Comptroller issues internet security breach alert

Canutillo ISD meet

The Facilities Stakeholders Committee of the Canutillo Independent School District will gather to take the first steps toward creating the Decision Canutillo 2011 Oversight Committee. The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 26, in the CISD Boardroom, 7965 Artcraft Rd. The Facilities Stakeholders Committee is a group of about 20 parents, employees and business leaders from the Canutillo community who last winter inspected all district facilities and finances. In February, they recommended to the CISD Board of Trustees that the district seek voter approval for a Tax Ratification Election and \$43.9 million Bond Election. Both elections, dubbed Decision Canutillo 2011, will be voted on during the May 14 election. CISD officials, including the Board of Trustees and Superintendent Dr. Damon Murphy, have made a commitment to create an oversight committee to review expenditures and progress of Decision Canutillo 2011 projects. During the meeting, the committee will hear what is needed to establish an oversight committee. They also will get an update on the Decision Canutillo 2011 information campaign.

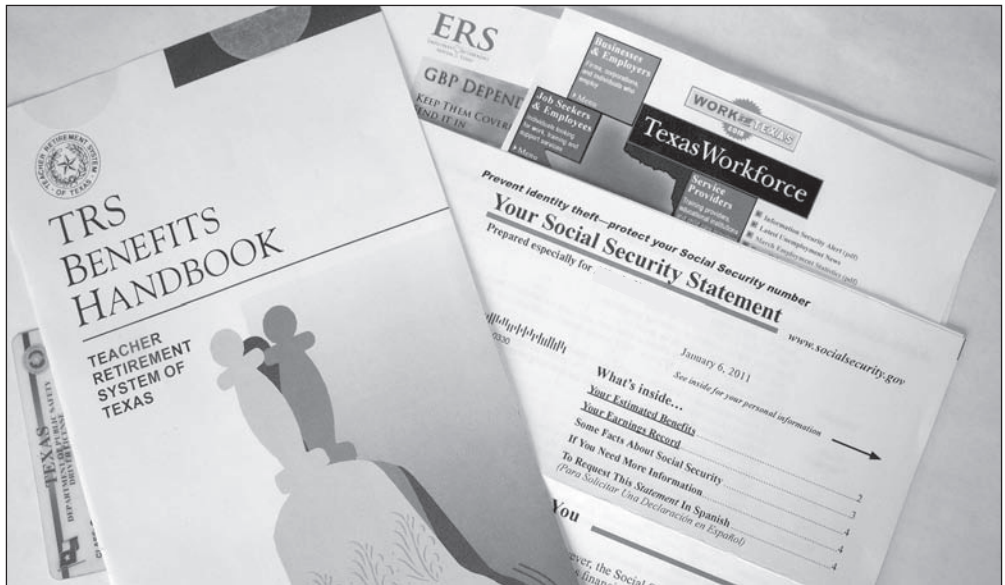
TEXAS – Texas Comptroller’s Office publicly issued recently a consumer alert regarding the names, addresses, Social Security numbers and driver’s licenses of more than three million Texans that were inadvertently stored on a publicly accessible website.

The information exposed on the website included data from the Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS), the Texas Workforce Commission and the Employees Retirement System of Texas (ERS).

“Unfortunately, the Attorney General’s Office has learned that Texans affected by the Internet security breach are now the targets of a new telephone scam,” stated John Ellen, director of Operations for Health and Human Services Commission Office of the Inspector General Operations Division.

Ellen stated that a state employee reported receiving fraudulent telephone calls at home from an individual seeking to confirm the employee’s Social Security numbers. The caller falsely claimed to be with ERS.

According to the report, a Health and Human Services Commission employee declared that an individual called the employee’s home, identified himself as “Mike with ERS” and said he wanted to confirm the last four digits of the employee’s Social Security number.

EXPOSED – All of the organizations pictured – Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS), the Texas Workforce Commission and the Employees Retirement System of Texas (ERS) – were breached. The information released included names, addresses, Social Security numbers and driver’s licenses of more than three million Texans. Any documents that contain peronal information, PINs or any other identifying information should be carefully stored. A good shredder should be used when disposing of these types of materials. Personal computers should also be guarded and have security software in place.

