Canutillo ISD gets Comptroller's Star

Marfa's events offer unique getaway experience

About 200 miles, or about a three-and-a-half-hour drive east, from El Paso lies the quaint town of Marfa, TX. This unassuming community of old timers and outsiders is steadily transforming into West Texas' version of Santa Fe NM with

its growing number of art galleries, food places, and entertainment venues.

Today, Marfa is a thriving, vibrant settlement that is made up of about 2,000 souls – some whose great grandparents walked the dirt streets of this poor cattle and oil town in the olden days and others who have recently escaped from their hectic urban living in cities throughout the country if not the world.

Consequently, the combination of the old and new Marfa inhabitants has evolved into a unique demonstration of cultures, traditions, and values that have come together through art and music amid vast mountain landscapes and spacious skies.

This desert oasis has become an interesting getaway location for city dwellers from all over the country, but especially from the Southwest. Marfa's cool weather, magnificent star-filled night skies, and proximity to Ft. Davis, Balmorhea, and Alpine's various attractions offer West Texas families a memorial weekend getaway experience.

Three special events that having been attracting people to Marfa – and returning after a year hiatus due to the coronavirus pandemic- are the Marfa Lights Festival, the Trans-Pecos Festival of Music + Love, and the Chinati Weekend party.

The 34th annual Marfa Lights Festival was canceled last year along with most public events in town, but for its 35th year, Marfa's Chamber of Commerce is planning to bring the festival back in full force over Labor Day Weekend, Friday, September 3 through Sunday, September 5.

