Census counting deadline is still not decided

NATION – As the United States began to grapple with the COVID-19 pandemic last spring, U.S. government officials, including the president, acknowledged that more time would be needed to complete the 2020 Census, and they proposed a four-month extension, which would put the delivery of the final census count report due in April of 2021.

But then in August, Census Bureau personnel announced unexpectedly that all counting efforts would end on September 30, with the final census tally report to be finalized and delivered to the president by the end of the year, December 31, 2020.

However, in an internal bureau analysis, census officials warned that if serious errors were to be discovered in the data, they may not be able to fix them within the scheduled completion date because of the time necessary to research and understand the root cause of the problem.

Subsequently, a coalition led by the National Urban League initiated a legal challenge to provide the U.S. Census Bureau with more time to tally the country's population and review results, which are used to determine the distribution of federal funding and political representation for the next decade.

The coalition's efforts convinced a uncertainty. federal judge in California, U.S. District

Operation Connectivity in San Elizario ISD

SAN ELIZARIO – Operation Connectivity (OC) is a statewide initiative, which aims to provide a connection to the internet Coronavirus Relief Fund. in addition to increasing the availability of devices for school

districts, students, and families throughout Texas. The OC project began in the Dallas Independent School District (DISD) and is now a partnership and collaborative effort which includes Governor Greg Abbott and the Texas Education Agency (TEA) and hopes to provide internet connectivity to hundreds of thousands of students throughout the state. The San Elizario ISD (SEISD) is one of the participating districts that applied for Operation Connectivity assistance.

SEISD will be receiving matching funds through the statewide bulk purchasing program. As part of the process SEISD entered into an interlocal acquisition agreement with Region 4 to purchase devices. After careful review of existing District devices and the device specifications offered through the bulk purchase program, the SEISD submitted a request to purchase the following devices and quantities:

- Hotspots (unlimited data): 300 Districtwide;
- Dell Laptops: 205 Garcia-Enriquez Middle School;
- HP Chromebooks: 321 Elementary Schools; and

• Apple iPads: 115 – Loya Primary.

The total cost for the devices was \$240,682. The 50% matching rate will allow for SEISD to only pay for \$120,341, which will be covered through ESSER funds. The other 50% was to be matched by The Texas Education Agency through the


As part of this OC initiative, TEA also had the Coronavirus


Relief Fund (CFR) Bulk-Purchase Local Reimbursement Program participating school districts. With this Local Match Reimbursement Program, TEA would contribute a \$1 per \$1 match for any funds contributed to school districts by local City and County entities towards this OC initiative.

On August 10, 2020, the County of El Paso unanimously approved the commitment of matching funds to regional school districts. As a result of this commitment from the County

of El Paso, San Elizario was awarded \$60,171 which means that TEA would contribute an additional \$60,171 through the Local Match Reimbursement Program thus bringing down San Elizario ISD's original 50% share of \$120,341 down to \$0.

Superintendent Dr. Meza-Chavez states, "This is the result of the collective effort by Cabinet Team Members such as Mr. Norberto Rivas, the Chief Financial Officer, and Mr. Horacio Hernandez, the Technology Director, along with the Texas Education Agency and that of the local county of El Paso when there is this type of collaboration, students win."

Surviving COVID-19: A new model to stop deaths of lives and businesses

The COVID death rate in the United States is one of the highest in the world, even with our advanced medical care delivery and resources. Many less affluent countries have death rates 20 times lower than the U.S., even with fewer hospitals, doctors, nurses and high tech equipment.

What is the common factor that accounts for the marked difference in death rates?

It is quite simply this: Other countries use EARLY OUTPATIENT TREATMENT with widely available antiviral medicines, begun at the first signs of symptoms, usually without waiting extra days for test results to confirm the physician's clinical diagnosis.

The LATE STAGE treatment model promoted by Dr. Fauci and FDA's Dr. Hahn has been for U.S. patients to be sent home to self-quarantine until symptoms worsened, and then go into the hospital safe, FDA-approved when seriously ill with respiratory distress hydroxychloroquine and heart damage. Only then do patients get offered medication, oxygen support, steroids, anti-coagulants, and others that typically don't work as well at this critical illness stage.

But home therapy could prevent thousands of hospitalizations and deaths, according to a just-published article¹ from the respected American Journal of Medicine. The U.S. urgently needs to implement this early successful model. Lead author Peter McCullough, M.D., a cardiologist at Baylor, one of the most widely published physicians in America, is not just theorizing. He is actually treating COVID patients at home.

Dr. McCullough's recommendation would clearly save lives using cheap,

medicines² (HCQ) azithromycin or doxycycline, possibly ivermectin or colchicine, inhaled budesomide or oral steroids, home oxygen concentrators, plus supplemental zinc, vitamin C and vitamin D.

The supply of HCQ has been ramped up to handle its use in early treatment of COVID, but we have millions of doses in the Strategic National Stockpile deteriorating in government warehouses – vital medicine that is not being distributed because, for political reasons, doctors are still not prescribing for COVID-19 outpatients.

