Driver wanted

A man is seriously injured at the hands of a hit and run driver in El Paso's eastside. Investigators from the El Paso Police Department's Special Investigations Unit are asking for your help in finding the driver involved through the Crime Stoppers "Crime of the Week." The crash took place on evening of Saturday, March 22, 2014, just before 8 p.m., on Loop 375 Southbound, just before the Vista Del Sol exit. The victim in this case was driving a blue 2005 Suzuki GSR600 motorcycle, when a black sedan struck the motorcycle from behind. The impact caused the victim to lose control and was thrown from the motorcycle. The hit and run driver partially ran over the motorcycle. Evidence at the scene suggests that the vehicle sustained damage to the undercarriage and to the right front fender area and the area around the passenger door. The suspect vehicle is described by witnesses as a black small four door sedan similar to a Dodge Neon. Burial benefit just got easier

As of July 2014, surviving spouses no longer need to apply for burial benefits after the death of a veteran. It used to be that survivors had to submit receipts and forms after the burial of a veteran, and then wait for the reimbursement check. The amounts were small: \$300 for a non-service-connected death, and \$2,000 if it was service-connected.

Now, as the Department of Veterans Affairs tries to cut back on the number of claims it processes, the authorized amounts will be paid automatically once it's notified of a veteran's death. Unfortunately, the amounts will remain the same.

The veteran still will be eligible for other benefits. A headstone (granite or marble) or marker (granite, marble, bronze) will be provided at no cost, but there is likely to be a cost for placement if it's not a national cemetery. A medallion can be provided to attach to a headstone that was privately purchased at a civilian cemetery. For questions or to check status of headstone applications, you can call 1-800-697-6947.


Survivors also can apply to receive a keepsake burial flag. This year, the VA estimates it will pay the benefit to 62,000 surviving spouses.

If you're a surviving spouse, a funeral director will typically take on the task of notifying the VA and Social Security, but don't take that for granted. Ask.

To find the nearest VA state or national cemetery, go online to www.cem.va.gov. You'll find more information about burial benefits and eligibility for burial in a national VA cemetery. To reach the National Cemetery Scheduling Office, call 1-866-900-6417. Call 1-800-535-1117 for follow-ups.

Don't let back-to-school tasks sneak up on you

Parents, if this is your first time at the back-to-school rodeo, let me share a few lessons my wife and I have learned the hard way. Chances are you'll be spending the next few weeks filling out piles of pre-enrollment paperwork, lining up carpools and, of course, taking the dreaded shopping excursions for clothes and school supplies.

If you're a first-timer or simply need a back-to-school refresher course, here are a few suggestions that can help you save time, money and sanity:

Get organized. Maintain a correspondence file from your kid's school for things like registration requirements, report cards, permission slips, required vaccinations, school policies, teacher and parent contact information, etc. Ask whether the school has a website, online calendar or email list you can join. Also, create a family master calendar.

Back-to-school shopping. Between new clothes, classroom supplies and extracurricular activity fees and equipment, many parents end up spending hundreds of dollars per child. Ideally, you've been setting money aside all year. If not, you'll need to determine what you can afford to spend without blowing your overall budget.

Here are a few organizational and money-saving tips:

- Before you shop, make a comprehensive list for each child. Use previous years' expenses as a guide and compare notes with other parents and school officials.
- Engage your kids in the budgeting process. Share how much money is available to spend and get them involved in prioritizing expenses between "needs" and "wants."
- Go through your kids' closets and have them try on everything. Make an inventory of items that fit and are in good shape, and take it when shopping so you don't accidentally buy duplicates. (While you're at it, share, sell or donate unneeded items.)
- Spread clothing purchases throughout the year so your kids don't outgrow everything at once. Many stores hold fall clearance sales to make room for holiday merchandise.
- Review the school's dress code so you don't waste money on inappropriate clothing.
- Although shopping online can save money, time and gas, don't forget to factor in shipping and return costs, which could undo any net savings. If your kids are old enough, put them in charge of online comparison shopping and coupon clipping.
- Ask which school supplies you're expected to buy. Go in with other families to take advantage of volume discounts and sales.
- Find out how much extracurricular activities (athletics, music, art, etc.) cost. Account for uniforms, membership dues, private lessons, field trips, snacks, etc.
- Rent or buy used sporting equipment or musical instruments until you're sure they'll stick with an activity.
- Know when to spend more for higher quality. Cheaper notebook paper shouldn't matter, but don't buy poorly made shoes that might hamper proper physical development.
- Before buying new clothing or accessories, look for "gently used" items in the closets of your older kids and friends, at garage sales, thrift and consignment stores and online.
- Clip newspaper and online coupons. Many stores will match competitors' prices even if their own items aren't on sale. Plus, many consolidation websites post downloadable coupons and sale codes for online retailers, including: CouponCabin.com, CouponCode.com, CouponCraze.com, DealHunting.com and Dealnews.com.
- Mobile shopping apps let in-store smartphone and mobile browser users scan product barcodes and make on-the-spot price comparisons, read reviews, download coupons, buy products and more.
- Follow your favorite retailers on Facebook and Twitter, where many post special savings for their followers.


