### Canutillo ISD governance program

## ASGA invites senior golfers to join up

EL PASO COUNTY – The recently manicured golf course radiated in the morning dew, with its sprawling green grass fairgrounds glistening under the desert sun and its huge billowing oak, pine, and ash trees dotting the landscape. The Ascarate Municipal Golf Course was perfect for an early morning golf tournament.

And so, about 36 players gathered at El Paso County’s South-Central golf course to compete for bragging rights and monetary prizes. The special aspect of this tournament was that all the golfers were over 55 years of age; for, they were participating in the annual Ascarate Senior Golf Association (ASGA) golf tournament.

Among the tournament players was 73 year-old Manuel Rodriguez. “I’ve been playing for two years. I was invited to play a round of golf with the association

members. I liked it, so I have been coming ever since,” he stated.

Chuy Gonzalez, 68, said that he has been playing golf for five years. He related that he’s gotten to know the members and considers them friends. “I also do it for the exercise,” he added.

Jesus Martinez, 70, has been playing golf for thirty years and for about ten years with ASGA members. “I come to play every week because it is a great

## San Eli HS seniors register to vote



way to exercise, and the association with fellow retirees is enjoyable,” he stated.

Since 1978, ASGA has been providing opportunities for men and women golfers to motivate their interest in golfing activities and to promote good sportsmanship and fellowship, according to Lupe Yzaguirre, a long-time ASGA board member.

The association is run by an executive board with elected president and vice president positions and with volunteers to fill other duties including treasurer, secretary, and tournament director. ASGA currently has 59 registered members with lots of friends joining-in for the monthly events, Yzaguirre stated.

“Each year the ASGA has club luncheons in June and November. It is during these luncheons that club business is conducted. President and vice president can only serve for two years; therefore, elections are held every two years during the November luncheon,” Yzaguirre explained.

Yzaguirre acknowledged that individuals wanting to join should have some playing experience and know game rules because ASGA does not offer golf lessons; however, he stated that the Ascarate Golf Course offers lessons for a nominal fee. He also pointed out that members’ ages range from the late 50s to the high 80s, and that their golf skills vary.

“Most of our members play golf year round, in wind, rain, and dusty days. The ASGA may offer two tournaments- the first and third Thursdays of each month- for its members, but most members play golf 2, 3, or 4 days a week,” Yzaguirre stated.

Yzaguirre said that ASGA is for senior golfers and plays with senior rules. “These rules were created to allow senior golfers to enjoy themselves while keeping up with the flow of the game,” he stated. “The rules are available to all new members. We have members whose handicap is 8 and others whose handicap is 40. We also have women members who always play together in tournaments against the men,” he said.

“To really enjoy being a

member of our association, everyone has to get involved and participate and be willing to meet and enjoy being with other seniors,” Yzaguirre asserted.

Interested golfers can join ASGA by calling The Ascarate Golf Course or contacting ASGA board members Lupe Yzaguirre, at 274-9947 or Ben Flores, at 256-4832. Membership dues are \$35 at the beginning of the year. On July 1st, the dues drop to \$25 for the remainder of the year.

**Ascarate Senior Golf Association offers:**

- Two tournaments each month (entry fee, \$6). One dollar from each entry fee is set aside to pay for a social dinner that is held in September. The rest of the money is returned as monetary prizes to the winners of each tournament.
- Social dinner during September is held on a Friday at the Teppanyaki Grill, located at Gateway East and Lee Trevino. All members eat free and are allowed to invite a guest that dines at a reduced price.
- Members attend two free club luncheons, one in June and November. These luncheons are for members only, however guests may pay full price.
- ASGA operates its own Handicap program. Players’ handicaps are generated at the end of each month.
- ASGA offers different tournament formats throughout the year; players’ handicaps are used to place players on teams according to their level of play.
- McDonalds of El Paso is ASGA’s major sponsor. In September, the two tournaments for the month are called the McDonalds/ASGA Club Championships. The format is individual play for both tournaments; however, the second tournament is divided into four flights. Monetary prizes are awarded to the various winners of each tournament.

Atticus Finch was on the wrong side

It’s time for *To Kill a Mockingbird* to give up its treasured place in American culture.

The 1960 novel by Harper Lee was published to instant acclaim, has sold more than 30 million copies and is ubiquitous in high school curricula. The 1962 movie version, starring Gregory Peck, is a classic in itself and won three Academy Awards.