Why don't Americans have the freedom to use HCQ as in other countries? FDA's false narrative about HCQ causing harm to outpatients has led to more deaths with unprecedented restrictions on physicians'

off-label prescribing rights imposed by with state governors, medical boards and pharmacy boards. Thirty-seven states still restrict HCQ³.



Bill would give low-income families access to medical care and save billions in government healthcare costs

"The outbreak of the deadly coronavirus pandemic was introduced in the House of Representatives has made healthcare a 'top of mind' issue for most Americans, particularly among low-income citizens. "And, it has put a new focus on the 2020 Physician Pro Bono Care Act currently under consideration in Congress," according to the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC).

The legislation was designed to increase both choice and access to quality healthcare for the Nation's underprivileged. It would also save billions in government outlays for Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

Bob Carlstrom, president of AMAC Action, the association's advocacy affiliate, says he is encouraged by the bi-partisan support the measure has attracted among lawmakers. "The measure



It would allow physicians, dentists, and other healthcare providers to take a straightforward charitable tax deduction for providing pro-bono healthcare to Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) patients. introduced: "This bill removes government bureaucracy and redtape that obstructs the patientdoctor relationship, and it expands access to doctors for some of the more vulnerable in our society." Representative Peterson called it an "important reform."

By providing physicians with a charitable deduction for treating Medicaid and CHIP eligible patients in their communities, this legislation will provide lowincome families and individuals greater access to healthcare. Additionally, this concept avoids the administratively burdensome costly reimbursement processes of both Medicaid and CHIP, if a physician chooses to use it.

As for its appeal among healthcare community, the Carlstrom explained that a survey conducted by AMAC showed that members of associations representing 350,000 doctors and nurse practitioners would be willing to participate in such a plan. It means that, if each of them took on 20 eligible patients, seven million needy patients who would be covered.

"The net benefits would be that the low-income population, including many senior citizens, would have free access to quality healthcare from doctors they choose and the nation, as a whole, would save money. In fact, it is estimated that the government could save as much as \$40 billion a year, and maybe more, in Medicaid payments and costly emergency room visits, the 'go-to' alternative for people who can't afford to pay medical fees," says Carlstrom.

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

UTEP has another winnable game this weekend when they travel to Louisiana-Monroe, which has lost its first two games by 30 and 21 points.


Then the Miners start the toughest part of their schedule.





Do homework first on clinical trials

DEAR DR. ROACH: My wife has had dementia for over two years. There is an ad in our local paper for an Alzheimer's disease study. It says, "This study will assess how safe and effective an

investigational drug is at slowing the progression of early (prodromal) or mild Alzheimer's disease." Is this protocol legit? I don't trust this type of ad not coming from a hospital. I couldn't find any information about the sponsors of the research. -J.N.



I was able to find the trial, called the Graduate II trial,

which is sponsored by the manufacturer of the drug being tested, called gantenerumab. This drug is designed to reduce the size of the amyloid protein plaques in the brain, which are suspected of being the underlying cause of Alzheimer's disease, and to prevent new ones from forming. It is indeed a legitimate trial. The best place to find out about these is on the clinicaltrials.gov website.

The trial is in phase III. The drug has passed both phase I trials, which are designed to look at safety, and phase II, which look at both safety and effectiveness. Now the investigators are studying the effectiveness of the drug in a larger population, usually for a longer period of time. Drugs that do well in phase III clinical trials may be approved by the Food and Drug Administration. Alzheimer's drug trials are difficult, because the disease often progresses slowly, and large, time-consuming trials are necessary.

In general, I encourage people to consider participating in clinical trials, as they are essential for clinical advances. For gantenerumab in particular, phase I and II trials did show that the drug is effective at reducing the amount of amyloid plaque in the brain; however, clinical trials did not show improvement in memory and brain function. The new trial is using a higher dose and recruiting patients with earlier stage illness.

I don't have enough information to answer whether your wife, having had symptoms for two years, might be eligible for this trial, but I would certainly encourage you to find out more about it.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have recently started transitioning to a plantbased diet for preventative health reasons. While discussing the benefits of nuts and seeds with a dietitian, they had a disclaimer that flax seed can interfere with medications and to eat them two hours before or one hour after taking medications. I would not sit down and eat a handful of flax seeds, but now I am afraid to use them in the meals I prepare at all. Can you help me make a good decision? – J.E.

For people eating reasonable amounts (like a handful or two) of flax seeds as part of a meal, it is unlikely that they would interfere with medications enough to cause any significant problem, for most medications.

There are two situations that might merit concern: In powerful anti-clotting agents, such as clopidogrel, flax seeds might prompt increased activity. Secondly, flax seeds may lower blood sugar a small amount. In combination with insulin or oral diabetes drugs, the blood sugar could possibly dip lower than expected. I doubt either of these interactions is likely to cause harm, but it is reasonable to discuss with your doctor if you are on one of the classes of medications mentioned.