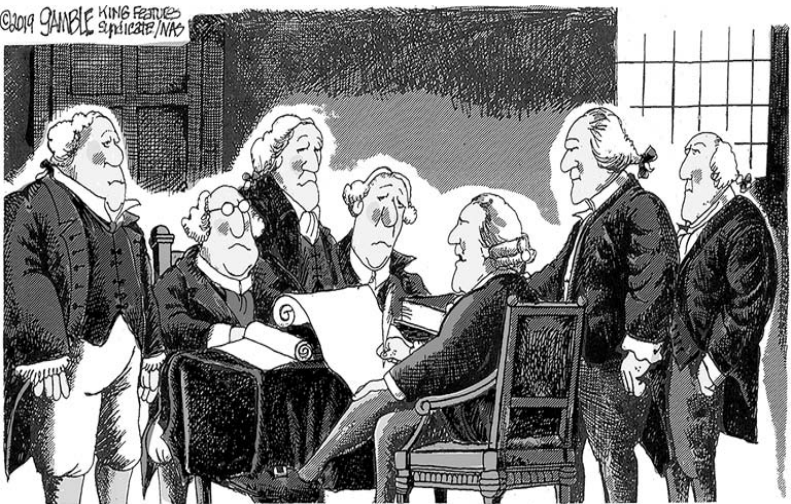

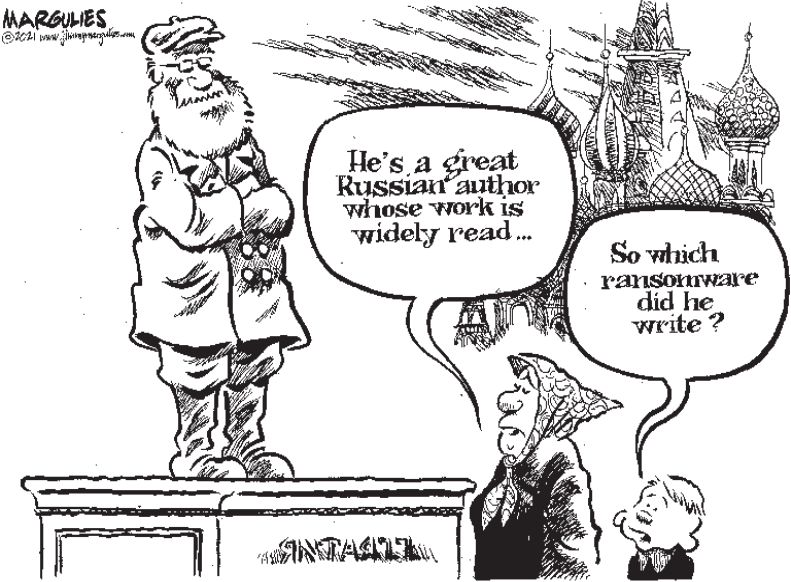

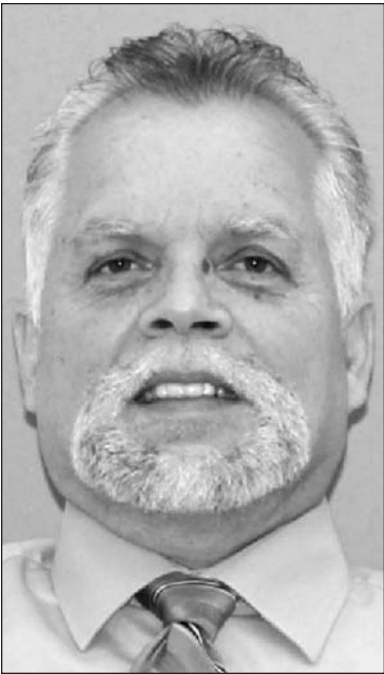

THE HISTORY CHANNEL

- On June 28, 1997, Mike Tyson bites Evander Holyfield’s ear in the third round of their heavyweight rematch. Though Holyfield was in obvious pain, the fight resumed after a brief stoppage, and then Tyson bit Holyfield’s other ear. Tyson was disqualified from the match and later suspended from boxing.
- On June 29, 1613, the Globe Theatre, where most of Shakespeare’s plays debuted, burns down. The Globe was built by Shakespeare’s acting company, the Lord Chamberlain’s Men, in 1599 from the timbers of London’s very first permanent theater, Burbage’s Theater, built in 1576.
- On June 30, 1936, Margaret Mitchell’s “Gone with the Wind,” one of the best-selling novels of all time and the basis for a blockbuster 1939 movie, is published. Scarlett’s name was originally Pansy, but a change was requested by the publisher.

- On July 1, 1979, the Sony Walkman goes on sale. Only 3,000 were sold in the first month, but after a massive advertising campaign, available stocks quickly sold out.
- On July 2, 1776, the Second Continental Congress, assembled in Philadelphia, formally adopts Richard Henry Lee’s resolution for independence from Great Britain. The vote was unanimous, with only New York abstaining.

- On July 3, 1989, Martha Ann Johnson is arrested in Georgia for the 1982 murder of her oldest child after an Atlanta newspaper initiated a new investigation into the suspicious death. Her three other children had also mysteriously died. Johnson’s case sparked a trend in which authorities look closely into the sudden deaths of young children.

- On July 4, 1884, in a ceremony held in Paris, the completed Statue of Liberty is formally presented to the U.S. ambassador as a commemoration of the friendship between France and the United States. The statue was then disassembled and shipped to New York City, where it would be reconstructed in 1886.

AYUDA's intent is to provide very low-income homeowners with necessary repair and rehabilitation work on their homes through a deferred loan program. **No funding is available at this time.**

Who may get this work done?
Homeowners who meet all of the following conditions may obtain assistance in the form of deferred loans.
• The homeowner must occupy the home.
• The home must be located in San Elizario, Fabens,Torrillo, Clint, Agua Dulce and Homestead Meadows.
• The home must be a single-family dwelling.
• Household income may not exceed very low-income limits established by the Department of Housing and Urban Development for each county.

AYUDA,INC makes efforts to assist applicants to complete applications. If an applicant is rejected, the client is sent a letter by mail explaining the status and the reason for the rejection. Applicants have the option to appeal a rejection.

What does very low-income mean?
• Very low-income – household income at or below 50% of El Paso County,Texas.

What kind of work can be done?
Funds can be used to cover costs of materials and labor that contribute to the structural integrity or longterm preservation of the unit, such as:
• repair or replacement of heating systems;
• electrical wiring;
• plumbing;
• repair or provision of structural support and foundations;
• repair/replacement of roofs and windows;
• replacement of severely deteriorated siding, porches or stoops;
• alterations to provide handicap accessibility; and
• additions to dwellings only when necessary to alleviate overcrowding or eliminate a health hazard.

