Anthony ISD to unveil upgraded stadium

ANTHONY – Plans are underway for a ribbon-cutting ceremony in August to herald the completion of the \$1.3 million renovation project of Anthony Independent School District's (AISD) athletic stadium.

"Our 40 year-old sports facility was in dire need of repair," said Ron Haugen, superintendent of AISD. "The old stadium had bleachers that could only hold about 100 fans, it had inadequate restrooms, the press box was too small and needed electrical and mechanical upgrades, and the entire facility was not ADA (American Disabilities Act)

compliant," Haugen related.

The project, which started in December, included new aluminum bleachers that will hold up to 1,000 fans, an expanded press box with major upgrades, and a new public address system. The renovation also involved replacing the grass on the athletic field, refurbishing the track around the field with a special asphalt surface, and installing a new scoreboard, the superintendent said.

To address the need for adequate restroom facilities, the lobby of Anthony Middle School's gymnasium, which sits adjacent to the athletic stadium, was converted into spacious restrooms.

Funds for the sports facility improvements came from the district's fund balance,

according to Haugen. "We felt that the improvements were so necessary for the health and safety of our students and fans that we chose to use some of our reserve funds to complete the much-needed renovations," Haugen explained.

According the Texas Education Agency (TEA), districts generally accumulate fund balances for three reasons: to cover cash flow deficits in the fall until property taxes are collected in January; to demonstrate financial stability to enhance district bond ratings for lower interest rates; and to create a financial cushion to meet unexpected expenses and emergencies. TEA recommends that

Credit for stay-at-home spouses and partners

One of the pitfalls of Congress passing complicated, sweeping legislation is that sometimes provisions designed to protect one group unexpectedly create hardships for others. That’s what happened with 2009s Credit Card Accountability Responsibility Disclosure (CARD) Act, which was hailed as legislation that would protect consumers from misleading credit practices.

Among other things, the CARD Act requires that people under 21 must have an adult co-signer in order to open a credit account unless they can prove their ability to repay their account balance. This provision was designed to prevent young adults from assuming more debt than they can afford and then being unable to pay it off, thereby ruining their credit standing.

So far, so good.

Then, in 2011 the Federal Reserve finalized rules around the CARD Act’s “ability to pay” provision. It stated that credit card issuers generally could only consider an applicant’s independent income or assets before issuing a new card or increasing a credit limit, not his or her access to the household’s overall income.

An unintended consequence soon emerged: As a result of the ability-to-pay rule, many spouses or

partners over age 21 who don’t work outside the home suddenly found they were unable to open separate credit accounts in their own name, regardless of whether or not they had access to their working spouse/partner’s income.

Establishing one’s own credit history is crucial to gaining favorable interest rates and access to credit, especially when non-working spouses get divorced or their spouse

dies unexpectedly. Thus many consumers (and their Congressional representatives) were upset. Their displeasure reached the ears of the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB).

Fast forward to October 2012, when the CFPB released a proposal that was expected to ease credit rules for stay-at-home spouses or partners. After six months of public review, the CFPB issued a formal amendment to the ability-to-pay rule that essentially says credit card applicants who are at

least 21 can factor in a third party’s income or assets when applying for credit card accounts if there’s a reasonable expectation they’ll be able to access those funds to make payments. (This includes income of a spouse or partner, although the rule applies to all applicants, regardless of marital status.)

Speaking of unintended consequences, however, remember that even though having at least one credit card or loan in your own name can help you build a strong credit history, it’s important to carefully manage all credit accounts on which you’re named – whether as an individual, cosigner or authorized user – to prevent damage to your credit score.

Having a poor credit score can cost a small fortune over a lifetime. You’ll pay higher rates and have a harder time qualifying for mortgages, car loans and credit cards. To maintain – or improve – your credit score:

- Always pay all bills on time.
- Never exceed credit limits.
- Try to keep your credit utilization ratio (the percentage of available credit you’re using) below 30 percent.
- Don’t automatically close older, unused accounts; 15 percent of your score is based on credit history.
- Each time you open a new account there’s a slight impact on your score, so avoid doing so in the months before a major purchase like a home or car.

Bottom line: Make sure you have credit in your own name, in case you ever need to open a new account based on your own credit history. Just make sure you don’t overextend yourself or mismanage credit you currently have.

