Conservation contest

EPWU is asking El Paso area students to get creative by using tools ranging from crayons to video-editing software to spread the word about water conservation. Students in grades 1 through 12 are eligible to compete in a poster contest; high school students are eligible to compete in a video contest. The theme for both contests is Water Conservation in El Paso. As the region's historic drought continues, EPWU will call on customers to conserve water in many ways. Since small actions can make a big difference, successful entries will creatively highlight water conservation methods El Pasoans can undertake in their daily lives. Winners of each contest will be awarded cash prizes. Their work will be featured at the EPWU Discover Center at the El Paso Zoo, at the Tech2O Water Resources Learning Center, and on EPWU's social media platforms. The contests are part of Drinking Water Week, May 6-12, an annual celebration of municipal water suppliers sponsored by the American Water Works Association. Crime app

Crime Stoppers of El Paso has announced that people can now anonymously report the identities and whereabouts of suspected criminals through a mobile app. A free Crime Stoppers app, called "TipSubmit," is now available for iPhones and Android cellular telephones. The new telephone app uses the phones' built-in GPS system to auto-locate the nearest Crime Stoppers organization and allows the sender to attach photos and video to the tip. "This option offers more powerful options than text messaging tips," says Crime Stoppers of El Paso board president Donald L. Reay. If the information provided in the tip leads to an arrest, the tipster is eligible for a cash reward up to \$1,000 just as when people submit tips to 566-TIPS (566-8477) or online at www.crimestoppersofelpaso.org. Tips may also be sent by text message. To do so, start your message with CRIME1 (no space) followed by the tip information, and send the message to CRIMES (274637).

TEA nominates school for 2012 award

EL PASO COUNTY – Mission Early College High School (MECHS), in the Socorro Independent School District, is among a select group of schools that have been nominated for the prestigious National Blue Ribbon Schools award this year.

TexasEducationAgency(TEA)Commissioner Robert Scott made the announcement in January of the 26 Texas public schools that TEA selected to nominate for the 2012 Blue Ribbon Schools recognition. The award honors schools from throughout the country for academic excellence and for significant progress in closing the achievement gap.

MECHS, founded in 2005 through joint efforts between Socorro Independent School District (SISD) and the El Paso Community College (EPCC), is a unique high school that enables students to move in four years from the ninth grade through the first two years of college and allows them to earn an associate of arts degree in addition to a high school diploma. The school is located adjacent to EPCC's Mission campus.

Since 1982, The Blue Ribbon Schools Program has honored more than 6,000 of America's most successful schools, including 538 Texas public schools. This prestigious program honors public and private elementary, middle and high schools. Schools are selected for one of two honors:

- Improving – Schools that dramatically improve student performance to high levels on state tests; and
- High Achieving – Schools whose students rank in the top 10 percent based on performance on their state standardized tests.

MECHS is the only school in El Paso County nominated as a high achieving school.

Douglas Elementary School in the El Paso Independent School District is nominated as an improving school.

According to a TEA news release, the nominated schools were chosen through an objective evaluation of student achievement statistics and other data for the more than 8,000 public school and charter campuses in the state.

"Schools nominated for the award serve as models of best practices for schools across the state," a TEA official stated.

The nominated schools will now complete a rigorous application process through

the U.S. Department of Education, and announcements of the award winners will be made in September 2012. Schools that receive the award are recognized at the Blue Ribbon School conference in Washington, D.C.

In 2011, the U.S. Department of Education named 305 schools as National Blue Ribbon Schools, which included three schools from the El Paso area – Coldwell Elementary School and Silva Magnet School for Health Professions in the El Paso Independent School District and Escontrias Elementary

Help sought for San Elizario community garden project

SAN ELIZARIO – The arrival of springtime in and around San Elizario can be seen in the few pecan groves, alfalfa fields, and plots of flowering cotton shrubs still left that bring the land back to life each season. This area with its long but fading farming history will soon be the site of a new endeavor – the creation and development of a sustainable community garden. The San Elizario Independent School District (SEISD) in partnership with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) are making progress in establishing this pilot project but still need support to obtain more resources and materials.

Miguel Moreno, a 2002 San Elizario High School graduate who now works for the EPA, proposed the idea of a community garden to the District. According to Moreno, one of the current objectives of the EPA is to identify communities underserved by the federal government and assist in implementing a grassroots or community based-approach to issues such as environmental public health challenges. Moreno stated that San Elizario was selected as the most appropriate site for a sustainable pilot garden because it has a 98.99 percent Hispanic population and has

a close-knit community with farming past. The specific goals of the EPA for the project are to create a self-sustaining garden run and administered by volunteers; to provide environmental awareness and create lasting partnerships; and to replicate the project in

other communities in the area.

