Transparent

Texas has received the top ranking for government spending transparency in an annual report on all states issued by the U.S. Public Interest Research Group (U.S.PIRG). The state's Texas Transparency website is developed and maintained by the office of Texas Comptroller Susan Combs. "I'm proud to be at the forefront of setting standards for government transparency and we will keep striving to improve our initiatives," Combs said. "From the time I took office we have worked to expand our transparency efforts to provide taxpayers online access to multiple levels of state spending and financial information. Taxpayers have the right to know how their money is spent and transparency ensures government is held accountable to the people it serves." The Texas Transparency website is at www.texas Transparency.org. U.S. PIRG noted the comprehensive financial information the website provides along with historical check-register level detail that is downloadable. EL PASO – Chester E. Jordan Elementary School, the city's first Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) school, recently earned yet another prestigious recognition for their green efforts.

The school's Green Science Team won a 2012 Texas Environment Excellence Award (TEEA) in the youth category for their work at the school, in the community and in their partnership with Fort Bliss.

Prosthetic limb study

The House Committee on Veterans Affairs asked the VA Office of Inspector General to review and evaluate how services are being provided to veterans who have had amputations. The study was limited to 838 veterans discharged from active service after Operation Enduring Freedom/Operation Iraqi Freedom/Operation New Dawn. Here's what it found:

- The majority were between the ages of 22 and 25, enlisted male veterans.
- The rates of some disorders increased after discharge. Anxiety disorders rose from 42 percent to 61 percent. Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder rates increased from 31 percent to 58 percent. Alcohol disorders rose from 7 percent to 11 percent. Drug disorders, however, and adjustment disorders decreased.
- Veterans with upper limb amputations didn't fare as well as those with lower limb amputations in terms of psychosocial adjustment, physical ability and prosthetic satisfaction.
- Veterans with amputations and prostheses are "significant users"

of Department of Veterans Affairs health services, and not just for the prostheses: 99 percent use VA health care for all medical needs. The comments at the end of the report are telling. One veteran commented on the lengthy process to get a prosthesis made by an outside vendor and have the VA approve and pay for it. Another makes his own repairs to his prosthesis to cut through the VA red tape. Another veteran goes out of his way to avoid using VA care, saying most of the staff doesn't understand upper limb amputations. Some veterans are waiting six months for an appointment and then have to travel long distances. Another has had a clothing issue for years and hadn't been able to get help until the OIG stepped in.

SISD holds district wide Pre-K, kindergarten early registration

EL PASO COUNTY – The Socorro Independent School District (SISD) will hold early registration for Pre-K and kindergarten students that are new to the District. Parents can register their children at SISD elementary schools and Pre-K to 8 schools throughout the District from April 2-5, 2012. Registration times are 8 to 11 a.m. for pre-kindergarten students and 1 to 3 p.m. for new kindergarten students.

Four SISD schools are designated as pre-kindergarten hubs that will serve as the home campus for Pre-K students from other campuses. Parents should register their children at hub campus for their school. The Pre-K hub schools are:

- O'Shea Keleher for O'Shea, Ituarte, Lujan-Chavez and Paso del Norte;
- Myrtle Cooper for Myrtle Cooper, Hurshel Antwine and Chester E. Jordan;
- Escontrias Early Childhood Center for Escontrias and Hilley; and
- Dr. Sue Shook for Dr. Sue Shook, John Drugan and Horizon Heights.

SISD schools Benito, Bill Sybert, Campestre, Desert Wind, Elfida Chavez, Ernesto Serna, Jane Hambric, Hueco, Helen Ball, Loma Verde, Rojas, Sierra Vista and Vista del Sol are all Pre-K campuses will serve Pre-K students on site.

Parents should be sure to bring your child and a utility bill (gas, electric, water), Social Security Card, birth certificate and immunization record to the registration site.

Immunization clinics will be available at each of the four Pre-K hub sites from 8 to 11 a.m. during registration.

Implementation of schools' new math standards tied to textbook funding

best math standards," Commissioner of Education Robert Scott told the board during the SBOE meeting that was held in late January.

A formal public comment period opened in February on the new math standards, with final approval of the new TEKS expected April 20.

