## Museum invites public to participate in ‘El Dia de Los Muertos’ festivities

EL PASO COUNTY – El Paso Museum of History is inviting the public to participate in its upcoming *El Dia de Los Muertos* (Day of the Dead) festivities by submitting *Calaveritas* (Halloween poems) or reserving a place for *Altars de Muertos* (Altars of the Dead).

The museum is now accepting the *Calaveritas* in English and Spanish and reserving space for the *Altars de Muertos* that will be on display in one of its galleries. The showing will be free and open to the public.

The poems and altars exhibit is scheduled to begin Saturday, October 25, and continue through Sunday, November 9. The history museum is located in downtown El Paso at 510 N. Santa Fe St.

According to museum officials, the origin of the Day of the Dead tradition is pre-Hispanic. The Mexicas (an ethnic group of central Mexico) recognized it with a party at the end of the harvest and associated it with the cult of the goddess *Mictecacihuatl*, guardian of the underworld. This aspect, combined with the pre-Hispanic tradition of burying the dead

## Museum lecture, exhibit focus on evolution of warfare

EL PASO COUNTY – The El Paso Museum of History will present a special lecture on the evolution of military tactics from Ancient Rome to the present, from 2 to 3 p.m., Saturday, October 25. The lecture is in conjunction with the museum’s featured exhibit, *Julius Caesar: Military Genius & Mighty Machines*, which is currently on display at the museum (510 N. Santa Fe Street).

John Hamilton will be guest speaker for the Saturday lecture. According to Hamilton, his talk will be about the development of warfare over the centuries including the evolution of technology as well as the progression to combined arms warfare from the ancient Roman times to present day.

“To be sure, warfare is ugly, but to ensure peace we must study warfare to understand its demands, why wars start, and how they are ended,” Hamilton stated. “As the military historian and tactician Sir Basil Liddell-Hart said, ‘History is a catalogue of mistakes. It is our duty to profit by them,’” he added.

Hamilton currently serves as the Chief of Inspections for the Fort Bliss Inspector General. He was a US Army Infantry officer from 1971 until his retirement from active duty in 1994 as a lieutenant colonel. His career also includes being a division historian and a professor of Military Science at the University of Arkansas.

Hamilton’s credentials include earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in History from Texas A&M University and a Master of Arts degree from the University of Southern California. He has also contributed articles to various historical publications including

Commanders’ Call, Infantry Magazine, Air Defense Magazine, and Password and is author of the book, *Blazing Skies*, which documents the history of air defense artillery at Fort Bliss.

## San Elizario ISD bond meeting

SAN ELIZARIO – The San Elizario Independent School District (SEISD) is hosting a series of meetings to inform the community about the district’s bond issuance appearing on the ballot for the upcoming November 4 general election. Voters will decide whether to issue up to \$28 million in bonds to provide for the construction, renovation, acquisition, and equipment of school buildings within the district. The San Elizario ISD school board voted to approve the order calling for a bond at the regular board meeting held on August 13.

A district Bond Advisory Committee formed in August 2013, recommended projects to be funded through a bond to the school board after a yearlong needs assessment that included tours of facilities and regular meetings. The ten projects include: replacement of aging roofing systems at seven district campuses and facilities; construction of a new building for Career and Technical Education courses; construction of a new field house; conversion of an existing parking lot into a playground area; expansion of a cafeteria; construction of a transportation and warehouse center; renovation of a classroom wing; installation

of artificial turf; replacement of all damaged floor tile at a campus; and the conversion of a classroom/lab into two classrooms.

The SEISD current tax rate for bonds is approximately five cents per \$100 of taxable assessed valuation. If all \$28 million of bonds are issued, it is expected that the tax rate would increase by approximately seven cents.

Additionally, SEISD currently receives state aid, which is used to pay approximately 87 percent of the district’s debt. Meanwhile, property taxes paid by district taxpayers are use to pay the remaining 13 percent of debt. The last of the bonds currently issued by the District will be paid off in February 2016. However, no bonds will be issued unless the District receives state assistance for the payment of the bonds. Based on current law, the District can expect to receive between 85 and 90 percent assistance from the state.

