Tigua statue defaced, vandals sought

EL PASO COUNTY – A bronze statue of a Tigua woman named Nestora Granillo Piarote was vandalized between 12:30 and 7:30 a.m., on Columbus Day, Monday, October 9. The statue measures 12 feet tall, weighs 1.5 tons and sits on a 7-foot elevated base. Red paint was poured onto the statue and a red wooden cross was placed in front of it. The FBI said the cross had white letters on it that apparently spelled “Columbus Day”.

The statue stands in front of the Tigua Indian Cultural Center (305 Yaya Lane and Socorro Road) in El Paso County's lower valley. Two weeks into the investigation the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI), El Paso Police Department, and Tigua Tribal Police Office continue to follow leads in their joint efforts to apprehend the individual or individuals responsible for the damage caused to the statue.

To encourage the public's assistance in solving this case a \$10,000 reward – made up of \$6,000 from the FBI, \$2,000 from the Tigua tribe, and \$2,000 from the Sociedad Cultural de Espana cultural group – has been posted. The reward is for information leading to the arrest of the person(s) that poured the paint on the Nestora Granillo Piarote Memorial Statue. FBI and Tigua tribal officials announced the reward during a recent news conference.

The statue was unveiled during a dedication ceremony at the cultural center

This prestigious national award carries with it a \$10,000 individual award

as well as \$10,000 awarded to the winner's district. Dr. Espinoza plans to donate his \$10,000 to students in the district in the form of college scholarships.

“I am humbled and extremely honored to win the Escalante-Gradillas Best in Education award,” Dr. Espinoza said.

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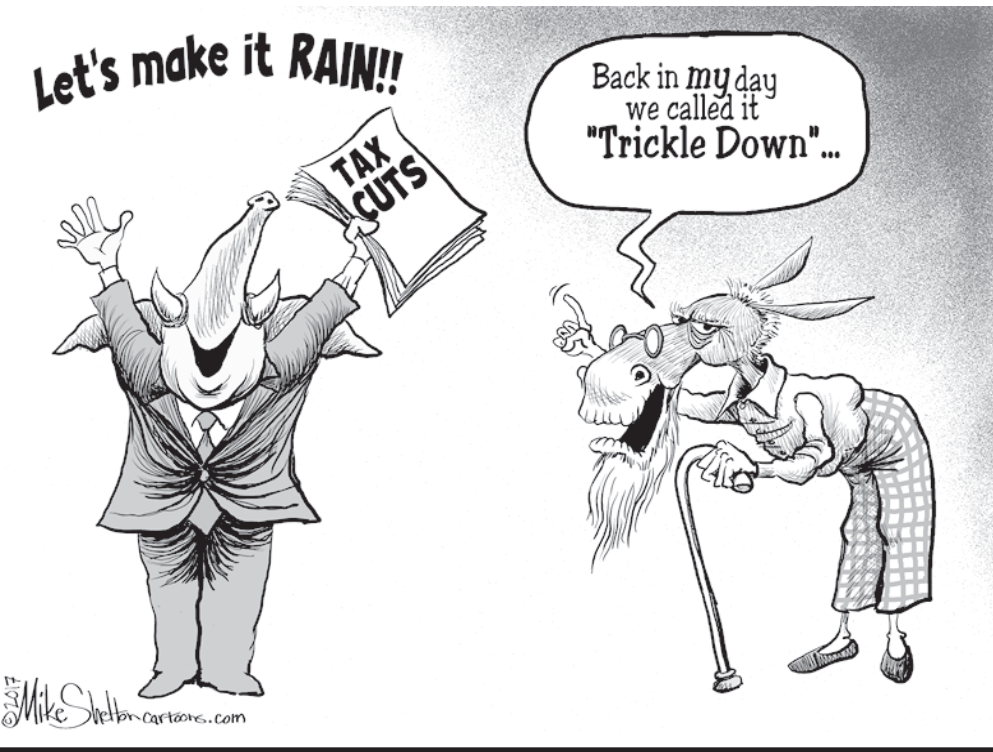
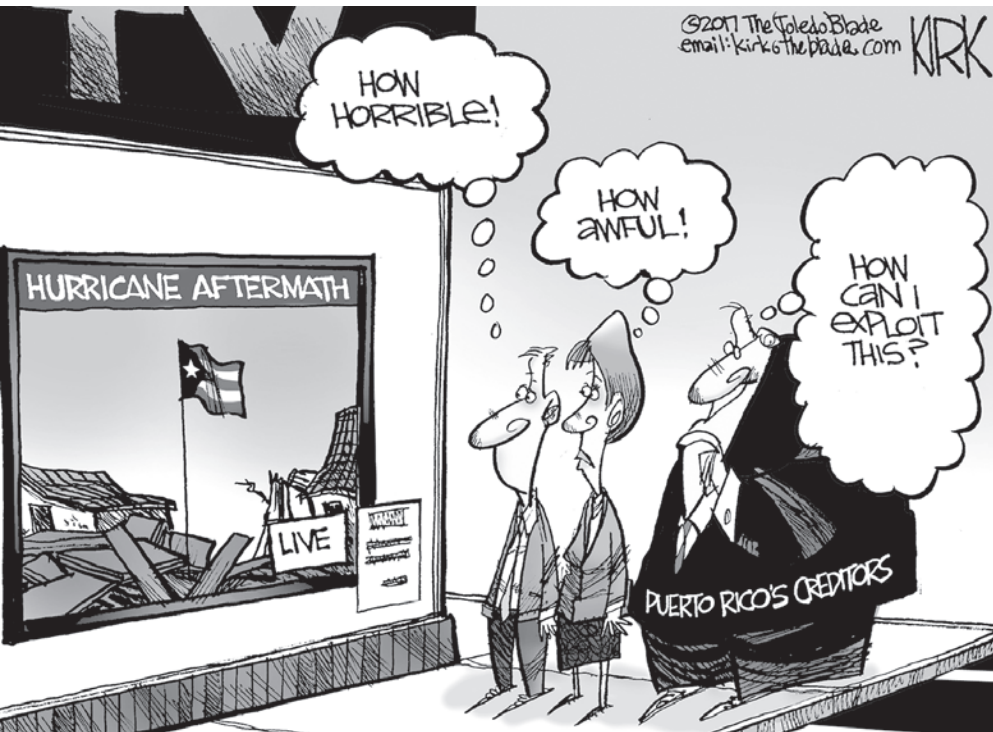

