## Canutillo ISD 60th anniversary event honors heritage, accomplishments

CANUTILLO – Today, Canutillo Independent School District (CISD), with its ten campuses serving more than 6,200 students, is considered one of the top-rated school districts in the region. To earn this recognition, the small rural school district had to overcome many challenges. To commemorate that arduous journey, CISD supporters are planning a big celebration for the district’s sixtieth anniversary.

Members of the Canutillo Alumni Foundation for Education (CAFÉ) announced recently that they will host a Diamond Jubilee celebration, from 6 to 12 p.m., Saturday, December 14, at the Grace Gardens Event Center, 6701 Westside Drive. The evening event will include dinner and feature live music, dancing, door prizes, a silent auction, and more. The public is invited to attend as tickets are currently on sale.

The 60th Diamond Jubilee event coordinator and CAFÉ charter member Sergio Martinez said that this event is a tribute to all of the accomplishments the district has achieved in the past six decades. “There have been so many good things come out of this district, and as supporters of the separate school campuses, we should join together to celebrate what CISD has achieved,” Martinez said.

Canutillo ISD, was established on April 18, 1959 by a group of concerned parents who felt that their children were being short-changed when it came to an adequate public-school education. Prior to CISD’s inception, an elementary school- located in the midst of the Canutillo community

and run by El Paso County public school officials- offered first through eighth grade classes only. Consequently, students who were interested in continuing their education after eighth grade had to travel nearly 20 miles to attend El Paso High School. With the support of local farmers and business owners, advocates for creating the new school district were successful and, in 1963, CISD graduated its first senior class.

The rural school district experienced growing pains throughout the years with bond issues being passed to support expansion. The first high school campus was built near the Rio Grande’s west bank on Bosque Road and opened for the 1974-75 school year. Canutillo Middle School on Talbot Road was opened in 1980.

In 1987, the district built Jose H. Damian Elementary School in the Borderland area and Deanna Davenport Elementary School in the Westway community. The growth steadily continued with the construction of Bill Childress Elementary School in the Vinton community in 1996 and the renovation of the original Canutillo Elementary School campus in 1998.

Eventually, the state-of-the-art Canutillo High School complex was opened in 2006 adjacent to El Paso Community College’s (EPCC) Northwest campus, which is next to the Interstate-10 Highway. Subsequently, the former high school facility was remodeled and converted into Canutillo Middle School, and the former middle school campus on Talbot Road was refurbished and renamed Jose J. Alderete Middle School.

In 2008, Gonzalo & Sofia Garcia Elementary School welcomed upper valley students, and that same year CISD partnered with EPCC to open the

Northwest Early College High School. CISD’s most recent campus opening was in 2015, when CISD christened the Silvestre and Carolina Reyes Elementary School for the district’s northwest community.

For the upcoming anniversary celebration, Salvador Payan, 1966 Canutillo HS graduate and current CISD board member, has been invited to share with attendees accounts of the district’s illustrious past; Martinez, a 1981 CHS graduate and the architect of the new CHS campus, will talk about the district’s latest accomplishments; with Dr. Pedro Galaviz, CISD superintendent, scheduled to present the district’s vision for the future. Musical entertainment will be provided by Mainstreet, a popular El Paso band composed of Canutillo natives.

Lilia ‘Teddy’ Martinez, a 1967 CHS graduate and CAFÉ charter member, affirmed that the proceeds from the event are earmarked for scholarship awards to CHS seniors who graduate at the end of this school year and enroll in a post-secondary education institution.

“CAFÉ has been able to provide thousands of dollars in scholarship awards to more than a hundred CHS graduates since it was formed in the 2003-04 school year,” asserted Teddy Martinez, who is also helping organize the anniversary festivities. “We are inviting everyone, especially CHS graduates and current and former employees, to join us celebrate the district’s many milestones,” she added.

# Fraud and anonymity: The perils of medical care bureaucracy

The high cost of medical care is on the lips of every politician and draining the pocketbooks of most Americans. After creating the Medicare/Medicaid monster, the government’s expanded intervention into the medical care marketplace with the inaptly named Affordable Care Act doubled the premiums and deductibles for both employer-sponsored and individual insurance. Piling on more laws, regulations, and agencies is not the answer.

Anonymity, complexity, and opacity invite shady behavior. Individuals, companies, and patients who defraud the massive federal “health system” would never dream of lifting money from their patients’ wallets or stealing from their doctors’ cash drawer.