With an initial grant of \$5,000 from the EPA, SEISD has already designated approximately 18,000 square feet of land behind the Excell

Veteran foreclosures

Veterans weren’t forgotten in the recent \$25 billion mortgage servicing settlement. In fact, veterans were treated much better than civilian counterparts who’d had their homes foreclosed.

In the lawsuit leading to the settlement, it was determined that the four biggest mortgage servicers violated the Servicemen’s Civil Relief Act, the law that outlines the rules under which mortgages must be handled for veterans.

Those banks will now have to pay veterans \$116,785 each, plus equity that was lost in the property after it was wrongfully foreclosed, plus any interest. That number might end up being higher.

JP Morgan Chase will need to provide the veteran with his or her property “free and clear of any debt or the cash equivalent of the full value of the home at the time of sale.”

Citigroup, Wells Fargo and Ally will have to give a refund to any veterans charged more than 6 percent interest on a mortgage after receiving a request to lower that rate, plus triple that amount.

The agreement expands and

beefs up the rules for SCRA. Previously a bank was prohibited from foreclosing on a veteran-owned property if the mortgage was taken out before the veteran began military service. Now the rule will additionally state that no matter when the mortgage began, if the veteran received Hostile Fire/Imminent Danger Pay and was away from home within nine months of foreclosure, the veteran is protected from foreclosure.

A victory for Texas landowners

February 24, 2012, was an important day for Texas landowners, and for all Texans who care about property rights. On that day, the Supreme Court of Texas issued its opinion in a case called Edwards Aquifer Authority and the State of Texas v. Burrell Day and Joel McDaniel. The court spoke definitively to an issue of enormous importance to all landowners: their right to use the waters under their properties.

As a fourth-generation West Texas rancher myself, I know full well how important that water can be, and what it would feel like if a government agency told you that you couldn’t use the water under your own land.

But too often, that’s just what happens. Conservation goals that could be accomplished with open communication and negotiation between agricultural producers and Texas’ water districts are pursued by administrative edict instead.

I’ve been concerned with this issue for a very long time. As a legislator in 1995, with the late Senator Teel Bivins, I wrote and passed the Texas Private Real Property Rights Preservation Act, a law that has been called “a basic charter for the protection of private real property rights in Texas.”

The act specifically defined real property as including groundwater rights – rights that shouldn’t be taken away without just compensation.

When government regulations limit your ability to use your land as productively as you can, they’ve cut its value. And when they devalue your land, it’s called a “taking.” Article I of the Texas Constitution says it clearly:

“No person’s property shall be taken, damaged, or destroyed for or applied to public use without adequate compensation being made.”

It’s a bedrock principle of our state. It was the issue before the Supreme Court in the Day case: “Whether land ownership includes an interest in groundwater in place that cannot be taken for public use without adequate compensation” as guaranteed by the Constitution?

The Court looked at how the Edwards Aquifer Authority issues permits based on “the amount of beneficial use” a person’s groundwater has been put to in the past. The Authority was using a “use it or lose it” approach to groundwater ownership based on regulations that say, in effect, that landowners can be deprived of nearly all use of their groundwater simply because they hadn’t used it before.

That’s why I was pleased to file an amicus brief in the case, and even more pleased to learn that the court had supported the landowners involved, concluding “a landowner cannot be deprived of all beneficial use of the groundwater below his property merely because he did not use it during an historical period.”

Now the Supreme Court has set it in stone: you have an ownership interest to the water under your land, just as you do oil or gas. And if state or local authorities want to interfere with your constitutionally protected rights, they have to pay you for it.

This opinion was critical to ensuring the stability of land titles and market value of lands and to the continued sustainability of investments made by communities across the state in acquiring groundwater rights from landowners to support the water supply needs of their growing economies.

As Texas’ population growth continues its breakneck pace, greater demands inevitably will be placed on our precious water resources. These will have to be managed wisely and well through a shared responsibility. But if we ignore private property rights, we’ve lost a fundamental part of what makes Texas what it is.

Fortunately, it looks like we’re staying on the right path.

HORIZON – District 4-A, Bi-district, Area, Regional Quarterfinal, and Regional Semifinal Champions, the Horizon girls’ basketball team advanced further in the playoffs than any other El Paso area girls team this year. 41, Amarillo Palo Duro 45-44, and Granbury.

“It was a difficult season with a lot of adversities, but we managed to pull through,” Perez said. “We all play together and have always had a pretty close team. We keep each other going and we don’t give up.”

