Tax help

Nationwide, AARP Foundation Tax-Aide's 35,000 volunteers at nearly 6,000 sites provided 2.6 million people with free tax help. Valentine's Day is the busiest day of the year for florists. Since many people now order flowers online, these purchases are a common target for fraud. A few tips when choosing a florist:

• Make sure the physical location, contact information and fees for the florist who's actually fulfilling your order are fully disclosed.

• Pay by credit card so if there's a problem you can dispute it with your card issuer.

• If you receive an email saying there's a problem with your order, call the florist to make sure it's legitimate; don't click on any links - they could be malware.

Beware of emails and social media ads touting great deals on other Valentine's themed gifts like chocolates, jewelry or lingerie. Unless you've previously done business with a company that legitimately has your email address, be skeptical. Watch out for minor typos in the web address - www. macys.comm instead of www. macys.com, for example.

It's no coincidence that dating websites are busier during the winter holidays and leading up to Valentine's Day. Lonely people's defenses are lowered, making them vulnerable to online romance scams. Before they know it, victims are conned into sharing personal or financial information, or lending money - money they'll never see again.

I'm not saying don't pursue love online at legitimate dating sites. Just watch out for these warning signs:

• They want to move your conversations off the dating site immediately and use personal email or instant messaging - the better to avoid policing by the site's Webmaster.

• Their online profile sounds too good to be true. That's because they've probably shaped it to reflect your stated preferences. Or,







or somewhere within the city of El Paso, Minjarez wanted residents of San Elizario and other neighboring towns to have access to those hiring opportunities as well. She approached Workforce Solutions in December about partnering up with SEISD to bring those resources and employers to San Elizario. Working with Terry Vasquez from Workforce Solutions, Minjarez assisted in recruiting companies to confirm their participation in the hiring fair. In total over 20 employers such as Verizon Wireless, West Corporation, Dish Network, RM Personnel, O'Reilly Auto Parts including SEISD, met with potential employees and provided information about job vacancies. Workforce Solutions also brought in their mobile unit equipped with computers where career counselors provided job seekers help in resume preparation, completing online applications, intensive job search and registering to receive further services from the agency.

Minjarez stated that the event was a success based on the turnout of many good companies and the positive comments from participants. She added that while some people did walk away with job offers, for many more the hiring fair was an opportunity they had not seen come to this area in a long time.

"Not only did it help a few people find jobs but it gave a lot of people hope to speak to these employers and I think it was a good thing for the community," Minjarez said.

As a result of the favorable outcome of the San Elizario Hiring Fair, Minjarez hopes to plan another one for May that will be larger and possibly assist graduating high school students with their initial job search. She also expects to continue building a partnership with Workforce Solutions to help bring other tools and support to the community.



The Texas Department of Transportation (*TxDOT*) – El Paso District will host two public meetings for the Border Highway East (*BHE*) Planning and Environmental Linkages (*PEL*) Study. The public meetings will be held from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the following locations:

The purpose of the public meetings is to present both the universe and preliminary alternatives for the BHE study area. The BHE study area begins at Loop 375 (*Americas Avenue*) near the Zaragoza International Port of Entry (*POE*) and extends approximately 20 miles southeast to the Fabens International POE (*future Tornillo-Guadalupe International POE*). In addition, IH-10 and the Rio Grande serve as east and west boundaries respectively.

The PEL process, initiated in May 2013, is ultimately intended to help identify the purpose and need for improvements, evaluation methodology, and conceptual alternatives or corridors to address the transportation needs in the study area. The PEL process follows current guidance for linking the transportation planning and National Environmental Policy Act (*NEPA*) processes. In accordance with federal guidance and regulations, information and products developed in highway planning phases are authorized to be integrated into future Federal Highway Administration (*FHWA*) NEPA evaluations.

All interested individuals are encouraged to attend one of the public meetings to discuss the BHE Study. Comment forms will be available at the public meetings for individuals wishing to provide input. Public meeting materials will also be available on the TxDOT website at *www.txdot.gov*, keyword: *Border Highway East*.

Canutillo seniors earn prestigious UTEP scholarships

CANUTILLO -Three Canutillo High School (CHS) seniors, Adam Menchaca, Cesar Nunez and Isaac Hoffman, were awarded presidential scholarships totaling \$38,000 from the University of Texas at El Paso. The boys received their surprise awards during a reception held at CHS in December.

These three CHS seniors were chosen from a field of 4,800 applicants. To qualify for a UTEP Presidential Scholarship, students needed to be in the top 3 percent of their class, hold a 96 GPA, achieve at least a 1220 on the SAT or a 27 on the ACT. In addition, the Presidential Excellence Scholarship also requires exceptional leadership abilities and achievements.

Representatives from the Scholarships office at UTEP presented Hoffman with a \$1,500 per year for his scholarship award, said Dino Coronado, CHS Principal.

According to senior class counselor Sandy Honts, this was only the first round of scholarships awarded by UTEP. 

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am a term use, but definite statements 69-year-old woman, writing to you for information on probiotics. After taking antibiotics for a sinus infection, I developed diarrhea and bloating. I had many tests and scans. Everything was OK. My symptoms continued. On my third visit, they took a stool specimen, which showed veasts. The doctor suggested I go to a health-food store and buy probiotics. I did, and a miracle happened: My diarrhea stopped. Is yogurt considered probiotics? For how long and how often should you take probiotics? – N.A.

Probiotics contain microorganisms that promote health when eaten. Microorganisms are bacteria and fungi. The thought of swigging down bacteria or fungi might be a turnoff. However, these microorganisms are the good kind, not the kind that causes infections. They work for us. Probiotics can restore to the digestive tract the normal balance between good and bad germs. They also appear *having normal children.* -S.B. to have a stimulatory effect on the immune system.

Probiotics come as tablets, cheeses, milk, yogurts, juices and other drinks. The labels on these products must say "live and active cultures." The names of the organisms most often used are lactobacillus, bifidobacterium and sacchromyces. Some brand names of probiotics are Culturelle, Align, Floraster and the yogurt Activia.

Curbing diarrhea is only one use for these products. They're also used for irritable bowel syndrome Dr. Donohue regrets that he is and other conditions.