Fabens students visit Hueco Tanks

FABENS – Three academic clubs from Fabens High School joined together for a Hueco Tanks field trip on Saturday, September 30. A total of 23 students from the Eukaryotes Science Club, National Art Honor Society and National History Club hiked approximately 8 miles with volunteer guides who tailored the tour to suit the group’s varying interests.

National History Club sponsor Carol Basil organized the trip to emphasize that not all learning has to occur indoors. “So much of a student’s day is spent inside. They really don’t get outdoors often enough,” she said. “I wanted my students

to see that studying history doesn’t have to be done at a desk all the time.”

Students learned about the petroglyphs, pictographs and the ancient tribes that produced them. From a scientific perspective, the students learned of the medicinal properties of the region’s plants and magma rock formations. The art students in the group were taught to create a paint brush from plant leaves.

Mrs. Basil believes the lessons from hiking are invaluable. “Students get a lot more knowledge that they wouldn’t have gotten from just a lecture from me,” she said.

The three clubs are planning their next joint field trip to the El Paso Museum of Art and the El Paso Holocaust Museum sometime in the spring.

Moments in Time The History Channel

- On Nov. 6, 1977, the Toccoa Falls Dam in Georgia bursts, and the resulting flash flood kills 39 people. The day before, a volunteer fireman had inspected the 100-year-old Earthen dam above the falls and found everything in order.
- On Nov. 7, 1944, Franklin Roosevelt is re-elected president of the United States for a record third time, defeating Thomas Dewey, the governor of New York, and becoming the only president in history to win a fourth term in office.
- On Nov. 8, 1895, in his lab in Germany, physicist Wilhelm Conrad Rontgen becomes the first person to observe X-rays while testing whether cathode rays could pass through glass. Rontgen received numerous accolades for his work, including the first Nobel Prize in physics in 1901.
- On Nov. 9, 1938, German Nazis launch a campaign of terror against Jews in Germany and Austria. The violence was dubbed “Kristallnacht,” or “Night of Broken Glass,” for the countless smashed windows of 7,500 Jewish-owned establishments. Some 100 Jews died, and hundreds of synagogues and homes were damaged.
- On Nov. 10, 1964, Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara says that the United States has no plans to send combat troops into Vietnam. By 1969, more than 500,000 American troops were in South Vietnam.
- On Nov. 11, 2000, a cable car taking skiers to a glacier in Austria catches fire as it passes through a mountain tunnel; 156 people die. Only 11 people survived the fire, which was caused by an illegal space heater in the driver’s cabin.
- On Nov. 12, 1980, the U.S. planetary probe Voyager 1 edges within 77,000 miles of Saturn, sending back 30,000 images that show hundreds of rings encircling the planet. Voyager 1, now in interstellar space, contains a disk featuring natural and manmade sounds of Earth.

this June. It replaced an earlier sculpture of an Eagle dancer that once stood at that site. Tribal officials said that the bronze statue was created in honor of all tribal women. Piarote was a well-known potter who was born and raised in the Ysleta Del Sur Pueblo community from 1849 to 1918, spoke the native Tiwa language, and has more than 800 tribal descendants today.

“This is not an act against one faction of our community;

it's an act against our entire community," Emmerson Buie Jr., special agent in charge of the El Paso FBI office, stated during the news conference.

The vandalism “tears at our heart”, Tigua Lieutenant Governor Chris Gomez said at the news conference. “It was an attack against our entire pueblo – not just the members of our pueblo, but the people who support our pueblo,” Gomez stated. The vandalism has brought tribal members closer together and there has been an outpouring of support from the El Paso community,

he related.

“Piarote was a strong female leader for our pueblo during a time we were losing our land, during a time when there was a lot of encroachment, and we needed that kind of leadership,” Gomez cited. “She was a matriarchal figure, and we built this monument in honor of not only her but all the women of our pueblo in honor of all the contributions that they have made,” he stated.

The red paint on the statue has been cleaned, but the statue was damaged and it will have to be repaired, Gomez added.

According to Buie, the FBI has jurisdiction to investigate hate crimes and crimes on tribal land.

“Hate crimes are not only an attack on the victim, they are meant to threaten and intimidate an entire community,” he said.

Anyone that might have seen or heard anything suspicious in connection with the vandalism is urged to call the FBI El Paso office at 832-5000, or leave a tip online at tips.fbi.gov. The FBI also is asking residents or business owners in the area that have security camera video during the time of the vandalism to contact their office.

The one constant is change

I don’t like Major League Baseball’s wild-card game. There, I said it, and it falls trippingly off my tongue.

Baseball has the longest season of all sports in America. For five months – six, if you count spring training – fans watch a story unfold. It’s the beauty of the game, this longevity. Storylines play out over this half-year season, a season actually made up of three seasons. We watch the rookies make the team in April, and witness the magical month of May, where every team is on equal ground and at its healthiest.

We watch them soldier on through the heat of summer, sweat out the pennant races in September, and we tune in to watch the heroics of October.

After all of that time and concession sales, the three division winners secure a playoff spot and the remaining teams get to fight over the scraps, a wild-card game between the next best two teams. They play a one-game playoff and the winner goes against the top seed. And that’s when my record needle scratches.

One game? You just played

162 games in the regular season, and the losing wild card gets to play 163? It makes no sense. I’m not buying into the theory that those teams are just lucky to be there, nor do I like the false equivocation of treating it like it’s the seventh game of a series – because it’s not. Teams play on a baseball diamond, not a baseball cubic zirconia.

One-game playoffs are like kissing your sister. It showcases nothing. During the regular, ordinary time of the season, teams play three game sets. This is not only done for logistical purposes, it is done in order to let the fans see the depth of the respective teams rosters, and that’s why this one-game format fails.