To learn more about the SEISD bond proposition, the community is invited to attend any of the upcoming meetings. The next community meeting will be on Tuesday, October 28 at 5:00 p.m. at the Garcia-Enriquez Middle School cafeteria located at 12280 Socorro Road. Another meeting will be held on Wednesday, October 29 at 5:00 p.m. in the Sambrano Elementary School cafeteria located at 200 Herring Road. # Weigh 2015 Medicare Part D, Advantage Plan choices carefully

If you're currently enrolled in Medicare, what you do or don't do over the next few weeks could determine whether you can secure the best, most affordable coverage next year. Here's why:

Medicare Part D prescription plans frequently change premiums, drug formularies, deductibles and copayment amounts for specific drugs from year to year. Medicare Advantage plans often make similar changes; plus doctors, hospitals and pharmacies may drop out of their preferred provider networks. Thus, by simply choosing the

same options for 2015 without investigating alternatives, you could wind up paying hundreds or thousands of dollars more for similar healthcare services.

Medicare's annual election period (a.k.a. open enrollment) to make coverage changes for 2015 runs from October 15, 2014, to December 7, 2014. For most people, this is the best – and sometimes only – opportunity to make coverage changes. (Exceptions are made for people who qualify for a special enrollment period – see *Medicare & You* at [www.medicare.gov](http://www.medicare.gov) for details.)

If you already have traditional Medicare Parts A and B, you needn't make any changes; however, if you also have Part D, you must either reenroll in your current plan or choose another.

- During open enrollment you can:
- Switch from Medicare Parts A, B and D to Medicare Advantage or vice versa.
  - Switch from one Advantage plan to another.
  - Switch from an Advantage plan offering drug coverage to one that doesn't or vice versa.
  - Join a Part D plan, switch from one plan to another or drop coverage altogether.

Current Advantage plan enrollees can also use the Medicare Advantage disenrollment period (January 1, 2015, to February 14, 2015) to switch back to Medicare Parts A, B and D. However they cannot:

- Switch from original Medicare to Medicare Advantage.
- Switch from one Advantage plan to another.
- Switch from one Part D plan to another.

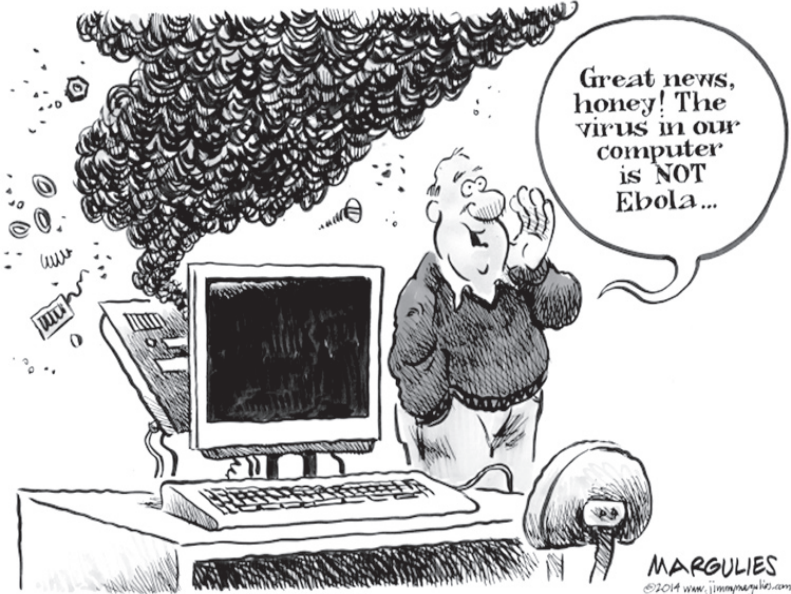
When choosing next year's Part D plan:

- Carefully review your plan's "Annual Notice of Change" for substantive changes to premiums, deductibles, copayments, covered drugs, participating pharmacies, etc.
- Notice whether they've changed copayments/coinsurance for your medications or possibly

# Telehealth care

For the fiscal year 2014, which ended in September, the Department of Veterans Affairs took care of 690,000 veterans via 2 million Telehealth visits. That equals 12 percent of all veterans enrolled in VA health care.

