Good Samaritan bill

Rep. Mark Meadows (R-NC) has chosen to co-sponsor H.R. Bill 5856 – the Good Samaritan bill – to provide free healthcare services to low-income families. The legislation would dramatically reduce government spending for Medicaid and the Children’s Health Insurance Program (CHIP) at no cost to taxpayers. Congressman Daniel Webster (R-FL) introduced the bill in the House on May 21st. It allows doctors and other healthcare professionals to provide pro-bono healthcare services to low-income individuals, including children in the CHIP program, in exchange for a simple tax deduction. Participating physicians and medical personnel would receive a tax deduction for the value of the service performed without the need for overly burdensome paperwork and administrative overhead. “It is estimated that the government would save as much as \$54.4 billion a year, and maybe more, in Medicaid payments annually. And it would reduce costly emergency room visits, the ‘go-to’ alternative for people who can’t afford to pay medical fees. That’s more than the amount requested in the FY2018 budget by NASA and the Departments of Energy, State, Homeland Security, and Housing and Urban Development. And pro bono care could easily be expanded to include medical specialists and retired physicians,” according to Dan Weber, president of the Association of Mature American Citizens.

Summer job cities

With summer approaching and many young adults expected to look for short-term work in order to bridge their finances or grow their professional skills, the personal-finance website WalletHub took an in-depth look at 2018’s Best Places for Summer Jobs. To help job seekers find the best summer employment opportunities, WalletHub’s analysts compared more than 180 markets in the U.S. across 21 key metrics. The data set ranges from availability of summer jobs to median income of part-time workers to median rental price. El Paso ranked 181st in the analysis. The top three cities, in order, were Scottsdale, AZ; Orlando, FL; and Columbia, MD. Other stats:

EL PASO COUNTY – The future of a large swath of land in El Paso County’s upper valley, along the foothills of the Franklin Mountains, on both sides of Transmountain Road is in jeopardy, according to members of the Franklin Mountains Wilderness Coalition (FMWC).

The coalition’s concerns arise from the El Paso City Council’s intent to purchase the land from the El Paso Public Service Board (EPPSB) and to set up Tax Increment Reinvestment Zones (TIRZ). These zones would establish an ordinance through 2054 to help facilitate the sale of the publicly-owned land along the northwest mountain slopes to developers.

EPPSB, which runs El Paso Water, is the biggest property owner in the county despite many sales to the city and developers of land the utility bought in the early 1950s. The utility purchased the land as an investment and to protect the region’s ground-water reserves.

The recently announced plans for the creation of the proposed 1,000-area TIRZ No. 12 and an adjacent TIRZ No. 10a on 4,000 acres reignited a decades-old fight among local area residents wanting to see the western slopes of the Franklin Mountains preserved and city leaders along with developers who see opportunities.

