Business boot camp

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has joined with the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the Department of Defense (DoD) to launch a training program for transitioning service members and veterans to help them become entrepreneurs and create jobs. *Operation Boots to Business: From Service to Startup* is a national initiative that will be piloted with the U.S. Marine Corps. SBA partners will coordinate training and services at military bases around the country, delivering a face-to-face introductory entrepreneurship course. In addition, an intensive eight-week online business planning training will be provided by Syracuse University and its affiliated university partners for those service members who choose to continue to pursue entrepreneurship after the face-to-face introductory course. Then service members and veterans will be referred to SBDCs, WBCs, SCORE chapters and VBOCs for counseling and training throughout the lifetime of their business. The program will pilot in four locations: Quantico, Va., Cherry Point, N.C., Camp

Put on your boots and spurs and be a cowboy, or cowgirl, for a day at the Third Annual National Day of the Cowboy, a day set aside to celebrate the contributions of the Cowboy and Cowgirl to America's culture and heritage.

The annual event will be held from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m., Saturday, July 28, at the El Paso Museum of History, 510 N. Santa Fe Street.

The program will feature a variety of western cowboy contributions, paraphernalia, and activities. The special event is open and free to the public.

According to museum representative Katherine Vandertulip, guests will have the opportunity to witness four different groups re-enact famous gunfights that happened in old El Paso including Six Guns and Shady Ladies, Old West Thunder, Paso del Norte Pistoleros, and the Wild Bunch.

Visitors will be able to participate in a Wild West Medicine Show complete with Little

Sheba the dancing Gypsy and a magic show, like the ones that traveled throughout the Old West, Vandertulip stated.

They will also be able to learn dances that were popular during the western frontier days, and view a fashion show of attire worn during the nineteenth century. And, guests will be able to stroll through a petting zoo with calves, ponies, sheep, and camels, the museum representative explained.

Texas voter ID law in hands of three-judge panel

Texans should know by this fall the fate of the new Texas voter ID law, as lawyers for both sides gave their closing statements recently before a federal court in Washington D.C.

The decision is now in the hands of a three-judge panel, whose members have indicated that they would like to rule on the matter before the presidential election in November. The panel includes Rosemary Collyer, who was appointed to a federal judgeship by President George W. Bush in 2002; David Tatel, appointed by President Bill Clinton in 1994, and Robert Wilkins, appointed by President Barack Obama in 2010.

The Justice Department set up the court fight when it blocked implementation of the new Texas voter ID law in March. It blocked the law under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act, which requires states with a history of discrimination to seek federal approval for

Public Notice of Availability

The USDA, Rural Utilities Service has received an application for financial assistance from the El Paso County Water Control and Improvements District No. 4 (District). As required by the National Environmental Policy Act and agency regulations, the Rural Utilities Service has prepared an Environmental Assessment that evaluated the potential environmental effects and consequences of the proposal. This notice announces the availability of the Environmental Assessment for public review and comment.

The proposal consists of water and wastewater improvements within the town of Fabens, El Paso County, TX and is summarized below.