More than half of veterans with Telehealth care live in rural areas, making it hard to get to clinics and hospitals, and not all physical locations can take care of all medical specialties. Granted, not every medical concern can be addressed via Telehealth, but there are more than 40 health specialties that can. Rehab, mental health, cardiology, neurology, occupational therapy and primary care are but a few. Surgical specialists also can be hooked in for consultations when required, both before and after surgery.

Telehealth works in two ways. With Asynchronous Telehealth, information such as medical images and voice recordings is stored in advance, then sent to the doctor for assessment. For veterans with diabetes, PTSD or heart failure, it's simple enough that vital signs can be sent via a telephone line. There even are

digital stethoscopes and scales to help with weight-loss programs. A care coordinator keeps track of the information and works with the doctor to arrange any treatment changes or appointments.

With Synchronous Video Telehealth, both the doctor and the veteran are hooked up with a real-time video communication link for checkups, diagnoses and more. The doctor also can review previously uploaded data and order prescription changes on the spot. Besides the benefit of receiving care while at home, the VA even pays for the equipment.

Also, when returning kicks, the stiff arm has never been known to fail. Use it liberally and watch as the opposing defenders fall to the wayside with astonishing ease.

**Boxing:** If possible, wear a T-shirt into the ring and hide an iron plate behind said shirt. Also, the ropes are your friend. Use them to sling yourself across the ring like an

arrow, bashing your opponent. This works especially well if you also place an iron inside your glove.

**Outdoors:** When hunting, should you come across one or two hunters who seem out of place, remain calm. One of them will level the shotgun in your face. His name will either

be Elmer or Dick Cheney. Stick your fingers in the shotgun muzzle and render the weapon harmless. The other, again, named Elmer or George, can be tricked into thinking it’s not rabbit season or duck season (depending on what prey species you are trying to protect) if you engage

him conversation long enough. This really works.

**Basketball:** Pick Jordan for your team. That guy can fly.

dropped some altogether. Ask your doctor whether comparable, covered drugs will work; otherwise you could pay much more next year.

- Even if your plan hasn’t changed substantially, it’s still wise to use the Medicare Plan Finder at [www.medicare.gov](http://www.medicare.gov) to compare all available plans. You’ll be prompted to enter your medications and dosages. The calculator then ranks plans by “star rating” and overall cost.
- Note: The lowest premium may not be your best bet – sometimes plans with higher monthly premiums have a lower overall cost due to their more favorable deductible, copayment and coinsurance amounts.

Medicare Advantage plans are HMO- or PPO-type alternatives to Medicare Parts A and B. Most cover drugs and some include extra benefits like

vision and dental coverage at additional cost. They usually have lower deductibles and copayments but require you to use the plan’s provider network. A few tips:

- If your Advantage plan includes drug coverage, you don’t need Part D.
- Carefully review the “Annual Notice of Change” from your plan for any substantive changes.
- Even if your plan hasn’t changed substantially, you can use the same Medicare Plan Finder as above to review available plans. As with Part D plans, an Advantage plan with a lower premium might have a higher overall cost, due to various restrictions.

Bottom line: Reviewing your Medicare options each year is complicated and time-consuming. But if you don’t and your plans change significantly, it could cost you a bundle next year.