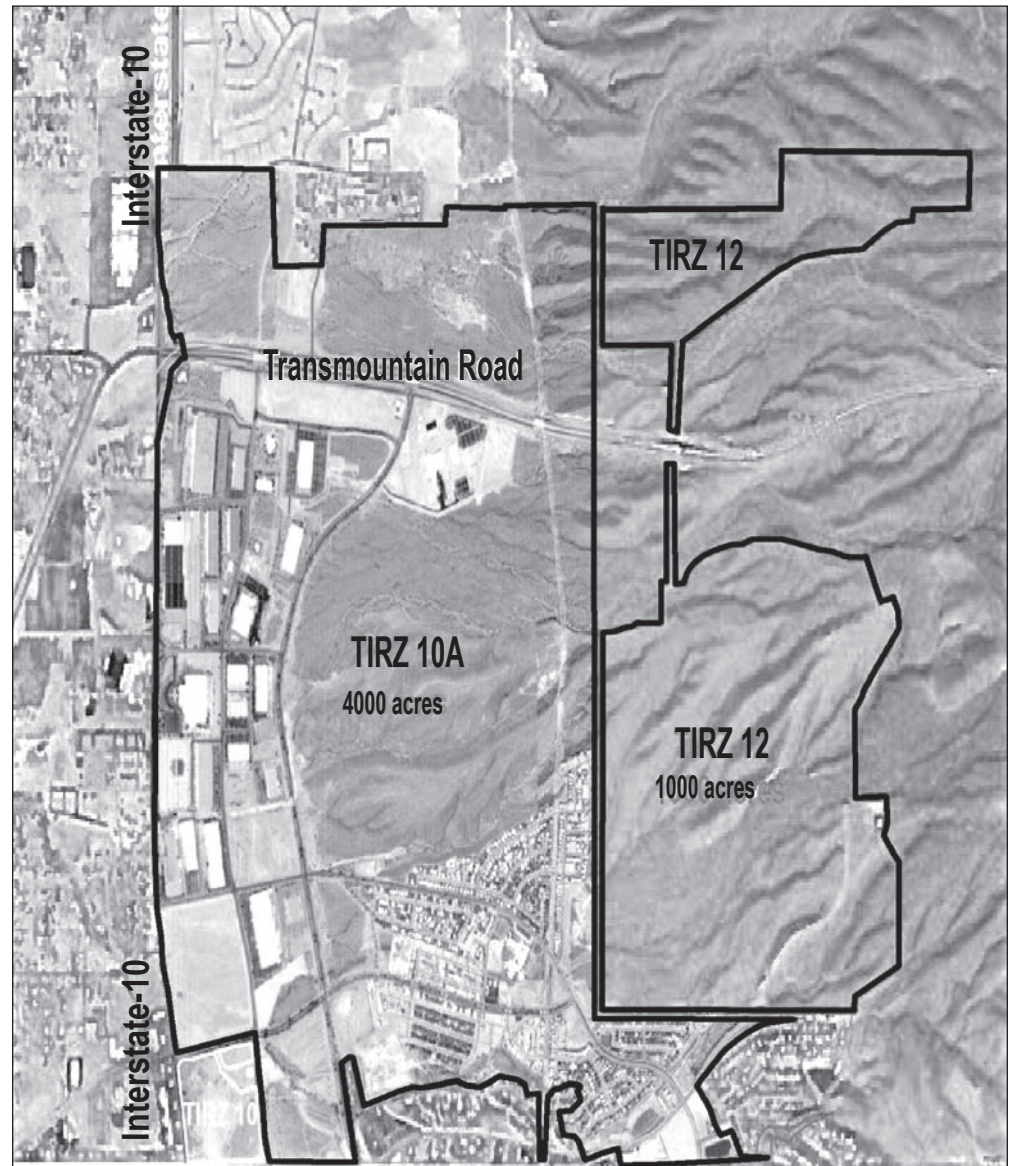
TIRZ districts are traditionally established in blighted or difficult to develop areas. Upon the creation of a TIRZ, the taxable value of the land and improvements is capped. Then, tax revenues from the capped value go to the city and other taxing entities, but if the property values rise, the taxes on the increased value are spent on improving the district, according to city officials.

“The ordinance would allow the development of this pristine desert open space by paying for it using TIRZ funds, which are allocated from property tax revenue,” stated Judy Ackerman, secretary for FMWC. “This significantly subsidizes the developers’ costs, while doing nothing to alleviate the city’s already overburdened

Police stations offer safety for online transactions

EL PASO COUNTY – What a common sense idea. In an effort to curb robberies linked to online classified ads sales, El Paso Police Department officials announced recently that police stations can be used as meeting sites for these types of online classified ad

tax base,” she claimed.

“The city will be taking publicly-owned land, purchased in the 1950’s to protect our resources and allow it to be built on. While this may generate funds for the city in the short run, it will not create a sustainable tax income without further development in the future to make up for tax shortfalls from the old development,” Ackerman asserted.