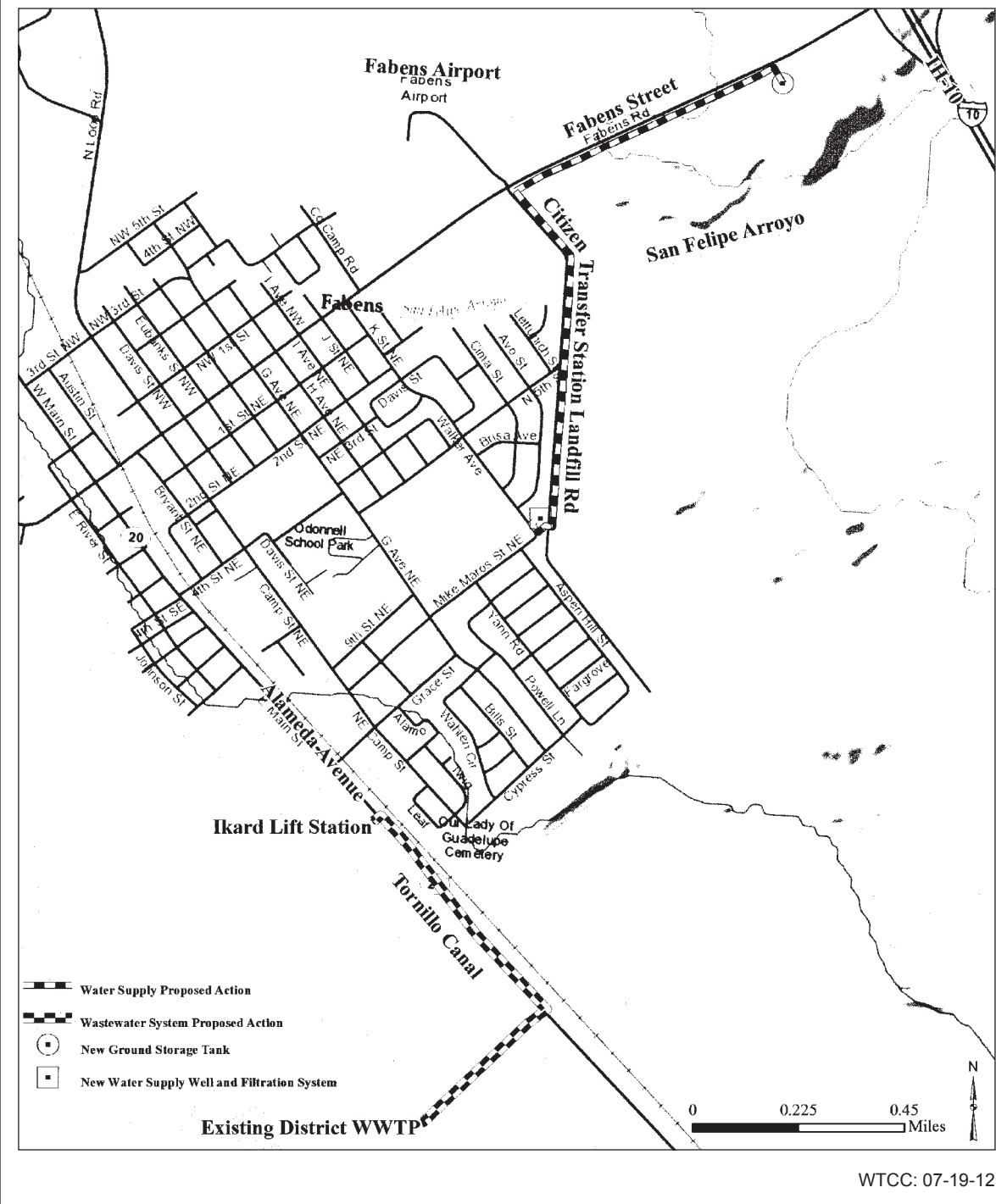
- A new 500,000-gallon ground storage tank (I-10 site) would be constructed adjacent to 1770 N. Fabens Street.
- A new 450-foot deep water supply well (10th Street site) would be drilled within the existing Booster Station at 991 Walker Street.
- A new 700 gallon per minute nano-filtration system (10th St. site) would be installed within the existing Booster Station at 991 Walker Street.
- 8,100 feet of 16" water main pipeline would be constructed between the 10th Street Booster Station site at 991 Walker Street and the proposed 500,000-gallon ground storage tank (I-10 site) adjacent to 1770 N. Fabens Street.
- 5,025 feet of 12" force main would be constructed between the Ikard Lift Station at 1212 E. Main Street. and the District's wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) at 17270 Alameda Street.

Proposed mitigation and best management measures to minimize any adverse environmental effects of the proposal include: ceasing all work in the immediate area of discover if cultural materials are encountered during construction and notifying the appropriate authorities; implementing standard dust and noise minimization measures with construction activities occurring between 7:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. restoring disturbed areas to pre-construction condition or better, and accessibility to all residential, commercial, and institutional facilities would be ensured during construction; implementing erosion control measures including boring under San Felipe Arroyo and installing the wastewater line along the existing bridge across Tornillo Canal; and protect state and federally listed species by following state and federal guidance.

The alternatives considered to the proposal include: doing nothing; installing the water line along Walker Ave.; and installing the wastewater line along either the entire south side of Alameda Ave. from the Ikard Lift Station to the District's WWTP access road or along the south side of Alameda and a portion of the Tornillo Canal right-of-way from the Ikard Lift Station before intersecting the District's WWTP access road.