Bottom line: If you get organized before setting out on back-to-school shopping, you can save money, time and aggravation.

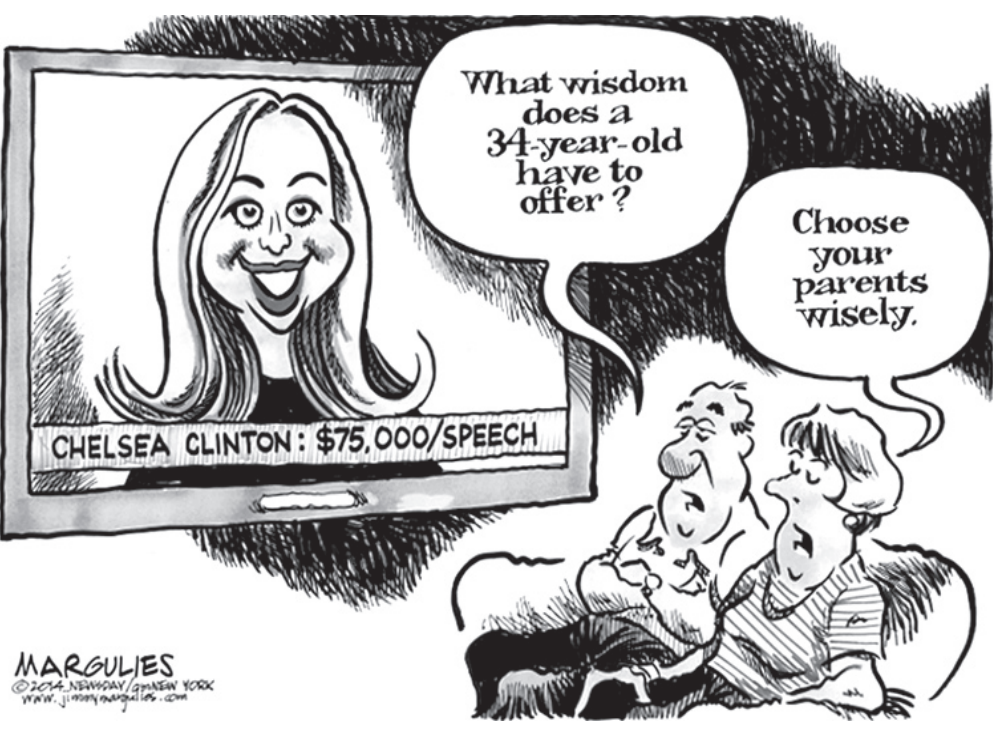

Going beyond medication to treat chronic pain

(StatePoint) Nearly 100 million Americans suffer from chronic pain – that’s more than the number of people living with heart disease, cancer and diabetes combined. Often experienced as pain that lasts over three to six months, chronic pain is a serious and debilitating condition that, if left unmanaged, can negatively impact nearly every aspect of your life.

Chronic pain is the leading cause of long-term disability in U.S. and is a significant burden to the health care economy and society as a whole. It costs as much as \$635 million annually in direct medical treatment costs and low productivity, according to government statistics. Surprisingly, 40 percent of work absences are due to back pain, second only to the common cold.



Zac Cover, a former fire fighter and triathlete, knows the devastating impact of chronic pain. In 2006, the Floridian was hit by a car while cycling and suffered multiple injuries, including broken ribs, a badly injured leg, fractured arm and severed nerve in his broken collarbone.

He underwent seven operations and was bedridden for nearly six months. While the surgeries corrected the physical damage to his body, Cover was left with excruciating pain that lasted for years. His doctor prescribed medication that helped ease the pain but left him foggy-headed, with a poor memory and unable to enjoy activities he loved.