Here’s a simple, temporary fix: Have the teams play best out of three, the higher seed getting home-field advantage for all three games. This eliminates the need for a travel day. Scheduling would be a cinch, too. Just lop three games off of spring training. Broadcast game one on a Saturday night, game two in a day game on Sunday. If both teams win a game, it’s a double header... turn on the lights and break the tie.

Right now, baseball has three divisions of five teams each. Baseball is due for expansion. TV ratings are bad, but the league is flush with cash and in the coming years, as football hemorrhages players due to safety concerns, you’ll see a lot

of talent opting to play baseball. The talent pool will be there. (For the record, I propose a team in Portland, Oregon, and a team in Nashville or Charlotte.) Create another division so you have four divisions of four teams. This once again establishes the thrill of a pennant race, since only division winners get to meet in a five-game series.

Of course, Bob Costas wouldn’t approve of this idea, but he’s not the boss of me. Even in a pastime, the one constant going forward should be change.

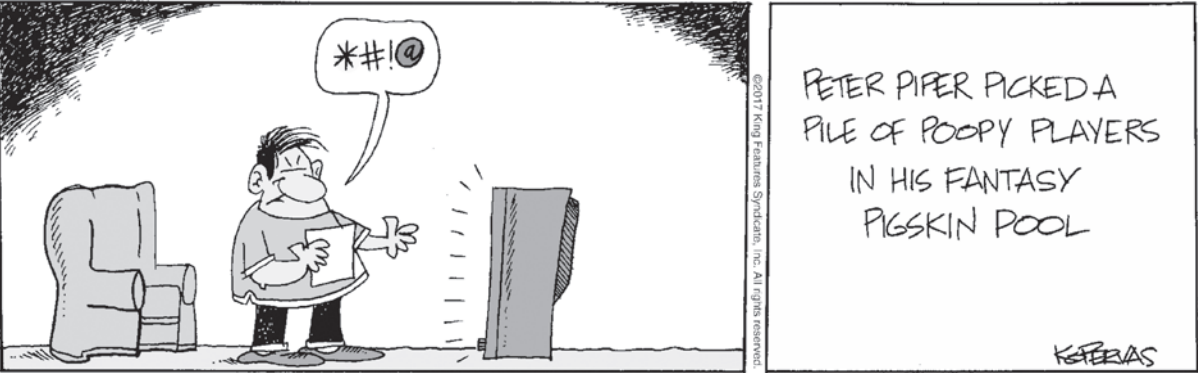

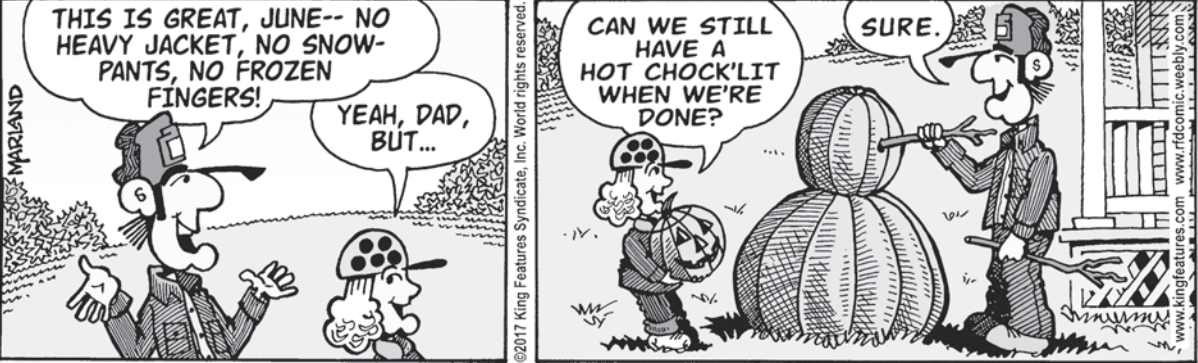

Your good health

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have heard that an apple a day keeps the dentist away and that an apple is nature's toothbrush. Can we really skip brushing our teeth if we eat an apple instead? – R.T.