High Court sides with phony heroes

I imagine the phonies and wannabes are chuckling up their sleeves right now. No longer do they have to worry (if they ever did) about getting caught lying about their alleged military service or medals earned. The Supreme Court has deemed that it's just hunky-dory to lie about those things, and they struck down the Stolen Valor Act.

The Stolen Valor Act made it a crime for people to say they'd earned a medal in the military or that they'd served when they hadn't. Didn't matter whether the lie was put in writing or just stated to one or more people – it was a crime under the Act.

The Supremes bent over backward, it appears, to find reasons to overturn the Act. They chose to lean heavily on the “free speech” aspect, deciding that it was an infringement, and that it's just fine to lie and claim earned medals and service.

There is one clause in the court decision that leaves some slightly open doors: that it's possible “to achieve the Government's objective in less burdensome ways.”

If you agree, pick up the phone and call your congressional representatives. With enough pressure, someone somewhere will draft another version of the Act.

If you need incentive, Google the images of “Xavier Alvarez” and take a look at him wearing a chest full of medals he didn't earn. Read about his claims to a room full of people that he was a 25-year Marine Corps veteran, a helicopter pilot who rescued POWs in Vietnam and earned the Congressional Medal of Honor.

He never even served.

any changes to elections procedures.

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott immediately filed a lawsuit in federal court and now must prove that its new requirements weren't meant to discriminate and don't have that effect.

Texas' new voter ID law, passed by the state's Republican-controlled Legislature last year, requires voters heading to the polls to present a valid, government-issued photo ID. The state currently requires only that voters show their voter registration cards, which do not have photos, or another acceptable alternative form of ID, such as a driver's license or a utility bill.

In federal court, Texas lawyers argued that its law is a simple safeguard against voter fraud. In a recent news report, Abbot stated that the new Texas voter ID law is similar to those in Georgia and Indiana that have withstood legal scrutiny and that the law was in line with Supreme Court precedent.

Justice Department lawyers, however, disputed that the law disproportionately affects Hispanic voters and addresses a problem that doesn't really exist. They contend that ID laws could suppress votes among people who may not typically have a driver's license, and disproportionately affect the elderly, poor and minorities. They also pointed out that in 2008 and 2010, there were 13 million votes cast

across the state and out of those votes there has been only one indictment for voter fraud.

A recently released Associated Press (AP) review of temporary ballots from Indiana and Georgia, that first adopted the most stringent standards, found that more than 1,200 such votes were tossed during the 2008 general election. During primaries this year in Georgia, Indiana and Tennessee – the states implementing the toughest laws – hundreds more ballots were blocked.

Indiana, Georgia, and Tennessee require that voters provide a photo ID at the polls. Failing that, voters can use a temporary ballot that can be verified later, when they must meet with local elections administrators to sort out the issue.

According to the AP review, the numbers suggest that the legitimate votes rejected by the laws are far more numerous than cases of fraud that advocates of the rules say they are trying to prevent. Thousands more votes could be in jeopardy for this November, when more states with larger populations are looking to have similar rules in place.

More than two-dozen states have some form of ID requirement, and 11 of those passed new rules in the past two years largely at the urging of Republicans who say they want to prevent fraud.

The federal court decision is of interest nationwide because it is viewed as a test of restrictive voting laws and, potentially, federal scrutiny of election rules in Texas and other states that began in the 1960s.