The new standards, however, will not take effect until new textbooks and other instructional materials are made available to Texas students.

Based on a new instructional materials adoption schedule also approved by the board recently, the new math TEKS, if given final approval by the board in April, would be used in kindergarten through eighth grade Texas classrooms beginning in the 2014-2015 school year when new materials are available.

The updated adoption cycle makes new materials for math, grades kindergarten through eighth grade; science, grades kindergarten through 12th grade; and technology applications available for use beginning in the 2014-2015 school year.

The following year, state-adopted materials for math, grades nine through 12; social studies, grades kindergarten through grade 12; and fine arts would be available to school districts.

The board passed the measure 13-0 with two members absent. The rules still must be approved during its April meeting. And, there are indications that the board will put pressure on state lawmakers to

The Texas State Board of Education (SBOE) gave preliminary approval recently to new math standards for schools statewide, but it moved to block implementation unless the Legislature provides funding for books to help students cope with the tougher curricula.

Educators based the new standards on the draft Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS), as well as math standards from Massachusetts, Minnesota and international standards from places such as Singapore, which are all believed to have some of the world's best math curriculum standards.

"My goal is for Texas to have the

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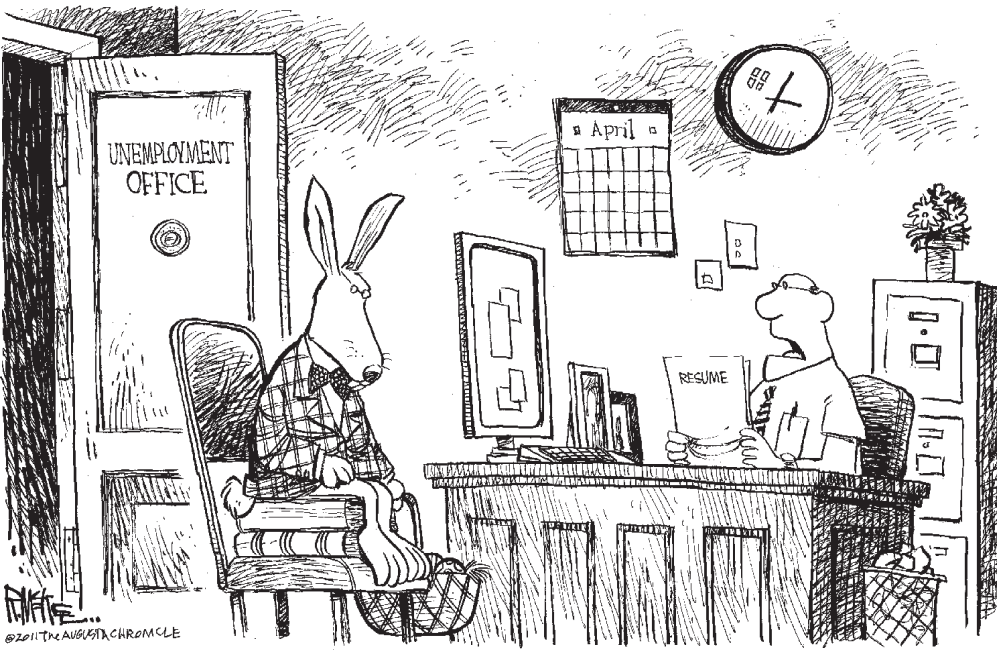
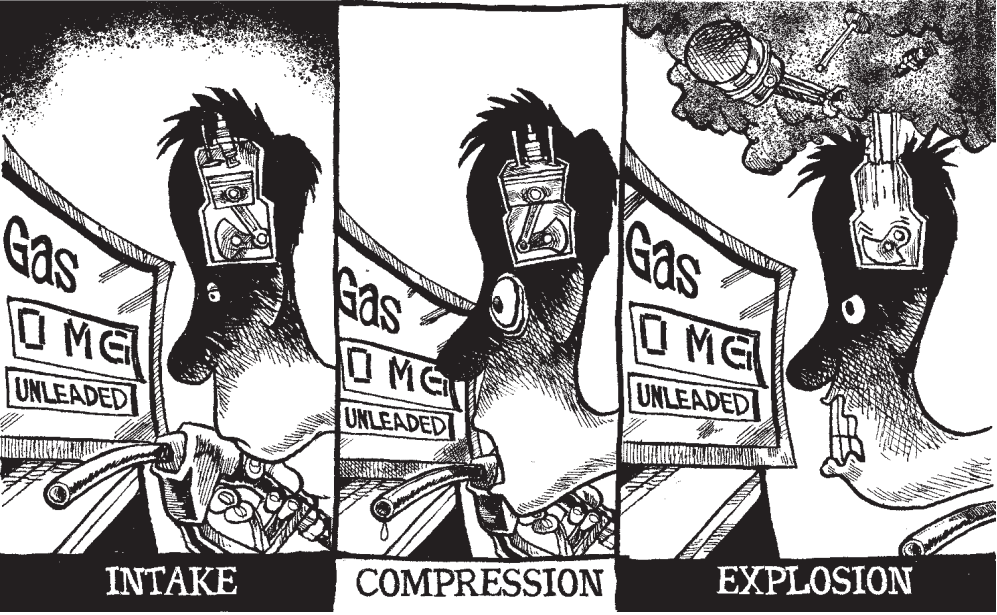