Military sexual assault

Last year, 26,000 service members were sexually assaulted while serving in the U.S. military.

That’s a sentence that ought to make any decent person feel sick. There’s even a handy acronym for it now: MST, for Military Sexual Trauma. Worse, of the estimated 26,000 victims, only 3,400 reported the incidents. That speaks volumes about what kind of help the victims expected to get from the military – retaliation.

MST was all over the news recently when some of those responsible for preventing sexual assault at military bases were arrested FOR sexual assault. The Defense Secretary was appalled, as he should be, and ordered all 25,000 people in assault prevention roles to be re-certified by July 1. Heads are rolling.

If you were a victim of sexual assault while you served in the military and never reported it, I hope you do now. If you didn’t get help, take advantage of the assistance and treatment that’s available. You CAN recover.

From the Department of Veterans Affairs’ website section on sexual assault, here are some of the emotional responses to sexual assault: feelings of numbness; trouble with attention, concentration and memory; relationship problems; trouble sleeping; and problems with alcohol and drugs. Untreated, it can lead to diagnoses of PTSD, anxiety disorders, depression, and drug and alcohol abuse.

In addition, even if you’re not eligible for VA care, you can receive treatment for military sexual assault. Every VA facility has a coordinator to help direct you to the right services and programs.

Whether you’re a veteran or on active duty, if you were a victim of military sexual assault, get treatment. You can be whole again. Your care and treatment, especially now, are most likely to be top-notch.

And for those who doubt the pervasiveness of sexual assault in the military, rent the documentary “The Invisible War” from Netflix.

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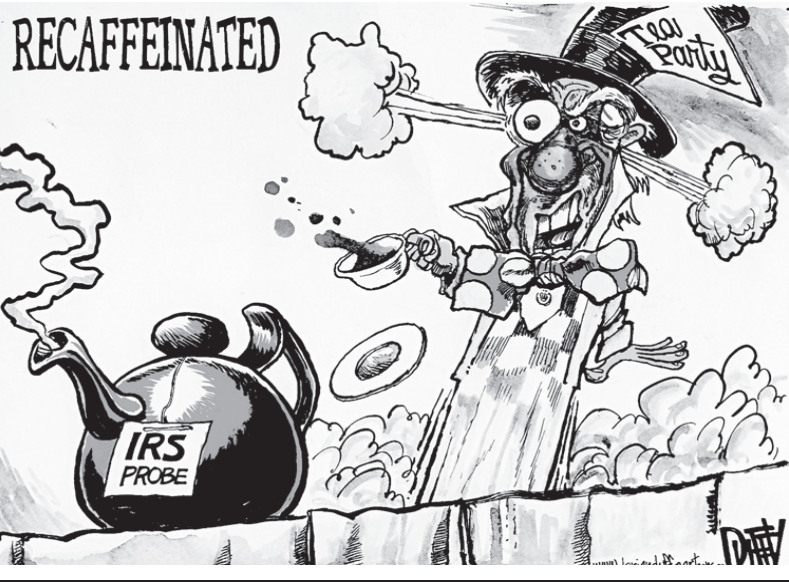

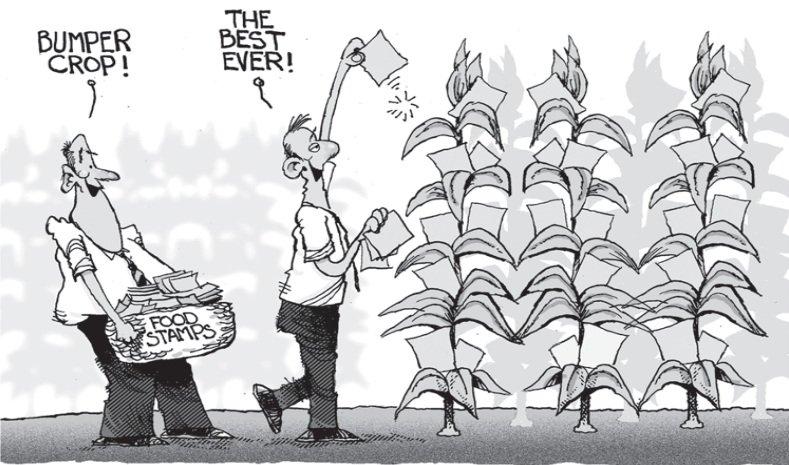
this year by the Heritage Festival, this recognition is awarded to a student musician whose contribution to music and the school community is memorable and inspiring.