The government’s track record does not bode well for imposing more bureaucracy to remedy a problem created by the layers of third-party payer bureaucracy. Waste, fraud, and abuse are so rampant that the government has a Medicare Strike Force to root out and recover lost federal funds. Medicare fraud – about \$60 billion in 2016 alone – is about 10 percent of Medicare’s total payments. By contrast the typical private business loses 5 percent of its revenues to fraud. Unfortunately, since its inception in March 2007, the Medicare Strike Force has recouped less than \$2 billion per year in misappropriated funds.

Medicare’s \$16.7 billion per year hospice program is fertile ground for the unscrupulous. Hospices are paid a fixed daily sum for each patient enrolled “regardless of the services provided.” One amoral scheme recruits patients who unknowingly forgo curative treatment options by joining hospice. A recent Office of Inspector General (OIG) report revealed that in 2012 hospices billed Medicare more than \$250 million for services to patients in long-term care or assisted-living residences who did not require hospice care, costing four times more than the appropriate level of care. Even worse, the OIG found that the quality of care suffered in 31 percent of programs. The bureaucratic morass allows the perpetrators to pocket the fixed fee and skimp on the services.

Further, the government cannot keep track of its program dollars. According to another OIG audit, in 2009, Medicare Prescription Drug program paid \$33.6 million and hospice patients paid \$3.8 million for medications that should have been included in the hospice daily fee. Even after discovering the snafu, the problem got exponentially worse. In 2016 the government paid \$160.8 million for drugs that hospice organizations should have paid for from its fixed daily fee. Our tax dollars paid for the drugs twice.

Physicians know what patients want and are acting on it. Free from the restraints of government “health care” programs, the physician-led, price-transparent, direct-pay Surgery Center of Oklahoma performs some surgeries for less than the copays of some insurance policies. Direct Primary Care physicians provide 24/7 access and basic labs for as little as \$50 per month with at-cost medications and low-priced x-rays.

The corporate private sector has learned a thing or two from innovative physicians. Care Accelerator is Sam’s Club’s version of “affordable [medical care] options with transparent pricing.” To offer relief from high out-of-pocket costs, \$50 (individual) to \$240 per year (families) buys access to lab screening for diabetes and heart disease, free generic drugs, telehealth, and up to a 30 percent discount on vision, dental, and other ancillary services. Additionally, Walmart is training its own employees for jobs in the health sector and ideally to staff Walmart’s own medical services. For their employees, Apple has “health care built around you” with its AC Wellness that offers office and home visits; Amazon launched its Amazon Care telemedicine services.

Given the outrageous price of drugs – largely due to the pharmacy benefit manager middlemen – Good Rx discount coupons are just what the doctor ordered. Good Rx is free to the consumer and makes money from advertisements on the website and referral fees. One typical victory is a Medicare patient whose neurologist prescribed a drug for his Parkinson’s disease symptoms. The government demanded testing that could not be done because of the patients debilitated condition. Despite a sympathetic ear and supporting research, the government arbiter could only parrot the party line: because the drug was not on the “list,” it was not covered by Medicare. In a fortunate twist of fate, with a Good Rx coupon the patient paid \$34 per month cash instead of the drug’s \$1,100 per month price with 20 percent patient co-pay that would have been charged through the Medicare Prescription Drug program.

Congress claims it plans a full-frontal attack on the high cost of medical care (with the same results as the war on poverty and drugs?). Frankly, we are better off with Congress engrossed in its impeachment clown show and keeping its nose out of our medical business.

- On Dec. 6, 1865, the 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, officially ending the institution of slavery, is ratified when Georgia votes to ratify. Mississippi, however, would not submit documentation to abolish slavery until 2013.
- On Dec. 7, 1805, explorers Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, having made a difficult trip across the rugged Rockies, set up winter camp near the mouth of the Columbia River. They named it Fort Clatsop, after the local Indian tribe.
- On Dec. 8, 1980, John Lennon, a former member of the Beatles, is shot and killed by Mark David Chapman, an obsessed fan, in New York City. Chapman was sentenced to 20 years to life, and he remains behind bars at Attica Prison in New York.

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# The foolhardy campaign against ‘endless wars’

Barack Obama and Donald Trump are diametrically opposed figures, representing the categorical rejection of the other for his supporters, yet they share significant foreign-policy DNA.

