Exodus to El Paso

Local historian Elias Bonilla, a well-known historian from Tornillo, Texas, will give a presentation, entitled The railway exodus of the Mormon children and women to El Paso, at 2 p.m., Saturday, September 1, in the El Paso Museum of History's Seminar Room, 510 N. Santa Fe Street. The Saturday afternoon event is in conjunction with the history museum's current exhibit, titled Finding Refuge in El Paso: The Mormon Exodus from Mexico A Centennial Celebration, 1912 – 2012. According to Bonilla, it was on July 28, 1912 that the order was given to evacuate all women and children from the seven Mormon colonies in Northern Mexico. They were sent by train to safe refuges in selected communities in the United States. This exodus was in the aftermath of the Mexican Revolution. The men stayed behind to protect their homes and agricultural properties from marauding revolutionaries who had turned against the new government.

Coach, team look to make Fabens proud

FABENS – They say that you can never really go back home again.

And for most people that saying is probably true. But not for one Fabens resident who is back to try and restore some glory from long ago.

The Fabens Wildcats haven't exactly had a winning tradition over the last decade but all that changed last season with the return of Don Hennigan.

Hennigan served as assistant coach at Fabens during the 1978-79 seasons and turned the team's fortunes around in 2011, returning as the head coach 32 years later to

lead the team to its first playoff appearance since 2001.

"Coming back has been great. The warmth of the people of Fabens and how accepting they are just amazes me," said Hennigan. "Too many people just don't know how great a place Fabens, Texas is.

"The players are very excited about this season, they realize that they have a chance to be very good."

The Wildcats open the season this Friday night at 7 p.m. with a home against Santa Teresa.

It took time for the team, which started 1-7, to respond to all the changes Hennigan installed last season but they eventually got it and are running on all cylinders this year.

"After years and years of not going to the

playoffs, they took very well to our changes in the offense and the defense and our whole philosophy," Hennigan said. "To put it simply, they're good with it."

But winning football games is not the only accomplishment Hennigan wants these players to leave high school with.

"We as a football program believe that these kids are given so much by God as far as physical ability, and people in the community come out and support them every Friday night," Hennigan said.

For that support, the coach felt that the players should learn to always give back in some way.

"We felt that a way to show our appreciation,

Over 6,000 students return to Canutillo schools

CANUTILLO – More students are attending Canutillo Independent School District (CISD) schools than ever before.

On its first day of school on Monday, August 27, CISD reported an enrollment of 6,128 students – up from 5,898 students at the same time last year.

The growth has mostly come from the new neighborhoods in the Upper Valley and Helen of Troy areas that include several subdivisions like Cimarron, Del Sol, Canutillo Palms, and College Park among others. As of today, CISD's

Camp Lejeune claims receive green light

Fifteen presumptive illnesses are now covered for those who served at Camp Lejeune, N.C.

The problem at Camp Lejeune was the drinking water. From the 1950s to the 1980s, the water contained volatile organic solvents (trichloroethylene, or TCE; tetrachloroethylene, or PCE; vinyl chloride) and benzene (a component of fuel), which are carcinogens.

For years the Department of Veterans Affairs denied claims for subsequent cancers and other illnesses. For a short time, claims were decided on a case-by-case basis, but getting benefits wasn't easy because it required proving the link between drinking the water so long ago and illness.

Now not only will veterans be covered, but their families will as well.

The devil is in the details, however. Family members will only be eligible for reimbursement for previous care after they have "exhausted without success all claims... against a third party."

Veterans who served at Camp Lejeune for not less than 30 days are covered for the following illnesses: esophageal cancer, lung cancer, breast cancer, bladder cancer, kidney cancer, leukemia, multiple myeloma,

myelodysplastic syndromes, renal toxicity, hepatic steatosis, female infertility, miscarriage, scleroderma, neurobehavioral effects and non-Hodgkin's lymphoma.

Sen. Leahy of Vermont, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, has released 8,000 documents related to the water contamination at Camp Lejeune. The link to those documents is: www.judiciary.senate.gov/CampLejeuneIndex.htm.