Farris continues his running quest

EL PASO COUNTY – Elliott Farris, 19, is a young man on the run, and he is very good at it.

And it is within the realms of possibility that his running could carry him to the Olympics this summer in London, says his coach, Franks Munene.

As chronicled in previous *Courier* stories, he is on a quest for success in track meets. Not unlike mythology’s Jason and his quest for the Golden Fleece, it is now Farris’ quest for gold, an Olympic gold medal.

Under the tutelage of Munene his quest has already earned him gold medals at AAU-sponsored events. However, because of his age, he is no longer eligible to compete at that level.

Consequently his sights are now set higher – to qualify at the Olympic trials coming up in June in Eugene, Oregon. He would be competing in what he considers his best event – the 5,000-meter run in which he would employ tactical skills to gain advantage and hopefully emerge victorious.

Based on results from his most recent competition in Tucson, his sights seem to be accurate, and he is hitting the mark, says his coach.

“I wouldn’t close the door on (his competing in) London,” Munene says. “He is developing well; he is ahead of schedule and is improving by leaps and bounds.” One of the keys to his success is his “ability to focus,” he adds “He is going to be extremely good.”

Farris sits in a Westside restaurant on a rainy and blustery afternoon. (Undaunted by the inclement weather, the six-foot, 145-pound Farris will later head for a nearby park to work out.) While sipping a glass of water, the young athlete exudes a quiet confidence in his abilities as he describes the recent Willie Williams Invitational Track Meet in the Arizona city. He says he competed against college athletes in the 1,500-meter event. He came in sixth in a field of 30.

He is not at all dismayed or disappointed at finishing only sixth. His assessment reflects just the opposite point of view. His time was 3:58, meeting his goal of running under four minutes.

“I knew I was in much, much better shape than I had ever been before,” he says. “I was running against experienced college athletes who had just finished their indoor track meet season. I ran with them, and I gave them my very best.”

Putting it into a more positive perspective, it was pointed out that, while not winning, he ran a faster race than 24 other more seasoned athletes. Only five had better times.

Home-schooled by his mother, Tracy, Farris is the oldest of seven children – three boys and four girls. His father is Dr. James Farris and is part of the medical staff of the University Medical Center Neighborhood Health Center in Fabens.

“They are all pretty excited about it,” young Farris says, referring to his successes in competition. For the Tucson race, he says his mother and his sisters showed their support for him by wearing yellow and blue nail polish to match the colors of his track attire.

The parents draw praise from Munene who took him under his wing in 2009.

“Their support makes my job easier.” The veteran coach sees his job as helping him run smarter, not harder.

“He got me running longer and harder and more often,” Farris explained in an earlier *Courier* article. “An important part of that training program was learning to rest more and eat more.”

Farris has this assessment of Coach Franks’ abilities.

“He is a complete package. He is not lacking in any area. He is a really good all-around coach. I don’t doubt any of his methods. I can’t point out any of his strengths when he doesn’t have any weaknesses.”

Rest is the second of the three “Rs” that comprise much of his life and consume much of his time. He goes to bed early, around 9:30 p.m.

