Carnegie Hall grant

Mission Ridge Elementary School’s afterschool music class, Tocando, has been awarded a grant by the Carnegie Hall Foundation through the El Paso Symphony Orchestra. It is one of only three programs across the nation to receive the funds. The non-profit program that offers underserved students exposure to the arts began in August at Mission Ridge. Thirty-five third graders spend from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. four days a week learning to play the cello and violin. The program is also offered at El Paso Independent School District’s Hart Elementary School. “My vision was to offer these students programs like other schools. I wanted these kids to be able to get a taste of what the arts can bring to them,” said Principal Rosy Vega-Barrio. “Not many of them get that chance. We are thrilled and humbled to be a part of this.” With the help of SISD’s Fine Arts Director, Donald Rominsky, she heard about Tocando and applied for the program. “The symphony people were great,” she said. “They walked around the school and we drove through the Sparks area. They strongly believed Tocando would be a good fit here.” EPSO’s Executive Director Ruth Ellen Jacobson agreed. She is thrilled the program is receiving funds from the Carnegie Hall. “We were one out of three chosen. Do you know how many groups applied for the grant?” Jacobson said. “Lots and lots of orchestras and organizations applied.” Phil Bravo, senior manager of secondary school projects for the Carnegie Hall’s Weill Music Institute, said the foundation is proud and happy with the partnership. The grant, called PlayUSA, is a new initiative by Carnegie. The hope is to increase access to music for low income children. “This can change the life of these children,” said Bravo, who was in El Paso recently to observe the program. “It is cultivating that seed for music and breaking the stereotypes of communities. That’s what I see this program here doing that. There is a strong bond between the school and the community. We are here to see what else we can do for the program.” The children at Mission Ridge are learning about music from Alejandro Gonzalez, a cello player from Columbia, who really believes

Road poses safety concerns

EL PASO COUNTY – During a recent incident in which a man with a gun was reported to be on El Paso Community College’s (EPCC) Northwest campus, an immediate lockdown was put in place at the college campus along with the nearby campuses of Canutillo High School, Northwest Early College High School, Region 19’s Head Start, and the City of El Paso’s Westside Sports Complex. The situation required a large response from area law enforcement agencies that had to use Isela Rubalcava Boulevard, the only

street available, to access and secure all of the sites. After about two and a half hours of intense combing of the facilities no one was found with a gun, subsequently law officials lifted the lockdown order. Although no serious issues were encountered in this incident, it did bring to light another glaring problem these five entities share: The only access road to these four campuses and the sports complex, is Isela Rubalcava Blvd. from South Desert Boulevard, an Interstate-10 East frontage road. The recent lockdown situation showed that in an event requiring an evacuation of the area, it would be highly challenging to

safely evacuate hundreds of individuals from one or all of the facilities that have only Isela Rubalcava Blvd. intersection with South Desert Blvd. to use. Currently, Rubalcava Blvd. is a four-lane divided roadway that extends from the frontage road for approximately a quarter mile and narrows to an unmarked two-lane street, then dead-ends after a tenth of a mile- about a quarter mile short of the new Spur 16 intersection. Large concrete debris barriers currently prevent vehicles from driving from the end of the unfinished road to the spur. Plans have been on the table since

Choosing the righ home alarm system

Although I take a certain amount of comfort from statistics that show major declines in most types of crime throughout the US, I also know that burglaries have increased in areas surrounding my neighborhood over the last few years.I was finally

prompted to take action was when my family returned home after being away for one night and found that someone had gotten about 90 percent through the process of unscrewing our front door handle. I figured we got lucky that time but it was a wake-up call that we needed to beef up our security measures.

I did a lot of research on home alarm systems and hereís what I learned:

There are several national players in the home security industry, as well as numerous regional and local companies. Much of the equipment used by most of them comes from the same few manufacturers, including GE and Honeywell.

With larger companies like ADT (which we eventually chose), you can buy directly from them, or go through one of their authorized contractors who will sell you the equipment and install it, then turn over the ongoing monitoring to ADT. In our case, I was able to use my AAA membership discount with a local ADT-authorized agent and bargain for a lot of additional hardware, saving considerable money on the overall deal.

Certain vendors will sell you the equipment directly to install yourself. Some people install a

security system that sounds an ear-piercing alarm if their house is broken into but doesnít send a signal to a central monitoring station. Thatíll save you from paying a monthly monitoring bill ñ typically \$20 to \$50 a month or more. But be aware that police departments often charge a stiff fee for responding to false alarms.