How much work will be done?
The amount of the work will be determined based on the repair and rehabilitation needs of each individual home, dollars available, severity (urgency) of the situation, and availability of other funds.

ADULTS AND YOUTH UNITED DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION, INC. USDA – SECTION 533 - 2021 HOUSING PRERVATION GRANT PROPOSAL STATEMENT OF ACTIVITIES

A (1)Type and Condition for Financial Assistance for Housing Preservation – Adults and Youth United Development Association, Inc. (AYUDA) is requesting \$103,626.00 USDA Housing Preservation Grant (HPG) Funding to provide grants to low- and very-low income homeowners to assist with critical repair and rehabilitation of their homes. A 2021 HPG award will enable AYUDA to allocate up to \$8,000 HPG funds per household, leveraged with an additional \$2,000 from our own funds to assist eight households. Assistance will be provided in the form of a grant to fund health and safety related repairs. We intend to assist 6 very-lowincome households and 2 low-income households with this grant, using HUD’s median income guidelines for our area to qualify the applicants. Specifically, this means that applicants must have monthly-adjusted household income that falls at or below HUD median income guidelines for 50% (very low) and 80% (low) AMFI). AYUDA will assure and document that applicants meet USDA homeowner requirements by reviewing their legal ownership documents relating to their homestead. Prior to providing assistance, AYUDA will require the recipients to sign a statement that they plan to continue living in the home as their primary residence. AYUDA will not retain any type of security instrument or impose any deed restrictions on the assistance. Having worked in this area for more than 20 years, and having gained extensive knowledge of the residents, we do not anticipate that recipients will sell their homes to profit from the assistance the program will provide. AYUDA's HPG Program will be limited to homeowners; rental units will not be included in this project. The total amount AYUDA will leverage from its own funds for the HPG Project is \$22,450.

A (2) Process for Selecting Recipients for HPG Assistance – AYUDA will announce the program upon notification of award. The announcement will be posted in prominent places frequented by residents such as municipal offices, stores, health clinics and other community venues. It will also issue a press release to local media entities. Additionally, AYUDA will revisit the waiting list for assistance from its other housing programs who meet HPG requirements. Applicants will be considered on a first-come, first-served basis. All recipients will be screened to meet the income and one-year minimum homeownership requirements and the applicant must intend to continue to live in the property at the time assistance is provided. Applicants with incomplete applications will be notified in writing as to the reason their application is incomplete and will be given the opportunity to complete it. Determination letters will be sent to applicants within 30 days. Persons with eligible applications will be notified as to whether the applicant was selected for the program, placed on a waiting list, or disqualified based on the criteria established for the program. An applicant not selected for assistance will be given the specific reason(s) for rejection and given the opportunity to have their determination reviewed by the Executive Director.

Determining Housing Preservation Needs in the Dwelling – Preliminary inspections of the homes will be conducted by Program Director and a procured licensed home Inspector for each selected HPG recipient to determine the rehabilitation needs of the home, and to develop a Scope of Work and Cost Estimate. AYUDA will use the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affair’s (TDHCA’s) Work Write-Up Tool for the home assessment. Eligible repairs include, but will not be limited to: repairing or replacing electrical wiring, roofs, windows, insulation, heating system, water and waste disposal system, and installing handicap accessibility features. The Work Write-Up tool will be accompanied by photographs of the existing deficiencies and/or conditions. From this, the licensed Inspector will develop a detailed Scope of Work and Cost Estimate. Applicants with homes that are in need of repairs and rehabilitation beyond the scope of the HPG Program will be considered for the HUD HOME Program. (AYUDA has consistently been awarded funds from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs for approximately 20 years.)

Performing the Necessary Work – The Program Director, Inspector, and the homeowner will meet in-person to discuss the Scope of Work which will be given to the homeowner for review, approval and signature(s). The homeowner will be provided with a copy. AYUDA will solicit contractors for the project from those who have previously performed satisfactorily on its other housing programs but will also make the announcement available with the Workforce Development Office and the local housing authorities to assure that Section 3 eligible individuals have the opportunity to participate in the program. Bids will be reviewed by the Program Director and by the Executive Director to assure that the bids align with the Scope of Work and are reasonable and appropriate. The lowest, most reasonable bid will be awarded the project. Selected contractors will be required to sign a contract that will include specifications, materials and time for completion, and a one year warranty among other things.

