Socorro veterans propose memorial

SOCORRO – Several El Paso County veterans, who live in and around the City of Socorro, are on a mission, and they have come together to accomplish their objective.

For the past two years, these Socorro vets, along with many volunteers, have been promoting the idea that a suitable memorial monument would be a fitting tribute to honor the sacrifices made by hundreds of individuals who served in the United States armed forces and call the lower valley community their hometown.

Spearheading the push for a memorial monument are Socorro residents and U.S. military veterans Jesse Montelongo, Chuy Hernandez, Carlos Sepulveda, and Gregorio Gonzales.

“The purpose of the monument would be to educate our younger generation about all the wars and the individual sacrifices made for our country’s freedom,” stated Montelongo, an U.S. Army veteran. “As vets, this is a way to give back to our community; especially, for the kids to see their family members’ names and pictures who served in the military and to read about the history of these wars,” he said.

To help garner support, the group of veterans established a state-recognized, non-profit effort and named it the Socorro Veterans Organization (SVO). As a legally registered entity, SVO members were able to lease from Socorro Independent School District (SISD) about three acres of land, on the corner of Buford and Socorro roads, as

the proposed site for the monument.

Since its inception, SVO members have held fund raising events to pay for the architectural design and construction of the project. Recently, SVO was able to raise \$5,000 in a bike run that the group helped sponsor in conjunction with Socorro independent motorcyclists and

the local American Legion chapter. “All donations go towards the completion of the memorial,” Montelongo stated.

Now, plans are to host a golf tournament, which has been scheduled for Saturday, September 15, at the Fort Bliss golf

SISD receives \$1.4 million TEA grant

EL PASO COUNTY – The Socorro Independent School District has been awarded a \$1.4 million 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant from the Texas Education Agency. The grant will allow the district to enhance its afterschool and summer academic enrichment programs providing students an additional safe learning opportunity while school is not in session.

The federally funded program, also called Texas Afterschool Centers on Education or Texas ACE, will provide students in grades K-12 additional opportunities to access programs and activities that reinforce the regular academic program. It will help students meet state and local standards in core academic subjects, such

SAN ELIZARIO – The San Elizario Independent School District (SEISD) Board of Trustees has a new Board Member, Ramon Rojas.

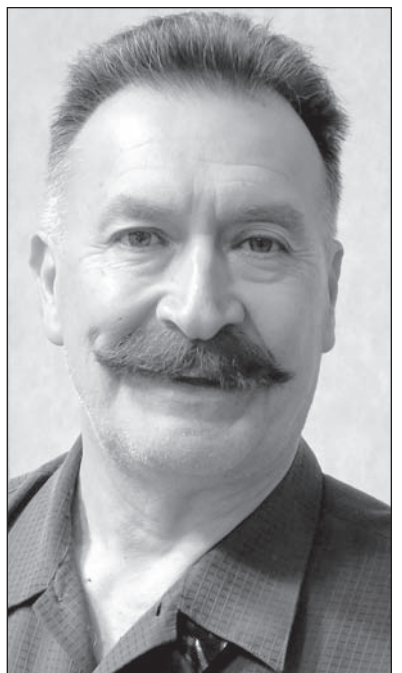
Rojas is an El Paso, Texas native who has been living in San Elizario, TX for the past five years. He is married to Delia Guerra-Rojas and together they have three children.

Yes, the Supreme Court is undemocratic

In an era of partisan polarization, it is rare to get agreement on anything, but about this there should be a consensus: The Supreme Court is an undemocratic institution whose power should be carefully circumscribed.

The right has long been of this view, and the left is suddenly and opportunistically partway there.

In an essay capturing progressives' newfound skepticism, Ezra Klein of Vox wrote that the Supreme Court "has always been undemocratic" and is now becoming even "more dangerous." This represents a welcome turnabout from cheering the high court's de facto legislating, although the left is about a half-century late to the insight that the court isn't a democratically elected legislature.

In the 1960s, the court became markedly more assertive, delivering a raft of activist decisions, especially on matters of criminal justice and sexual morality.

Progressives cheered all the while. They happily pocketed all the court-mandated policy changes to their liking, relieved of the burden of enacting them through democratic means.

Needless to say, the court was never meant to be an unelected lawmaking body, and it has taken on such a highly charged role in our politics, in part, because it arrogated this power to itself.