The first, of course, is Running. The third is Reading. Continuing his education, his mother has put him on what he terms an “intense” reading regimen of good books.

In the longer term, Farris is looking to attend the University of Arizona, which he says has a very good coach with a very good distance running program. He would like to run professionally and is considering a career

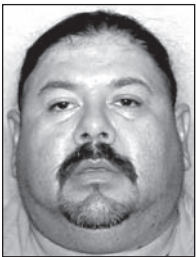

Gabriela Blanco-Rodriguez, 31, is this week's Manhunt Monday Most Wanted Fugitive. She also uses Gabriela Macias. She is 5'4" tall, weighs 160 pounds and has brown hair and eyes. On March 13, 2012, Deputies were dispatched to a business in San Elizario in reference to a family assault in progress. They arrived and met with the victim who told authorities his ex-spouse, Blanco-Rodriguez, came to his place of employment highly intoxicated and began insulting him. A short time later she attacked him striking him

multiple times to the head and face area with her cell phone and fled the scene. The entire incident occurred in the presence of witnesses that included the couples' three-month-old child. Blanco-Rodriguez attempted to take the child but the victim managed to retrieve the child from the car before she sped off. A Protective Order has also been issued against Blanco-Rodriguez on behalf of the victim and the three-month-old child. Blanco-Rodriguez has already been arrested three times in 2012. approve funding for new books and other key classroom materials before Texas can demand its students learn more.

Board member Thomas Ratliff submitted an amendment to the proposed standards that would require funding for books as part of larger rules on new math curricula for elementary, middle and high school students.

“This now says we’re not going to pass any new standards without

guarantees books will be funded,” said Ratliff.

Based on the textbook provisions included in the vote, new math curriculum standards from kindergarten through eighth grade would take effect for the 2014-2015 school year when new books are available; and in 2015-2016 for grades nine through 12 when those books are ready, according to Debbie Ratcliffe, a spokeswoman for the Texas Education Agency.

Ratcliffe said that it’s difficult to estimate how much state funding would be needed to purchase new

books for the future curriculum standards, but that a very rough estimate for K-12 math material would be around \$350 million.

Education authorities use the Permanent School Fund, an endowment established in the 1850s and consisting of state land and mineral rights, royalty earnings and stocks and bonds, to raise money for the purchase of new books. They must have the Legislature appropriate that money so the purchases can go forward.

But the Legislature cut \$4 billion in education spending during last year’s session – the first time since World War II that lawmakers did not approve education-spending increases to meet rising school enrollments statewide.

Ratcliffe said that during the last budget cycle or two, there was a problem with purchasing textbooks and that the cuts meant authorities had to postpone a plan to buy science books last year.

in sports medicine or as a veterinarian.

In the nearer term, he will compete in the New Mexico Tailwind Invitational in April in Albuquerque. Farris confidently expects a win. “I’ll be ready for that one.”

Beyond Tailwind, he hopes to take part in 54th annual Mt Sac Relays in April in Walnut, California. There again he would go with his strength, the 5,000-meter event. The Mt. Sac Relays website says that this event is “where the world’s best athletes compete.”

Beyond Tailwind, beyond Mount Sac, beyond the Olympic trials, the confident Farris sees himself competing in the summer Olympics in 2020 and 2024 in what he considers his prime running years.

- America’s first vending machines were found in New York City train stations; they dispensed gum.