Your best bet is to read them side by side with an excellent explanatory page done by Mike Partain for The Few, The Proud, The Forgotten website: tftptf.com, then click MCBLC Timeline of Events, then scroll to Partain's link.

You'll be dismayed by what you read. However, the good news is that we now have benefits for presumptive illnesses caused by service at Camp Lejeune. The shame of it all is that the government has known for many years that those wells were contaminated.

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County Judge promotes efforts for shared services

EL PASO COUNTY – El Paso County Judge Veronica Escobar will give a presentation on the History of City/County Partnerships: What has Worked and What has not and Current Efforts to Share Services and Save Money.

The special presentation will be at 6:30 p.m., Thursday, August 30, in the El Paso Museum of History Seminar Room, 510 N. Santa Fe Street.

Escobar, who is also a former city employee, will share her insights regarding the recent history of the relationship between the city and the county.

According to the County Judge, there have been numerous attempts and partnerships between the two government entities; some of those ideas were seen through to fruition,

others were not. Currently, the city and county are working together on various projects with the goal of efficiency and savings to the taxpayer.

"The city and county of El Paso continue to share a vision for the community through working partnerships and shared services to ensure trust and confidence in its leadership now and in the future," Escobar stated.

Escobar was sworn in as El Paso County Judge on January 1, 2011. She stated that as county judge her priorities are issues related to healthcare, border policy, government consolidation, nature tourism, and economic development.


Escobar has spent her professional and civic life working for non-profits in education and, more recently, in local government. She served as Communications Director for Mayor Raymond C. Caballero from

2001-2003 and as Precinct 2 County Commissioner from 2007-2010.

Escobar has been the recipient of the "Women of Integrity" award given by Women for an Ethical El Paso (2007), the "2008 Elected Official of the Year" Award given by the National Association of Social Workers (Texas Chapter, El Paso Branch), the "Human Rights Safe Communities" award given by the Border Network for Human Rights (2009), and the "2010 Elected Official of the Year" presented to her by the Rio Grande Council of Governments.

Escobar's presentation is in conjunction with El Paso's Third Wall of Giants exhibit, *Awakening our Giants, Celebrating our Firsts: El Paso's Mayors*, which is part of the El Paso Museum of History's Union Pacific Mayor's lecture series that highlights political milestones of past and present mayors.

Dove hunters must follow the rules

WEST TEXAS – The United States Section of the International Boundary and Water Commission (USIBWC) has released information about dove hunting areas on USIBWC lands along the Rio Grande in El Paso and Hudspeth Counties. During the 2012/2013 seasons, that run Sept. 01 – Oct. 24,

2012 and Dec. 22, 2012 – Jan. 06, 2013, the lands open to hunters have changed due to Rio Grande levee construction affecting areas where hunting was previously allowed.

Using the numbering system for the DHS Border Security Initiative markers on the border fence and corresponding markers in Mexico, the USIBWC has prepared a map of areas where hunting is permitted and where it is prohibited. The markers are blue signs approximately two

feet square with bright yellow numbers. Because of ongoing Rio Grande levee construction in the Fabens and Fort Hancock areas, hunting is prohibited this season between markers #68 and #93 in order to protect the safety of both hunters and construction workers.

During the 2012/2013 season, hunting will be permitted between marker # 52, located approximately

Socorro Search

On Friday, Aug. 10, 2012, City of Socorro Police officers secured the area around 10331 North Loop because of a reported assault. They found the victim just sitting on the ground in the middle of the parking lot. The victim went on to explain she was actually sitting in her car, with the door open and her left leg hanging out. This all happened in the parking lot of the La Fiesta Bar. That’s when our suspect, Paola Pulido, walked up to her and asked her if she had anything to say to her. The assault escalated to the point