When the employee refused to provide information, the caller said, “Good luck to you” and disconnected the call.

“Affected state employees and retirees – as well as current and retired teachers or university employees – should be alert that ERS, TRS and the Texas Workforce Commission are not making these telephone calls,” stated Ellen. “State

employees and all Texans who receive these kinds of fraudulent phone calls should not provide any information to the caller: JUST HANG UP!”

The Attorney General’s Office offered the following guidelines to further guard against identity theft. Texans whose confidential

Over 4,700 sites join DEA nationwide effort to collect drugs

WASHINGTONDC–The Drug Enforcement Administration’s (DEA’s) second National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day is this Saturday, April 30. More than 4,700 sites nationwide have joined the effort that seeks to prevent pill abuse and theft. This is hundreds more sites than were established for the event last fall. The free event will be held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. local time.

Government, community, public health and law enforcement partners at these sites will be working together to collect expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs that are potentially dangerous if left in the family’s medicine cabinet.

Last September, Americans turned in over 242,000 pounds – 121 tons – of prescription drugs at nearly 4,100 sites operated by more than 3,000 of the DEA’s state and local law enforcement partners. Also last fall, Congress passed the Safe and Secure Drug Disposal Act of 2010, which amends the Controlled Substances Act to allow users of controlled substance medications to dispose of them by delivering them to entities authorized by the Attorney General to accept them. The Act also allows the Attorney

General to authorize long term care facilities to dispose of their residents’ controlled substances in certain instances. DEA is presently drafting regulations to implement the Act.

Collection sites in every local community can be found by going to www.dea.gov and clicking on the “Got Drugs?” banner at the top of the home page, which connects to a database that citizens can search by zip code, city or county. This site is continuously updated with new take-back locations. In addition, interested media can now go to: www.nationaltakebackday.com to download a public service announcement about the initiative.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high – more Americans currently abuse prescription drugs than the number of those using cocaine, hallucinogens, and heroin combined, according to the 2009 National Survey on Drug Use and Health. Studies show that individuals that abuse prescription drugs often obtained them from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition,

many Americans do not know how to properly dispose of their unused medicine, often flushing them down the toilet or throwing them away – both potential safety and health hazards.

“The overwhelming public response to DEA’s first nationwide Take-Back event last fall not only rid homes of potentially

harmful prescription drugs, but was an unprecedented opportunity to educate everyone about the growing prescription drug abuse problem,” said DEA Administrator Michele Leonhart. “Studies have shown that, for many, prescription drugs are the very first drugs

The month of April has been proclaimed “Fair Housing Month”; copies of the official proclamation are available at the Socorro City Hall between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday.

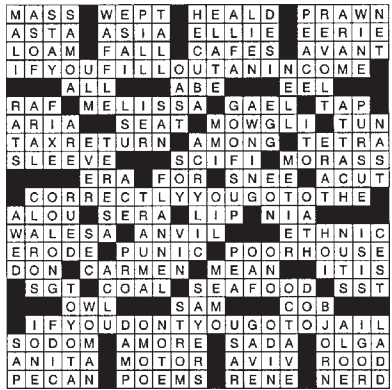
COMPLAINT AND GRIEVANCE PROCEDURES

Socorro Bulldogs miss Forbes, NFL holds draft

Chris Forbes – where are you?

If you take a look at the District 1-5A baseball standings you’ll notice something missing from the very top – the Socorro Bulldogs.

It’s more than sad to see what has happened to the proud Socorro program since the retirement of legendary coach Chris Forbes a couple years ago.

How bad has it gotten? In the last two years of the Forbes era, Socorro went 70-8 and won the Texas state baseball championship.

Last season Socorro lost eight games alone, and this year they are just 15-16 and are a shocking 3-11 in league play, just a game out of last place.