The court's legitimacy comes from faithfully interpreting laws passed by the legislature and adhering to the Constitution that is the foundational governing document of the country, adopted and amended by "We the People." Anything else is usurpation.

Progressives are, perversely, taking a hostile view of the court precisely when it may get a reliable majority of justices devoted to this vision.

Klein alleges that the court is becoming affirmatively "anti-democratic," meaning it isn't striking down democratically adopted voter rules and gerrymandered districts. Klein may oppose the Ohio law that purges nonvoters from the rolls, but there is a remedy readily at hand – changing the law in Ohio.

If the left were serious about its new worries about an undemocratic court, it would welcome the prospect of overturning Roe v. Wade.

Indeed, the belief that voters



in states will ban abortion or more stringently regulate it if Roe is overturned is the single biggest motivating factor in opposition to Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh. In other words, on this issue, the worry is that the court will allow too much democracy.

Of course, the court should act as a check on the popular will at times. But in doing so, it must limit itself to enforcing the law and the Constitution. This is the goal of originalism, which should be embraced by both sides as the appropriately modest view of the court's role in our republic.

But this would represent an enormous loss for progressives.

First, a court that no longer envisions itself as an instrument of social change wouldn't hand the left totalist victories unachievable in the political realm. Two, the animating

markets are associated with higher prices for a number of hospital and physician services and Affordable Care Act (ACA) premiums." In consolidated markets (defined by the Federal Trade Commission's *Horizontal Merger Guidelines*), prices for inpatient procedures were 79 percent higher and outpatient physician prices ranged from 35 percent to 63 percent higher (depending on the physician specialty) than less concentrated markets.

Big medicine and third-party financing are taking the cost curve in the wrong direction. This speaks to the urgency of encouraging cash friendly practices that bypass insurance and direct primary care (DPC) practices. With DPC, all primary care services and access to low-priced commonly used medications are included in an affordable upfront price. Importantly, DPC's time-intensive and individualized management of chronic diseases decreases hospital admissions, paring down Medicare's \$17 billion spent on avoidable readmissions.

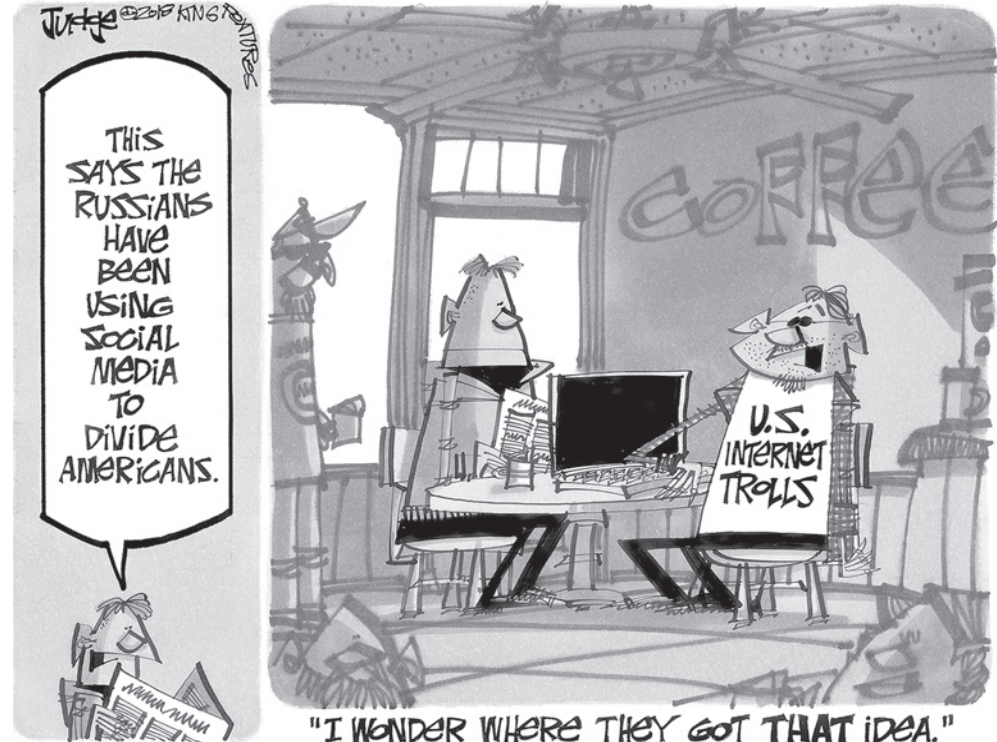
Why corporations want to marginalize private practice seems clear; the government's

motive is open to debate. Surveys consistently find that patients overwhelmingly want "personalized provider interactions." Thus, herding patients into government-directed programs is not the solution. One core problem with government systems is their reliance on the goodwill of politicians. As President Ford said, "a government big enough to give you everything you want is a government big enough to take everything you have."