Monitoring/Inspecting Work Performed – Monitoring will include a pre-construction walk thorough, progress monitoring and a final inspection. The Inspector will monitor and approve construction at intervals stated in the contract. Inspections will be required and work must be satisfactorily performed before AYUDA pays the contractor’s invoices. Inspections will include photographs of work in progress. Ten percent of the contract amount will be retained and will be paid within ten days of a satisfactorily completed punch list.

A (3) Process for Coordinating with other Housing Rehabilitation Organizations Regarding Preservation of Historic Properties – AYUDA will submit the addresses and other relevant information to the Texas State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) upon qualifying selected applicants and will await their response as to whether the property is classified as historic or not. AYUDA will only begin working on a property upon receipt of a letter from the SHPO declaring “no significant impact” on historical or archeological concerns or whether the address is registered in the National Register. Should a selected property be eligible for the National Register, AYUDA will follow the SHPO’s direction for use of materials and

A (4) Development Standards – AYUDA will use the Rural Development Standards for Existing Dwellings for this project and will assure that all activities will meet the Thermal Standards for Existing Structures per RHS Subpart A of Part 1924.

A (7) Estimated Number of Low- and Very-Low Income Individuals and non-minority individuals the HPG Will Assist – if given an award, AYUDA will allocate six of the eight recipients for very-low income households and two for low-income. Given the demographics of the target area, we anticipate that all of the recipients will be minority individuals. AYUDA will give full and equal consideration to ALL applicants, regardless of their race, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, religion, sex, or disability.

A (8) Geographical Area to be Served – AYUDA will implement the HPG Program in the USDA designated rural areas of eastern El Paso County, TX. These areas lie east of the City of El Paso and include the following: Agua Dulce CDP, Homestead Meadows South, Homestead Meadows North, Clint, San Elizario and Fabens. Until recently, these areas were designated as *colonias* by the Texas Attorney General's

Office, but recently, the office has discontinued updating or posting the changes. These areas, while inside the El Paso MSA are distinctly rural in nature and population, and are not eligible for HUD CDBG funds for housing programs for which City residents may qualify. At the time of this writing the County of El Paso has no resources available for home repairs for its residents.

A (10) Indirect Cost Proposal – Not Applicable

A (11) Description of Accounting System – AYUDA uses QuickBooks accounting software for paying invoices, balancing bank accounts and developing financial reports. It undergoes annual audits as required by law and its grantors. Its accounting policies conform to OMB Circular A- 122 Cost Principles for Non-Profit Organizations. If given an award, a separate unit accounting will be conducted for each of the eight HPG assisted units. AYUDA's Program & Fiscal Manager and has 12 years of experience with government-funded programs. Both the Executive Director and the Board of Directors review both internal financial statements and the annual audit.

A (12) Method of Evaluation – AYUDA will evaluate its effectiveness by having recipients complete a satisfaction survey upon the completion of repairs. It will also use the information from the quarterly reports to USDA/RD. The program will be considered successful when it meets the number of completed projects described in the Statement of Activities and the majority of recipients provide positive reviews.

A (13) Source and Estimated Amount of Other Financial Resources – AYUDA will contribute \$22,450 of its own funds to leverage the HPG program. The source of these funds is program income generated from its rental properties. AYUDA obtained five single family homes which are used as rental properties as a result of participation in its HUD Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP2). The program was closed in 2015 and since five years have passed since close-out, the income generated from these rentals has been re-classified as unrestricted funds.

A (14) Use of Program Income – Not Applicable as no program income will be received – USDA funds are on a reimbursement basis, therefore no interest will be earned on federal funds. Additionally, AYUDA will not charge any fees to applicants or participants.

(15) Plan for Disposition of Security Instruments – No security instruments will be held for the HPG Program as the assistance will be provided in the form of a grant.