Far more common is to sign a monitoring service contract ñ usually at least a two- or three-year commitment.

Typically, whenever your system is activated it sends a signal to a central monitoring station. The monitoring station generally will call you to verify itís not a false alarm. If they canít reach you, or whoever answers gives the wrong password, they may then contact the proper authorities (police, fire or medical services) to investigate.

Depending on how much youíre willing to spend, thereís a broad array of security equipment available, including:

- Central control unit with backup battery, keypad and siren.
- Motion detectors, which sense changes in a room caused by human presence.
- Magnetic door and window contacts, which form a circuit

that breaks when the door or window is opened, sounding the alarm.

- Detectors for smoke, fire, carbon monoxide and/or broken glass.
 - Panic buttons (hand-held or mounted in strategic locations).
 - Pressure mats placed under rugs to detect footsteps.
 - Closed-circuit TV system to allow monitoring and/or recording inside or outside your home.
 - Temperature gauges to detect if your furnace is broken and the pipes are about to freeze.
 - Water detectors to detect basement leaks.
- Most homeowners and renters insurance policies provide a discount for installing an alarm system ñ generally between 2 and 20 percent, depending on which equipment youíve installed.It pays to shop around. I asked friends for recommendations and did a lot of online research. Donít fall for high-pressure sales techniques or scare tactics. Once youíve identified a few good candidates, check for customer complaints with the Better Business Bureau or other trusted reviewers. The Federal Trade Commission (www.consumer.ftc.gov) provides tips for choosing a home security system and identifying common scams.

Military retirees can fly on the cheap

Space-A travel is one of the benefits of military service that can save you a lot of money. Eligibility requirements are tight, but if you qualify, you can literally see the world for a small amount of cash.

Space-A travel, short for Space Available Flight, is for active military and their families, as well as retirees. Seats on planes that might not be used are opened to qualified personnel.

Things to know: Potential passengers are prioritized and taken in order based on when they sign up for a flight. Travel for serious purposes rates a higher priority: attending to an ill relative ranks higher than vacations.

You can be bumped from your flight if higher priority people come in. You might need to continue your trip on commercial flights, and need to be prepared to do that. You can sign up 60 days in advance for a trip you’d like to take. Blue-card retirees (you’re getting retirement pay) are eligible

for Space-A; a “Gray-Area” retiree (you haven’t reached age 60 and gotten a blue card) are eligible but with location limits. Gray-Area retirees cannot take family members.

To check whether your preferred destination and point of departure are Space-A terminals, check www.baseops.net/spaceatravel under Locations. You’ll find a list of phone and fax numbers.

For a list of FAQs about Space-A travel, see www.spacea.net. It has information about taking a grandchild or a pet, meals, bag limits and more. If you’ve never flown Space-A, start with the Basics page, especially the Category section to determine where on the priority list you’ll be placed. Retirees, unfortunately, fall in Cat VI, which is at the bottom of the pile. However, Space-A travel can be an excellent, cheap way to travel as long as you’re flexible.

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
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
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

2006 to extend the boulevard and connect with the spur once it was constructed. The spur, which runs from the top of Talbot Road to Doniphan Drive (near Borderland) and behind these five facilities, was completed about two years ago. Initially, plans were to start the extension project in 2013; however, the project’s timeline was pushed back by the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) to fiscal year 2017.

The MPO is composed

of representatives from the various local area governmental organizations, and it coordinates this region’s road construction projects. According to a MPO report, Isela Rubalcava Boulevard extension project startup date has been moved back because the necessary approval is pending the environmental/ congestion mitigation and the air quality study assessments.

Because of the boulevard extension’s scheduled delay, Canutillo Independent School District (CISD) officials are taking a proactive approach to ensure that the road connection is not put off any longer.

“CISD has urged several

city, county, and state offices to request that the project be expedited from its current let date in FY 2017 in order to provide increased access to our schools and the surrounding facilities and to address critical safety hazards the unfinished project presents to CISD students, families and staff,” stated Rene Leon, CISD government relations coordinator.

“In addition to the increased congestion, the delay of Isela Rubalcava also poses a dangerous safety hazard to the facilities in the area. With only one point of ingress and egress, should an emergency situation occur, it would be difficult for emergency

vehicles to access these facilities and it would be problematic for people to evacuate the area,” Leon stated.

The project’s funds, which have already been secured through a Federal Highway Administration grant, are under the auspices of the Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT), but the design and construction will be managed by the MPO and the City of El Paso.