But nothing is forever, even for a book commonly called “timeless.” Lee’s novel is deeply out of sympathy with a moment when on college campuses, and in the culture more broadly, due process isn’t what it used to be, when it is often thought to be a hateful act to insist that allegations of sexual misconduct be proven.

A refresher on the story: The setting is Depression-era Alabama. Small-town lawyer Atticus Finch (played by Peck in the movie) is unpopular in town because he has decided to take on the defense of a black man named Tom Robinson who is accused of rape by a young white woman.

And this is where the story, in contemporary terms, goes off the rails. Atticus Finch didn’t #BelieveAllWomen. He didn’t take an accusation at face value.

He defended an alleged rapist, vigorously and unremittingly, making use of every opportunity provided to him by the norms of the Anglo-American system of justice. He did it despite considerable social pressure to simply believe the accuser.

In a gripping courtroom scene, Finch cross-examines Mayella Ewell, the 19-year-old daughter of an abusive drunk from a dirt-poor family who is Robinson’s accuser. With all the vehemence and emotion she can muster, Ewell insists that Robinson attacked her at her house.

Without mercy, Finch takes apart her account. In contemporary internet argot, he “destroys” her. He brushes right by her tears. He doesn’t care about her feelings, only the facts. He exposes contradictions in her story and shreds her credibility, especially with the dramatic revelation that Robinson doesn’t have use of his left arm when he stands up at the defense table (he is alleged to have hit her with his left hand).

It is revealed that Ewell is lying. She had made an advance on Robinson and gotten caught by her vicious, racist father. The charge of rape against Robinson was a cover story, although the bigoted jury convicts him anyway.



*To Kill a Mockingbird* stands firmly for the proposition that an accusation can be false, that unpopular defendants presumed guilty must and should be defended, and that it is admirable and brave to withstand the crowd when it wants to cast aside the normal protections of justice.

Exactly what has made Atticus Finch such an honored figure in our culture would make him a very inconvenient man at many college campuses today, where charges of sexual misconduct are adjudicated without the accused being allowed to confront the accuser or make use of other key features of our system of justice. He didn’t believe that someone being accused of something is enough to establish his wrongdoing.

Atticus Finch is not the man for this moment, but we need him, and his reasoned yet unshakable commitment to fairness and justice, more than ever.

• On Oct. 28, 1775, the commander in chief of the British army, Major Gen. Sir William Howe, forbids Boston residents to leave the city. He ordered citizens to organize into military companies for the preservation of order.



# If the Super Bowl was this weekend, we’d be watching...

Can you believe it; a quarter of the NFL season has already passed us by.

Of course, there’s way too much football left to be played to know who’s going to make the playoffs. But we can pretty much name the two best teams in the early going.

In the NFC, the team that has looked the best is the Los Angeles Rams. In the AFC, the top of the crop appears to be the Kansas City Chiefs.

If the Super Bowl were going to be played this weekend, I think most fans would pick the Rams and the Chiefs as the participants.

Both teams have had little trouble with their opponents and each is easily the most exciting team to watch in their conference.

Both teams are led by young quarterbacks that are playing like seasoned veterans.

The Rams’ Jared Goff is picking up right where he left off a year ago as one of the best QBs in the league. Goff finished fifth in the NFL last season in touchdown passes with 28. He only had seven interceptions.

Through his first four games of this year, Goff had already thrown 11 touchdowns.

On the other side of the ledger, the Chiefs are led by a quarterback making the first starts of his career.

Patrick Mahomes has taken over for veteran Alex Smith and is already

rewriting the NFL record book.

Through his first three games, Mahomes’ 13 touchdown passes were the most that any quarterback has ever had in that span.

Oh and by the way, Mahomes didn’t throw a single interception during those games.

A lot of fans and experts questioned whether it was worth it for the Chiefs to get rid of the established quarterback for the new guy. But so far Mahomes has proven that he isn’t just a winner, he might just end up being a champion.

Both teams are just as dangerous on the ground. The Rams have one of the best runners in the league with Todd Gurley, while the Chiefs are just as strong with Kareem Hunt.

The Rams’ Gurley was second in the

league in rushing a year ago with 1,305 yards. The funny thing is that the #1 rusher in the league was the Chiefs’ Hunt with 1,327 yards.

Both Gurley and Hunt have the speed to take it all the way on any given play. They can also catch the ball out of the backfield, giving their quarterbacks another option when their receivers are covered.