FMWC supporters insist that there are better ways the land can, as open space, benefit residents without creating a tax burden for future generations. “The city frequently points to open spaces and accessibility to outdoor activities as an economic driver, as on the Visit El Paso’s

negotiations.

According to a recent news release, police officials stated that individuals may meet in the lobby of city police stations for transactions when buying or selling items using Internet websites, such as Craigslist, OfferUp, and other classified ad sales.

Nature Tourism website,” Ackerman noted, “pushing through legislation that reduces the amount of open space contradicts that claim.” She added that city officials have also, for a long time, stated that their plans were to concentrate development in the downtown area and along mass transit corridors.

A city official with the economic and international development department commented in a recent public statement that the TIRZ proposal is being considered because the property in question will be especially expensive to develop. “What we’re doing is creating a partnership with the developer, whomever that may be, to help offset some of the costs so this land can be built on,” she said.

City council representatives were slated to discuss the TIRZ proposal this week. Meanwhile, FMWC officials are continuing their push to garner enough support to stop the designation. They are encouraging interested individuals to show up at city council meetings or send e-mails to council members to voice their opposition and for inclusion in the record as public comment.

High blood pressure remains a silent killer, especially among African Americans

If you haven’t seen your doctor lately, you’re probably unaware that you could have high blood pressure, which means your

life is at risk. According to the American Heart Association (AHA), about half of American adults have high blood pressure, and most are unaware that they have it. High blood pressure – also called hypertension – is known as

the “silent killer” because it can emerge with no warning signs and cause stroke, heart disease, heart attacks and kidney failure. There is also a financial cost. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says high blood pressure costs the nation \$46

billion each year that includes health care services, medications, and missed days of work.

High blood pressure is especially dangerous for African Americans. According to the AHA, high blood pressure begins earlier in life and is usually more severe in African Americans, with 59 percent of men and 56 percent of women affected. Common theories as to why this is the case are genetic factors and higher rates of obesity and diabetes.

Since high blood pressure can develop slowly over time, it’s important to have it measured regularly. Talk with your doctor to understand your risk factors and discuss whether your blood pressure is in a healthy range.

Although there is no cure for high blood pressure, here are tips to best manage the condition.

- Maintain a healthy weight. Keep an eye on your Body Mass Index, which uses your height and weight to estimate your body fat. Ask your doctor what a healthy BMI is for you.

- Eat healthy foods such as vegetables, fruit, lean meat, low-fat dairy, fish and whole grains. Avoid salt and limit foods high

in sodium that elevate blood pressure, while adding potassium to your diet.

- Get your heart pumping and MOVE. Combine aerobic exercise – for a recommended 90 to 150 minutes every week – with resistance exercises.

- Limit alcohol. If you choose to drink, do so only in moderation. That means no more than one drink a day for women and no more than two for men.

- Manage stress. Find tension-relievers that work for you. Maybe that’s reading a book, listening to music or doing deep breathing. Exercise like a brisk walk is a proven stress buster too. And since it’s also a plus for healthy blood pressure, consider it doubly good.

If lifestyle changes don’t work, your doctor may prescribe medicine to help get your blood pressure numbers under control. If you haven’t seen your doctor lately, schedule an appointment today. It may just save your life.

police department staff will not become involved in the civil transaction unless a crime occurs.

Local police officials stated that last year there were 54 robberies, thefts, and other crimes reported that were linked to e-commerce interactions. There were 22 cases

in the Pebble Hills police region, 13 in the Central area, nine in the Mission Valley, six in the Northeast, and four on the West Side, according to their report.

When conducting online sales transactions, police officials advise that individuals take certain precautions including: meeting in public locations; letting another person know the time, place, name and telephone number of the person you are meeting; avoiding meeting in secluded areas or at night; never going alone; not getting into a vehicle or allowing a person to get into your vehicle for a transaction; not carrying cash and informing sellers that cash will not be immediately on hand; not concerning yourself if safety precautions offend someone; being skeptical if arrangements are changed at the last minute; and not hesitating to cancel a transaction if something doesn’t feel right or you have a bad feeling.

