SISD funds tests

As part of the Socorro Independent School District's (SISD) top goal to ensure students are college and career ready, the District is paying for all eighth-graders to take the PSAT 8/9 Oct. 24 at their schools. The nearly three-hour test will help the 3,600 plus eighth-graders prepare for the PSAT/NMSQT they will take as sophomores and the SAT they will take as juniors. When results are in, scores will be assessed and given to educators to see where students stand in regard to College Board College and Career Readiness benchmarks. "We will be able to track the kids' progress toward the PSAT," said Frank Clark, SISD's advanced academics coordinator. "The data will give us additional insight as to which advanced coursework a student will be best suited for and will allow us to identify additional areas students need support in to better prepare them for the math TSI. It also will allow us to better prepare the students for the SAT." This is the first time all SISD eighth graders will take the PSAT. High school students also are provided the opportunity to take the standardized tests that are administered by the College Board for free. Team SISD pays for all sophomores to take the PSAT, which they will take on Oct. 24. SISD also pays for high school juniors to take the SAT, which will be given on March 6, 2019.

Commissioners approve county parks improvements

EL PASO COUNTY — Gallegos Park in Canutillo, Coyote Park in Tornillo, and Ascarate Park in South-Central El Paso will finally get much-needed improvements as El Paso County Commissioners Court approved recently more than \$648,000 in leftover funds from its 2007 certificates of obligation for the park projects.

For Gallegos Park on Bosque Road, county officials allocated \$135,000 to build additional flat fields and improve the irrigation system by extending a

water line. The \$135,000 will be in addition to \$225,320 previously approved by commissioners, the director of the county's Public Works Department Norma Palacios pointed out.

These funds will allow the county to plant grass and extend a water line, and replace fields that would be used for a planned sports park facility, according to county officials, who have been working with the El Paso Border Youth Athletic Association to develop a sports park-type facility in the northern portion of Gallegos Park.

In Tornillo, the Coyote Park will receive \$163,000 in improvements including a new irrigation system, new sod, a walking

trail, the installation of a rock wall, and the replacement of shade structures.

According to county officials, an additional \$87,000 will be needed to pay for the \$250,000 Tornillo park project, so they decided to explore other funding sources, including possible savings from other projects to cover the remaining funding.

The Coyote Park project will be a partnership between the county and the Tornillo Independent School District, as the county is negotiating with the school district a property maintenance agreement. As part of the proposal, the school district will apply for a grant to purchase a new playground for the park, Palacios explained.

Commissioner Vince Perez, who represents the Tornillo area, said that the project is important for the community of Tornillo because it is one of the few unincorporated communities in the county that does not have access to adequate park area.

The county is also working on a new 2.5-mile hiking and biking trail on O.T. Smith for Tornillo. The \$2.4 million trail would run from Alameda to Interstate 10. This project is expected to begin in September 2019 and be completed in about a year.

The O.T. Smith trail project will be paid for with a federal grant, and as part of the grant, the county will pay for the design portion of the project. Consequently, commissioners voted unanimously to authorize the county judge to sign a \$419,000 agreement with the Camino Real Regional Mobility Authority for the design of the trail on O.T. Smith Road.

Commissioner Perez, who has been in office since 2012, said that for several years, both projects — the improvements at Coyote Park and the trail on O.T. Smith — have been priorities for his office.

At Ascarate Park, the appropriated funds will pay for two futsal courts (hard-floor courts for a version of soccer with fewer players), four flat fields with grass

The Left’s foolhardy attack on the Senate

Democrats suffered a stinging loss in the fight over Brett Kavanaugh’s confirmation, and have concluded that the constitutional system is to blame.

You see, if only the Founders hadn’t forged the Great Compromise between large states and small states at the Constitutional Convention in 1787, giving each state equal representation in the U.S. Senate, they would have defeated Brett Kavanaugh handily. It’s only because smaller red states have two senators just like larger blue states that the judge got confirmed.

For the left, the U.S. Senate is now looming, together with the Electoral College and the Supreme Court, as an institution of villainy in American life. In the words of Vox, the Senate is “a grotesquely unrepresentative body.” Washington Post columnist E.J. Dionne calls the ascension of Kavanaugh to the high court “a coup” because he was “confirmed by senators representing 44 percent of the population.”

Democrats have gone from bragging about their permanent majority a few years ago to complaining it’s impossible for them to win under the governing regime that we’ve had for more than 200 years, since it’s so tilted toward “minority rule.”

It’s certainly true that the Senate is not fully democratic and

gives an outsized role to small states, since this was the price they exacted for signing on to the Constitution. This arrangement isn’t a conspiracy against the left.