CISD officials said that when complete, the boulevard extension will alleviate this growing safety concern, will have a positive impact on school district operations, and will enhance economic development

in the community which is presently experiencing an influx of growth and development.

Still, the concern is, like one CISD employee surmised, “I hope that the powers-that-be don’t wait to fix this precarious situation until after something tragic happens.”

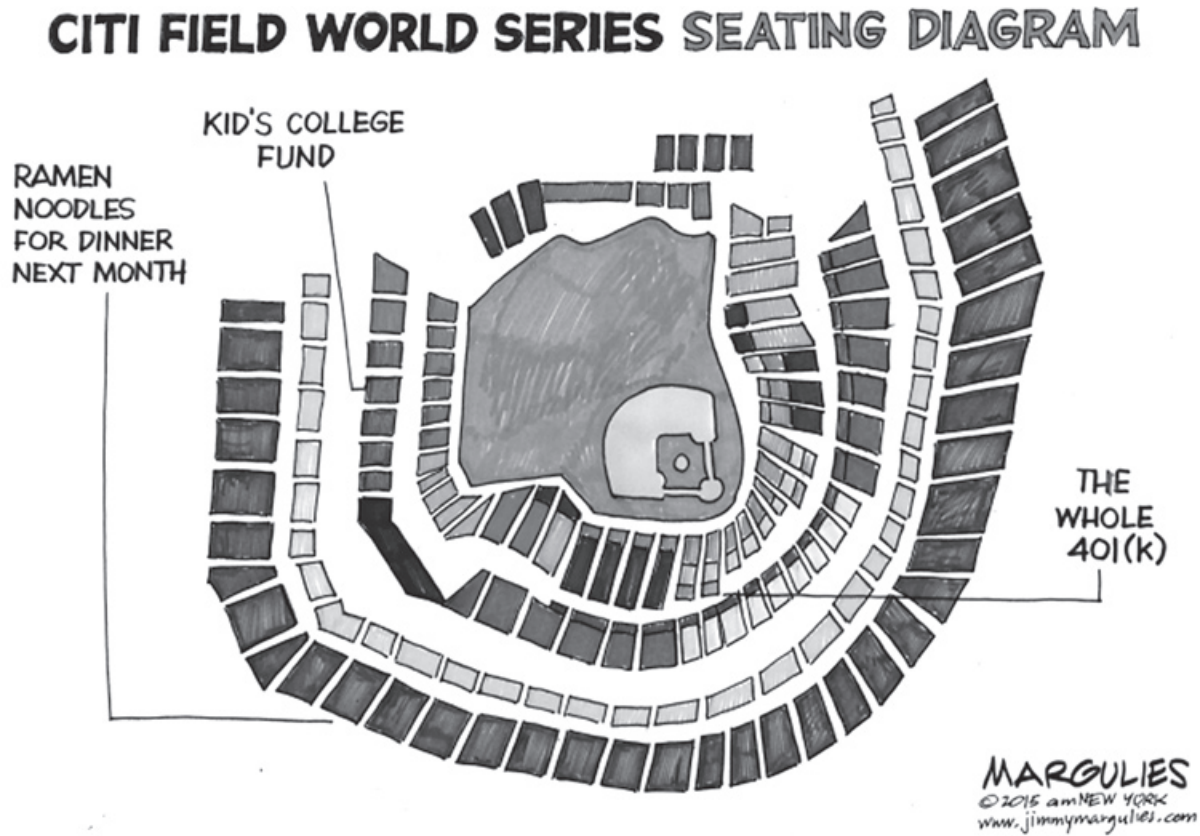
My sister is a smart person. She eventually mutters some stuff about cheerleaders. I let her off the hook.

