Social Security changes

As of February 2014, the Social Security Administration will no longer offer Social Security number (SSN) printouts and benefit verification information in our field offices. However, to ensure a smooth transition, we will continue providing these services if requested until April 2014. We are making these changes to meet the increasing demands for our services at the same time that our agency budget has been significantly cut by over \$1 billion in each of the last three years. During this same time period we have invested in technology that offers more convenient, cost-effective, and secure options for our customers to obtain certain services without visiting a local office. Because the SSN printout is not an official document with security features, and is easily duplicated, misused, shared illegally, or counterfeited, eliminating it helps prevent fraud. Employers, departments of motor vehicles, and other entities requiring SSN verification can obtain this information in real time or overnight using online government



Why was your credit card transaction denied?

We've all had these moments: You're at a romantic include: restaurant and the evening went great. But just as you and your date are readying to leave, an embarrassed waiter appears and whispers, "I'm afraid your card has a gas station. Always alert your card issuer whenever been denied." So much for romance.

The same thing can happen at the grocery store, when shopping online or worst of all, when you're traveling and don't have a back-up means of payment. Why do credit card transactions get denied and what can you do to prevent it?

Banks and other credit card issuers have developed complex algorithms that track credit card behavior and highlight unusual usage patterns commonly associated with card theft or fraud.

"Unusual activities" that jump out to card issuers

- When you ordinarily use your card only rarely, but suddenly make several charges in one day.
- Making multiple purchases at the same store (or website) within a few minutes of each other.
- appliance, furniture or jewelry. Alert your card issuer before making large purchases.
- One small purchase quickly followed by larger ones. Thieves will test the waters to see if a small purchase is denied; if it's not, they'll quickly run up major charges.
- Exceeding daily spending limits. Some cards limit how much you can charge per day, even if you have sufficient remaining credit.
- Multiple out-of-town purchases in short succession. (Always tell your card issuer when you'll be traveling.)
- International purchases, whether online or while traveling. In fact, some card issuers automatically decline international transactions because of the high potential for fraud, so learn your issuer's policy before attempting one.

Other common triggers for credit card denials programs.

- Outdated or incorrect personal information for example, when you're asked to enter your zip code at
- Also, make sure you don't mistype your credit card number, expiration date, security code, address or other identifying information.
- Expired card. Always check the card's expiration date. You should receive a replacement card several weeks beforehand. It's often mailed in a plain envelope, so be careful what you toss. If the new card doesn't arrive, contact the issuer to ensure it hasn't been

You've reached your credit limit. For the sake of your credit score, try to keep your overall and individual card credit utilization ratios (credit available divided by amount used) as low as possible - ideally below 50, or even 30, percent.

- A temporary hold has been placed on your card • An unusually large purchase - say for a major say for a rental car or hotel reservation - that puts you over your credit limit. Always ask whether a hold will be placed, how much and for how long, and factor that into your remaining balance calculations.
 - You miss a monthly payment. Card issuers may let this slide once or twice, depending on your history with them, but eventually if you don't make at least the minimum payment due, your card will probably be
- The primary cardholder made changes on the • Making large purchases outside your geographic account and forgot to tell other authorized users - for example, reporting his or her card stolen, lowering credit limits or removing you from the account.

On last thought: If your card is denied, don't shoot the messenger - he's only following instructions. Rather, call the card issuer and find out what happened. Embarrassment aside, it's nice to know that someone is trying to ensure your card isn't being used fraudulently.






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
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

"It is a motivation for the students to see that people care about them, that the community cares and intrinsically kids will see that we for the students," Flores added. care," Hernandez said.




who may need a new coat for the cold season.

Museum offers opportunity to delve into art of repujado

El Paso Museum of Archaeology will hold a workshop to give interested individuals an opportunity to delve into the creative world of Repujado (Metal Embossing) art.

The free workshop will be held from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m., Saturday, January 11, at the archaeology museum (4301 Transmountain Road). During the workshop, El Paso artist Maria Almeida Natividad will lead adults and children (age 6 and older) in creating personal masterpieces using the ancient art of embossing, or pressing shapes into metal, to create a unique design. Participants will be provided all

materials needed for the workshop.

The metal embossing technique, called repujado in Spanish, arrived in Mexico during the Spanish Colonization, explained Natividad. "At that time, churches were lit with candles and the smoke from candles damaged the sacred images painted on canvas, thus the change to using images painted on metal. Eventually the technique was used for decorative popular arts, not just for religious art. Mexican and South American artisans have used copper and tin for centuries to produce jewelry and ornamental works," she related.

"Our design themes will include prehistoric pottery, rock art, and missions, but a wide variety of other design options are available or participants can create their own design.


An antique look can be added with paints and/ or markers," Natividad stated.

The workshop is offered through sponsorship by the City of El Paso Museums and Cultural Affairs Department and the Texas Commission on the Arts.





Your good health By Paul G. Donahue, M.D.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have been with my husband for 33 years, and for the past six I have been suspicious of him being unfaithful. I went to the doctor and tested negative for HIV, but I was positive for herpes 1 and 2. My husband claims I could have had this since before we met and says that he's completely innocent. Do you think I could have had this for 30 years and not known it? It seems rather unrealistic to me. – D.F.

Herpes viruses are a group of common viruses that share several traits, one of which is that they all stay dormant in the body and may cause recurrences in times of stress. Herpes simplex 1 causes an outbreak of cold sores: These often come out when people are ill or stressed. Herpes simplex 2 usually causes genital lesions. About 20 percent of adults in the U.S. are positive for HSV-2; many or even most of them don't know they have it. Once you acquire HSV-2, it stays in your body forever, and may (or may not) cause recurrent disease, DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I had a which most commonly looks like a clear, fluid-filled blister. ago. It is possible that you acquired the condition 30 or more years ago. The test isn't able to tell how long you've had it.

You were right in starting out with your dentist. When no oral conditions are found that produce bad breath, then the most likely cause is mouth bacteria that produce odoriferous, sulfur compounds. Let me repeat what your dentists told you for the sake of others. Brush after every meal, and brush your tongue as far back as you can. You might want to get a tongue scraper for the backmost part of the tongue. That's where the sulfur-producing bacteria live. Keep your mouth moist by drinking water or chewing sugarfree gum.

Products containing zinc have been sold since the 1970s and have gotten mixed reviews for their effect on halitosis. Listerine with zinc is one product. Another is SmartMouth.