El Paso Police Headquarters and the five regional command centers are open twenty-four hours, seven days a week, are well lit and have security cameras.

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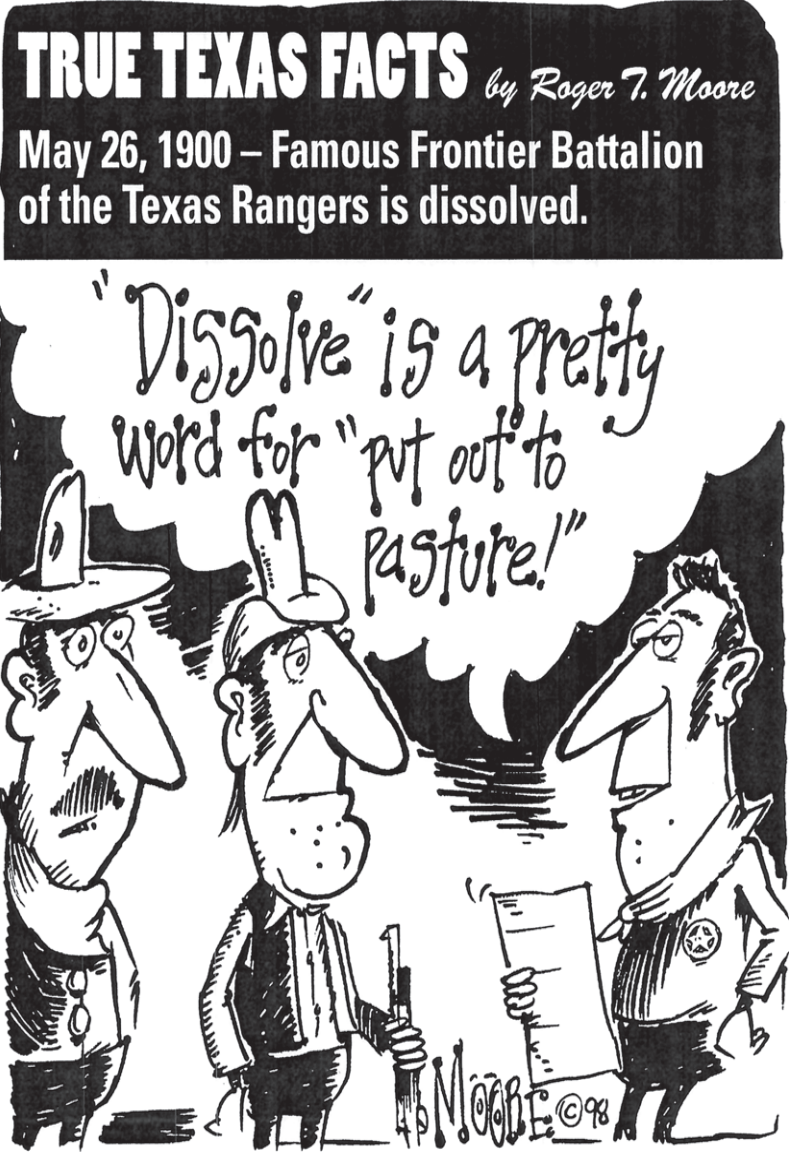


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The Chinese threat isn't just trade

We are currently engaged in a high-profile negotiation that may or may not succeed in getting the Chinese to buy more of our stuff. This is a fine goal as far as it goes, although that isn't very far. It doesn't matter if China buys \$14 billion of our soybeans or \$25 billion of our soybeans – it is still a mercantilist, revisionist power representing a significant geopolitical challenge.

China isn't just a commercial but a strategic competitor with the United States. It seeks to restore its former national glory, establish hegemony in East Asia and unravel Pax Americana. President Xi Jinping champions a national revival ("The Chinese Dream") that flies in the face of the expectations that economic growth would soften China.