A (16) Other Useful Information – AYUDA will adhere to all applicable local, State, and Federal regulations during the implementation of the HPG Program. AYUDA has been implementing housing programs for nearly 20 years and has developed the expertise and experience needed to implement this program. It has a long-standing relationship with Housing Assistance Council (HAC) and has access to technical assistance, if needed. It also has relationships with other non-profit organizations who frequently call AYUDA to cross-refer clients. This positions AYUDA to implement a highly successful HPG project in El Paso.

A (17) Outreach Efforts – AYUDA will announce the availability of the program at the County of El Paso's Self Help Center, local municipal offices, health centers, local stores and with community partners such as Texas A & M Colonia Program and on local radio stations as PSA's, and of course, at its own community center. It will also publish an announcement in the West Texas Courier, a paper with readership in the outlying county areas.

NBA playoffs have produced a whole new crop of stars

When the 2021 version of the NBA playoffs got underway, we were all aware of the superstars who would be involved. We all knew the names of guys like LeBron James, Kawhi Leonard, Chris Paul, James Harden, Kevin Durant, Anthony Davis, Russell Westbrook, Kyrie Irving, Damien Lillard, Paul George, Giannis Antetokounmpo and Joel Embiid. But one of the best things about this season’s playoffs, has been the emergence of young players who are undoubtably the future of the league. Though some of them have been in the league for two, three, or four years, these playoffs are the first time they’ve been in

the national spotlight, and they’re making the best of their opportunities. And the most amazing thing of all is that they’re all between 21 and 24 years of age. The one player who I’d say about 95 percent of the country hadn’t seen before is Memphis Grizzlies point guard Ja Morant. And though Memphis was knocked out in the first round, everyone knows who Ja Morant is now. Morant, who is only 21 years old, averaged 30.2 points and 8.2 assists in his five playoff games. In his two years in the NBA, Morant had averaged 18 points a game, but if the rest of his career is similar to this year’s playoff performance, you’re looking at a perennial all-star. The Boston Celtics were bounced in the first round by the Brooklyn Nets. But that doesn’t take anything away from the play

of Jayson Tatum. The 23-year-old Tatum averaged 30.6 points in his five playoff games. And talk about improving every year, in his first four seasons in the NBA, Tatum’s scoring has gone from 13.9 to 15.7 to 23.4 to 26.4; his rebounding has gone from 5.0 to 6.0 to 7.0 to 7.4, and his assists from 1.6 to 2.1 to 3.0 to 4.3. Imagine what he’ll be doing when he’s 30. The Dallas Mavericks lost to the L.A. Clippers in the first round, but the star of that series was Luka Doncic. At just 22 years of age, Doncic is already an NBA star, but nobody had really seen him on the big “playoff” stage. Doncic averaged 35 points a game in his seven games and went over 40 three times. Luka, who finished sixth in this year’s

MVP voting, should keep the Mavs in the championship hunt for a long time. The Utah Jazz had the best regular-season record in the league but were knocked out of the playoffs by the Clippers. Even so, it feels like the Jazz will be one of the top NBA teams for years to come, mainly because of star guard Donovan Mitchell. Though he’s only 24, Mitchell is already the vocal leader of the team. He averaged 32.3 points a game in his 10 playoff games and 26.4 during the season. The best thing about Mitchell is that he isn’t afraid of the moment and wants the ball in his hands with the game on the line. The surprise team of the playoffs has been the Atlanta Hawks. And where would the Hawks be without star point guard Trae Young?