After months of trying other unsuccessful treatments, Cover’s doctor recommended neurostimulation, also known as spinal cord stimulation (SCS) – an advanced therapy option used to manage chronic pain in the arms, legs and trunk, and pain caused by failed back surgery. SCS involves implanting a small device (the size of a silver dollar) along the spinal cord where it emits low intensity electrical pulses that intercept the body’s pain signals before they reach the brain, replacing feelings of pain with a more pleasant tingling sensation.

Dr. Timothy Deer, president-elect of the International Neuromodulation Society, says he has seen an increase in the number of people receiving SCS. “Spinal cord stimulation is an important therapy option for patients who have not been able to alleviate their chronic pain through traditional methods, such as back surgery or pharmacological options,” Deer said. “Studies have shown SCS can reduce pain by 50 percent or more, and patients have the option to try a temporary implant to see if they’re comfortable with the therapy.”

Over time, Cover was able to resume almost all his normal activities – like biking, swimming and running – because he can now better manage his pain. In fact, he was able to draw from this experience and began working as a clinical specialist at St. Jude Medical, the company that manufactured his device. He now works with patients also suffering from chronic pain who have or are about to receive SCS systems.

Cover urges others suffering from chronic pain to talk to their doctor about the best treatment option for them. “Spinal cord stimulation has given me back a life I didn’t think I would have again,” he said. “My pain level is much lower and I’ve been able to stop taking pain medication. It’s dramatically transformed my quality of life.”

Top two life lessons from Derek Jeter

These days it is commonplace to say that people simply don’t notice important things in life. We suffer either from a disorder that creates deficits in our attention span (as if our attention was a quantifiable asset or readily measurable commodity) or from some sort of soul-numbing apathy.

Presumably, this is due to the several layers of varnish our society has lathered upon us through various technologies and social mediums. Words like “personal brand,” “search optimization,” “trolling” and “clickbait” have entered our vernacular. If we’re not finding the top 10 tips to hack our lives, best seven-minute workouts or best slow cooker recipes, we’re falling behind. Certainly, we’re not getting ahead, right?

Leave it to a guy from Kalamazoo, Michigan, a guy who swung a stick at a ball for the better part of two decades, to put it all in perspective. Derek Jeter refutes the notion that people simply don’t notice the standout performances in our lives. This 40-year-old man has put together a stellar, Hall of Fame-worthy career on the field, and as the All-Star Game – a singular event – proved this year, people do notice the little things.

The top two lessons we learn from

Derek Jeter are summarized with one word: respect – 1) respect for yourself, and 2) respect for others.

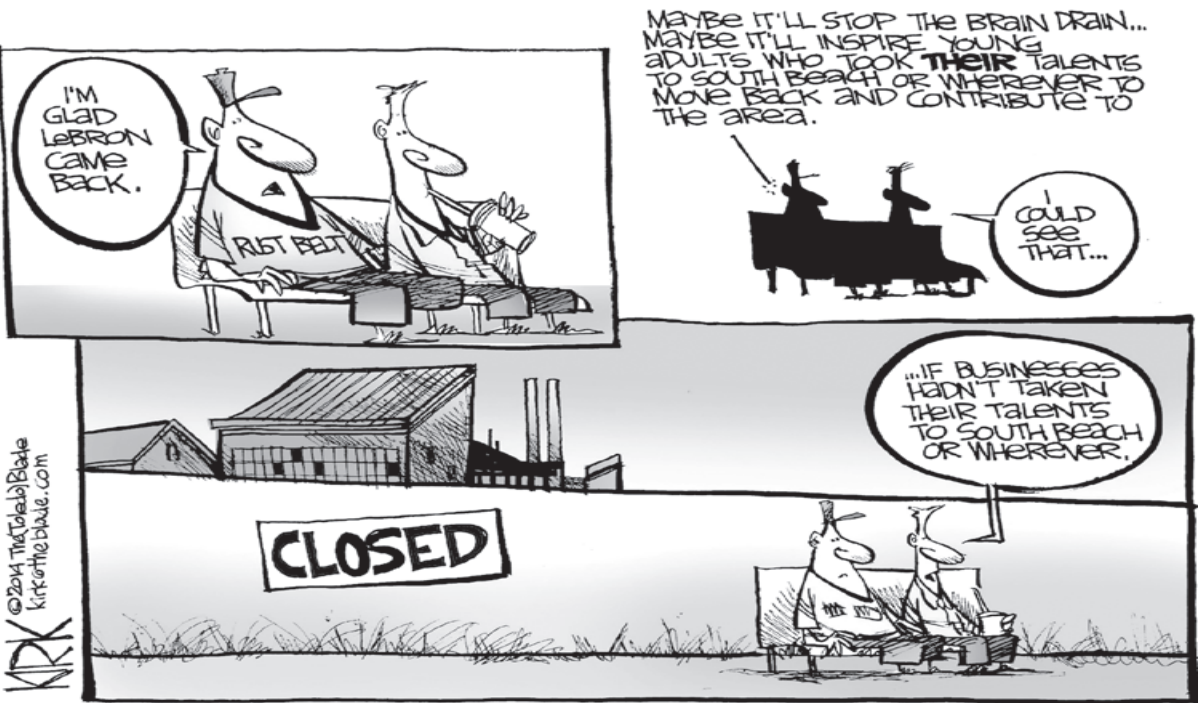
If the New York Yankee shortstop teaches us anything about life, it certainly has come by way of his actions and not by way of his mouth. He was not an Ali or Reggie... ask him and he will say he is “not great.” When asked about what he prided himself in, it was “consistency.” To be consistent, Jeter had to respect himself. He treated himself right, knew his limitations and took pride in his appearance and his performance. Until snapping his ankle last season, he was a picture of consistency. A slump here and there over his career, sure ... but never when it mattered, like say, in October with a championship on the line.