that Paola slammed the victim’s car door about three times on the victims left leg actually breaking it in three places. Testimony indicates Pulido then grabbed the victim and pulled her onto the pavement and the ground. The victim tried to stand up to either make a run for it or at least defend herself but never could stand up because of her broken left leg. Pulido is described as Hispanic, 5’4” tall, between 140-150 pounds and about 30 years old. Pulido continued to hit her and pull her hair while the victim was on the ground. That’s when others got involved and separated the two. The victim’s broken left leg required surgery. Investigators

have not been able to get a picture nor a location of Pulido, but they know she’s still in the area. Right now, if she comes forward she faces assault charges. But if she is caught by law enforcement she could face other additional charges. If anybody is found guilty of helping her hide from police, they too could face charges. If you’ve heard something or know where she’d hiding call the police. In the City of Socorro the number is 858-6986.




SOCORRO ISD – Two administrators from the Socorro Independent School District have been selected by the Texas Association of Secondary School Principals (TASSP) as the 2012-13 Region 19 Assistant Principal of the Year and the 2012-13 Region 19 Middle School Principal of the Year.

El Dorado assistant principal Edgar Rincon was selected as the TASSP Region 19 Assistant Principal of the Year. He has been an assistant principal at El Dorado for four years and employed with SISD for seven years. He was previously a seventh- and eighth-grade science teacher at Socorro Middle School. He earned

his bachelor’s degree in 2005 and his master’s degree in 2008 from the University of Texas at El Paso.

5.5 miles downstream from the Ysleta-Zaragoza Port of Entry, and marker #54 just upstream from San Elizario; between marker # 59, located near Herring Road, and marker # 68 near Bill’s Crossing; and between marker # 93, located near Diablo Arroyo, and FM 192. The map is available at <http://www.ibwc.gov/Files/HuntingMap2012.pdf> and is also attached. Hunting regulations and the USIBWC also prohibit hunting where people could

be endangered, such as near housing areas and where others may be working on or near the Rio Grande levees.

There is only one public access point through the border fence for hunters in El Paso County; it is located immediately upstream from the Ysleta-Zaragoza Port of Entry. During the dove hunting season, the U.S. Border Patrol will allow access through the border fence at this location beginning at 4:00 a.m. and locking gates one hour past sunset.

For public safety and to avoid damage to USIBWC lands and infrastructure, hunters must abide

by the following rules:

- Use existing ramps to drive onto the levee or floodplain. Driving on the levee slope or face damages the levee and is prohibited.
- Hunters are responsible for identifying legal access points to reach hunting areas and must respect private property.
- Do not damage vegetation in the floodplain. Avoid driving on grass, brush, and trees or disturbing the ground.
- Remove your trash, including any shells.
- Do not discharge firearms within 600 feet of homes or businesses or

toward other people, especially those who must work on or near the levees.

- Hunters who drive on the levee or hunt on USIBWC lands do so at their own risk. Hunters should be aware of security considerations along the border with Mexico.
- Hunters must have any applicable hunting license, follow state hunting laws, and use appropriate firearms. The Texas game warden will enforce state hunting laws on USIBWC lands.

To fulfill its flood control mission, the USIBWC manages lands along the Rio Grande in El Paso and

Hudspeth Counties, Texas that are popular with dove hunters. The USIBWC has jurisdiction over lands on the river side of the levee but not on the land side. Hunting on USIBWC lands is not allowed in the City of El Paso. The USIBWC continues to prohibit hunting on its property along the Rio Grande upstream from the El Paso city limits. The USIBWC developed its dove hunting policy based on consultations with Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, the El Paso County Sheriff’s Office, the Hudspeth County Sheriff’s Office, and the U.S. Border Patrol.

Wanted

the least we could do, was go out and clean up our highway and show our pride in being from Fabens,” said Hennigan.

And on Aug. 11, the team did just that. They cleaned up Fabens Road from Interstate 10 into town.

“That afternoon at 5 p.m., the players showed up, the trainers showed up, the coaches showed up, we had family members show up,” Hennigan said. “It was pretty amazing to tell you the truth.

“We’re not only trying to teach these kids to be better football players, we’re trying to teach them to be good citizens,” he added. “No matter how good you are at something,

you can always find a way to give back and remember where you came from.

