First home

July accounted nearly 40% of 2017's single-family home purchases made by first-time buyers, the personal-finance website WalletHub took an in-depth look at 2018's *Best & Worst Cities for First-Time Home Buyers*. To determine the most favorable housing markets for first-time buyers, WalletHub took the pulse of real estate in 300 cities of varying sizes using 27 key metrics. The data set ranges from housing affordability to real-estate tax rate to property-crime rate. El Paso was ranked as the 10th best large city. Other stats:

- Akron, OH has the most affordable housing (median house price divided by median annual household income), with a ratio of 1.72, which is 8.9 times cheaper than in Berkley, CA, the city with the least affordable, with a ratio of 15.25.
- Honolulu, HI has the lowest real-

American cowboys, Mexican traditions

EL PASO COUNTY – The American cowboy ranching and farming practices are uniquely a North and South American way of life that did not exist in Europe when the Americas were discovered.

After the Spanish arrived in Mexico in 1519, ranches were established and stocked with cattle and horses imported from Spain. Landowners mounted native Indians on well-trained horses and taught them to handle cattle.

By the early 1700s, cattle ranching had spread north into what is now Texas, Arizona, and New Mexico and south to Argentina. The native cowboys were called vaqueros (from the Spanish word for cow) and developed roping skills, using braided rawhide reatas (the root word for lariat).

Ranching ceased to be a strictly Hispanic profession as more Americans poured into once Mexican-held lands (especially after the Mexican/American War, 1846–48). The Anglo newcomers adapted to the vaquero style, and many settlers intermarried with the old Spanish ranching families.

The 1849 gold rush brought even more people to the wild west, which increased the demand for beef. As the livestock industry expanded, these horsemen found work in Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, Arizona, and Hawaii, taking their equipment and livestock-handling techniques with them.

Today, as long as cattle are raised in big American pastures, the legacy of the vaquero will endure. The early Mexican techniques for handling cattle can be seen throughout the modern livestock industry, like whenever a cowboy cinches a saddle on his horse, straps on chaps (from chaparreras, Spanish for leather leggings), competes in a rodeo (from rodear, Spanish for to surround), or ropes a horse from his remuda (from remudar, Spanish for exchange).

To relive the origin of the cowboy culture, Rudy Avila will give a special presentation

during El Paso Archaeological Society's (EPAS) next monthly meeting, which is scheduled for 2 p.m., Saturday, August 18, at the El Paso Museum of Archaeology, 4301 Transmountain Road. The meeting is free and open to the public.

Avila stated that his talk will encompass the ecology and history of the cowboy culture as we know it today. He said that he will discuss the linguistic origins and environmental timeline of ranching and demonstrate the tools of the trade.

For his presentation, Avila will show saddles, spurs, horse tack, and other equipment used by cowboys in the Americas in the past. For example, he will show ropes made of horsehair, rawhide and Lechuguilla, a plant native to the Chihuahuan desert, to compare and contrast materials and techniques used by Native Americans and the early Spanish to make ropes and other tools.

Avila, who was born in Alpine, Texas, grew up on farms in the El Paso area and learned horse and livestock handling from his father. Although his primary career was working as a plumbing and air conditioning contractor until retirement in 2015, he has always had a knack for