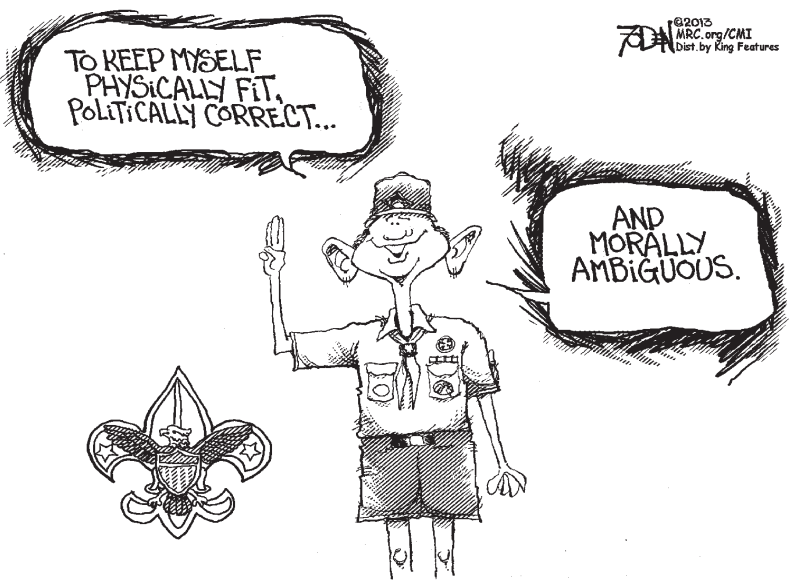

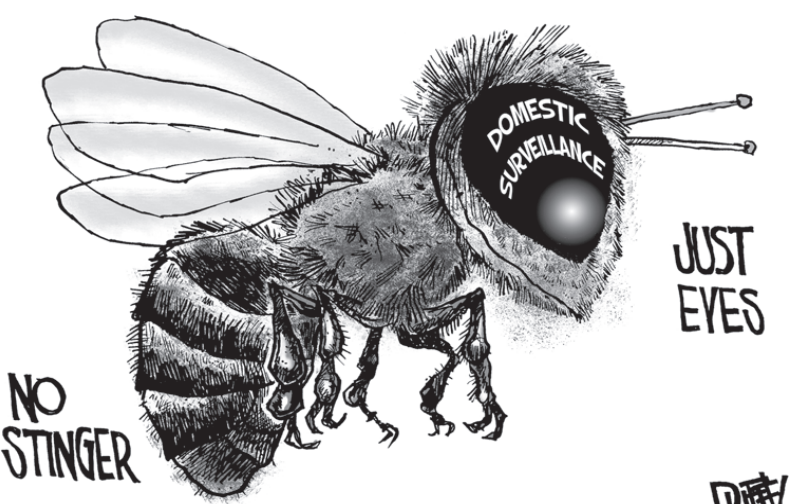
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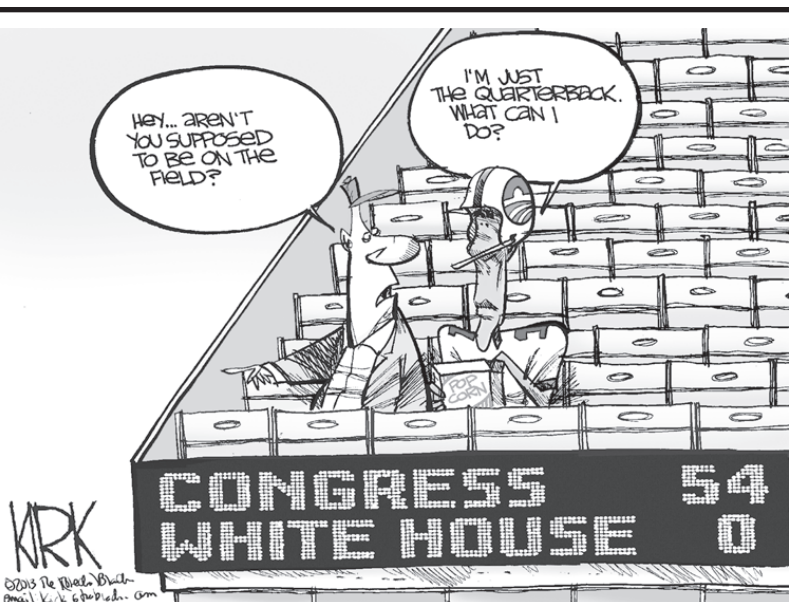

The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the school district's tax rate that will be adopted. Public participation in the discussion is invited.

