against the attacker.

Importantly, sexual assault victims are not charged for the forensic portion of the sexual assault medical forensic examination. The forensic examination, including the evidence collection kit, is initially paid for by the local law enforcement agency. Local law enforcement agencies are then reimbursed by the OAG's Texas Compensation for Victims of Crime (CVC) Fund. The CVC Fund is also available as a payer of last resort to reimburse victims for other expenses incurred because of the crime – such as treatment of physical injuries, counseling or even relocation for sexual assault victims attacked in their own residence.

Nurse professionals who obtain SANE certification learn how to properly collect valuable forensic evidence. As a result, SANEs have the ability to help improve sexual assault survivors' mental health and physical well being – while also helping law enforcement authorities investigate and prosecutors secure convictions of sex offenders. Accurate evidence collection and increased conviction rates can help ensure that more sexual assault perpetrators in Texas are incarcerated and safely prevented from harming new victims.

Bad autism study spreads fear, preventable disease

One vaccine study now exposed as fraudulent frightened parents and harmed children, but today doctors hope they can re-convince patients that vaccines are safe, effective, and important.
A study attempting to link autism to the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine, though ultimately retracted and now alleged to be fraudulent, is lowering immunization rates and increasing the prevalence of vaccine-preventable diseases, explains Texas Medicine magazine, the official publication of the Texas Medical Association (TMA).
In 1998, British physician Andrew Wakefield, MD, published a study in British medical journal The Lancet linking the MMR vaccine to autism and bowel disease, introducing a new syndrome he called “autistic enterocolitis.” This sparked a media firestorm, and some parents decided against vaccinating their children.
“Parents developed a global fear of vaccines,” says Ari Brown, MD, an Austin pediatrician and member of TMA’s *Be Wise – Immunize* Advisory Panel.
Now the number of patients contracting preventable diseases, such as measles and pertussis (commonly referred to as whooping cough), has risen.
Measles cases in the United States rose to 131 in 2008 from 63 in 2000. The suffering caused by the measles outbreak was “preventable and occurred because of fear created by this public fraud,” according to Jason Terk, MD, a member of TMA’s Council on Science and Public Health, and *Be Wise – Immunize* Advisory Panel. The situation was worse in Britain, where in 2004 the vaccination rate fell to 80 percent, well below the World Health Organization’s recommendation of 95 percent. England and Wales declared measles endemic in 2008. They asserted the disease has taken firm root among their populations when the number of cases surged to 1,370.

Also, nearly 17,000 people suffered from whooping cough in 2009, and 12 infants died from the disease. A recent serious whooping cough outbreak struck Williamson County in central Texas, where more than 18 times the state average number of residents contracted the illness.
Meanwhile public doubt about vaccines existed, so physicians and scientific researchers repeatedly asked and attempted to answer whether

Character has up and down rookie year with LA Lakers

Derrick Character was sent back to the Los Angeles Lakers this week after a few games with Bakersfield of the NBA D-League, which serves as a kind of Triple-A for the big club.

Of course he was sent back up because starting center Andrew Bynum hurt his chronic right knee and is currently listed as day-to-day for their first playoff series against the New Orleans Hornets.

The real downside of Character’s decision will come in a couple years when it’s time to sign a new contract.

Will the Lakers resign him? If they don’t, will anyone else think enough of him to hand over the big bucks?

Now don’t get me wrong, \$400,000 is nothing to sneeze at. I would love to find out what it’s like to settle for that kind of paycheck.

Character should have stayed in school even though they keep paying guys big money to play a kid’s game. Then he would have been given the kind of money that would set him up for several lifetimes.

Well, let’s look at it this way – at least Character will get to tell his grandchildren he was kind of on the same team as Kobe Bryant.

Best of the bunch

On my top living-room library shelf, the actual sugar bowl seen and used by Mary Tyler Moore on “The Dick Van Dyke Show” resides.

Yes...it was verified through some agency that supposedly specializes in that sort of thing – celebrity sugar bowls, apparently – but as for me, there was always room for doubt or, at least, a little skepticism. I’m thinking that the MTM memorabilia

business – with all due respect to the resurgent Betty White – is tepid at best these days.

Nonetheless, on my shelf that little sugar bowl remains, and someday, when I actually make friends with the neighbors I’ve so successfully avoided over all these years (and don’t I just sound like a thrill a minute), it will be a fantastic “awkward conversation” destructor.