It's time for Congress to scrutinize anti-competitive health system mergers. It's time to bring to the floor over a dozen bills to expand and improve Health Savings Accounts (HSAs) to give patients more control over all facets of their medical care.

Congress, the clock is ticking on this legislative session. Stand up for patients. Or did the dog eat your courage?

THE HISTORY CHANNEL

- On Aug. 6, 1862, the C.S.S. Arkansas, the most feared Confederate ironclad on the Mississippi River, is blown up by her crew after suffering mechanical problems during a battle with the U.S.S. Essex near Baton Rouge, Louisiana. The ship was 165 feet long and 35 feet wide.
- On Aug. 7, 1947, Kon-Tiki, a balsa wood raft captained by Norwegian anthropologist Thor Heyerdahl, completes a 4,300-mile, 101-day journey from Peru to an archipelago near Tahiti. Heyerdahl wanted to prove his theory that prehistoric South Americans could have colonized Polynesia by drifting on ocean currents.
- On Aug. 8, 1968, at the Republican National Convention in Miami, Richard Nixon and Spiro Agnew are chosen as the presidential and vice-presidential nominees for the upcoming election. In 1974 on this day, Nixon would announce his resignation as president.
- On Aug. 9, 1936, at the 1936 Berlin Olympics, black American track star Jesse Owens wins his fourth gold medal of the Games in the 4x100-meter relay. His team's world record of 39.8 seconds stood for 20 years.
- On Aug. 10, 1793, after more than two centuries as a royal palace, the Louvre is opened as a public museum in Paris by the French revolutionary government. Today the Louvre's collection is one of the richest in the world, with artwork and artifacts representative of 11,000 years of human civilization and culture.

New Social Security wage reporting app

On June 2, 2018, a new capability “myWageReport” (myWR) was added to my Social Security accounts. This new portal is an automated wage reporting application for Title II disability (SSDI), SSI, and concurrent beneficiaries. The myWR portal now accepts wage reports electronically from Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients and SSI deemors, concurrent beneficiaries, and representative payees. This capability had been available only to Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries and their representative payees. This new application makes it possible to avoid visits to a field office to report wages in person. However, users must still contact an office to report when they first start working for each new employer. It’s also important to note that representative payees are able to report wages, but won’t have access to beneficiaries’ or recipient’s other information. Supplemental Security Income

as reading and math. Team SISD is one of 51 entities in the state to earn the grant and the only school district in the region to be eligible for four years of grant funding. The grant will be used to implement the Texas ACE program at Campestre, H.D. Hilley, Hueco, Escontrias and Rojas elementary schools; Escontrias Early Childhood Center; Desert Wind and Ernesto Serna K-8 schools; and Salvador H. Sanchez and Socorro middle schools. “We are grateful to have been awarded the 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant, which will enable us to continue our efforts to ensure every student succeeds,” said Superintendent José Espinoza, Ed.D. “The additional learning time and support will have a positive impact on our students, helping them become effective communicators, providing them experiences to collaborate with their peers on projects, and developing their creative and critical thinking skills.” With the Texas ACE program, SISD will offer 15 additional hours of literacy, science, technology, engineering, arts and math courses weekly during the school year. In the summer, additional services will be offered four hours daily, for six weeks. The funding will start on Aug. 1, 2018 and will run through July 31, 2021.

(SSI) and concurrent reports will be able to submit wage reports for only the month immediately preceding the report on any day during the current reporting month. Title-II (SSDI) only beneficiaries may report up to 24-months of past wages. In order to avoid potential overpayments, reporter must submit wages via myWR by the 6th of the month. New portal, myWageReport application requires the reporting individual to create their my Social Security account. Creating an account is fast, safe and

secure. When you sign up for or log into your my Social Security account, you’ll have access to this convenient application on your desktop, laptop, and mobile device. After you report your wages online, you can save or print a copy of your receipt. We’re expanding and improving our services to put you in control of your time by providing applications and services when, where, and how you need them.

state and national level. There are so many great things happening in San Elizario ISD,” he said.