“So many people make it big and they forget where their roots are and I do not want them to do that.”

Hennigan said the team wanted to show pride of place and community and felt that this was the best way to demonstrate that idea. Approximately 75 students participated in the highway cleanup.

On the football field, to make the playoffs again this season, Fabens must at least finish third in District 3-3A. The other five teams battling them for the top three sports are Fort Stockton, Pecos, Mountain View, Clint and Anthony.

“We went to the playoffs last year on my first year back as the head coach,” said Hennigan. “I can’t express what that meant to me, and the players, and the community.

“I can tell you that the players aren’t satisfied at all.”

Fabens will count heavily on the play of quarterback Eric Ochoa and a punishing ground game featuring Alex Ortega and J.J. Pacheco.

For the first time in many years, the Fabens Wildcats are fully expected to compete for a playoff spot.

But the team’s goals are a little loftier.

“Since we went to the playoffs last year, the players want to go deeper into the playoffs this year,” said Hennigan. “That’s their goal.”

And now that the team has had a whole year under Hennigan’s system, could they go even farther?

“We honestly believe we will be in the hunt for a district championship,” he said. “If you don’t set your goals that high, then why are you out there playing to begin with?”





DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My 88-year-old relative has high blood pressure and atrial fibrillation, both of which are well-controlled by medication. She is mentally sharp but has developed arthritis in various joints. She's been told that she can't take any medicine for pain because it would interfere with her medicines for blood pressure and atrial fib. I know she could have a better quality of life with less pain. Is there something she can take? – A.H.

amount of medicine that gets into the blood is less than the amount she'd get from an oral medicine, yet a sufficient amount reaches the joint.

I have to presume your relative has osteoarthritis, the kind of arthritis almost all older people develop. Cushioning cartilage in joints crumbles and eventually becomes functionless. Bone rubs against bone, and that is painful and stiffens joints.

Your relative ought to try heat in the form of hot baths, hot packs or heating pads. Heat lessens joint pain. If heat doesn't do the trick for her, she should try ice packs. Heat can be left on a joint for 15 minutes; ice for 10.

If she has hip, knee or foot arthritis, padded shoes or padded shoe inserts lessen the force generated in leg joints when the foot hits the ground.

An exercise program supervised by a physical therapist will strengthen muscles around the affected joints, provide them protection and give the joints a greater range of motion.

Occupational therapists devise splints or braces that protect joints and mitigate pain. They also can suggest devices that make the tasks of daily living much less troublesome.

Has she tried anti-inflammatory medicines applied to the skin directly over an affected joint? Pennsaid lotion is one example. Some of the medicine does get into the blood, so she'll need to have her doctor's approval for it. It is a prescription medicine. The

Basal cell cancer is the most common kind of skin cancer. It's quite treatable and most often completely curable. Up to 2 million new cases of it occur yearly in the United States. Sunlight and a tendency for the person to sunburn easily have a hand in its occurrence. Basal cell cancers almost never spread to other body locations.

They can be dried with an electric current and then scraped off. They can be treated with a laser, frozen or removed with 5-fluorouracil cream applied by the patient. And this is only a small sample of the ways to treat them. Your niece, her mother and you can all relax.



Taking late registration into consideration, the district expects an even larger number by the end of the first six weeks.

According to Associate Superintendent Annette Brigham, most of the new growth is in the areas around Damian Elementary and Garcia Elementary schools. These two elementary schools follow the feeder pattern to Canutillo High School, which topped the 1,600-student mark. Projections indicate that three of the five elementary schools in the district are well over 650 students and Canutillo

Middle School is expected to go over 700 students this year.

“I expect we will need to hire at least half a dozen more new teachers before the end of September to keep our class sizes manageable,” Brigham said.

Over the next 5 years, the district expects a steady growth that could increase student population by about 15 percent. To meet the demand CISD is building a new PK-8 school in the Cimarron subdivision using funds from the voter-approved Decision Canutillo 2011 bond program.