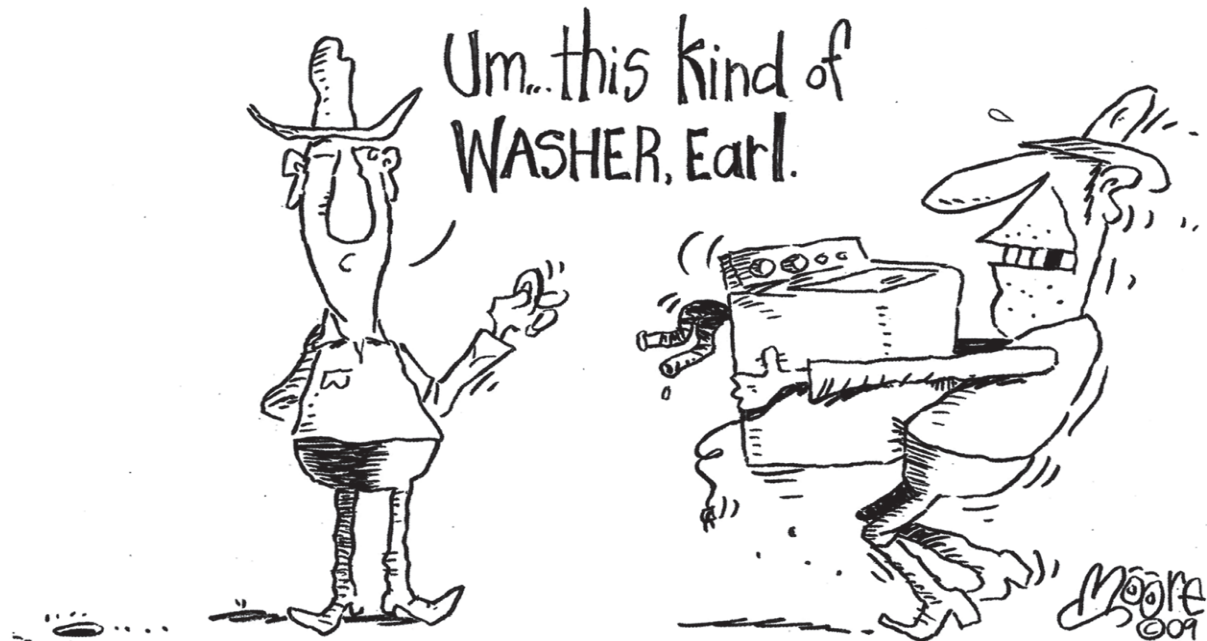

The battle over socialism is joined

It’s begun. We are having a debate over socialism. Not over whether it’s fair to call Democrats socialists. Not over whether socialism has been good for Venezuela or some other faraway, unfortunate country. But socialist policies right here in the United States.

The press attention to a new study of the costs of “Medicare for all,” or universal health coverage paid for by the government that goes much further than Obamacare, is a sign that it is a live issue.

Popularized by Bernie Sanders, Medicare-for-all is not just a fringy left-wing talking point anymore. It’s a plank of a growing element of the Democratic Party. A raft of prospective Democratic presidential candidates has endorsed the policy, while about a third of the Democratic members of the House have joined a caucus devoted to it.

The good news for Sanders and Co. is that, in the wake of the failure of an attempted GOP repeal of Obamacare, the health care debate is clearly moving left. The bad news is that Medicare-for-all is still a completely batty, politically unserious idea.

The new study of its costs, from the conservative Mercatus Center, concludes that Medicare-for-all would increase federal spending by almost \$33 trillion during the first 10 years. The study notes that “it would be less expensive to the federal government to triple all projected appropriations,” and that “doubling all currently projected federal individual and corporate income tax collections would be insufficient to finance the added federal costs of the plan.”

Supporters of the idea impeached the credibility of the findings based on their source, yet a study by the centrist Urban Institute in 2016 found exactly the same thing.

The costs aren’t merely a theoretical matter. Vermont, the home of Bernie Sanders, abandoned a single-payer proposal after the Democratic



governor concluded that it wasn’t fiscally sustainable. Despite its Democratic supermajorities, California gave up on a single-payer proposal last year for the same reason – the projected cost was twice as much as the state budget.

The upside is that Medicare-for-all purports to save on overall health care spending by ratcheting down payments to health care providers. Medicare does indeed pay less to hospitals than private insurers, but it’s not clear that this would be sustainable if hospitals could count on only Medicare-level payments.

Since Medicare-for-all would eliminate insurance premiums and provide health care free of charge, it would create an incentive for more usage, and more health care expenditures.

All of this is why the natural gravity in a single-payer system is toward brute-force price controls and rationing to control costs.