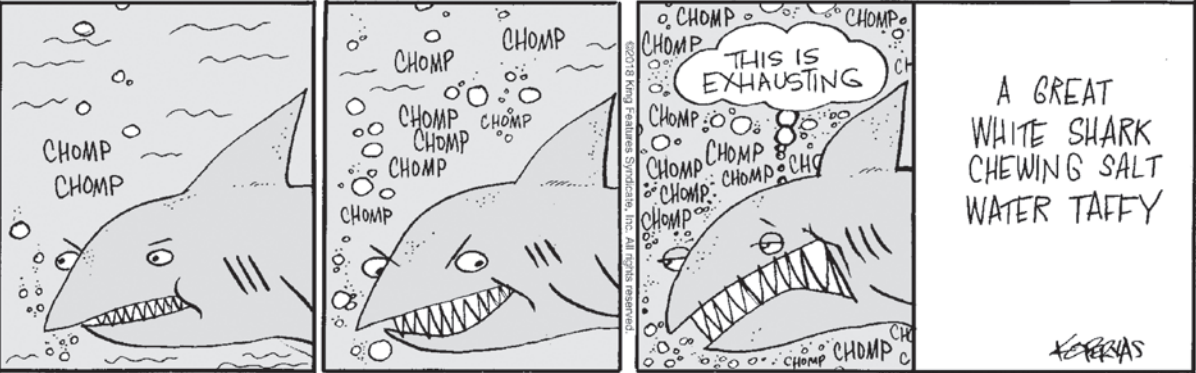
“As part of this Board, I plan to do my best to represent both the school district and the community the same way the other Board Members have – with pride.”

Rojas was appointed by the SEISD Board of Trustees and was sworn in on Wednesday, July 11th.