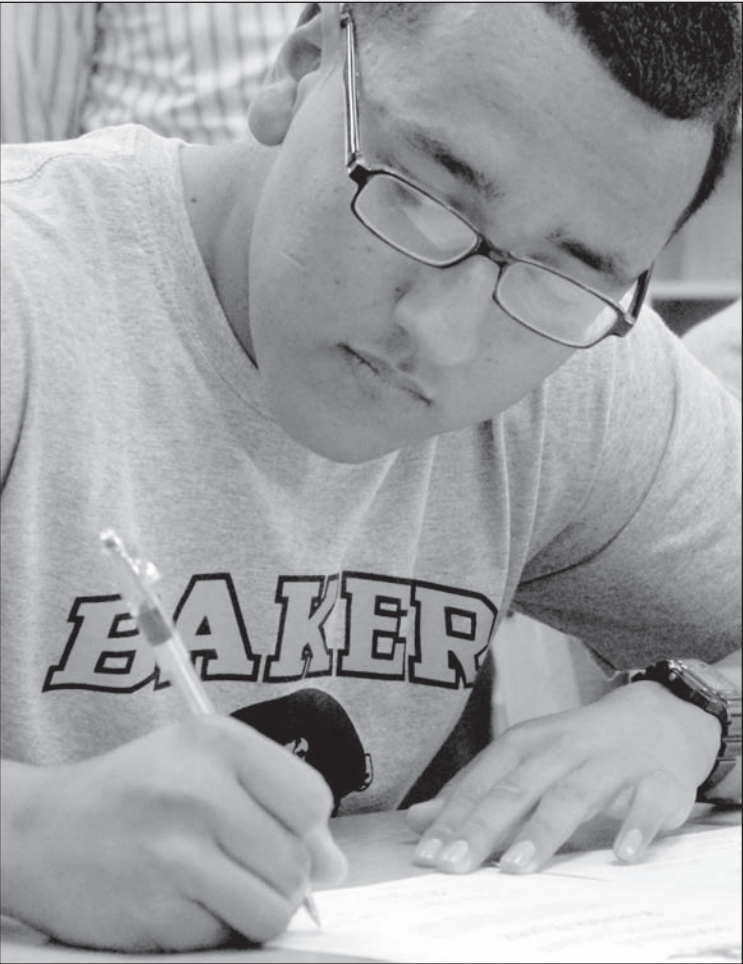

- In a 1982 issue of the magazine American Film, a writer named Chuck Ross claimed that he retyped the screenplay to the 1942 film “Casablanca,” changing only the title and one of the character’s names, and submitted it to 217 agencies. Of the 85 who responded, only eight recognized it as “Casablanca,” though it seemed familiar to another 25. Three of the agencies thought it might be commercially viable, while one thought it should be turned into a novel. The Oscar-wining screenplay was rejected outright by 38 of the agencies.

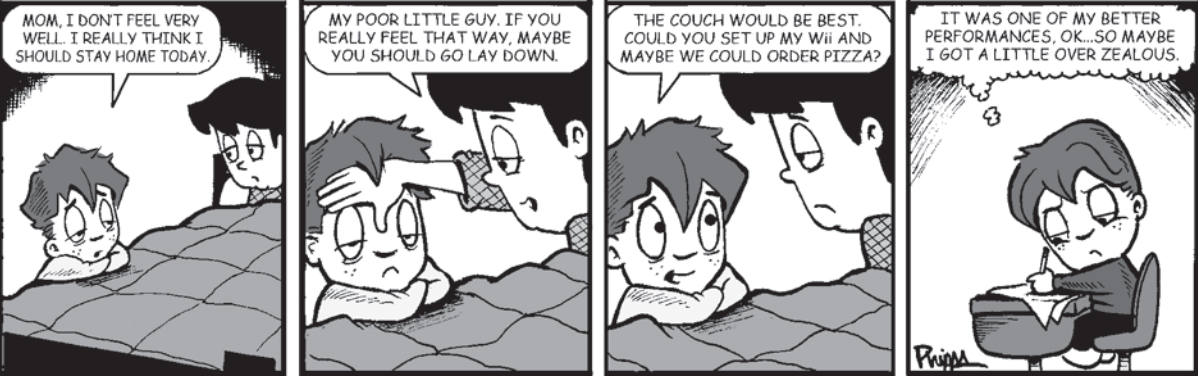
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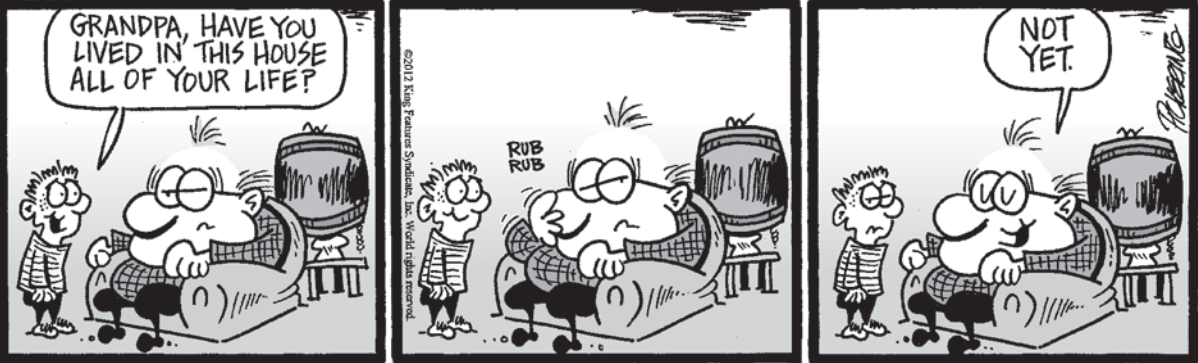