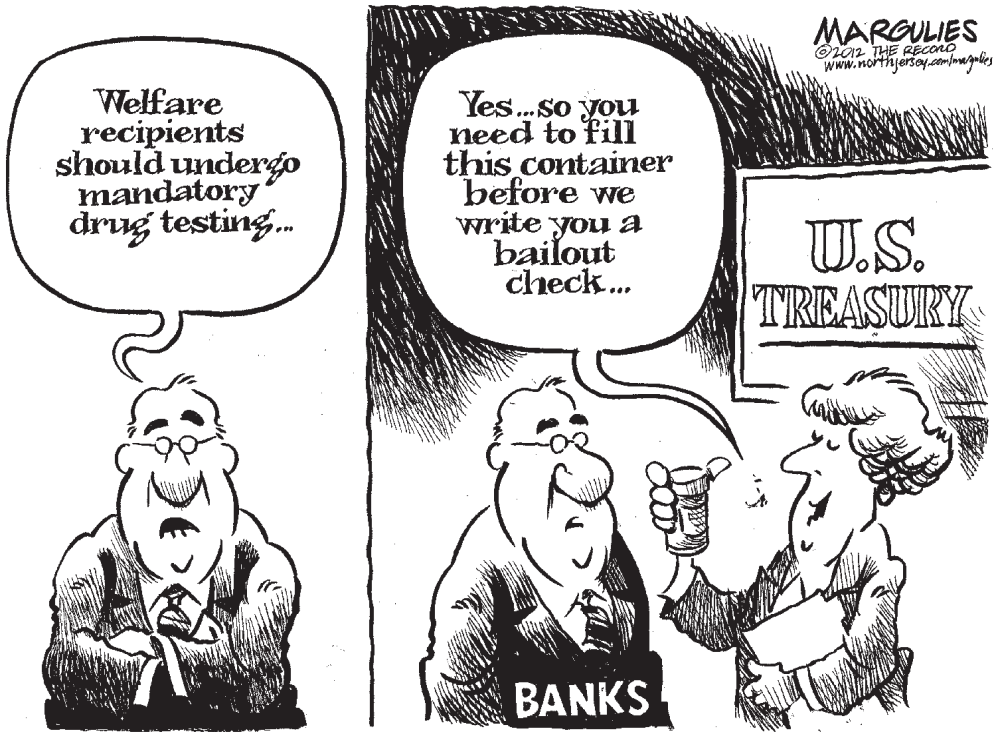
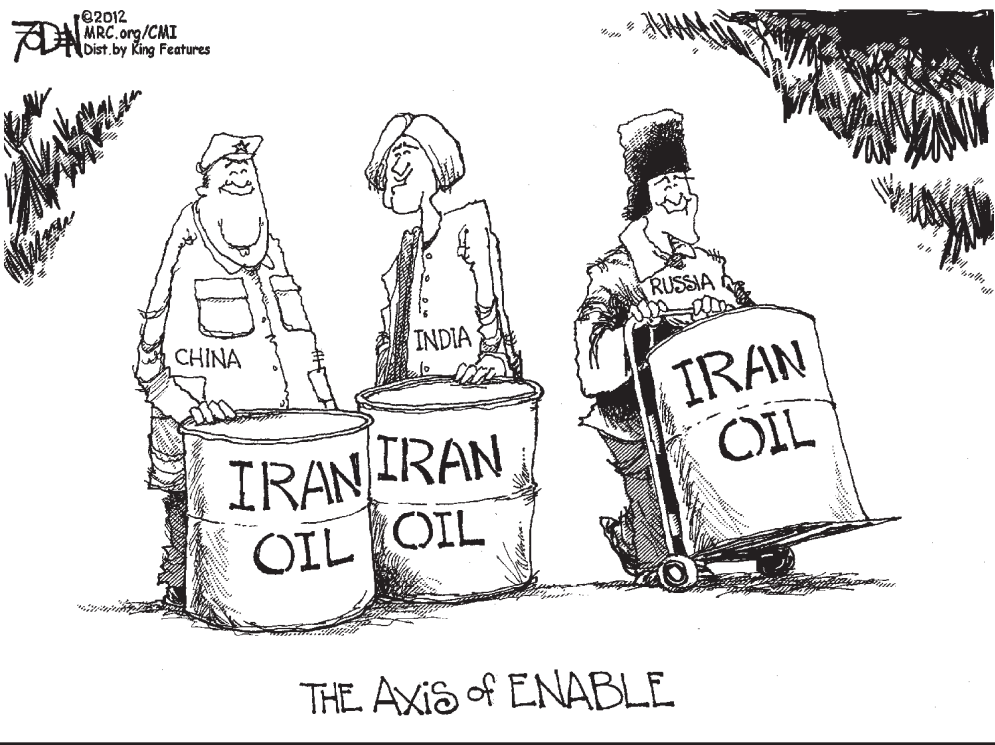
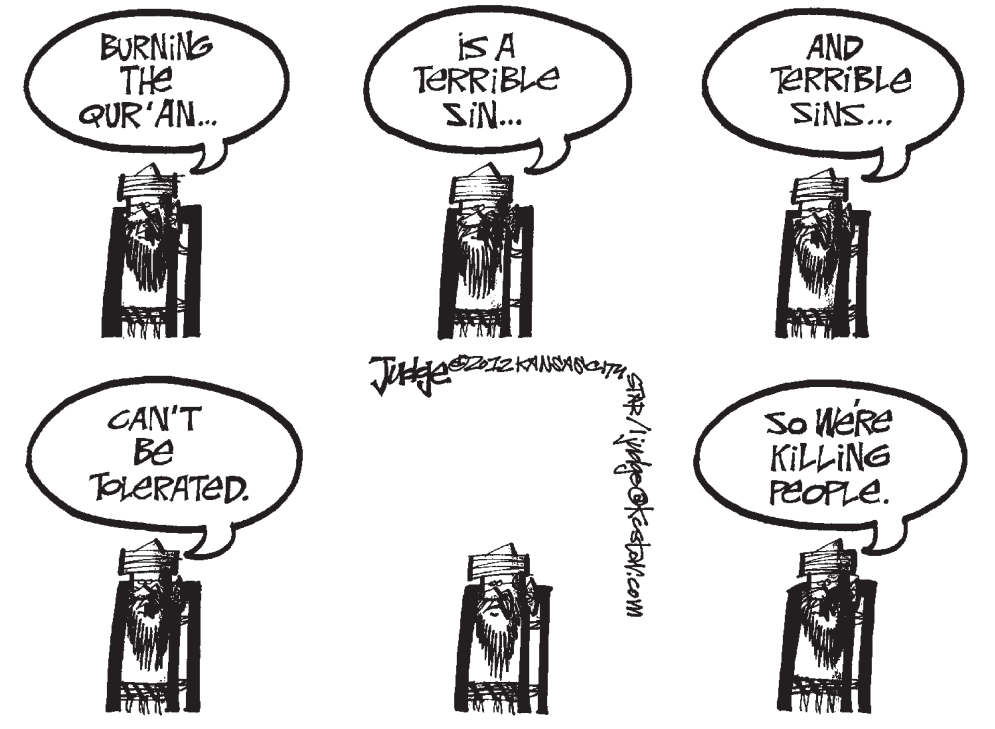
Caballero said the team learned from losses to Chapin earlier in the season.