The school district has elected to adopt a tax rate before receiving the certified appraisal roll from the chief appraiser(s) of the appraisal district(s) and before adopting a budget. school districts have a minimum unrestricted fund balance of about two-and-a-half months of operating expenditures plus enough to cover anticipated cash flow deficits.

With the recent stadium renovation expenses, AISD will still have over \$3 million in its fund balance, the superintendent reported. The district’s annual budget is about \$8.5 million, according to its website.

“The State does not finance athletic facilities construction projects, only instructional ones,” noted Haugen, “and we were unsuccessful in two attempts to pass a bond issue to pay for the renovation work, so our recourse was to use the district’s existing funds,” he said.

Helping AISD’s financial affairs, however, is the passage of the district’s \$3 million bond issue in May. “I think the bond issue passed by 60 percent of the voters this time because the athletic stadium expenditures were taken out of the bond proposal,” Haugen surmised. AISD held a bond election for \$5 million in the prior two years to no avail.

With the recent bond election approval, the district will be able to complete a massive remodeling project that will involve the elementary and middle school buildings. The work will encompass electrical, mechanical, and ADA compliant upgrades for the two schools.

Approval of the bond issue is adding about \$3.17 a month to the average homeowner’s school taxes, said the superintendent. And, district officials are waiting for word from the state regarding AISD’s request for IFA (Instructional Facilities Allotment) funds to help defray some of the cost for the upgrade projects at the two campuses. Haugen said that they expect to hear from the state this summer.

So, the stage is set for a special celebration come Friday, August 30th (the tentative date for the ribbon-cutting ceremony), which is the day Anthony High School football team plays its first home game in the new stadium.

Haugen, who announced recently that he plans to retire in December, said that he is proud that AISD is in better shape today than what it was seven years ago when he was hired as the district’s superintendent.

A woman is found murdered in the backyard of her Northeast El Paso Home and the case remains unsolved. Detectives from the El Paso Police Department are asking for the public's assistance in finding the person responsible for the brutal death of a 53-year old

woman through Crime Stoppers. At 12:30 on the afternoon of Wednesday March 6th 2013, Officers from the El Paso Police Department's Northeast Regional Command Center responded to a home at the 10600 block of Onyxstone, regarding a Subject down. Once at the scene, the Officers found 53-year old, Nora Kim Lorts, lying on the ground in the backyard of her home dead. Detectives from the Crimes Against Persons Unit (C.A.P.) responded to the scene and found that Lorts' death was suspicious in nature. After an autopsy was performed, the death of Nora Kim Lorts was determined to be a murder. The murder is believed to have occurred sometime between seven in the morning and noon on Wednesday March 6th. Investigators are certain that someone has information about this violent death that took place in a Northeast El Paso neighborhood in the victim's own backyard. If you

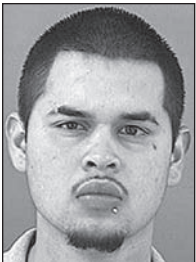

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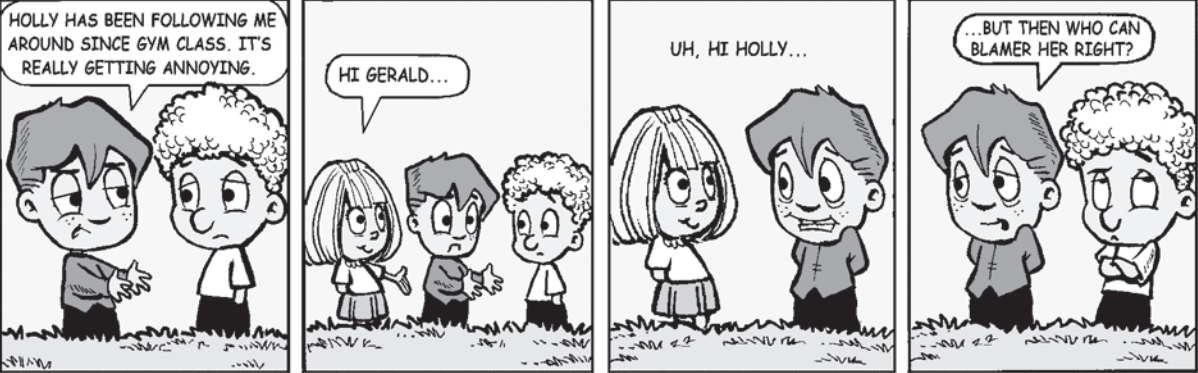