I've read many opinions about this subject, and I tend to agree with the ones that show that apples are high in both sugar (some newer varieties much more so than old ones) and acid, which can damage teeth. Apples do have some ability to remove some particles from the teeth, but they will not clean all surfaces of the teeth. So, I would not skip brushing after an apple, even though apples are much better for your teeth than sticky sweets.

DEAR DR. ROACH: What is an exophytic cyst? I have one on my right kidney, and it has been watched closely for the past eight years. The most recent ultrasound shows that it is 2.1 cm and hasn't changed in that time. I am 78 and in good health, except for asbestos exposure. Should I get this thing removed, or let it be? I get conflicting advice. – B.W.

The word “exophytic” means “growing outward,” and a cyst is a fluid-filled cavity. So an exophytic cyst bulges out of the kidney and is filled with fluid. The big concern with these is whether they can be cancerous. A simple cyst, with thin walls and fluid without any solid structures, has a very low likelihood of being cancer and does not need further evaluation. If the sonogram can't show that for certain, then a CT scan is usually done.

Kidney cysts are graded according to the Bosniak category, based on their appearance by CT scan. The more complex the cyst, the higher the likelihood of

cancer. Older age, being a male and asbestos exposure are risk factors for cancer of the kidney. Despite those risk factors, if this were a simple cyst (Bosniak I or II) and unchanged in eight years, it is very unlikely to be cancer, and I would recommend letting it be. However, if it were a Bosniak category III or higher, I would discuss biopsy with the urologist.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I'm having a sensation on the balls of my feet, as though I am walking with pads. I have diabetes, but my sugar level is moderate. I have seen three doctors without results. Do you have any thoughts? – B.G.

Anytime I hear symptoms that could be numbness, pain, tingling or burning sensation in someone with diabetes, I think it is diabetic neuropathy until proven differently. It is not usually hard to diagnose with a filament (to test light touch sensation) and a tuning fork (to test vibration), but occasionally an electrodiagnostic test (i.e., EMG) is necessary. If your regular or diabetes doctor hasn't helped, I suggest a neurologist.

Blood sugar levels that are persistently high are more likely to result in diabetic neuropathy, but longstanding diabetes, even when it's moderately well-controlled, can lead to neuropathy.

VA targets shifty mortgage lenders

Scams targeting veterans who are refinancing VA-guaranteed mortgages have gone on for far too many years. Now the Department of Veterans Affairs is trying to do something about it. It's just hooked up with Ginnie Mae to take a close look at all the complaints. As a veteran refinancing a VA home loan, you have certain benefits, and lenders who offer those loans are supposed to follow the rules.

Complaints received by the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau fall into two main categories:

Aggressive Lenders: Since lenders are protected by the VA guarantee, they can be aggressive in going after veterans to refinance. They want your business, whether you're interested or not. One way to get their (unwanted) attention is to actually do a refinance. Veterans have reported continued harassing calls and requests to do yet another refinance.

Deceptive Lenders: Lenders lie about the interest rate, and it's only later that the true

interest rate becomes apparent. Lenders stall and drag their feet when a rate is locked in, causing the rate to rise. Then the veteran either has to accept the higher rate or bring more money to the closing. Lenders also lie about whether a veteran is actually qualified, waiting until far into the process before revealing the truth. Lenders also play fast and loose with escrow monies, causing the veteran more grief and expense.

The task force will be looking at these tactics, especially "loan churning," which is repeated refinancing to get more fees out of the veteran.

If you're about to refinance, go online to the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (www.consumerfinance.gov) and learn about your rights.

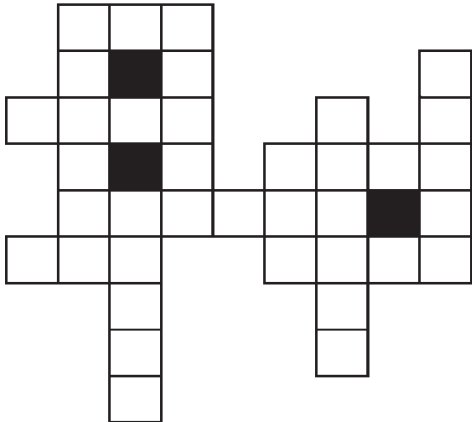