Reagan, who was pretty good at turning a phrase, helped in the response. Years earlier, he had agreed to debate the president of the student body at Berkeley. The student, in his opening remarks, slammed Reagan for being out of touch and checked off a litany of things that Reagan couldn’t possibly comprehend.

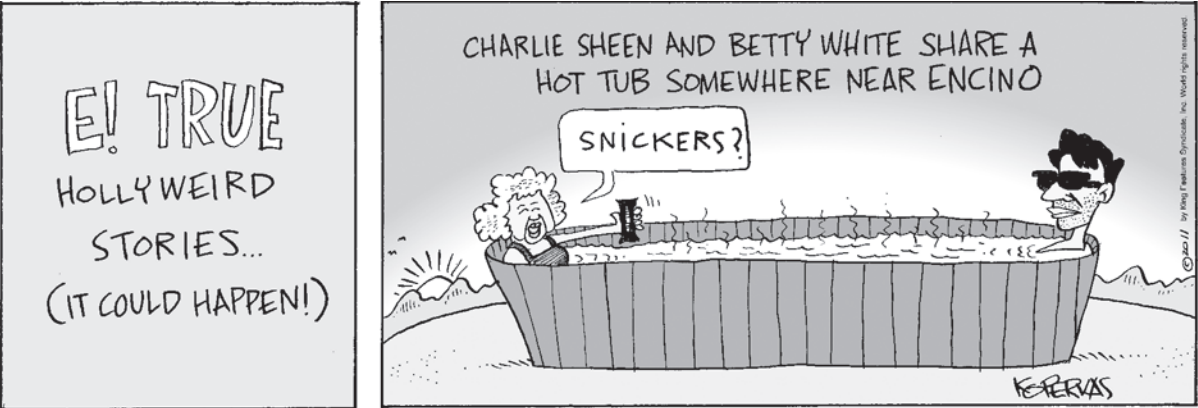

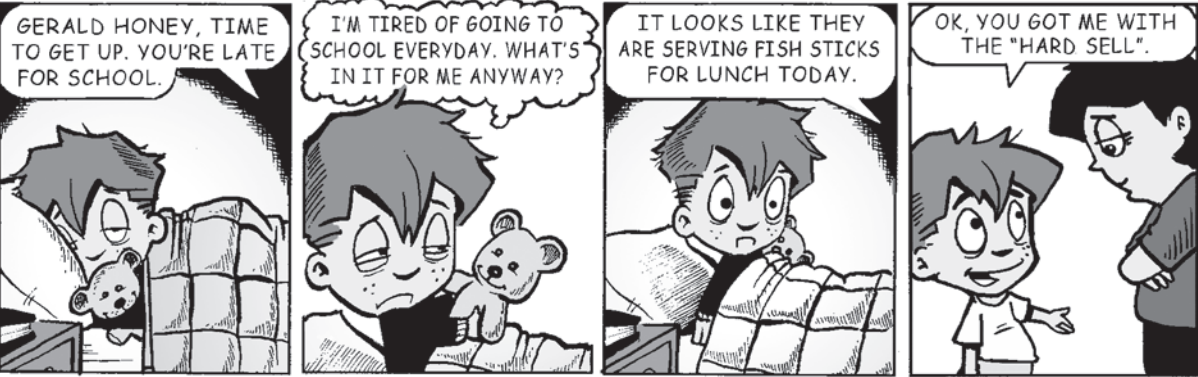

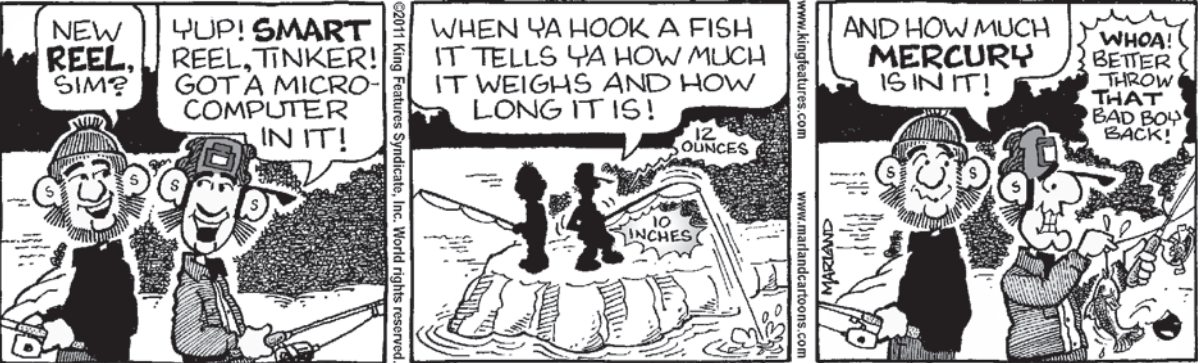

Your good healthBy Paul G. Donahue, M.D.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am a 73-year-old woman. I have an abdominal aortic aneurysm. I have sonograms regularly. I am in a bowling league. I bowl each week. My bowling ball weighs 10 pounds. Should I bowl? My last ultrasound shows that the aneurysm is 3.8 cm. – F.S.

Your doctor is the only one who can answer your question with authority. He or she knows all the circumstances of your health. However, I can tell you that most people with an aneurysm of your size are encouraged to be active. Lifting heavy weights is discouraged. A 10-pound bowling ball isn't considered a heavy weight.

The size of an aneurysm determines its risk of breaking apart and bleeding profusely. Aneurysms smaller than 4 cm are not in danger of suddenly rupturing. When an aneurysm reaches 5 to 5.5 cm, then surgical repair is recommended. You are quite a distance away from the danger zone.

For readers: Aneurysms are bulges of an artery wall, and are weak spots.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I hope you will discuss lactose intolerance. I am 60 and just developed it. – J.B.

Lactose is milk sugar. In our digestive tracts is an enzyme—lactase—that digests milk sugar. People with too little of the lactase enzyme have trouble when they drink or eat dairy products. Milk sugar doesn't break down. The undigested sugar leads to gas production, stomach cramps and diarrhea.

Medical tests can confirm the dearth of the lactase enzyme.

Standard treatment of lactose intolerance (also called lactase deficiency) is avoidance of dairy products. Most cheeses have little lactose, so they can be eaten. Yogurt made from live cultures is