China uses its economic clout to back self-interested investments around the world and has poured resources into a decades-long military buildup. As it has grown in strength, it has become increasingly assertive in making maritime claims in the region. It harasses its neighbors it wants to cow into submission, as we are shouldered aside.

We have long failed to grapple with the Chinese threat because we have believed that rising per capita income would do our work for us by inevitably democratizing China; because corporate America covets the Chinese market; and because, as Miles Maochun Yu of the Naval Academy points out, we are always "playing the China card" in pursuit of some other strategic objective – currently, the denuclearization of North Korea – rather than focusing on China in its own right.

At the moment, we are in the midst of a collective national freakout about Russia, a second-rate power. China's economy is eight times bigger than Russia's. While Russia is associated with the weapons of the 20th century, China is heavily investing in high-tech weapons – cyberwarfare capabilities, hypersonic rockets, anti-satellite missiles and the like. "The United States cannot assume," the U.S.-China Economic and Security Review Commission warned, "it will have an enduring advantage in developing next frontier military technology."

The comprehensive challenge of

China deserves a comprehensive response. Diplomatically, we need to strengthen relations with all those countries on China's periphery that feel threatened by it, Taiwan and Japan in particular.

Militarily, we need to spend more on research and development and on building up our Navy. And we need to make it clear to China, through robust patrolling, that we are committed to maintaining freedom of navigation in the region.

Economically, we need a better long-term approach to China's mercantilism than blustery threats of tariffs. This will require allies, which means that we should return to the Trans-Pacific Partnership. The pact was designed to lock China out of creating trade norms in the region, but Trump abandoned it in a perversely self-defeating protectionist gesture.



The Chinese flatter themselves that they have a long view that unstable American democracy lacks. When dealing with Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin, apparently desperate for any agreement he can wave around as a victory in the much-advertised looming trade war, they must feel confirmed in their belief. We need a strategy to convince them otherwise, and it will be the work of decades.