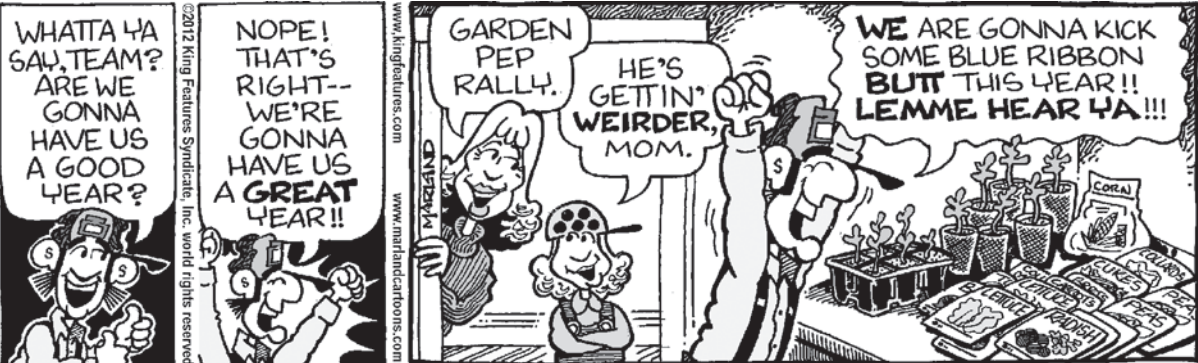

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: The receptionist at my doctor’s office called to give me the report on a mammogram I had taken. She said that it showed calcifications and that the doctor wanted it repeated in six months. Why? Are calcifications indications of cancer? If they are, I’d like to get this taken care of immediately. I am becoming a nervous wreck thinking about this. – H.M.

When tests don’t provide a definite answer, everyone suffers – the patient, the doctor of the patient and the doctor who interpreted the test.

Calcifications are the perfect example. They’re calcium specks. When the doctor interpreting the mammogram sees them, he or she bases their importance on their number, their shape, their size and the pattern they make. With those criteria, the doctor usually can say whether they indicate cancer.

Noncancerous calcifications might result from a bump to the breast to which you paid little attention. Or a minor breast infection could have caused them.

If the doctor feels that evidence points more in the direction of cancer, then he or she will ask for an immediate biopsy. If the doctor feels more certain that they are not cancer signs but is not completely certain about that call, a repeat examination at a later date is a reasonable position to take. Neither the interpreting doctor nor your personal doctor would ask for a delay if there was any chance that the inaction would harm your health.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My thighs are loaded with cellulite. What is it, and how can I get rid of it? – M.T.

Cellulite is beneath-the-skin fat that forms small puckers due to crisscrossing fibers similar to but not the same as scar-tissue fibers. The fiber-puckered fat gives the involved skin a lumpy-bumpy appearance.

Laser treatments, radiofrequency wave treatments and ultrasound have been used for removing cellulite. These are cosmetic procedures and likely are not covered by insurance.

Innumerable creams are advertised for cellulite reduction, but I can’t tell you if they work. I would be cautious about trying any that are costly. Weight loss makes cellulite less obvious. You are best served by consulting a dermatologist.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: For the past several days, my left eyelid has been twitching. There’s no pain. It does not affect my vision. Does it mean anything? – T.P.

Not usually. Eyelid twitches result from spasms of muscles controlling eyelid movement. It’s intermittent and lasts for a few days, at most. Fatigue, stress and caffeine have been implicated as causes. I have had such twitching, at times when I was neither tired nor stressed nor drinking caffeine.