“We are managing our growth in a smart, thoughtful manner,” said CISD Superintendent Dr. Damon Murphy. “As we continue to grow, we want to make sure our students have top facilities, great teachers and the best education possible.

El Paso County Water Control and Improvements District No. 4 Notice of a Finding of No Significant Impact

The USDA, Rural Utilities Service has received an application for financial assistance from the El Paso County Water Control and Improvements District No. 4 (District). The proposal consists of water and wastewater improvements within the town of Fabens, El Paso County, TX and is summarized below:


- A new 500,000-gallon ground storage tank, booster station and 8-inch water main (I-10 site) would be constructed at 1770 N. Fabens Street within University Land property.
- A new 450-foot deep water supply well (10th Street site) would be drilled and equipped with a well pump, motor, piping and appurtenances within the existing Booster Station site at 991 Walker Street.
- A new 700 gallon per minute nano-filtration system (10th St. site), building, piping and appurtenances would be installed within the existing Booster Station site at 991 Walker Street.
- 8,100 feet of 16” water main pipeline would be constructed between the 10th Street Booster Station site at 991 Walker Street and the proposed 500,000-gallon ground storage tank (I-10 site) at 1770 N. Fabens Street on Citizens Transfer Station Landfill Road.
- 5,025 feet of 12” force main would be constructed between the Ikard Lift Station at 1212 E. Main Street and the District’s wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) at 17270 Alameda Street within Alameda Ave (TxDOT ROW).

As required by the National Environmental Policy Act and agency regulations, the Rural Utilities Service prepared an Environmental Assessment of the proposal that assessed the potential environmental effects of the proposal and the effect the proposal may have on historic properties. The Environmental Assessment was published on July 12, 2012 and July 19, 2012 for a 30-day public comment period. No comments were provided, therefore, no changes to the Environmental Assessment document are required. Upon consideration of the applicant’s proposal, federal and state environmental regulatory and natural resource agencies, and public input the agency has determined that the proposal will not have a significant effect on the human environment and for which an Environment Impact Statement will not be prepared. The basis of this determination is the lack of adverse impacts to prime and unique farmlands, formally classified lands, floodplains, wetlands, waterbodies, and water quality. The proposal is not likely to adversely impact federal or state protected species. The proposal will not result in disproportionate adverse impacts to high minority and low-income populations. The impacts to air, noise, and traffic patterns within the project area will be temporary and minor.

In order to avoid or minimize any adverse environmental impacts, the Rural Utilities Service will require the applicant to incorporate the following mitigation measures into the proposal’s design: Ceasing all work in the immediate area of discover if cultural materials are encountered during construction and notifying the appropriate authorities; and implementing standard dust and noise minimization measures with construction activities occurring between 7:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

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Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: I have never worked, but my spouse has. What will my Social Security benefit be?

A: You can be entitled to as much as one-half of your spouse’s benefit amount if you start your benefits when you reach full retirement age. If you want to get Social Security retirement benefits before you reach full retirement age, the amount of your benefit will be reduced. The amount of reduction depends on when you will reach full retirement age. For example, if your full retirement age is 66, you can get 35 percent of your spouse’s unreduced benefit at age 62. The amount of your benefit increases at later ages up to the maximum of 50 percent if you retire at full retirement age. However, if you are taking care of a child who is under age 16 or who gets Social Security disability benefits, you get full benefits, regardless of your age. and you pay an additional monthly premium for the coverage. People with higher incomes might pay a higher premium. If you have limited income and resources, you may be eligible for Extra Help to pay for the costs—monthly premiums, annual deductibles, and prescription co-payments—related to a Medicare prescription drug plan. To qualify for Extra Help, you must reside in one of the 50 states or the District of Columbia. Your resources must be limited to \$13,070 for an individual or \$26,120 for a married couple living together. (Resources include such things as bank accounts, stocks, and bonds. We do not count your house and car as resources.) Your annual income must be limited to \$16,755 for an individual or \$22,695 for a married couple living together. 