Guys like Jeter know that the difference between a .270 hitter and a .300 hitter over a hundred at bats is three hits. Stay consistent, and they fall more often than not. Think chicks dig the long ball? Jeter’s best home-run total came last century, in 1999, when he hit 24 homers during the heart of the steroid era. Yet there he was dating Jessica Biel, Jessica Alba, Mariah Carey, Scarlett Johansson.

People say he was a tough interview, but he wasn’t inaccessible... just the opposite. He was always cooperative with the media. He respected them and he, in turn, received their respect. That’s why he was able to live a normal life while dating women like that... people respected him and accorded him boundaries.

And so, as Derek Jeter leaves our television sets, radio broadcasts, sports columns and gossip columns, and goes on to reside as a memory, perhaps the greatest thing we’re reminded of when considering the man’s larger-than-life consistency and legendary presence is, perhaps most fittingly and honorably, his absence.

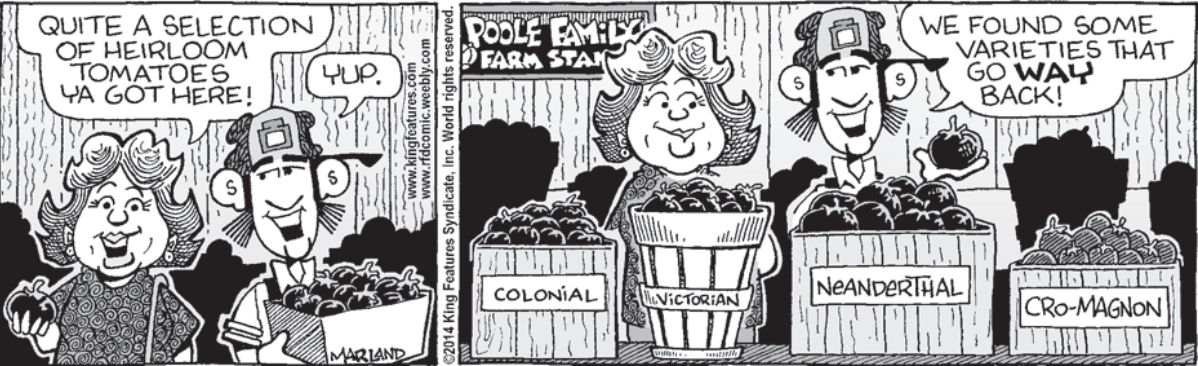

Your good health

DEAR DR. ROACH: I hope you can help me. I am 67 years old and have been sweating profusely from my head for about six years. I believe it is secondary hyperhidrosis. No one in my family has this problem. The sweating seems to happen at all different times, but not at night. The moisture runs in rivulets from my scalp anytime from morning to evening, but mostly in the morning. I tried stopping my water pill, but it still happened. It happened when I stopped vitamins and took only my medications for physical problems. My doctor tested my thyroid, and it was fine. Please help me, as it is an embarrassing ailment, and it happens no matter the season or what I have eaten. I do drink tea and coffee, but not soda. There are people who have said I should take Botox, but I have little faith in the product, as it can cause serious health problems and death. – M.E.