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

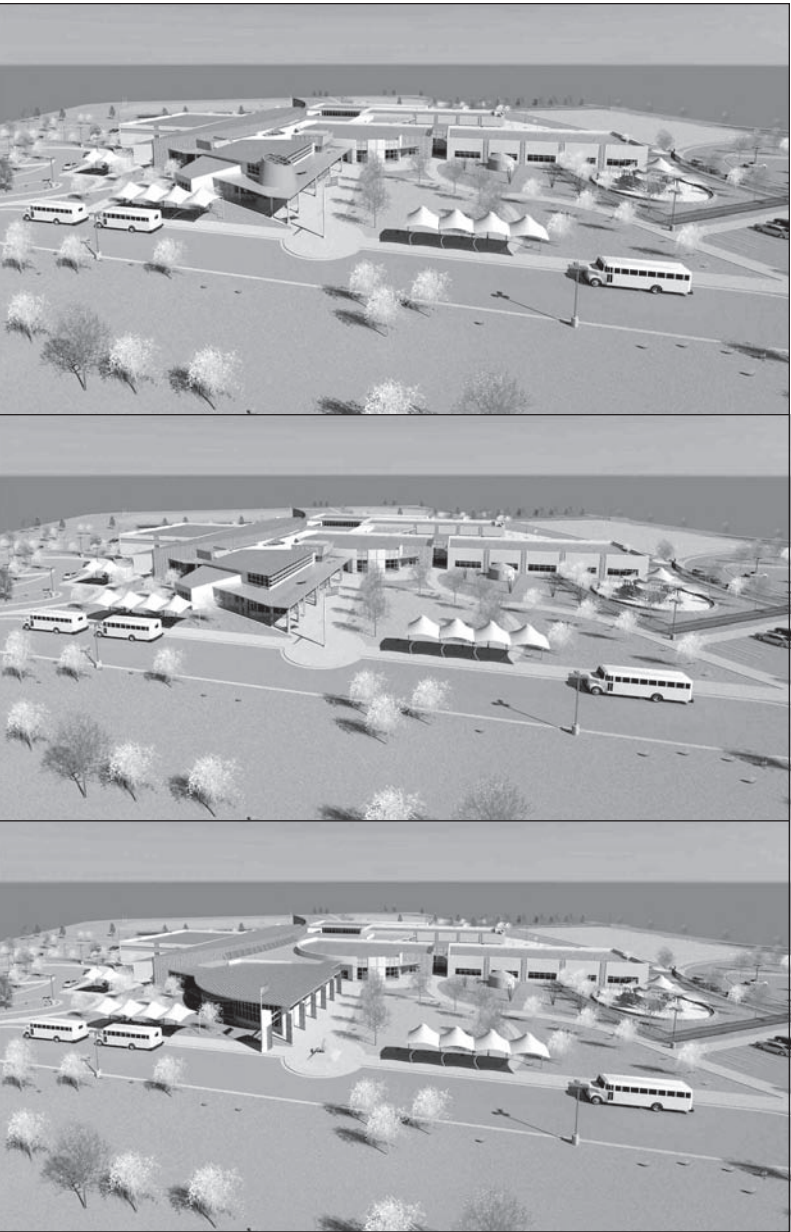

Public helps pick new school design

CANUTILLO – The Canutillo Independent School District is building a new elementary/middle combination school and asked the public to help architects finalize the design of the campus.

Carl Daniel Architects, the firm hired by the District to design the school, presented three potential designs for the campus during a community meeting on Wednesday. The artist renderings of each design are shown above.

School officials asked parents, students, employees and taxpayers to select their favorite option for recommendation to the Board of

Trustees as the final look of the new school. The Board will adopt the final drawings later this summer.

“We are excited to be getting closer and closer to the actual construction of the school,” said Jennifer Matthews, CISD’s Executive Director of Facilities and Transportation. “It is very important to present our constituents with opportunities to give input on every aspect of school construction.”

The \$21-million school will be located at the intersection of Paseo del Norte and Northern Pass drives, and be funded through bonds that were approved by voters in 2006 and 2011. The campus will serve grades pre-kindergarten through eighth and accommodate fast growth in the eastern part of the District.

Q: How do I apply for Social Security disability benefits?

A: There are two ways that you can apply for disability benefits. You can:

1. Apply Online at www.socialsecurity.gov; or
2. Call our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778), to make an appointment to file a disability claim at your local Social Security office or to set up an appointment for someone to take your claim over the telephone.

If you are applying online, a Disability Starter Kit is available at www.socialsecurity.gov/disability. The kit will help you get ready for your disability claim interview. If you schedule an appointment, a Disability Starter

Kit will be mailed to you.

Q: I just started my first job and my paycheck is less than I expected. Why am I paying for retirement benefits when I have a lifetime to live before retirement?

A: Besides being required by law, you are securing your own financial future through the payment of Social Security and Medicare taxes. The taxes you pay now translate to a lifetime of protection, whether you retire or become disabled.