They both defined themselves in opposition to George W. Bush’s foreign policy. Obama probably wouldn’t have defeated Hillary Clinton for the 2008 Democratic nomination if she hadn’t voted for the Iraq War and if he didn’t speak out against it at the time. Likewise, Trump outpaced all his 2016 GOP rivals in denouncing our Middle East commitments.

Obama represented the internationalist left, while Trump is the champion of the populist right, and there are important policy differences between the two (Obama cut the Iran nuclear deal; Trump withdrew from it). Yet, in his pullback from the Syrian border, exposing our Kurdish allies to a Turkish invasion, Trump now has his own version of Obama’s foolhardy pullout from Iraq that created the opening for the rise of ISIS.

The cost of Trump’s decision is a betrayal of the Kurds, a worsening relationship with Turkey, a possible lifeline for ISIS and a boost to the influence of Russia, which should be able to leverage it for continued

strategic gains in the region.

The pullback has managed, astonishingly enough, to alienate both the Kurds and Turkey from the United States. Usually, given the historic enmity between the two, it’s possible to alienate only one at a time. After we dumped them, the Kurds have fallen into the arms of the Assad regime in Syria, while Turkey will be as hostile to the U.S. as ever once Congress gets done trying to punish it for its invasion.

Just like Obama’s withdrawal from Iraq, Trump’s pullback in Syria is a belated reaction to the Iraq War. Obviously, there is no political support on the right or left for invading and occupying a Middle Eastern country again. But there’s a vast distance between the height of the occupation of Iraq, when we had 150,000 troops fighting a war of counterinsurgency, and our minimal commitment in Syria aimed at creating and supporting a proxy force to do the hard fighting against ISIS.

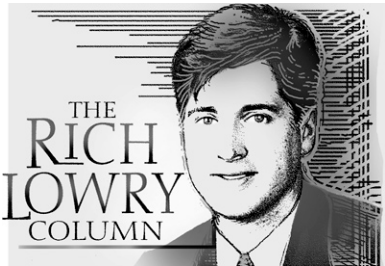
To throw both the Syria and Iraq interventions together under the rubric of “endless war” is to fail to make distinctions. It’s senseless to oppose a relatively cost-free action in Syria that has succeeded in its own terms (the ISIS caliphate has been

defeated) because the Iraq War was fought for years at a high cost with dubious results. It’d be like opposing the invasion of Grenada because the invasion of Normandy required so much blood and treasure.

The long-standing American military reflex is to win and go home, but it’s rare that even the most clear-cut victory is so neat. We won a decisive conventional military victory in World War II in

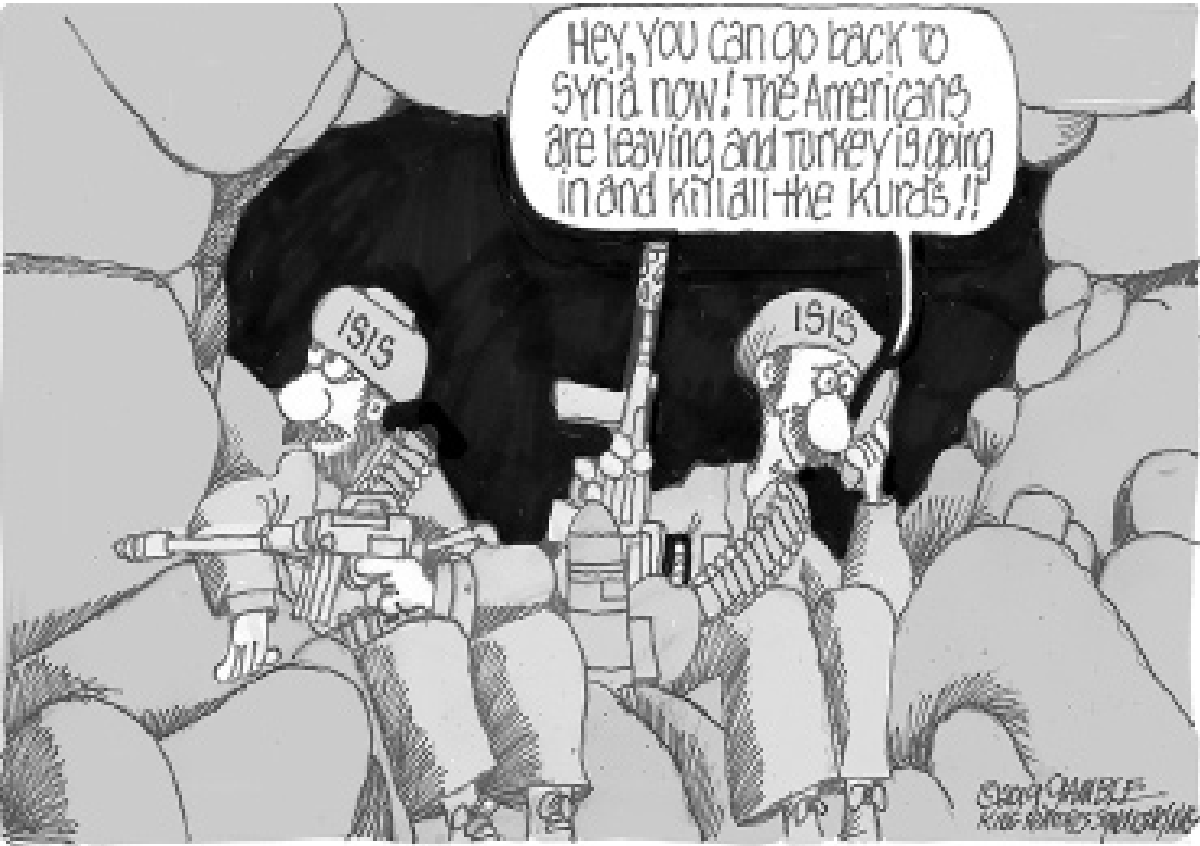
Europe, and we still have troops in Germany. The first Gulf War is supposed to be the model of a rigorously limited commitment, but it still resulted in a no-fly zone over Iraq, the creation of an autonomous region for the Kurds in the north and a constant effort to enforce U.N. sanctions.