Meds need to be funded

Hola, mi gente. Just after Valentine’s Day last month, I wrote about the gimmickry that was used to convince Texans that our budget was balanced. You may recall that one of the gimmicks was to intentionally under-fund Medicaid reimbursements.

Earlier in February, the Executive Commissioner of HHSC, Tom Suehs, stated publicly that the next legislature faces a vacuum of funding that amounts to between \$15 to \$17 billion. For two sessions now, the commissioner has stated flatly that his agency cannot satisfy the basic obligations that the state has without additional revenues.

My office has since the beginning of the year received many calls from constituents who receive benefits from Medicaid, mostly seniors, who have been burdened with less help or higher out of pocket money. These are people who are pretty much stuck at one income level, Social Security, plus whatever programs supplement that. If their health depends on certain amounts to be reimbursed to doctors, clinics or pharmacies are reduced, these poor people stand to lose their lifeline.

Granted, it is a fact that our economy has suffered and that revenues to the state have fallen. It is also a fact that certain industries that have come to Texas and made hundreds of millions of dollars refuse to share that wealth for the needy.

Just recently, a new program was initiated for the funding of prescriptions. In order to offset lost revenues, there has been a shift toward managed care. There is nothing wrong with managed care as long as it reduces or eliminates waste and fraud. In this case, it may mean more money for the cost managers and less for pharmacies and patients.

I have had conversations, with patients needing prescriptions and pharmacists who dispense the medicines, that have caused me great concern.

Pharmacies are not being reimbursed sufficiently for dispensing certain medications. Whether one wishes to acknowledge it or not, a pharmacy is a business. If the business does not get paid cost plus a profit margin, that business will go bankrupt.

My office has been informed that in too many cases, the documented reimbursement rate based on the maximum allowable cost is too low. Those local Medicaid entities that reimburse the pharmacies may be using outdated rates. If that is the case, then those entities are probably making a significant profit at the expense of pharmacies and the patients who need prescriptions.

How would you feel if you went to a pharmacy and asked for medicine that your child needed to breathe and it wasn’t available? I know you would not be happy.

It is very dangerous that the reimbursements are inadequate to keep locally owned drug stores in business. You can be sure that those business people will not let their pharmacy go under. The ones to ultimately suffer will be poor parents and seniors.

I will have a letter to the commissioner out about this very serious situation. I am not certain how much of an impact I can have because the fact is that state agencies are not actually reimbursing the druggists. For the sake of those who need the medications, let’s hope that reason prevails and that the health of certain Texans is no longer in jeopardy.