“Hyperhidrosis” simply means “too much sweat.” I think you probably have primary hyperhidrosis, meaning that the sweating is the only problem, as opposed to secondary, which means it’s due to something else. Other conditions that can lead to secondary hyperhidrosis include the thyroid disease your doctor looked for, and medications (which it also doesn’t seem to be). Other rare causes, such as tuberculosis and lymphoma, surely would have produced other symptoms by now. The most common sites for hyperhidrosis are the palms, armpits and soles of the feet. Nearly everybody sweats in those places, but with hyperhidrosis, the amount of sweat is much greater than normal and can have serious emotional, professional and social effects.

The first treatment I would recommend would be a prescription antiperspirant, either aluminum chloride (Xerac) or topical glycopyrrolate (available by compounding pharmacies in

the U.S. and Canada). The scalp is a harder place than most to apply it, but after applying, you can dry with a hair dryer, and use a plastic shower cap to keep the medicine on at nighttime. Occasionally, oral medications such as clonidine are used. Botulinum toxin (Botox) is usually quite safe in expert hands. A last resort is surgery to remove the sympathetic nerves to the scalp, a procedure that’s very effective.

DEAR DR. ROACH: In a recent column, you wrote, “Some people can’t absorb fructose.” I’d like to know more about that. What are the side effects of the inability to absorb fructose? How does that happen? – I.N.

Fructose is a sugar naturally found in fruits, but also in sweeteners, especially honey and high-fructose corn syrup. Other sugars, such as glucose, improve fructose absorption. Few people get symptoms just from natural foods, because these contain the other natural sugars that improve fructose absorption. On the other hand, sorbitol (a “sugar alcohol”) decreases fructose absorption. Almost half the population cannot completely absorb fructose, and the more fructose people take in, the greater the risk of the symptoms of malabsorption, including diarrhea, gas and bloating.

I recommend against HFCS for many reasons, but this is another one. For people with symptoms of malabsorption, I recommend a trial of reducing fructose and sorbitol.

Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: My dad receives Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits. He soon will be coming to live with me. Does he have to report the move to Social Security?

A: Yes. He should report any change in his living arrangements within 10 days. The change may affect his benefit amount. Also, we need his correct address so we can send correspondence when needed, even if he receives his payments electronically. He can report the change by mail or in person at a Social Security office. Or, have him call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778). Changes must be reported promptly or a penalty may be charged and held from future benefits. For more information about the kinds of changes that need to be reported, read the publication *What You Need To Know When You Get SSI* at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs.

Q: My uncle is interested in the Medicare Part D prescription help, but he has about \$10,000 in the bank. Would he still be eligible?

A: Based on his resources, yes. However, there are other factors to consider. This year a person's

total resources are, in most cases, limited to \$13,440 (or \$26,860 if married and living with spouse) to qualify for *Extra Help* with Medicare prescription drug costs. Resources include the value of the things he owns, such as real estate (other than the place you live), cash, bank accounts, stocks, bonds, and retirement accounts like IRAs or 401(k)s. There are exceptions. To learn more, go to www.socialsecurity.gov.

Q: My neighbor said my kids, 8 and 15, might be eligible for survivors' benefits since their mother died. Are they?

A: Maybe. Their mother must have worked and earned the required number of Social Security credits. If she did, both you and your children may be eligible for benefits. Apply promptly for survivors benefits because benefits are generally retroactive only up to six months. You can apply by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Monday through Friday. People who are deaf or hard of hearing may call our toll-free TTY number, 1-800-325-0778. For more information, read

Other than some shoes (1,700 pairs) and stationery (1,200 boxes) that she left to the Salvation Army, her entire estate was used to create a trust for the 150 stray dogs she had adopted. The pets lived in luxury, dying of old age one by one, until 1984, when the last one – the richest dog in the country – also succumbed. The remainder of the inheritance then went to Auburn University.

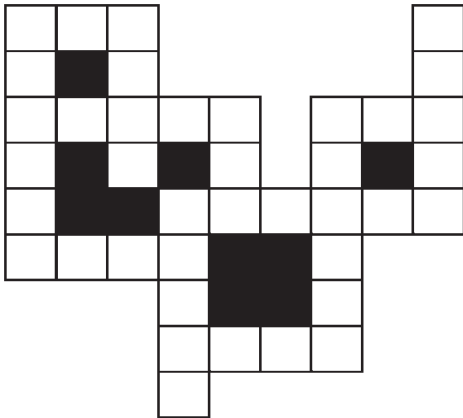