“Yes, Mitzi,” I’d say, not completely sure that her name was, in fact, “Mitzi,” but gaming her enough to bet she wouldn’t make a scene if I was wrong. “Yes,” I would say, “That is the Stanley Cup of sugar bowls.”

Maybe Mitzi would balk at that notion. Maybe her husband originally hailed from Canada and actually knew of the sport called “hockey” and employed some serious skill when it came to “getting past customs.”

But if you get past that shelf, you run into some of the greatest sports movies in history. Accordingly,

these are some of the best of the bunch (in no particular order):

“Raging Bull” –The ultimate sports bio-pic involving subject matter that wasn’t a bit too short in stature for Notre Dame or suffering from a terminal illness, Robert Deniro and Martin Scorsese collaborate to make this not only one of the greatest sports flicks of all-time (the boxing scenes are of legend and cribbed by almost every director in the ring), but one of the best movies ever, period. It may seem cliché now, but that’s only because this movie helped define what they were.

Pass the popcorn... more “best sports movies of all-time” in next week’s installment.

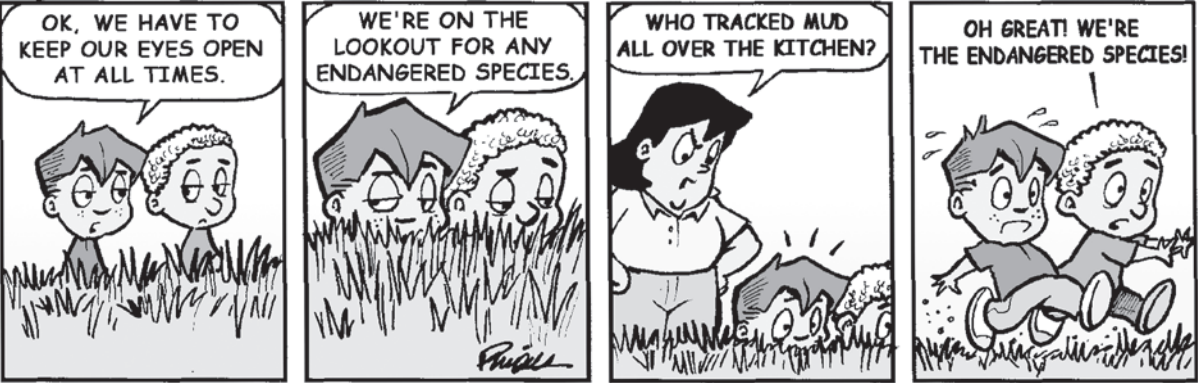

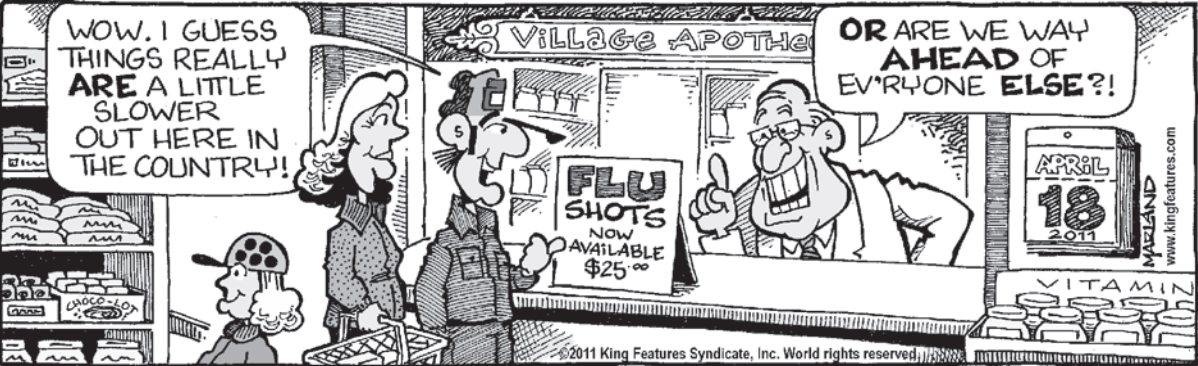

Your good healthBy Paul G. Donahue, M.D.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Can I reverse sarcopenia, or just slow it down? What I would like to know is what can I do for my thighs? How often should I do it? And I'd like something for my stomach. – J.H.

For readers: Sarcopenia is muscle shrinkage that comes with age.

Weightlifting stops the wasting away of muscles and builds them up. Older people are not going to develop the same muscle size that a 20-year-old can, but they can see a marked improvement in their strength and an increase in muscle size through weightlifting.