El Dorado yearbook wins first national award in SISD history

EL PASO COUNTY – During the winter break, El Dorado High journalism made history. For the first time in 30 years, the Columbia Scholastic Press Association (CSPA) based out of Columbia University in New York City awarded the 2011 *The Legend* yearbook the prestigious Crown Award. The award is the equivalent of the Pulitzer Prize for yearbooks and is the first for Socorro ISD. Only five El Paso schools have received the Crown Award since CSPA began to give them out in 1982.

The 2012 Crown Award recipients were chosen from a total of 1,351 scholastic newspapers, magazines and yearbooks published last school year. A panel of 10 judges selected the 66 yearbooks to receive the national award. The judges are experienced former advisers to student media, professional journalists who understand student media and industry professionals with particular expertise needed for the judging exercise.

The panel considered all aspects of value to the yearbook reader: content, design or presentation,

coverage, photography as well as writing and editing.

“It sounds like a cliché,” senior Celeste Compean said. Compean was a staff member in last year’s yearbook staff and is one of this year’s editor-in-chiefs. “But after seeing the endless after school hours and thousands of key strokes pay off, it’s like a kid in a candy store. Since Mr. Carlos Briano was hired at El Dorado, it has been a goal to get the Crown Award. Now that we’ve earned it, there’s a lot of pressure to put out another yearbook that tops it.”

According to senior Adrian Scott Flores, who was also in last year’s staff and is the other editor-in-chief for 2012, getting the Crown Award has focused the current staff even more.

“My goal has always been to give my work 150%,” he said. “Since joining last year’s staff I wanted to help make this book something worth remembering. I still want to be able to create something that will always be looked back on. But for now, I want to take this yearbook and leave it better than when it was passed down to us.”

Briano and the five remaining students from last year’s staff will attend the CSPA convention at Columbia University March 14-16,

Tobacco

Tobacco companies continue to produce and market new smokeless tobacco products to attract new users and keep smokers addicted. In the past years cigarette companies have introduced new smokeless products. The most common are the snus products, which are small teabag like pouches containing tobacco and flavorings that users place between their gum and lip. R.J.Reynolds’s Camel Snus and Philip Morris Snus are now sold nation wide in a variety of flavors. These products do not require spitting out tobacco juice and their use can be easily concealed. The problem with smokeless tobacco is that it is not a

safe alternative to smoking. According to the CDC, smokeless tobacco use can lead to oral cancer, gum disease, nicotine addiction and cardiovascular disease. Repeated exposure to tobacco juice causes cancer of the esophagus, larynx, pharynx and pancreas. Regardless of the product there is no safe form of tobacco use.

School in Socorro ISD.

“America’s long-term economic prosperity and civic engagement depends on our children receiving a world-class education,” said U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan. “National Blue Ribbon Schools are committed to accelerating student achievement and preparing students for success in college and careers. Their success is an example for others to follow.”

Before selecting National Blue Ribbon Schools, the Department asks for nominations from the top education official in every state, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico, the Department of Defense Education Activity and the Bureau of Indian Education. The Council for American Private Education (CAPE) nominates private schools.

A total of 413 schools nationwide are nominated, based on the number of K–12 students and the number of schools in each jurisdiction. The schools are invited by the Secretary of Education to submit an application for possible recognition as a National Blue Ribbon School.

Blue Ribbon Schools are nationally recognized as some of America’s most successful schools. The award acknowledges and validates the hard work of students, staff members, families, and communities in reaching high levels

Adult Learning Center for the garden. The parcel of land has already been prepared, aerified, and leveled. The raised beds for the garden are being built by students from San Elizario High School’s construction technology classes under the direction of teacher Rafael Cardoza. The district’s Support Services Department will be providing grounds expertise and skilled labor to implement the irrigation system for the garden. However, there are still many needs left to fill and SEISD is actively seeking partners to provide assistance with additional funds or materials.

Once established and thriving, the garden will bring many benefits to the San Elizario community such revitalizing and beautifying the neighborhood; providing nutritious, local produce; and serving as a teaching tool for schools. Ernesto Rodriguez, Executive Director of the district’s Research and Development, stated that all SEISD elementary schools will be participating in the project including staff, parents, and other businesses and organizations.

“The school district is creating opportunities for school children to discover fresh food, make healthier choices and become stewards of the environment,” Rodriguez added.