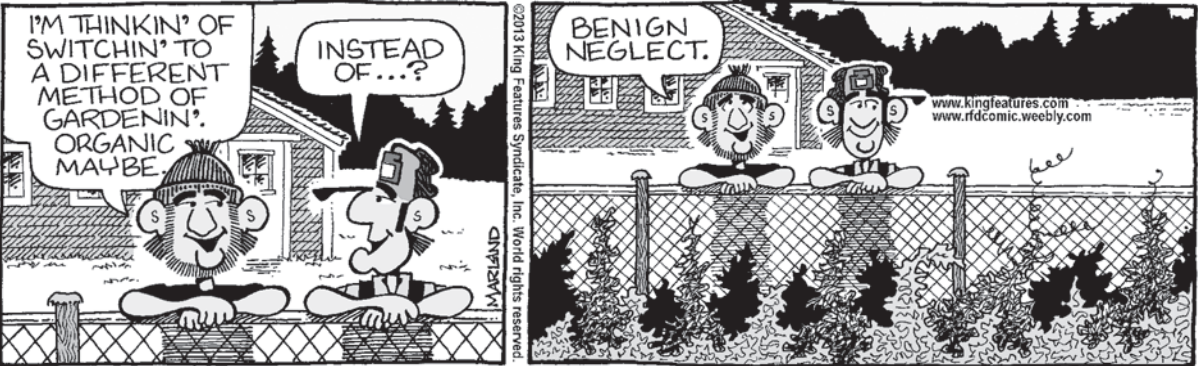

Your good health By Paul G. Donahue, M.D.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have pseudogout. It's hard for me to explain to people, so I either tell them I have gout or I don't tell them anything. Will you do me a favor and explain it in the paper? I'll cut it out, carry it with me and give it to people who ask what I have. Thanks. – D.K.

“Pseudo” is the Greek word for “false.” Pseudogout is false gout, an illness that looks a lot like gout but really isn’t related to it. With gout, blood uric-acid level rises. Crystals of uric acid deposit in joints and give rise to gout pain. With pseudogout, the crystals that invade joints and the tissues around joints are calcium pyrophosphate. What causes the rise of these crystals isn’t known. It’s not diet. The first attack of gout usually involves the base of the big toe. With pseudogout, it’s the knee. The pain of pseudogout is not false; it’s quite real. Both crystals target other joints as time passes. Even though these two are different processes, treatment is similar. Nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs are used for acute attacks of both, medicines like Indocin and Motrin. Colchicine, another gout medicine, is also used for an acute, painful attack of pseudogout. As in gout, cortisone injection of an inflamed joint reliably suppresses joint pain. The standard treatment of inflamed joints – ice packs and immobilization – are part of treatment for both illnesses.

Unlike gout, pseudogout doesn’t have as many medicines for the prevention of attacks. Colchicine can be taken on a daily basis to ward off attacks. However, should this illness develop into a chronic illness, medicines like methotrexate and hydroxychloroquine are often prescribed.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: For about two months, my husband had a red bump on the back of his hand, and he picked at it all the time. It became a sore. I pestered him to see somebody about it, and he finally did. It turned out to be Bowen’s disease. My husband now believes he is at death’s door. Please explain what this is and how it’s treated. – G.R.

Bowen’s disease is squamous cell skin cancer in situ. Squamous cells are the usual outer skin cells. “In situ” is a Latin phrase that means “in place,” the cancer hasn’t gnawed deeply into the skin and hasn’t spread. Bowen’s disease is as close to being 100 percent curable as any illness can be.

Freezing it, drying it with an electric current, radiating it, applying F-fluorouracil cream and surgically removing it (including Mohs surgery) are options that your doctor will explain to your husband. The choice depends on the size and depth of the cancer and your husband’s health.

And oh yeah, tell him to stop picking at it.