Yes, Wyoming, population 560,000 in the 2010 census, cancels out California, population 37 million, with two Republican senators to the Golden State’s two Democrats. But Vermont, population 630,000, cancels out the two Republicans from Texas, population 25 million, with a Democrat and a socialist.

Gross population disparities aren’t anything new. In 1790, shortly after the ratification of the Constitution, Virginia had 747,160 people, Delaware 59,096. In 1900, New York had 7,268,894 people, and Nevada all of 42,335. The republic survived.

The Senate ensures that flyover country isn’t ignored. It reflects the dizzying geographic diversity of a continental nation and promotes national cohesion by giving every corner of it a voice.

The House is the more democratic body. California has 53 representatives; Wyoming has one. Yet Democrats don’t control the House, either.

The root of the problem is that Democrats don’t have much appeal to the middle of the country anymore. As recently as 2010, both senators from North Dakota were Democrats, and

back in 2004, both senators from South Dakota were Democrats.

The disenchantment is a function of the left’s preference for coastal rule. It wants California to have the whip hand in our national life. But why should Los Angeles and San Francisco have an outsized role in governing distant, rural parts of the country, with which they have no sympathy?

Fundamentally remaking the Senate is a fantasy, regardless. The Constitution stipulates in Article 5 that “no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the Senate.” Striking the language would require the assent of some smaller states that wouldn’t be enamored with reducing their own relative power so California can have more.

Rather than cursing the design of the Senate, Democrats would be better served simply winning Senate elections, a cause they materially harmed with their fevered attack on Brett Kavanaugh.

UTEP fans hold out hope for Miners basketball

I know all El Paso fans are still in the middle of another disappointing UTEP football season but like every year around this time – hope is on the way.

And that hope comes in the form of the UTEP basketball season.

Don't look now but the Rodney Terry era officially starts in just two-and-a-half weeks.

Though the 0-6 football Miners are just in the middle of their season, things are so bad that fans are already turning the corner toward basketball.

Don't believe me? Just look at the crowds (I mean the lack of a crowd) at the Sun Bowl.

Attendance figures are hovering at lows that haven't been seen here in 25 years.

And who can blame the fans? Everybody will watch a bad movie once, maybe twice, but that's about it. Eventually they'll stop (as they see it) wasting their money.

That of course, doesn't mean that Dana Dimel has failed at UTEP. Not even close.

We all have to be patient and give him a chance to recruit the kind of players who fit his system.

Right now his roster is filled with Sean Kugler recruits and let's face it – the talent just isn't there yet. The nation's longest losing streak (18 games) proves that.

It all comes down to talent. Three different coaches, Kugler, Mike Price and Dimel have all shared in this monumental

slump.

The real test for Dimel will come in the next two years when his Miners will be expected to at least win half of their games.

But until then, he deserves a chance to build a program.

In the meantime, another new coach, Rodney Terry is getting his basketball team ready for the season opener against UT Permian Basin on Nov. 6.

And like we did every year when Tim Floyd was the coach, this year fans will definitely have to pick up a roster and learn who these new guys are.

Of the 18 guys on the official UTEP roster, fans will only recognize three names.

Paul Thomas, Evan Gilyard and Kobe McGee are the only players returning

from last year's squad.

Last year's basketballers finished with a disappointing 11-20 record.

Just like the football team, many El Pasoans are expecting instant success in basketball. But everyone must remember that a new team of young players needs time to grow up and get to know one another.

The roster of unfamiliar names include eight freshmen and five sophomores.

New names like Nigel Hawkins, Jordan Lathon, Tydus Verhoeven, Souley Boum, Bryson Williams, Anthony Tarke, Ountae Campbell, Garrett Sullivan, Jakobe Dill, Deon Stroud, Brandon Averitt, Kaosi Ezeagu, Efe Odigie, Gilles Dekoninck and Isaiah

Rhyanes, fill the roster.

Obviously some of these guys are going to remembered 30 years from now and some are going to forgotten by season's end. It remains to be seen how talented this crop of new Miners are.

On paper, basketball should be going

through a resurgence at UTEP. But that was said many times during the Floyd era and that never happened.

My point is that if the Miners finish in the middle of the pack in Conference USA and don't contend for a league title, don't get down on coach Terry.

Just like the football team, these new players are probably a year or two away from being a serious force.

And by the looks of the credentials

some of these players bring with them, it appears that UTEP basketball may be on the way back.

El Pasoans expect the same thing from the football team every year. We'd like for them to win but losing has been engrained into our football psyche. The UTEP football team has produced losers for the last five decades.

But the basketball team has produced winners over that same period.

It seems like we say it every year, the best thing about UTEP football is that it eventually gives way to UTEP basketball.