The next step in helping the garden flourish will be recruiting volunteers, forming a planning committee to establish a protocol for the operation of the garden, providing and receiving training, and securing resources. Daytona’s wring of fire

Two days of hand wringing, head ringing and jet-fuel flinging burned down to a pretty exciting race in Daytona this year. The Daytona 500 was kicked around in the rain, and ratings were down. As expected, Danica Patrick hijacked much of the pre-race coverage. Dale Earnhardt Jr. mounted an exciting comeback in the race, nearly passing eventual

winner Matt Kenseth. The finish buoyed fans of Earnhardt Jr. who hope the finish will translate into a strong 2012 season for the driver. Earnhardt Jr., in post-race comments, was able to show that he, too, was looking forward to the future and not content with second-place finishes. “You know, you do want to come in here and make sure the press knows

that you wanted to win the race, because the press is going to tell the fans what you thought, and you don’t want to give anyone the impression that you are fine running second, because I’m not,” Earnhardt said. His compassion extended to Kenseth’s future as well. “I’m happy for Matt,” he said. “He’s going to need that for his college fund.” (Presumably the comment was an allusion to the 39-year-old Kenseth’s two young daughters.) As for Kenseth, the 2012 win pretty much locks him in as one of the sport’s all-time greatest rain-delayed

Daytona winners. Kenseth won the 2009 Daytona 500, a race that saw 48 laps shaved off the back end. This race, however, was anything but short. Delayed by rain Sunday, the race began Monday night and saw its first crash after the first lap. Then, in lap 160, under a caution flag, Juan Pablo Montoya slammed into a truck filled with 200 gallons of jet fuel, stopping the race for another two hours. Kenseth wasn’t given the Harvey J. Early trophy until early Tuesday morning. But just as Patrick dominated pre-race coverage, it was Brad Keselowski who garnered most of the post-race buzz over the interwebs. Keselowski, it would seem, became the first NASCAR driver to ever tweet from his car. Keselowski went on to finish in 32nd in the race, but according to

Time magazine, he saw his Twitter following jump from 60,000 to more than 200,000 the next day. As for Patrick, she still managed to find her name in the headlines for finishing 38th in the race. For the attention-getting race diva, she found herself in a different circumstance after her Elite Series debut – avoiding the limelight. “As it got later and later in the race, I just didn’t want to play a part,” Patrick said. “I didn’t want to have an influence on it. I didn’t want something to happen.” Rain, jet fuel, Twitter and the sport’s all-time-leading sex symbol – that’s the story two days in the wringing from Daytona.

Canutillo ISD picks architect, contractor

CANUTILLO – The first steps toward the construction of a new Elementary/Middle School campus in the Canutillo Independent School District were taken last week when the Board of Trustees signed an architectural design contract and retained a contractor to serve as construction manager at risk. The Board voted unanimously to sign a contract with the El Paso architectural firm of Carl Daniel. The firm will begin an extensive process to design the yet-to-be-named pre-kindergarten through eighth-grade school that will be built in the Cimarron subdivision of Northwest El Paso. This will be Canutillo’s first school located east of Interstate 10. “We are very happy to start work on what will be a wonderful addition to our Canutillo family,” said Board President Laure Searls. “The Canutillo school district is growing fast, and it’s imperative that we move forward to meet the needs of the families that are moving into our school district.”

The school was funded through Decision Canutillo 2011, the bond election voters approved last May. The campus is slated to open in the fall of 2014. The PK-8 platform, which is new to Canutillo, will give students in these neighborhoods a smooth transition between elementary and middle school grades. As part of the design process, Carl Daniel architects and Canutillo officials will spend a significant amount of time drafting the necessary features for the new campus, and gathering community input into the design and look of the school. The Board also voted to retain the El Paso firm of Venegas Engineering Management and Construction (Vemac) as the construction manager at risk for the Elementary/Middle School campus. Vemac will be charged with the construction and completion of the building once the design phase is completed. “The trust of the voters was placed on us to deliver a quality school building that continues the tradition of excellence in the Canutillo Independent School District,” said Superintendent Dr. Damon Murphy. “I’m confident that these two companies will help us achieve that goal.”