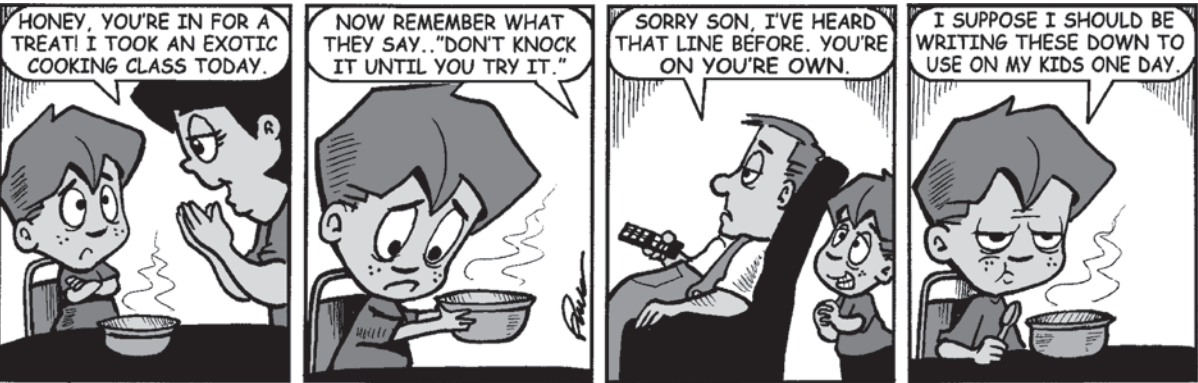

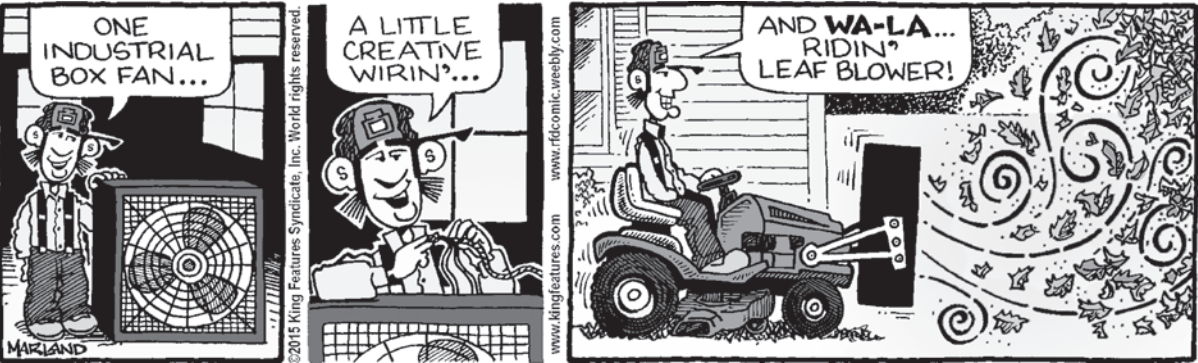

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Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: I lost my Medicare card. How can I get replacement?

A: The easiest and newest way to get a replacement Medicare card is by using your *my Social Security* account. Go to www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount for more information on how to create an account. You also can get a replacement Medicare card by calling us toll-free at 1-800-772-1213 (for the deaf or hard of hearing, call our TTY number, 1-800-325-0778). Keep your card in a safe place. You don’t want anyone getting hold of your Social Security number. They could steal your identity.

Q: I have an appointment to apply for Supplemental Security Income (SSI). What kind of information will I need to take with me?

A: To help make the application process go quickly and smoothly, you should

bring

- Your Social Security card or Social Security Number;
- Your birth certificate or other proof of your age;
- The name, Social Security number and date of birth or age of your current spouse and any former spouse. You should also know the dates and places of marriage and dates of divorce or death (if appropriate);
- Information about the home where you live, such as your mortgage or your lease and landlord’s name;
- Payroll slips, bank books, insurance policies, burial fund records, and other information about your income and the things you own;
- Proof of U.S. citizenship or eligible noncitizen status; and
- If you are applying for SSI because you are disabled or blind, we will need to know detailed information about your medical illnesses, injuries or conditions:

– Names, addresses, phone

numbers, patient ID numbers and dates of treatment for all doctors, hospitals and clinics; – Names of medicines you are taking and who prescribed them; and – Names and dates of medical tests you have had and who sent you for them.

Q: Is there a time limit on how long I can receive Social Security disability benefits?

A: Your disability benefits will continue as long as your medical condition has not improved and you cannot work. Social Security will periodically review your case to determine whether you continue to be eligible. If you are still receiving disability benefits when you reach your full retirement age http://ssa-custhelp.ssa.gov/cgi-bin/ssa.cfg/php/enduser/std_adp.php?p_faqid=160, your disability benefits will automatically be converted to retirement benefits. 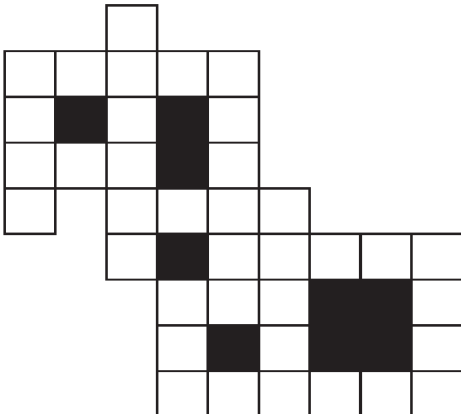