If the twitching is bothersome, soak a washcloth in warm water and apply it to the closed eyelid. If twitching lasts longer than a week or two, see the family doctor.

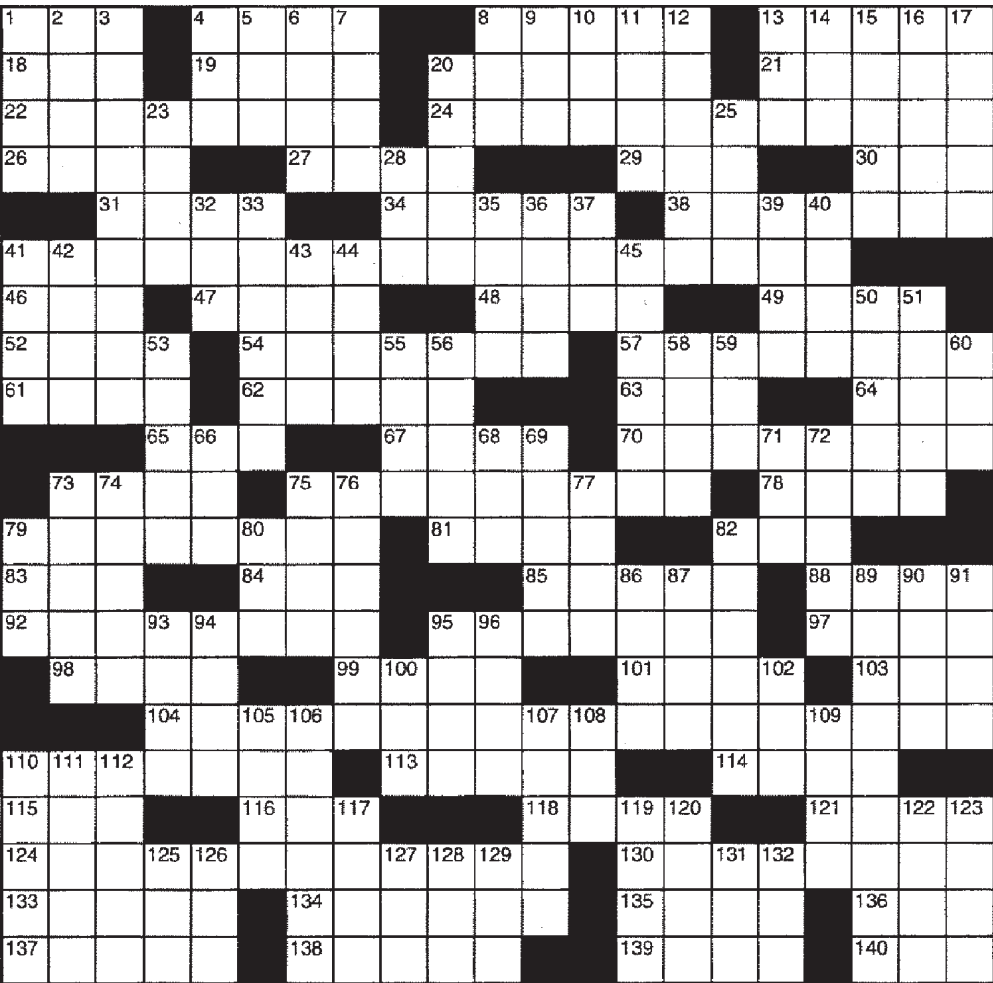

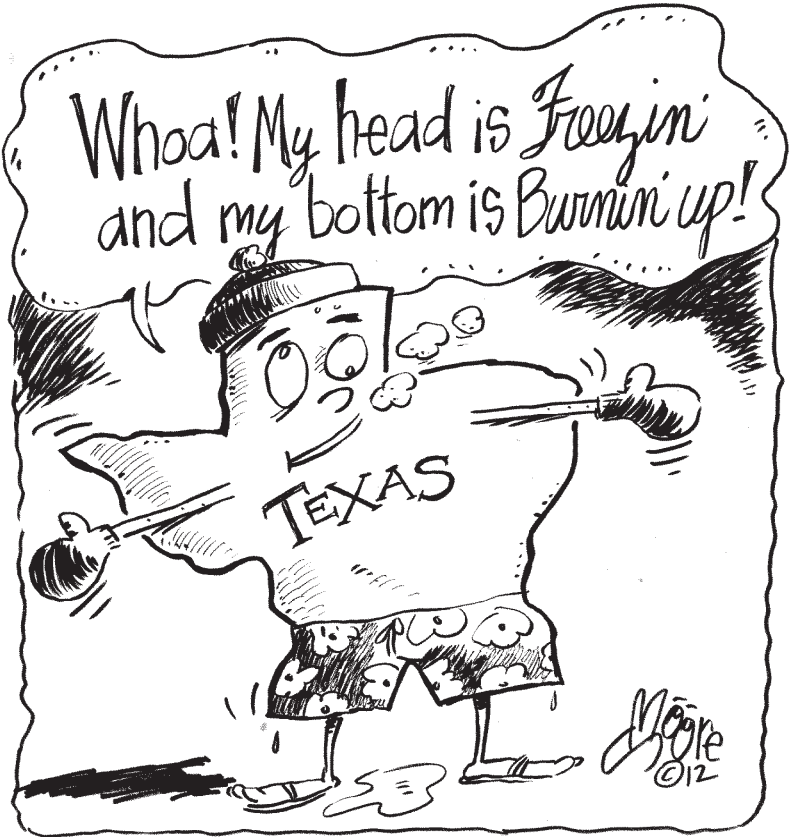

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Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: I know you need to have limited resources to receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI). But what is considered a resource?

A: Resources are things you own that you can use for support. They include cash, real estate, personal belongings, bank accounts, stocks, and bonds. To be eligible for SSI a person must have no more than \$2,000 in countable resources. A married couple must have no more than \$3,000 in countable resources. If you own resources over the SSI limit, you may be able to get SSI benefits while trying to sell the resources. Not all of your resources count toward the SSI resource limit. For example:

- The home you live in and the land it's on do not count.
- Your personal effects and household goods do not count.
- Life insurance policies may not count, depending on their value.
- Your car usually does not count.
- Burial plots for you and members of your immediate family do not count.

- Up to \$1,500 in burial funds for you and up to \$1,500 in burial funds for your spouse may not count.
- If you are blind or have a disability, some items may not count if you plan to use them to work or earn extra income.