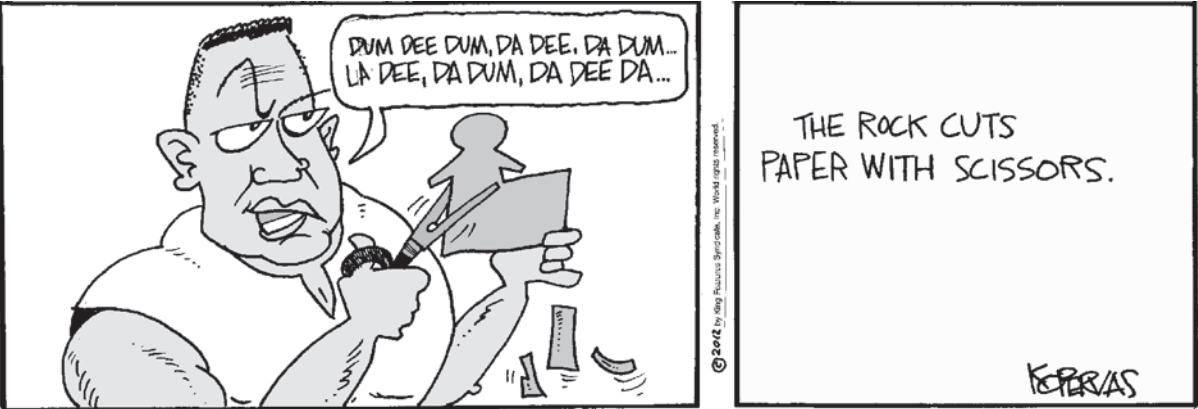

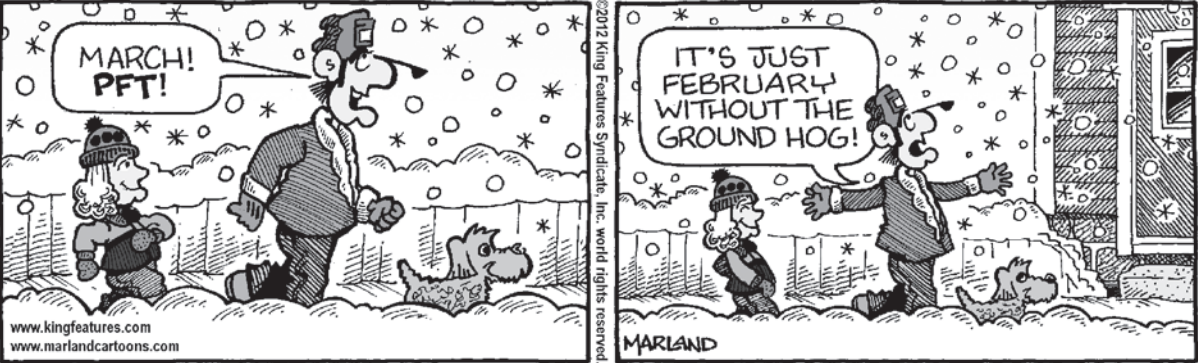

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have had headaches since I was 12. I am now 32. I hear people talk about their migraine headaches and wonder if I might have them. What makes a headache a migraine headache? I take aspirin for my headaches. It helps, but not all that much. Are there special medicines for migraines? – K.D.

Yes, there are special migraine medicines, so it is important to determine if your headaches are true migraine headaches.

Some of the distinguishing attributes of migraines are the following: They begin before age 40. More women have them than men. The headache starts out with minor pain but often progresses to intense and incapacitating pain. The word used to describe it is “throbbing.” Nausea and vomiting frequently accompany it. In a little more than half of migraine patients, the headache is on one side only. Bright lights and noise intensify the pain. Sufferers try to find a dark, quiet room where they can lie down until the headache goes, and that can take four to 72 hours.

Migraine sufferers can identify triggers that bring on their headaches. Stress, missing a meal, too much or too little sleep, menstrual periods, bright lights, certain odors like cigarette smoke or perfume and fatigue are some of the things that start a migraine. Alcohol – beer and red wine in particular – chocolate, some cheeses and cured meats like hot dogs, sausage and bacon are triggers for some.

Aspirin, Tylenol, Midrin and naproxen alleviate mild migraines. Cafergot is a migraine standby. A group of newer drugs are especially good for migraine sufferers. Seven of them are available. Some names are Imitrex, Maxalt and Zomig. Imitrex comes as a nasal spray and as an injection, administered like insulin. Zomig also comes as a nasal spray. This is a godsend for those who become sick to the

stomach along with the headache. Not all migraine headaches produce all the signs and symptoms I mentioned, but if you have more than two of these characteristic symptoms, it’s a good bet that you suffer from migraines.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Many of my friends take aspirin for the prevention of a heart attack or stroke. I decided I should join them. Is this a wise move? – K.H.

Aspirin and similar drugs are the rule for prevention of heart attacks and certain strokes. The aspirin dose in greatest use is 81 mg – low-dose aspirin. Three different regimens for the prevention of stroke are acceptable: Plavix, aspirin or aspirin combined with sustained-release dipyridamole. The aspirin-dipyridamole combination comes in one tablet called Aggrenox. Note that these are for prevention of second heart attacks and strokes.

For the prevention of a first heart attack or stroke, patients should consult their doctor, who will evaluate each patient’s risk. Based on that, the doctor will recommend a regimen that’s appropriate. It’s not a good idea to self-medicate with any medicine.