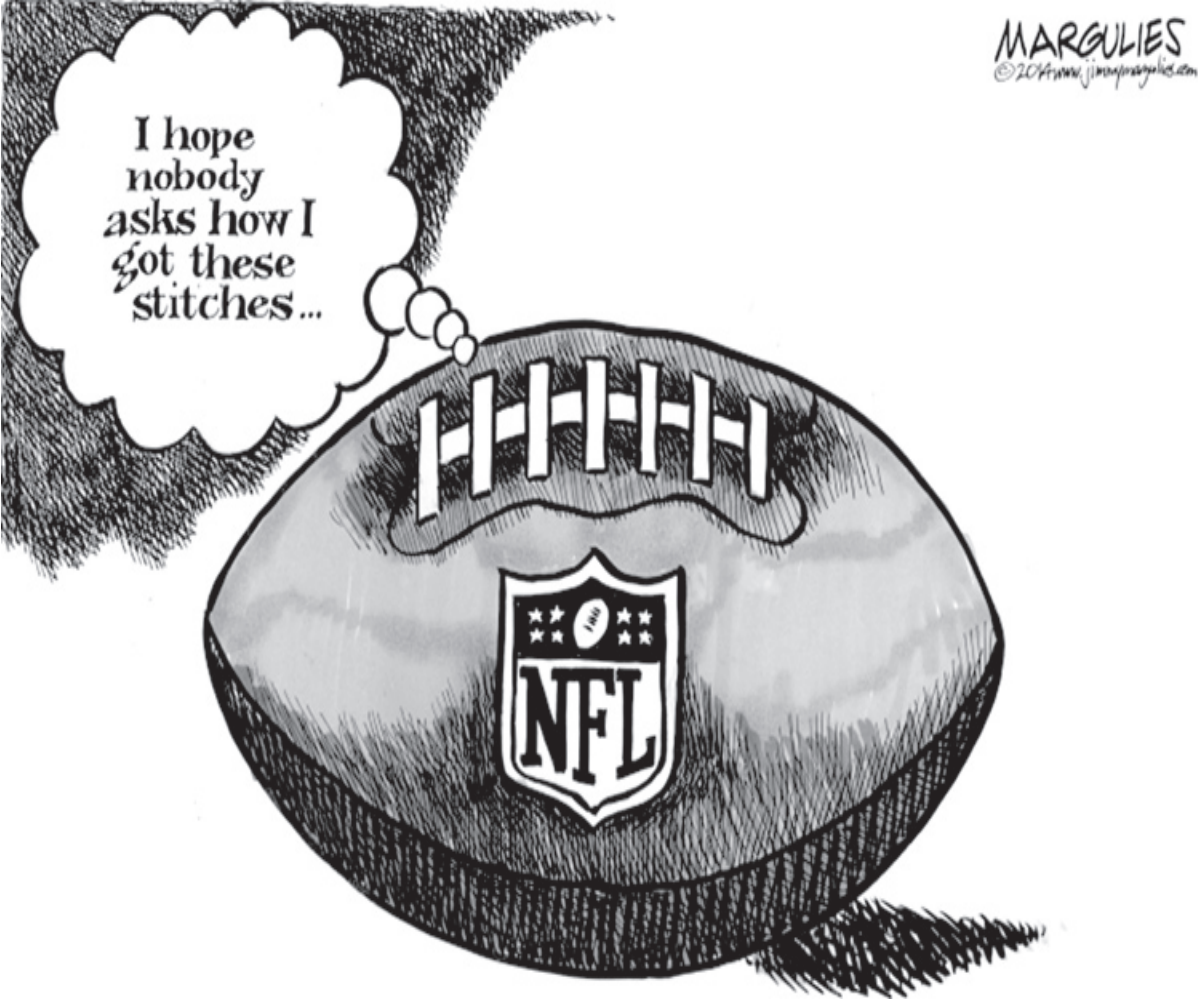

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am an active 63-year-old female of normal weight. I exercise several times a week and am in seemingly good health. About a year ago I noticed that my eyebrows were disappearing, starting on the outer edges. They are now almost completely gone. During my annual physical in November, my general physician found that I have thyroid nodules. Three large ones were biopsied and proved negative. Blood work, including a TSH level, is normal. Both my GP and dermatologist feel certain that the nodules are not causing the eyebrow problem, because I don't have any other symptoms of thyroid disease, but they don't know what is causing the loss. – K.F.