Well, in less than three weeks the Don Haskins Center will come alive with the sounds of squeaking sneakers, referee's whistles, and fans cheering and booing.

But remember, for both sports, the future isn't now – it's still a couple years away.

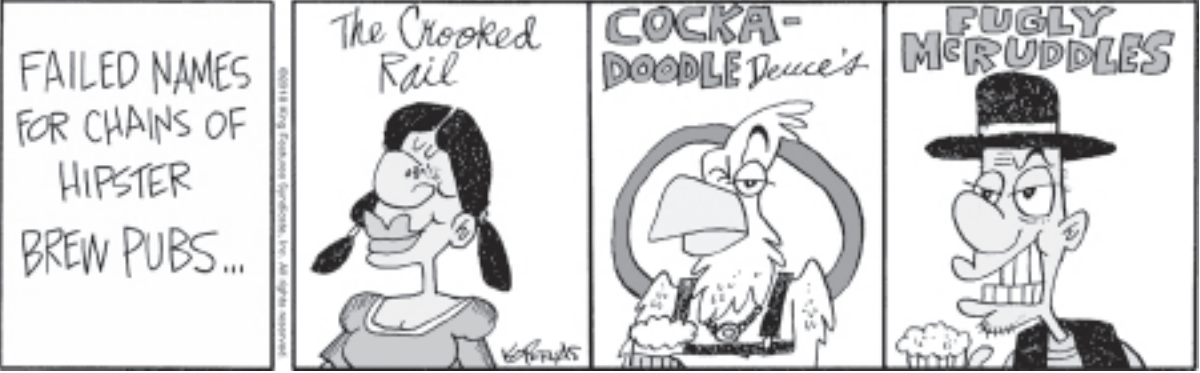

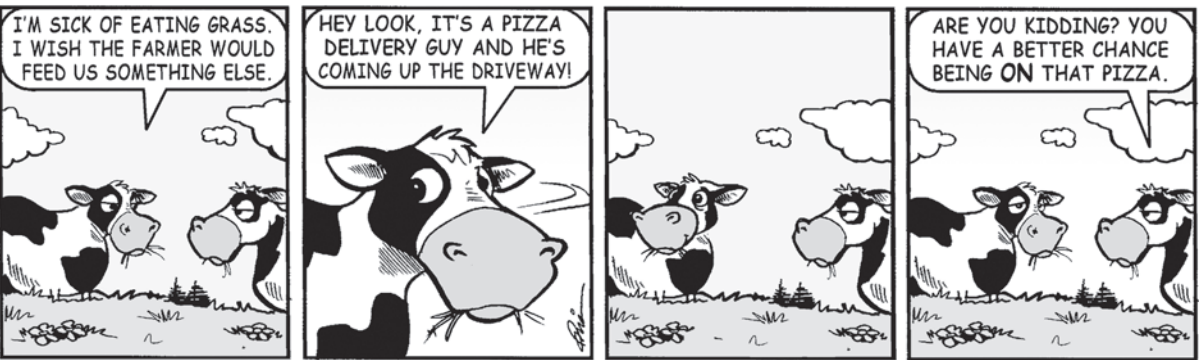

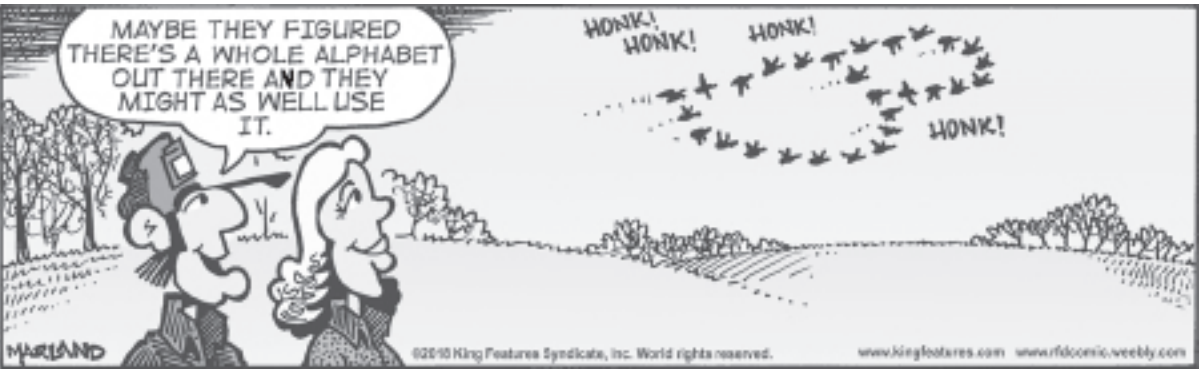

After Hep C is treated, what about cirrhosis?