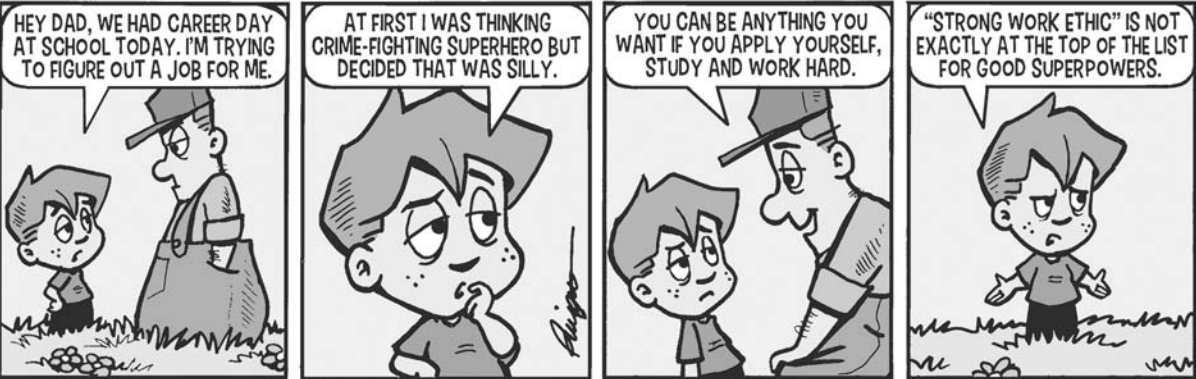

Commercial lab tests vs genetic counseling

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have a daughter (almost 31 years) who is concerned about Charcot-Marie-Tooth syndrome. Her maternal grandmother has been diagnosed with that condition. She is interested in seeking out a genetic test for the condition to learn if she is susceptible. She was referred to a commercial, direct-to-consumer laboratory for the test. How likely is it that a lab test for this specific condition would be accurate? Should she be doing all of this through either a particular type of genetics counselor or her private physician (internist) rather than an independent effort? – R.C.



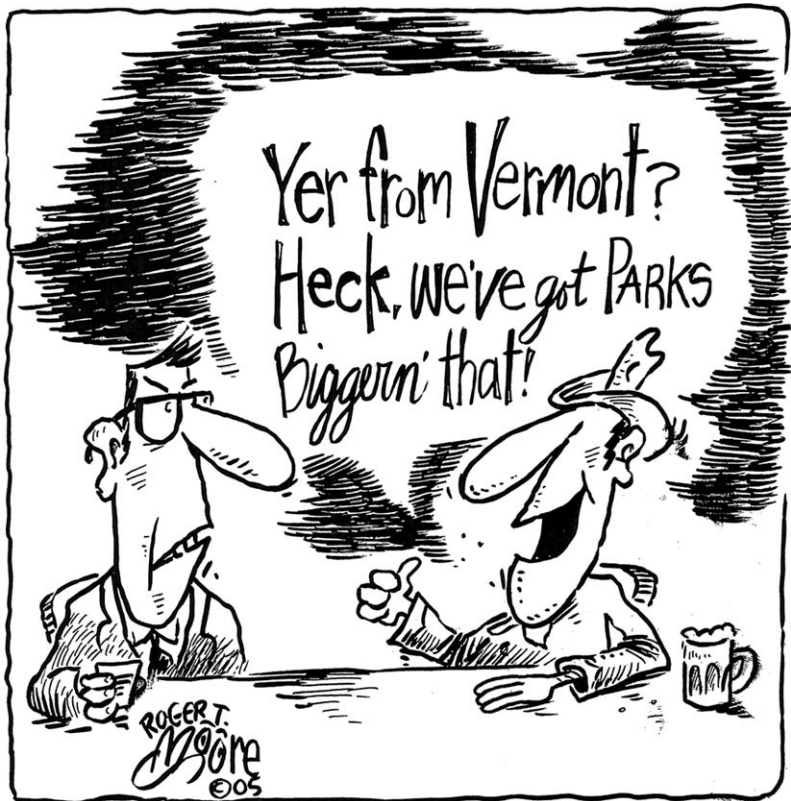
Charcot-Marie-Tooth disease is the eponym given to a family of hereditary motor sensory neuropathies: diseases that affect the nerves that carry the impulses necessary for movement and sensation. The initial symptoms are most commonly weakness and atrophy in the feet, followed by similar problems in the hands and sensory changes. The diagnosis may be made by EMG testing (electromyography, a needle study of the electrical activity of the muscles), but genetic testing is another way of making the diagnosis. If her grandmother has a known mutation, then genetic testing is likely to give her confirmation of her own status. Commercial genetic testing is certainly available, and probably accurate. However, I would still recommend a visit to a genetic counselor. This may require a referral from her primary-care doctor. The correct test to order, and its interpretation, depends on the exact diagnosis of her grandmother’s condition, since there are many genetic variations of Charcot-Marie-Tooth. It is likely that your daughter will have questions after the test results, and the benefit of having an experienced clinician there to answer them would be invaluable.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I’m an 81-year-old man. About two years ago, I began to realize that my testicles were shrinking, and they are now about the size of a marble. I have asked my primary care doctor and urologist about this, and the reply is that nothing can be done about it. I have read that boxer shorts are recommended to keep the testicles cooler and healthier. I am wondering whether my extensive time sitting at a desk and reading could be related to my shrinking testicles. Or is it related to erectile dysfunction, which is caused by decreased blood flow? I have ED. My last testosterone result was about 500. Is there nothing that can be done, not even any exercises? – L.D.