For your specific thigh problem, the squat is a good exercise. From the standing position, you bend your knees until your thighs are parallel to the ground. You don't have to touch your heels with your buttocks. Lower yourself only to the position I mentioned. Farther than that can hurt the knees.

Start out doing the exercise with no additional weight. Your body weight is enough at first. As you gain experience and strength, you can use additional weight, either a barbell supported behind your neck and on your shoulders, or you can hold on to weights. When you start using weights, exercise three times a week with a full day's rest between exercise sessions.

For your abdomen, the bicycle maneuver is one of the best exercises. Lie on the floor and raise your legs straight up. Then bend the knees to a right angle so your lower legs are parallel to the floor. Now start pedaling as though you were riding a bike.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: When you and others tell people to walk for exercise, exactly what does that mean in terms of speed? – L.M.

The ideal walking speed is 3 to 3.5 miles an hour or 1 mile in 17 to 20 minutes. If that's too fast a pace for you, walk at a speed you can maintain for at least 10 minutes. Every week try to increase the tempo and the time spent walking.

The ultimate goal is to walk for 30 minutes every day of the week – if possible.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I'm 61, and I don't take medicines. I feel good. I have been exercising for two years. I would like to increase my activity. What's considered a safe way to do so? – L.P.

Follow the 10 percent rule. It's safe to increase exercise by 10 percent each week. Increase means increasing exercise speed, exercise duration, the number of repetitions you lift a weight or the number of pounds you lift. Don't increase all aspects. Take one at a time. If you jog, increase either the distance or the time by 10 percent. One week make it distance; the next, speed.