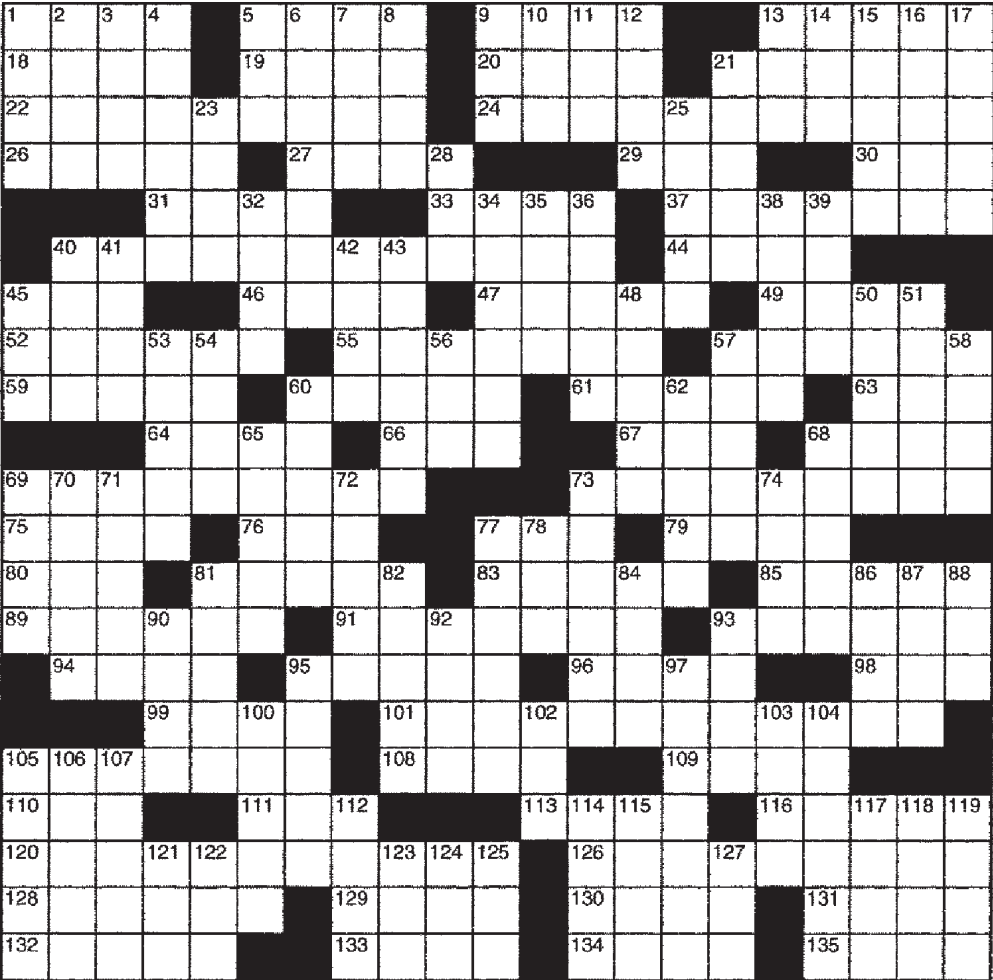

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Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: I live in a hurricane zone and there's always a good chance I'll have to evacuate. What should I do if I'm expecting my check and a hurricane disrupts the mail?

A: To avoid this situation altogether, get your payments sent electronically. Direct Deposit and Direct Express are the fast, easy and secure ways to receive your benefit payment. For more information, see www.socialsecurity.gov/deposit.

Q: Will my son be eligible to receive benefits on his retired father's record while going to college?

A: No. At one time, Social Security did pay benefits to eligible college students. But the law changed in 1981. We now pay benefits only to students taking courses at grade 12 or below. Normally, benefits stop when children reach age 18 unless they are disabled. However, if children are still full-time students at a secondary (or elementary) school at age 18, benefits generally can continue until they graduate or until two months after they reach age 19, whichever is first. If your child is still going to be in school at age 19, you'll want to visit www.socialsecurity.gov/schools.

Q: How do I obtain a copy of the form, Application for Help with

Medicare Prescription Drug Plan Costs?

A: If you wish to apply for Extra Help with Medicare prescription drug plan costs, we recommend you use our online application at www.socialsecurity.gov/i1020/. Meanwhile, you can view a sample at www.socialsecurity.gov/prescriptionhelp. There, you also can find instruction sheets in 15 different languages to help you understand the English application. Soon, the online application also will be available in Spanish. If you prefer not to fill out this application on the Internet, you can call our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, to ask for a paper application. Also, you can make an appointment at your local Social Security office to apply for Extra Help with Medicare prescription drug plan costs. If you are deaf or hard of hearing, call our toll-free TTY number, 1-800-325-0778. Representatives are available Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

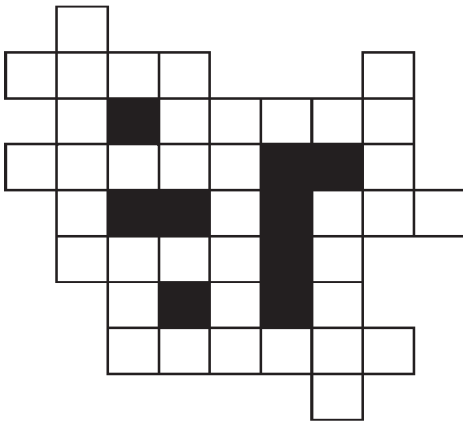
