UTEP wants to be hub for commercial space exploration

With Blue Origin LLC near Van Horn, Texas and Spaceport America outside of Las Cruces, New Mexico, the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP) is striving to become a hub for the private sector's exploration of space.

UTEP officials said recently that plans are underway to work with Blue Origin and Spaceport America to make commercial human space flight safer. Blue Origin, LLC, which has a launch and test facility in Van Horn, is an aerospace company that plans to develop technology to transport people to space using reusable launch vehicles. Spaceport America, located in Sierra NM, is a launch site dedicated solely to commercial space flight to take customers into space.

Also, ex-astronaut Danny Olivas, an El Paso native and UTEP graduate, has accepted

In addition, UTEP is partnering with Japan's Kyushu Institute of Technology (Kyutech) for collaborative research on advancing aerospace technologies. University officials signed the international agreement this summer which will allow for faculty and student exchange programs.

By developing these space exploration ventures, UTEP takes another step toward being recognized as a Tier One research university, which would give it elite status among the nation's academic institutions. Tier One universities attract millions of dollars annually in research grant money, meaning a big boost to the university and to the economy of cities where they are located, university officials explained.

Olivas, a NASA space traveler himself, pointed out that very little is known about flight and ways to make it safer.

KyuTech has been historically funded by JAXA, the Japanese Aerospace Exploration Agency, and its plans are to collaborate with the NASA University Research Center and Center for Space Exploration Technology Research at UTEP.

Kyutech has developed a winged rocket platform and the collaboration with UTEP is designed to result in a reusable, suborbital vehicle. UTEP faculty and students' initial task will be to provide a propulsion system using Japanese structural components.

Olivas, who will oversee space initiatives on campus, said that these programs will give students an opportunity to work in the commercial space flight sector in the future and provide UTEP with a direct line into the national direction right now, which is space

Don't dawdle on student loan search

If your kid is among demonstrating exceptional financial need. them, he or she is probably busy juggling homework, extracurricular activities and maybe a part-time job - all undergraduate and graduate students with financial while trying to savor the last official year of childhood and simultaneously prepare for impending adulthood.

You, on the other hand, are likely just wondering how the heck you're going to pay for college.

College may be a year away, but scholarship and loan application deadlines are just around the corner. As you'll soon learn, there are tons of decisions to make and documents to fill out. Plus, some states award aid on a first-come, first-served basis, meaning funds for your child's dream school could be exhausted by the time you get your paperwork together.

Your first step is to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form, which is required by virtually all colleges, universities and career schools for federal student aid, as well as for most aid from states and individual colleges.

It's easiest to file an FAFSA online at www.fafsa. ed.gov. You can also get a hard copy from your child's school or by calling 1-800-4-FED-AID. The FAFSA filing deadline for federal loans isn't until June 30, and parents. Interest rates may be lower than federal 2014, but many state and individual school deadlines fall months earlier.

Many types of student aid are available to help cover costs at four-year colleges and universities, community colleges, and trade, career or technical schools, including:

- · Hundreds of thousands of free scholarships and fellowships are awarded each year. Visit www.finaid. org/scholarships for helpful tips.
- to low-income students to pursue post-secondary education. The maximum annual Pell Grant amount is \$5,500; but students can receive Pell Grants for no more than 12 semesters. They need not be repaid.
 - Federal Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants programs.

- Federal Work-Study provides part-time jobs for need, allowing them to earn money to help pay education expenses.
- Low-interest Federal Perkins Loans are for students who demonstrate exceptional financial need. They are "subsidized," meaning the government pays yearly interest while students are enrolled. They have no origination or default fees.
- Direct Stafford Loans are low-interest federal government loans with no origination fee and come in two varieties: needs-based "Subsidized" loans for undergraduate students where the government pays If that doesn't make you want to get the jump on the yearly interest while students are enrolled; and "Unsubsidized," for undergraduate and graduate students of any income level, where students are responsible for interest that accrues while enrolled.
 - Private Education Loans are offered by lenders to students and parents to supplement government loans. They aren't government-guaranteed or subsidized and typically carry higher interest rates, although you can borrow greater amounts. Details and rates vary widely.
 - Some colleges sponsor their own loans to students loans. Check each college's aid materials to see if they're available.
 - PLUS loans are federal loans that graduate or professional-degree students and parents of dependent undergraduate students can use to pay for education expenses. They are made through participating schools at a fixed interest rate. There is an origination fee.





A couple of years ago, researchers Los Angeles found that pancreatic tumor cells use fructose to divide and reproduce. Tumor cells that were fed glucose and fructose used those sugars in two different ways, the research team said. Their findings, which were published in the journal Cancer Research, could help explain earlier studies that have linked ingestion of fructose with pancreatic cancer, one of the deadliest forms of the disease.

"These findings show that cancer cells can readily metabolize fructose to increase proliferation," Dr. Anthony Heaney of UCLA's Jonsson Cancer Center and colleagues wrote in 2010. "They have major significance for cancer patients given dietary refined fructose consumption, and indicate that efforts to reduce refined fructose intake or inhibit fructose-mediated actions may disrupt cancer growth," he stated.

Archaeologist presents evidence of ancient jade, chocolate trade routes

Mary Louise Johnson Thompson Ridinger- an archaeologist, jade miner, researcher, lecturer, and business administrator who has been working in Antigua, Guatemala since 1974- will share an interesting presentation that traces trade routes in Mesoamerica that go back nearly four thousand years as part of El Paso Museum of Archeaology's lecture program.

Ridinger's presentation scheduled for 2 p.m., Saturday, September 21, at the archeaology museum (4301 Transmountain Road). The special event is free and open to the public.

In her talk, Ridinger will explore the evidence for early trade in jade

which chocolate products are made) along similar routes connecting farflung regions in ancient Mesoamerica as early as 1700 B.C.

According to Ridinger, the trading relationships in these two commodities imply the sharing of astronomical information and calendrics as well as religious symbols and myths. "For example, the earliest calendar dates from the Long Count calendar were only 15, 24, and 40 years apart along the distant points of the jade/cacao route which had been in place 1000 years before the development of the calendar," she

"Most recently, traces of cacao have been found in pottery vessels in southeastern Utah dating to the eighth century. Apparently the cacao trade route stretched from the and cacao (the tree and its fruit from tropical lowland areas of Tabasco and

Veracruz, Mexico to Utah whereas the trade in jade only extended from the Motagua Valley of Guatemala to La Mascota in Jalisco, Mexico," Ridinger related.

Ridinger said that she has devoted her entire professional career to the study of Mesoamerican archaeology and the cultural significance of jade. She has published numerous articles on the significance of jade in Central American cultures, and her many public lectures on Mayan ways of life, astronomy, and art have contributed greatly to contemporary understanding of Mesoamerica.

Ridinger is the co-founder, owner, and vice-president of JadeMaya, located in Antigua, Guatemala and founder of the nonprofit The Maya Conservancy in the USA with sister organizations in Guatemala and Mexico.

Ridinger received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Latin American Studies from the University of Colorado in 1967 and a Master of Arts degree in Anthropology from the Universidad de las Américas, Cholula, Pueblo, México in 1974. She was also field coordinator of the Stanford University summer field programs in Mexico in 1972 and 1973.

The upcoming presentation, which is made possible in part by a grant from Humanities Texas, (the state affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities), is being held in conjunction with the CARTA (Camino Real Trail Association) Conference which is scheduled for September 26-28 in El Paso.