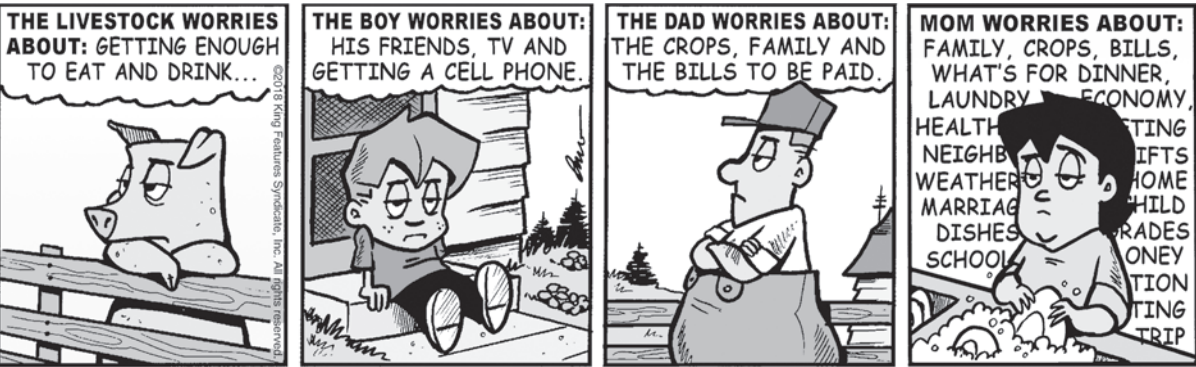

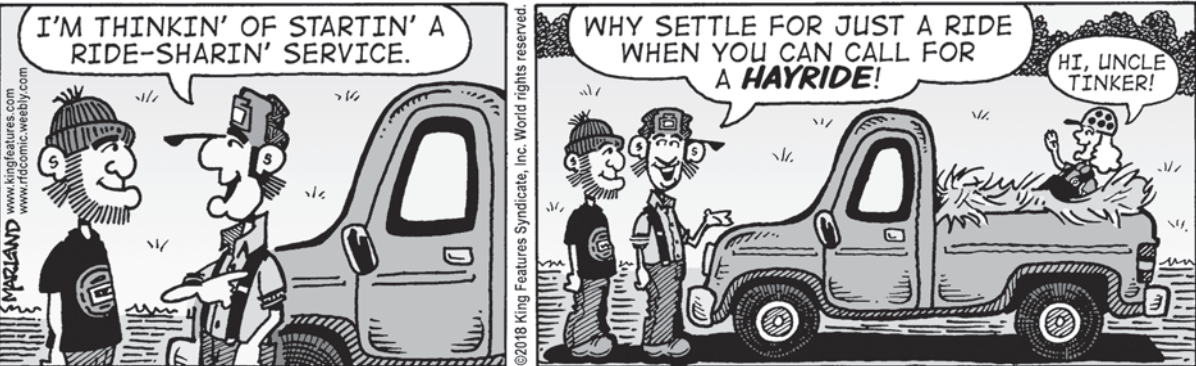

Know the ABCDE’s of melanoma

DEAR DR. ROACH: In 1976, I had a mole on my right calf about the size of a pencil eraser. A biopsy showed it to be melanoma, and they thought they had removed all of the cancer, but they did another surgery to be sure that I was cancer-free. I am a natural redhead and never sunbathed or used a tanning bed. It has been 38 years, and I am still cancer-free. I get a skin check from my dermatologist every six months. At the time of my diagnosis, my family doctor said that if the melanoma spreads inside the body, “the ball game is over.” Is that still true? I know melanoma can be deadly. – W.K.



Melanoma is the most commonly lethal skin cancer. Although there have been some exciting new developments in treating advanced melanoma, the survival rate for stage IV melanoma, where the cancer has spread to internal organs, is only 15 percent to 20 percent at five years.

Fortunately, the survival rate for melanoma caught early, at stage I, is greater than 90 percent, which is why it’s so important to know the ABCDE’s of melanoma recognition:

- A: Asymmetry – one half looks different from the other half;
- B: Border – the border in a melanoma is often irregular, not a near-circle;
- C: Color – melanomas usually are not a uniform color, like most benign lesions. Some areas are light brown, others brown-black, others red or pale;
- D: Diameter – greater than 6 millimeters, the eraser on a standard pencil;
- E: Enlargement or Evolution – any change in color, shape, size or symptoms (including bleeding).

Any of these should prompt a visit to your regular doctor or a dermatologist. As an internist, these are the features I look for, and I have a very low threshold for sending suspicious lesions to my colleagues in dermatology.

DEAR DR. ROACH: My son is 40 years old. After a recent stress test, he ended up with five stents in his arteries, and also was diagnosed with diabetes. His doctor ordered him not to go back to work for three or four weeks, but he went back after three days. He told the doctor that he would be more stressed if he stayed home. His job is mostly sitting down. Since he didn’t follow the advice, how will this affect his health? – V.B.

We don’t normally have people stay home for long periods

of time after placement of stents, so I was surprised to hear that he was “ordered” (I almost never “order,” only recommend, more or less strongly) to stay home. My experience is that after receiving life-changing diagnoses, such as diabetes or coronary artery disease, it’s best to keep some habits, such as work, the same and change others. For your son, I am sure he will be recommended a proper diet for diabetes and exercise appropriate for a person with a

new diagnosis of heart disease. Surgery to relieve the nerve compression is successful in some cases.

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ChooseVA wants you

Coming to a billboard near you: ChooseVA. The Department of Veterans Affairs has just started a campaign to persuade veterans to make use of all the services and benefits it provides. It’s also aimed at attracting employees.

The VA is using as the backbone of its message the results of a new RAND study that found the VA provides “some of the highest quality care and benefits available anywhere.” The campaign will start on social and digital media before going over to traditional media like billboards and broadcast. Here’s what the messages will include:

- VA benefits include home loans, women’s health, PTSD help, rehab and mental-health services.
- Working for the VA will help give back to those who have served.
- They’ll use best industry practices to attract exceptional employees (including veterans).

According to the RAND study, the VA is similar to or better than civilian care, but there’s a wide variation across the country in individual facilities. Some of the variation might be because some facilities have older or sicker patients. Some facilities don’t provide the same level of care as others. The VA needs improvement to be sure all veterans at all facilities receive high-quality care. The VA doesn’t rank well for readmissions or for pain management.

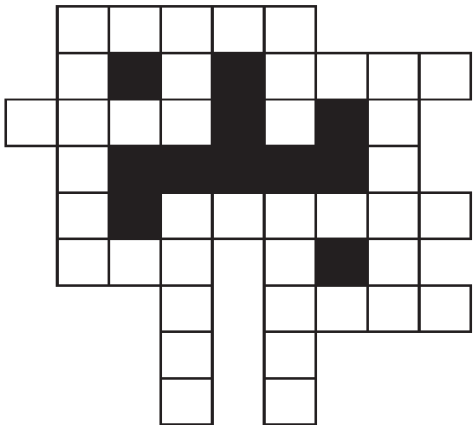