President Barack Obama had to promise that if you like your health care you can keep it because any change to private insurance is so toxic. Medicare-for-all would replace the employer-based system entirely for more than 150 million people. It wouldn’t matter how much they liked their insurance – it would be gone as a matter of definition.

Republicans need to continue to develop and push their own ideas to reduce health care costs and adjust to the new reality where socialism doesn’t simply represent a laugh line, but a battle that needs to be won.

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in the tax rate or property value.

Notice of Rollback Rate: The highest tax rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election is 1.530000. This election will be automatically held if the district adopts a rate in excess of the rollback rate of 1.530000.

Under this pilot initiative, the TWDB will provide Anthony funding for the creation of a comprehensive asset management plan, and other management tools for its water management system. Parkhill Smith & Cooper will undertake the development of the plan in cooperation with the Town of Anthony staff. Upon the successful completion of the project, Anthony will receive an asset management plan, sustainability plan, system operations and maintenance manual, compliance manual, installation of developed tools on the Town's computer system, as well as training for system management.

TWDB Board Member Kathleen Jackson and Matthew Schmidt, TWDB staffer, met with Anthony's staff to review the program details and requirements. The goal is to produce a successful system and comprehensive plan for managing Anthony's water system in a financially and technically sustainable manner.

- On Aug. 23, 1904, Harold Weed of Canastota, New York, is issued U.S. Patent No. 768,495 for his “Grip-Tread for Pneumatic Tires,” a nonskid tire chain to be used on automobiles in order to increase traction on slick roads. He drew inspiration from the habit of local motorists who wrapped rope around their tires.
- On Aug. 24, 1814, during the War of 1812, British forces overwhelm American militiamen and march unopposed into Washington, D.C. Most congressmen and officials had already fled. The British officers dined that night at the deserted White House as the British troops began setting the city aflame.
- On Aug. 25, 1835, the first in a series of six articles announcing the discovery of life on the moon appears in the New York Sun newspaper. “The Great Moon Hoax” described evidence of life forms including unicorns and winged humanoids resembling bats.
- On Aug. 26, 1959, the British Motor Corporation launches its newest car, the small, affordable \$800 Mark I Mini. The diminutive Mini went on to become one of the best-selling British cars in history.

Dimel looks to rejuvenate Miners after dismal season

Americas High grad Josh Fields showed signs of being a legitimate running threat last season. 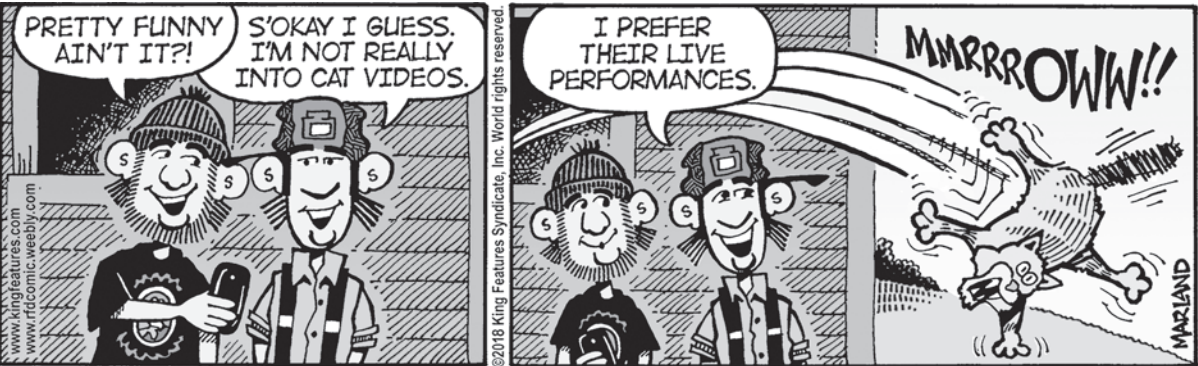

Is it OK to crush pills?

DEAR DR. ROACH: I would like to know your opinion about whether it is OK to crush up different psychiatric medications and put them in a small container of water to drink. This doesn't seem very safe to me, but I'd like an expert opinion. – Anon.