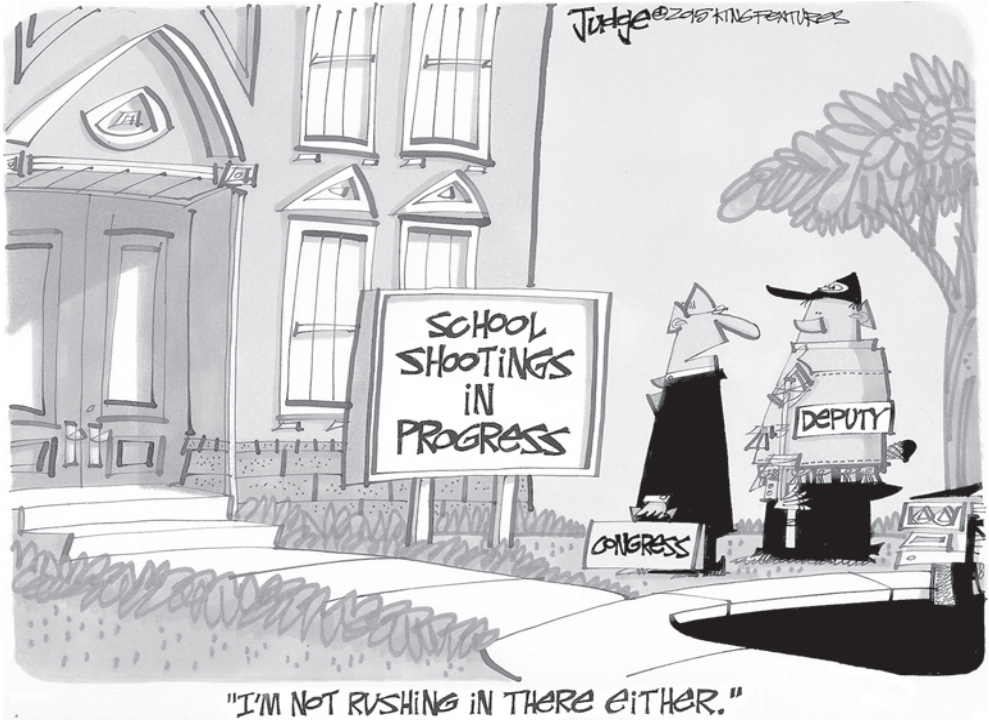

THE HISTORY CHANNEL

- On June 11, 1979, actor John Wayne, born Marion Morrison in Iowa, dies at age 72. In his early acting jobs Wayne was credited as Duke Morrison, a childhood nickname derived from the name of his beloved pet dog.
- On June 12, 1940, Edsel Ford agrees to manufacture 9,000 Rolls-Royce-designed engines to be used in British and U.S. airplanes in World War II. A biography about Edsel's father, Henry, later revealed that Henry had already accepted a contract to work with the German government. He eventually reversed his position.

- On June 13, 1895, Emile Levassor drives a Panhard et Levassor car with a two-cylinder, 750-rpm, four-horsepower engine to victory in the world's first real automobile race. He completed the 732-mile course in just under 49 hours, at a then-impressive speed of about 15 mph.

El Paso County Water Control and Improvement District No. 4, P.O. Box 3880, Fabens, Texas 79838, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) to renew Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. WQ0010166001 (EPA I.D. No. TX0065013) to authorize the discharge of treated wastewater at a volume not to exceed an annual average flow of 1,200,000 gallons per day. The domestic wastewater treatment facility is located at 17270 Alameda Avenue, Fabens, in El Paso County,

Texas 79838. The discharge route is from the plant site to Fabens Waste Canal; thence to Rio Grande Below Riverside Diversion Dam. TCEQ received this application on March 7, 2018. The permit application is available for viewing and copying at El Paso County Water Control & Improvement District 4, 117 East Main Street, Fabens, Texas. ADDITIONAL NOTICE. TCEQ's Executive Director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. After technical review of the application is complete, the Executive Director may prepare a draft permit and will issue a preliminary decision on the application. **Notice of the Application and Preliminary**

Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the county-wide mailing list and to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the deadline for submitting public comments.

PUBLIC COMMENT / MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting on this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless

the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments, and the Executive Director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision and for requesting a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common

to the general public; a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period and, the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for

their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material water quality concerns submitted during the comment period.

TCEQ may act on an application to renew a permit for discharge of wastewater without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

MAILING LIST. If you submit public comments, a request for a contested case hearing or a reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision, you will be added to the mailing list for this specific application to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. In addition, you may request to be placed on:

job openings per 1,000 people aged 16 to 24 in the labor force at 132.58, which is 21 times higher than in North Las Vegas, NV, the city with the fewest at 6.32.

- Scottsdale, AZ has the highest median income for part-time workers (adjusted for cost of living) at \$24,636, which is than 3.5 times higher than in New York, NY, the city with the lowest at \$6,993.
- Portland, ME, has the highest

labor-force participation rate of people aged 16 to 24 at 75.81 percent, which is 1.9 times higher than in Irvine, CA, the city with the lowest at 39.33 percent.

Clint ISD intends to destroy Special Education records of those students that ceased receiving services during the school year 2012-2013.

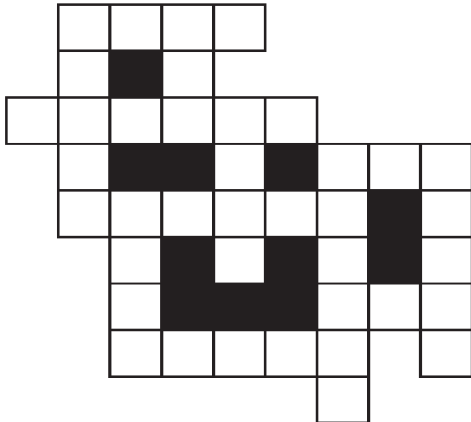