Nor is getting out as clean as advertised. Obama triumphantly exited Iraq, only to have to go back in when things spun out



of control. If Trump wants to be done with Syria, it might not be done with him.

Study shows too many American don’t know symptoms of heart attack

New research shows that some 13.5 million adults in the U.S. could not identify a single symptom of a heart attack – not even that chest pains are an obvious sign of a cardiac event. The study was conducted for a recent scientific gathering sponsored by the American Heart Association (AHA). It was based on findings of data gathered by the Centers for Disease Control in a massive 2017 National Health Interview Survey among more than 25,000 U.S. adults. According to the AHA, “About 805,000 Americans have a heart attack each year, and about 15% of them die from it. Because early intervention is so critical, health officials have spent decades trying to improve public knowledge of heart attack symptoms and the appropriate emergency response.” Dan Weber, president of the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC), notes that cardiovascular disease is of particular concern for seniors. “The American College of Cardiology says that more than a million American adults will have a cardiac event this year and that the average age of heart attack victims is 65.6 years for men and 72 percent for women. It’s as you get older it is critical to be aware of the symptoms so that you can get help quickly.” However, according to Harvard Medical School about

45% heart attacks are what is known as silent heart attacks. “They are described as “silent” because when they occur, their symptoms lack the intensity of a classic heart attack, such as extreme chest pain and pressure; stabbing pain in the arm, neck, or jaw; sudden shortness of breath; sweating, and dizziness.”

These silent myocardial infarctions (SMI) are more common in men than in women. And, because the symptoms of SMIs can be so mild, its victims can readily ignore them, attributing them to the aches and pains of old age, for example.

“It’s a good reason to get regular checkups, especially as you get on in years,” suggests AMAC’s Weber. Meanwhile, the Harvard report on SMIs, recommends that if you experience suspicious discomfort, whatever the reason,

you should see your doctor as soon as possible.

According to that report, “suspicious discomfort” includes:

- Discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts several minutes or goes away and comes back. It can feel like an uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, or pain.
- Discomfort in other upper-body areas, such as one or both arms, the back, the neck, the jaw, or the stomach.
- Shortness of breath before or during chest discomfort.
- Breaking out in a cold sweat or feeling nauseated or lightheaded.

Daughter got measles despite vaccination

DEAR DR. ROACH: My daughter is 4 years old and has, in the past five days, developed measles. She was vaccinated at 9 months and has been treated with antibiotics, Tylenol and vitamin A supplements. What concerns me is that she is now experiencing seizures, even without a fever. They are not grand mal seizures, but simple ones. They have me worried. What can I do? – G.A.



Measles remains a serious disease in many parts of the world, with 90,000 deaths reported in 2016. Even in industrialized nations, there have been outbreaks involving tens of thousands of people infected.