I'll give you my answer, and also tell you where to find an expert opinion. My answer is that many people have trouble swallowing pills, and that most pills can be crushed and taken with water or mixed in with food. Your local pharmacy sells pill crushers, or you can get a mortar and pestle.

While you are at the pharmacy, ask your pharmacist. He or she can look at your medications and tell you whether it is safe for you to crush your particular medications. Slow-release medications, of which there are many, should not be crushed. Often, the bottle will tell you, but ask your pharmacist for the expert opinion.



DEAR DR. ROACH: What are your thoughts about the MiraDRY procedure to get rid of underarm sweat? Is it safe not to have sweat under the arms? – S.J.

MiraDRY is the brand name of a microwave device designed to treat hyperhidrosis (excessive sweating). This is not normal underarm sweating, but a rare condition of abnormal, drenching sweat that greatly interferes with social activities. It is currently used only for underarms – not hands, feet or face, the other most common places for localized hyperhidrosis.

According to several published papers, the microwaves heat up the water in the sweat glands, destroying them, while the skin itself is cooled. The published success rates (at reducing sweating to “never noticeable” or “tolerable”) are very high, as are patient satisfaction results. Side effects included swelling, redness and temporary numbness.

This is a new procedure, but it appears to have promise in the treatment of excess sweating. I also found a very helpful website at www.sweathelp.org.

DEAR DR. ROACH: What causes foot drop? Is there any cure for it? – B.H.

Foot drop is most commonly caused by damage to the peroneal nerve, which wraps around the fibula, one of the two

bones of the leg (anatomically, only the lower leg is called the leg, as opposed to the thigh). The nerve can be damaged from trauma, such as during surgery or prolonged hospitalization. Leg casts and prolonged positioning with stress on the nerve, such as squatting, also can damage the nerve. Most people describe numbness but not pain, and the dropped foot can cause people to trip, so people with this condition learn to flex the hip to lift the thigh up higher. The diagnosis can be confirmed by electrical studies

of the nerves. Treatment usually is to prevent further damage, with a splint to keep the foot flexed upward. A physical therapist can prescribe helpful exercises.

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Clinic reminders by cellphone

If you’re a patient and you have a new cellphone number, you need to tell the Department of Veterans Affairs. It has a new system to remind patients about upcoming appointments, and thus far, it’s managed to reduce no-shows by more than 100,000 appointments. As of July, 319,000 appointments had been canceled in advance, opening up the time slots for others.

The first reminder text message on your phone will come seven days in advance of the appointment, with a second one two days prior. When the call comes, follow the prompts in the message to confirm that you still want the appointment, or you can cancel it. If you have more than one appointment the same day, you’ll get a message for each one. Be sure to respond to each one individually.

If you’re enrolled in VA health care and previously

entered a cell number, you’re automatically enrolled. If you need to change that number, or if you get a cellphone for the first time, let them know when you check in or out.

If you don’t want these messages and want to opt out, reply STOP to any message and you won’t get more of them. Later, to restart your appointment alerts, go to a previous reminder message and type in START.

These messages are only for clinic appointments, not for getting labs, community care or telephone clinics. If you’re getting letters or automated calls, you’ll still get those.

At this point, only the clinic name is included in the message. However, the VA is working on a way to expand the information you receive in the reminder and give more details about your appointment.

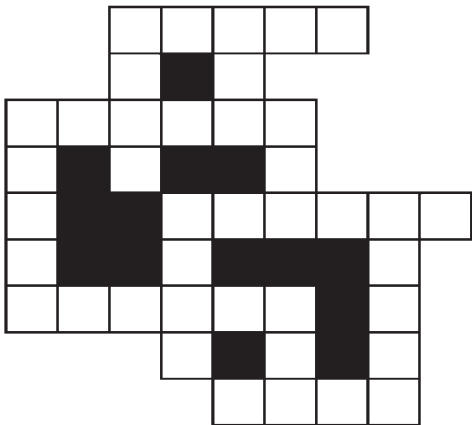