You may also wish to read our

material on “resources” in the booklet, Understanding SSI at www.socialsecurity.gov/ssi/text-understanding-ssi.htm.

Q: If I call 1-800-772-1213, can a Social Security representative take my application for Medicare prescription drug help over the phone?

A: If an interviewer is available when you call the 800 number, he or she can take your application over the phone. If an interviewer is not immediately available, we can schedule a telephone appointment for you. For the fastest and most convenient way to apply for Medicare prescription drug help, go online to www.socialsecurity.gov/prescriptionhelp.

Q: How are my retirement benefits calculated?

A: Your Social Security benefits are based on earnings averaged over

your lifetime. Your actual earnings are first adjusted or “indexed” to account for changes in average wages since the year the earnings were received. Then we calculate your average monthly indexed earnings during the 35 years in which you earned the most. We apply a formula to these earnings and arrive at your basic benefit. This is the amount you would receive at your full retirement age. You may be able to estimate your benefit by using our Retirement Estimator which offers estimates based on your Social Security earnings. You can find the Retirement Estimator at www.socialsecurity.gov/estimator.

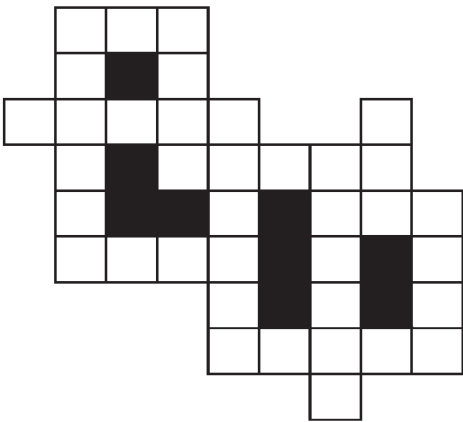