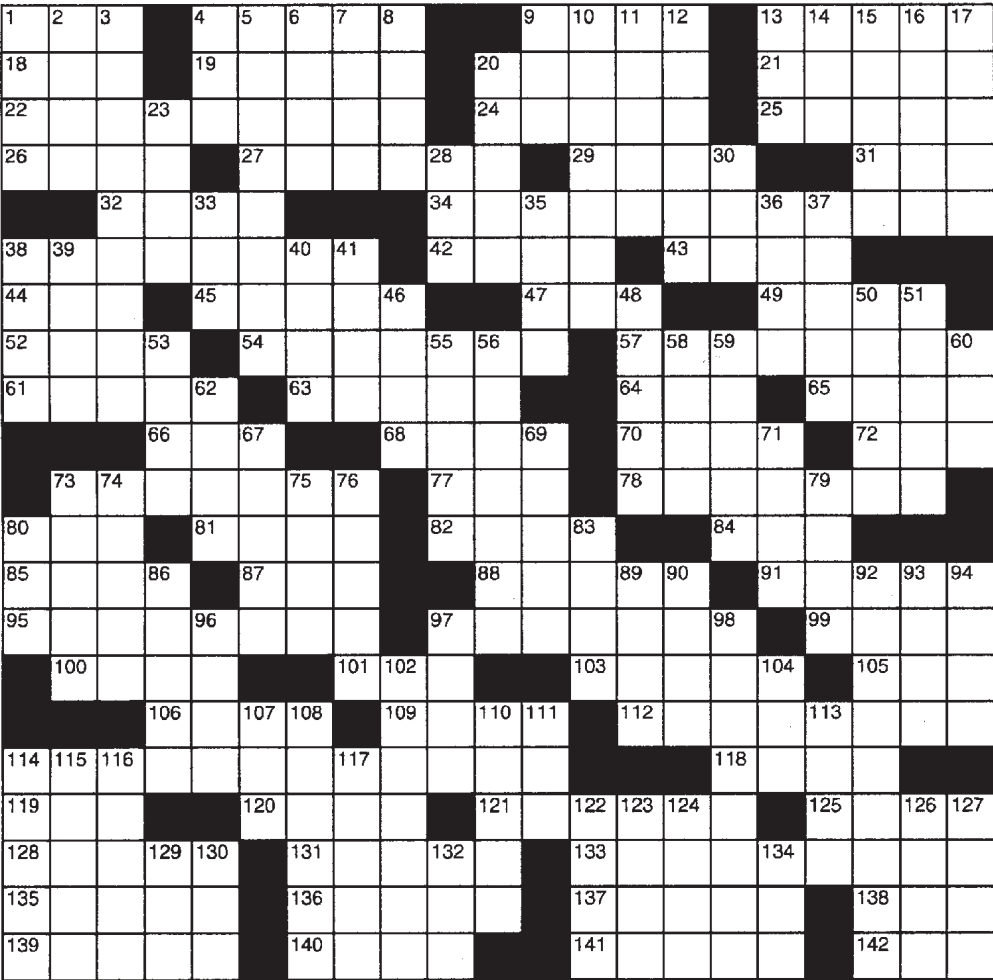

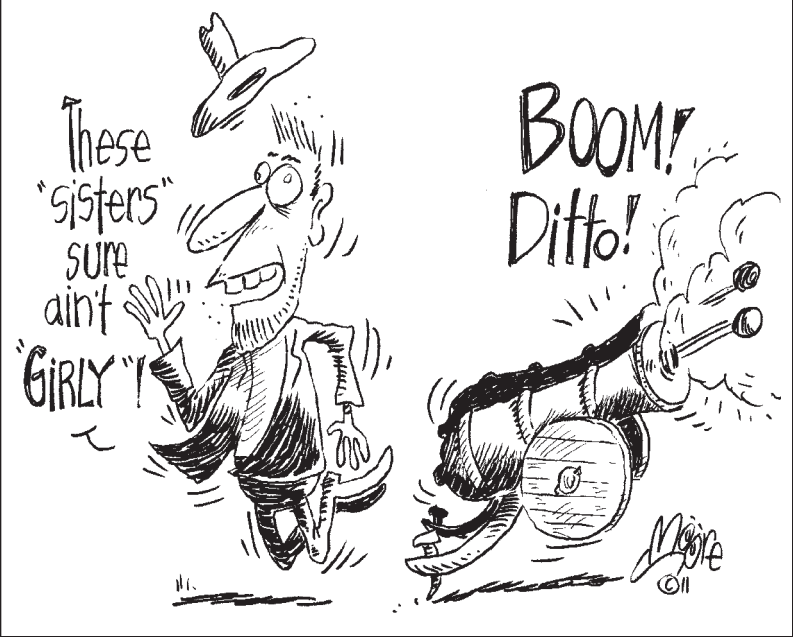

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Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: My uncle is interested in getting help with his Medicare Part D prescription costs, but he has about \$10,000 in the bank. Would he still be eligible?

A: Based on his resources, yes. However, there are other factors to consider as well including your uncle’s income. This year a person’s total resources are, in most cases, limited to \$11,010 (or \$22,010 if married and living with spouse) to qualify for Extra Help with Medicare prescription drug costs. But the resource limits shown on the application include a \$1,500 per person exclusion for burial purposes. So, if you expect to use some of your resources to pay for burial or funeral expenses, your resource limit is \$12,510 if you are single or \$25,010 if you are married and living with your spouse. Resources include the value of the things you own, such as real estate (other than the place you live), cash, bank accounts, stocks, bonds, and retirement accounts like IRAs or 401ks. There are exceptions. To learn more, go to www.socialsecurity.gov and visit the Medicare link. Or call us at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778).

Q: Is there a time limit on how long I can collect Social Security disability benefits?

A: Your disability benefits will

continue as long as your medical condition has not improved and you remain unable to work. Your case will be reviewed at regular intervals to make sure you still are disabled. If you still are receiving disability benefits when you reach full retirement age, we will automatically convert them to retirement benefits. See www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs/10153.html#6 for more information on disability.

Q: My husband doesn’t have enough work to qualify for Social Security or Medicare. Can he qualify on my record?

A: This answer applies to wives as well as husbands – even if your spouse has never worked under Social Security, your spouse at full retirement age can receive a benefit equal to one-half of your full retirement amount. This assumes you were married at least 1 year and that he did not pay into a government pension plan that offsets Social Security. If he receives a pension from Federal, State or local government based on work where he did not pay Social Security taxes, any benefits he may be offset. Spouses cannot receive benefits on your record until you begin receiving retirement benefits, however. You can learn more by reading our online publication,

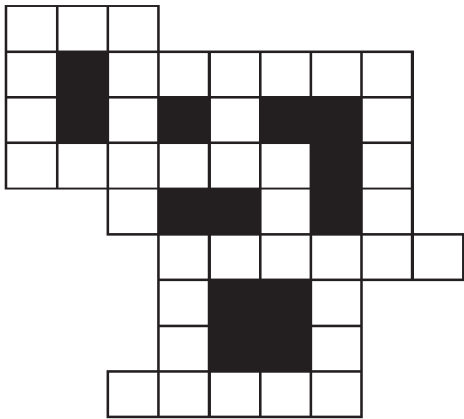