usually tolerated. Furthermore, many dairy products can be pretreated with lactase, and people with the intolerance are not bothered by such products. The lactase enzyme comes in pill and liquid forms. It can be added to milk or taken by mouth before eating or drinking dairy products.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: How do I get a doctor to correct or change his written report? Twice in my 77 years I have pointed out incorrect statements in their records. Each time I was told they could not change anything once it appears in their written report. There must be a way to correct an error, especially before sending the report to other doctors. Do you have any suggestions? – G.J.

I do have a suggestion. The doctors are afraid of changing information because such changes can be damaging to them if the records are required in any legal proceedings.

However, they can make a current note in the chart, explaining how previous information in the record was not correct. That's not going to get them into any trouble. It seems to me that not doing so would get them into trouble.

If the doctors balk at this, ask them to talk to a lawyer. Tell them you are preparing a document that states what the correction should be and that you will send it to any doctor to whom your current doctor sends your records. That should motivate your doctor to act.

Q: I currently receive Social Security disability benefits. I now have a second serious disability. Can my monthly benefit amount be increased?

A: No. Your Social Security disability benefit amount is based on the amount of your lifetime earnings before your disability began and not the number, degree, or severity of your disability. For more information, go to www.socialsecurity.gov/dibplan/dapproval2.htm.

Q: I receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits. How do I notify Social Security that I have changed my address?

A: Social Security needs your correct mailing address to send you notices and other correspondence about your benefits even if you receive your benefits by direct deposit. An SSI recipient must report any change in living arrangements or change of address by calling our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, or by visiting a local office. If you do not notify us in a timely manner, you could end up receiving an incorrect payment and have to pay it back.