The loss of eyebrows, superciliary madarosis, has many possible causes, but low thyroid is the first one that most doctors think of. A TSH level is a reasonable screening test for thyroid disease, but if the suspicion is high, I check additional thyroid tests, such a thyroxine (T4), free T4 and T3. Occasionally TSH still can be in the very broad “normal” range for most people but be abnormal for that person.

Other causes of eyebrow loss include autoimmune disease, inflammatory skin conditions and infection. Repeated plucking of the eyebrows can lead to permanent loss of the follicles. Allergies to cosmetics also can cause eyebrow and eyelash loss. Have you changed your makeup recently?

DEAR DR. ROACH: My wife continually tells me that I should not drink reheated coffee because it concentrates the acid in coffee and is bad for me. I never drink more than one cup per day, and I always use a non-dairy creamer and Splenda. I have researched this question online and several responses say it is not harmful. In the meantime, she drinks orange juice every day, which has a lower

pH than coffee. She sometimes complains about acid indigestion. Your comments? – A.

Acid is measured by the pH scale – with the lower the number, the more acid in the liquid. Coffee has a pH of about 5, slightly acidic, whereas orange juice has a pH of 3, which means it is a hundred times more acidic. Reheating coffee should not change the acid concentration.

Your stomach has a pH of about 1.5 – much more acid than either juice or coffee. The caffeine in coffee can stimulate your stomach to make more acid, and can weaken the sphincter muscle that keeps the stomach acid from going up into the esophagus. However, if it isn't bothering you, there is no reason to stop drinking coffee.

One cup of juice usually doesn't cause acid indigestion either.

DEAR DR. ROACH: What is a hammer toe? Is surgery always necessary? – R.H.

A hammer toe is a deformity of the second, third or fourth toe, where it stays permanently bent. It may be caused by wearing shoes with too little toe room. Roomy shoes are always a good idea, and taping may be tried if the toe is still bendable.

Surgery is used in cases of pain that doesn't respond to conservative treatments. Surgery should not be done just for cosmetic reasons.

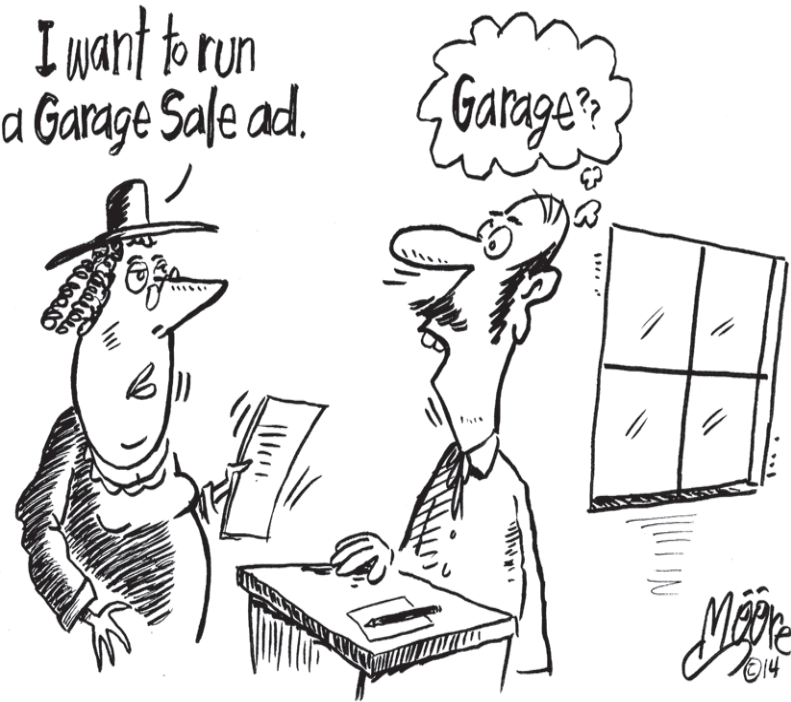