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 59-year-old woman who was recently diagnosed with hepatitis C and cirrhosis. I have never been a drinker. I was treated with Harvoni for three months. I understand the medication is intended to cure the hepatitis C. What about the cirrhosis? My doctor hasn't explained any of my long-term effects from taking this. – C.J.



Hepatitis C is a common infection of the liver. It is caused by a virus, which can be transmitted by blood and blood products, as well as through sharing needles for injection drugs. It is rarely transmitted sexually.

Anyone with a history of injection drug use, who received blood transfusions or organ transplants before 1992, or who received clotting factors before 1987 should be tested, as should anyone with a known blood or sexual exposure to someone with hepatitis C. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention also recommends testing all adults born in the United States between 1945 and 1965, anyone who is HIV-infected, who received hemodialysis or was incarcerated.

The treatment you have taken (Harvoni) is a combination of ledipasvir and sofosbuvir, and has an excellent cure rate. The cure rate is 99 percent in people who had never been treated before and who did not have cirrhosis. Even people like you, with cirrhosis, had a cure rate of 94 percent with 12 weeks of therapy in the trial that got the medication approved.

Cirrhosis is liver damage and scarring as a result of liver disease. Once it has developed, it is not reversible; however, a successful cure of the hepatitis C virus greatly reduces the risk of further damage, specifically reducing the need for liver transplant and the rates of death, liver cancer and other liver-related complications.

These medications are so new that I can't estimate how much lower your risk of further damage to your liver is post-treatment; however, there is little doubt that your likely successful treatment will substantially improve your expected length and quality of life.

But, since you still have cirrhosis, you will need to take some important precautions. These include continued abstinence from alcohol, careful monitoring of prescription and non-prescription medications, avoiding raw shellfish and making sure your

immunizations are up-to-date. You should keep asking your gastroenterologist questions until you are satisfied. I recommend you make a list of questions to ask, and bring a friend to help make sure you understand the answers you get.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Should your blood pressure go higher as you age? Is the top number or the bottom more important? I don't like medicine, and my blood pressure was 145/82, but the top number sometimes goes to 150-158. – J.S.

Both the systolic (top number) and diastolic blood pressures are important, and the difference

between them is occasionally important (for example, a blood pressure of 160/60 is more worrisome than 160/85). Blood pressure does go up with age, but even in people over 60, the recommendation is still to get the BP down below 150, and I try to aim for 140 if there aren't too many side effects. It often takes several tries to find a regimen that gets the blood pressure where it should be without affecting quality of life.

Lazy provider faked blood-pressure readings

A potentially life-threatening practice had been going on at one of the Department of Veteran Affairs medical facilities, until the Office of the Inspector General caught them at it. A primary-care provider had been falsifying blood-pressure readings to cut down on the workload.

This is a big deal. High blood pressure can lead to all kinds of ugly outcomes such as stroke, kidney disease, heart failure and heart attack.

Specifically, the OIG responded to a report that the primary-care provider was entering fake blood-pressure readings into the patients' records, indicating normal readings. When the OIG investigated, the care provider had put 128/78 into the record for 83 percent of the patients. The OIG reached out to 10 patients with that reading and was told that their blood pressure hadn't been taken at all.

At that point the OIG looked

at 5,000 of that provider's patient records. Of those, 1,370 had conditions that required blood pressure to be tracked and controlled, and 1,364 of those had the same reading (128/78) entered into their record. In that group, 64 patients were ill with hypertension, which could have led to death. Additionally, lab work wasn't always done when prescription changes were ordered. The patients were scheduled for follow-up in nine months, no matter how serious their conditions.

Why on earth would a care provider falsify information like this? The OIG reported that the normal 128/78 reading was entered to turn off the clinical reminder – an automatic note to the physician about whether lab work, referrals or medication changes are needed – which served to reduce workload because a normal blood pressure would not require any other intervention or documentation.

Worse, the care provider may have received a performance bonus based on all the "improved" patient blood-pressure readings.

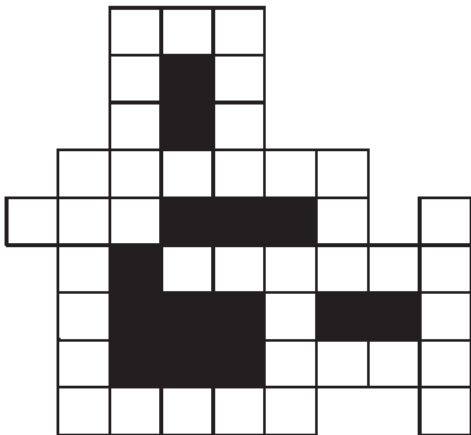