And speaking of receivers, Cooper Kupp and Robert Woods already gave the Rams a potent pass-catching duo, but the acquisition of Brandin Cooks makes L.A. downright scary.

And the Chiefs are no slouches when it comes to catching the football. Wide receiver Tyreek Hill and tight end Travis

Kelce are two of the best at their respective positions.

One of the fastest guys in the league, Hill is especially dangerous when returning kicks.

On the defensive end of the ball, the Rams have a pair of tackles in Aaron

Donald and Ndamukong Suh, who may be the most feared tacklers in the game.

Linebacker Cory Littleton and defensive backs Marcus Peters and Aqib Talib round out and tenacious defense led by coordinator Wade Phillips, considered the best defensive guru in the business.

The Chiefs have some beasts on defense as well. Justin Houston and Anthony Hitchens lead the linebacking corps.

Houston is always among the league leaders in sacks.

While the Chiefs don’t have as many big names on defense as the Rams, they are just as stubborn and just as talented.





## Reducing eye strain

DEAR DR. ROACH: Would you mind providing some guidelines for preventing eye strain? I'm a graduate student, so I spend a lot of time reading, both from computer screens and from books. I will always need to read to get things done, but I'd also like my eyes to last me my whole life. – B.I.

We tend to spend a lot of time reading or in front of computer screens, and eye strain is very common. I think eye problems from excess screen time and reading fall into two categories: dry eyes and muscle strain.

Computer users in particular can get dry eyes, largely from decreased blinking. And “blink more” isn’t likely to be successful advice, so I recommend an eye lubricant, used periodically during computer work if you have any sense of eye fatigue or strain. If dry eyes are part of your problem, you will feel relief immediately, and you should use a drop in each eye every few hours.

Muscle strain comes from staring at one point of focus – your computer screen – for long periods of time. Also, many people tend to hold their shoulders and neck in an uncomfortable position during computer work or play. The solution is to get away from the computer for a while. I recommend getting up and pacing periodically, since prolonged sitting isn’t good for you.

Another option is the 20-20-20 rule (I haven’t been able to discover who made the rule, but I think it makes sense): Look at something 20 feet away for 20 seconds every 20 minutes. This can help prevent fatigue to the ciliary muscles, the muscles of the eye. Some people, especially those who are nearing or past their 50th birthday, might benefit from very mild reading glasses when using the computer.

treatments have potential for real harm, even though it isn't likely. If the issue is strictly cosmetic, I wouldn't recommend treatment. If it's for pain or because you have had skin or soft tissue infections in the area, then treatment is reasonable.

If you pursue treatment, get a culture done to be sure you know what you are treating. Sometimes what looks like a nail infection is really something else (psoriasis, eczema, lichen planus or others).

Depending on what the culture shows, you might benefit from itraconazole, an oral antifungal agent.

New steps to an appeal

The Department of Veterans Affairs reached a big goal two weeks early in September: It delivered 81,000 appeals decisions for fiscal 2018. That's 28,000 more decisions on services and disability benefits than it cleared last year. The VA already has hired nearly 200 attorneys and plans to hire 30 more as it implements the Veterans Appeals Improvement and Modernization Act of 2017.

There's a lot to know.

If you disagreed with your original claim decision, you have three choices, per the Act: A higher-level review, where you jump up to another decision-making body; a supplemental claim, where new evidence is submitted; or an appeal (Notice of Disagreement) to the board.

If you appeal directly to the board, there are three directions to take: direct review docket, evidence docket and hearing docket. Do you know the

difference? This is when having an attorney can help. In the direct review, no new evidence is submitted. In the evidence docket, new evidence is sent. In the hearing docket, new evidence also is introduced.

On the VA.gov blog website there is a chart with the above information, cleverly identified as Simplified Process Gives Veterans Clear Choices. Clear as mud, no?

If you want to learn more about what the Board of Veterans' Appeals does, go online to [www.bva.va.gov](http://www.bva.va.gov). Click the tiny images for expanded information. You'll find sections on what the Board does, what the appeals modernization actually is and how to monitor the status of your appeal.

To check your status, you'll need to sign in using the DS Logon (ID issued by the DOD), your HealtheVet account or your ID.me account. You can create an ID.me account using your HealtheVet account, or Facebook or Google, or even an AARP account. Think carefully before you use any of these last three.