Vitamin A supplementation may be of value in those who are deficient, and Tylenol can help keep the fever down, reducing the risk of febrile seizures. The antiviral drug ribavirin sometimes is used, though without clear evidence of effectiveness. Otherwise, there are no effective antibiotics or other treatments for measles.

When seizures occur in a child with measles in absence of fever, it can indicate a complication called encephalitis – inflammation of the brain. Children also may experience nausea and vomiting, and they usually have a headache. Confusion and sleepiness are other common symptoms. The diagnosis can be confirmed by an evaluation of the fluid around the brain, the cerebrospinal fluid, which is sampled via a needle inserted into the lower back.

Confirmed encephalitis with measles is treated with steroids. This reduces the risk of permanent brain damage from the infection. Even so, 25% of children may be left with some impairment, including epilepsy.

Unfortunately, vaccination at 9 months is not adequate protection. Children’s immune systems may not be able to fully respond to the vaccine so early. Children are recommended to have the measles vaccine at 12-15 months and again at 4 to 6 years in the United States. In countries where risk of measles mortality remains high, children are vaccinated at 9 months, then again at 15-18 months. During an outbreak, a dose may be given as early as 6 months old, in addition to the other two doses.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I get horrible fever blisters when I go on any tropical vacation and am exposed to lasting sun. These

blisters develop on my lower lip. I have tried sunscreen, but nothing has worked. On my most recent trip, the blisters appeared on the final day and took nearly three weeks to heal. It's painful and horribly embarrassing. Is there anything I can do? Should I see my dermatologist? – S.A.

The sun can cause many kinds of skin reactions. In some people, the light itself causes the problem (these reactions are called photodermatoses). In others, the sun causes a reaction in combination with exposure to a particular substance. Sometimes, it's a fruit, especially limes. In people with blisters around the mouth, I think of mangoes,

especially if you are enjoying them in the tropics. Some skin diseases just get worse in the sun: Lupus is the classic example, but there are many others (my textbook lists about 50, some quite rare). A dermatologist is indeed the person to see. In the meantime, wear sun-protective clothing on your next tropical vacation, and consider a blocking sunscreen like zinc oxide in the areas where the blistering has occurred in the past.

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Jobs and careers for military spouses

If you are debating whether to re-up and one of your concerns is your spouse's employment opportunities, perhaps the Military Spouse Employment Partnership (MSEP) program will help you decide. There are currently 350,000 job listings for military spouses on the MSEP website. In a partnership with 390 employers, the Department of Veterans Affairs has expanded opportunities as part of its Department of Defense MSEP program. Those employers have committed to hire, promote, recruit and retain military spouses in portable jobs. At this point they have hired over 134,000 military spouses. Portable means you can take your skills with you, possibly to one of the many other employers in the program, should you need to relocate. There are big names in the list, but not just retailers

or convenience stores. Also included are organizations with community networks that provide career resources and mentoring, and federal agency partners. The program is part of the Spouse Education and Career Opportunities program that aims to reduce the horrible 25% wage gap that military spouses face. It offers career guidance, education, resources, tools, training, licensing and more. To search for open jobs, go online to [msepjobs.militaryonesource.mil/msep](http://msepjobs.militaryonesource.mil/msep) and click Search Jobs, or call 800-342-9647 to speak to a career coach. You'll need to sign up. Once you reach your personal online dashboard, you can search by location or special skills. Or if you think you're not quite ready to land a job, go online to [myseco.militaryonesource.mil](http://myseco.militaryonesource.mil). Click on career exploration, education and training, and employment readiness. Do not miss the list of coaching packages further down the page. They have everything to get you ready, some very specialized: health care coaching package, cybersecurity coaching

package, K-12 education coaching package and more. If you want to advance your career, there is a scholarship program with funds up to \$4,000 in tuition assistance.

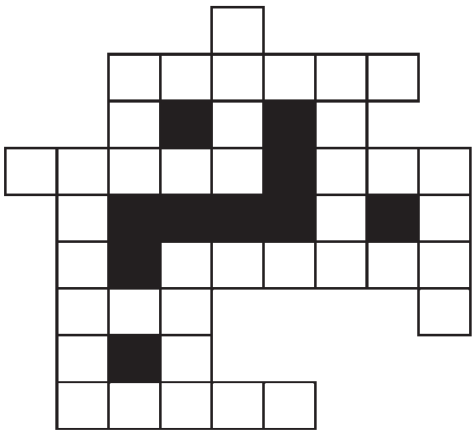