The medical term for what’s happening to you is “testicular atrophy,” and it has several possible causes. Age alone is one: At age 81, many men have noticed some shrinkage in testicular size, but yours is beyond the norm. You are right that cooler temperatures are healthier for the testicles, but again, I am a little surprised by the severity of your description. Among the other common causes are a history of trauma or infection. However, any underlying cause can also affect the ability of the testicles to make testosterone. Your blood testosterone level is surprisingly normal for your age (400-500 is the average for a man in his 80s). A low testosterone is a common cause of erectile dysfunction (poor blood flow is only one cause of ED). After two years, it is very unlikely that any treatments will affect the testicles now, unfortunately.

The Department of Veterans Affairs just celebrated its 75th year of using volunteers to run programs for veterans. In that time they’ve toted up 1 billion hours of volunteer time. Last year alone, 46,000 volunteers worked 4.4 million service hours and gave \$108 million worth of gifts and donations.

That’s huge, and it’s a credit to all those volunteers that they found ways to support veterans despite COVID and all the restrictions it brought to our lives.

We can make this year even better.

Go to Voluntary Services at www.volunteer.va.gov and see how you can help. On the left side look at Volunteer or Donate Now. Pick your state and the facility you want to support.

If you want to donate money, you can do that online with a

credit card. Be sure to identify the facility you’d like the money to go to.

If you want to volunteer in person, select the facility and check the list for slots that need filled. It might be parking-lot shuttle driver, mealtime companion, maintenance help or any other type of service. If the facility has a hospice unit, look at the list and consider the families that are staying there.

If you’re a member of a service organization such as the American Legion and want to make a group donation, look at the list of wish items they need. Right now at my medical facility, they’re looking for store gift cards, sneakers, underwear, canteen coupon books and gas cards. Other facility lists are more specific, down to the actual size of pants and shoes that are needed or the type of paperback books that are preferred.

If there is a large homeless population in your area, facilities often try to put together care packages for those veterans or apartment

start-up kits for those moving into housing.

Call the Voluntary Services department at a facility near you and ask how you can help.

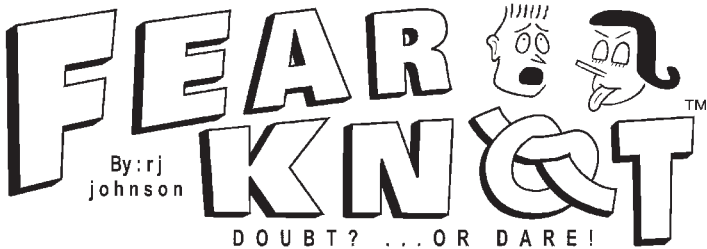

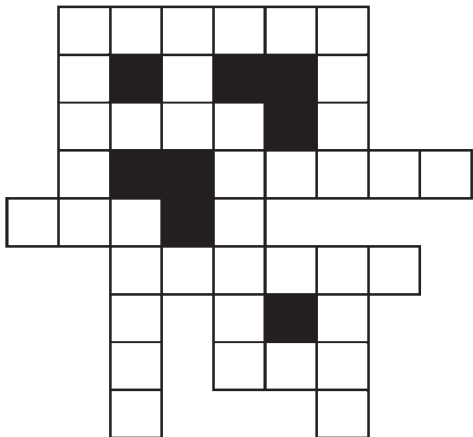
