EL PASO COUNTY – The El Paso Hispanic Chamber of Commerce announced recently that NFL Hall of Famer and former Dallas Cowboy Emmitt Smith will be the special guest speaker at the chamber's 31st Annual Fiesta Celebration, Saturday, November 13, at the renovated Paso Del Norte Hotel in El Paso's downtown district.

Smith, the NFL's all-time leading rusher, is now a successful businessman, a best-selling author, and one of the most well-known brands in sports entertainment. For the Fiesta Celebration, chamber organizers related that Smith would share how he managed to rise to the top in his field and be a three-time Super Bowl champion.

"We are very excited to be bringing such a well-known and respected athlete and businessman to speak to our community. Emmitt Smith has been on our radar for years, and we thought it would be extra special to have him speak after having missed our Fiesta last year, due to COVID-19 concerns," El Paso Hispanic Chamber

of Commerce CEO Cindy Ramos-Davidson said in a news release.

Smith currently is president and CEO of Emmitt Smith Enterprises Inc. and leads a team that oversees the company's many ventures, including the marketing and advocating for Your Business Success, management of the Emmitt Smith brand, the company's two core businesses- EJ Smith Construction and E Smith Legacy real estate company- and the Pat & Emmitt Smith Charities foundation.

In 2000, Pat Southall, former Miss Virginia USA, and Smith got married and started their public charity two years later to provide educational opportunities and positive experiences for children.

Focusing on primarily the North Texas area, they offered a hands-on mentoring program and financial help to several local organizations. Some of their charities' accomplishments included 29 college scholarships, dental services for 2,500 children, and mentoring and leadership camp for TEAM 22 students, which was a program that offered a multi-year curriculum including mentorship, leadership development, community

## Morales hired as secondary school café manager

ANTHONY – Anthony's warm hospitality and small-town environment are what drove Hugo Morales back to his hometown to help students receive nutritious meals at Anthony ISD.

"I love this community. Ever since I was a kid, I would come to the school events," Morales said.

"You know everyone, and everyone knows you. It's just a small and very safe community," Morales said.

Morales was hired as AISD's secondary café manager in June. The move was like a homecoming for the lifelong Wildcat who attended Anthony elementary, middle, and high school.

Shortly after graduating high school in 2017, Morales was hired as a food helper at the AISD cafeteria where he became fond of working in the nutrition department. He briefly worked for Las Cruces Public Schools before returning to AISD.

"The school food service is not something that a lot of people think about supporting, but it's very crucial for the students to get their lunch," Morales said.

"A lot of planning goes into making sure we follow the guidance from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)," Morales said.

Every morning before sunrise, the Child Nutrition Department assembles breakfast for students. Organizing more than a thousand meals per day is a big, calculated task – from keeping meals at a certain temperature to brainstorming what will appeal the students' palate.

"We're trying to implement new options and provide other entrée choices. For middle school, we added salads. For high school, we added salads and pizza,"

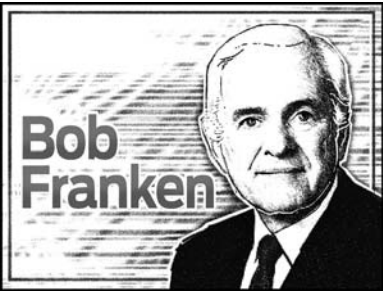
Morales said.

The Child Nutrition Department is a federal funded program that relies on students receiving their meals daily. Every student that receives a meal is counted and reported to the state for reimbursement. Each meal consists of the following five components: meat/meat alternate, grain, dairy, fruits and vegetables). Each student must take at least three of the five components.

that’s not very progressive, is it? And to spread the poison around, when Jesse Jackson and his wife were hospitalized for the same disease, a big cheer went up from too many conservatives.

But it’s nothing new here in the U.S. of A. Just read the far-fetched hateful comments after a school massacre or listen to the racists crow when the police gun down a person of color.

When will we ever learn? Will we ever learn? We are spinning in the wrong direction. That could be because our beginning set of principles were created by slaveholders who were such hypocrites and left history by writing “All men are created equal.”

The voter-approval rate is the highest tax rate that TOWN OF ANTHONY may adopt without holding an election to seek voter approval of the rate.

The proposed tax rate is greater than the no-new-revenue tax rate. This means that TOWN OF ANTHONY is proposing to increase property taxes for the 2021 tax year.

A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE PROPOSED TAX RATE WILL BE HELD ON September 13, 2021 AT 6:30 PM AT Town Hall, 401 Wildcat Drive, Anthony, Texas 79821.

The proposed tax rate is not greater than the voter-approval tax rate. As a result, TOWN OF ANTHONY is not required to hold an election at which voters may accept or reject the proposed tax rate. However, you may express your support for or opposition to the proposed tax rate by contacting the members of the City Council of TOWN OF ANTHONY at their offices or by attending the public hearing mentioned above.

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# The media’s finest hour

Poor Ron Klain.

It’s not a good sign when a White House chief of staff to a Democratic president wants to re-tweet favorable news coverage and all he can find is the least credible and most slavishly loyal commentators on the internet.

The Afghanistan fiasco has created that most disorienting and discomfiting experience for a progressive administration – a serious bout of critical media coverage immune to White House spin and determined to tell the unvarnished story of an ongoing debacle.

The White House and its allies have lashed out at what they are portraying as an insular, pro-war media ignoring its many successes in the Afghan evacuation.

This, like Ron Klain’s tweeting, is a sign of desperation and of a feeling of outraged betrayal that usually dependable allies have, on this story, switched sides. Say it’s not so, CNN.

The White House is unfamiliar with what it’s like to be on the receiving end of the kind of media feeding frenzy that Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis experiences every other day (almost always involving spurious storylines).

But on Afghanistan, Joe Biden in effect set out to test how much

shameless incompetence and dishonesty the media would accept. The answer? Not nearly enough.

The press is blatantly biased and has become even more so over time, repeatedly propagating false narratives that have shredded its credibility. Still, there are limits beyond which even it can’t be pushed.

Biden said that the Afghan withdrawal wouldn’t be another Saigon within weeks of Saigon-like scenes of a hasty evacuation of the U.S. embassy, of terrified Afghans clinging to a U.S. transport plane, of desperate Afghans passing their infants over the barbed wire to Western soldiers guarding the Kabul airport.

There is no number of look-on-the-bright-side briefings that are going to overcome these indelible images, and even a journalist who tilted heavily toward Biden in 2020 and supports his agenda was going to be hard-pressed to look away.

The contradiction in Biden’s case for withdrawal was also too stark to ignore. He originally justified his pullout because the Afghan government and military were capable of defending the country without us, then he justified his exit because the government and

military collapsed so quickly. Which was it?

Much of what Biden has said in his remarks and press conferences has been vulnerable to instant fact checks. When he said that Americans weren’t having trouble getting through to the airport, reporters could immediately attest that it wasn’t true.


Who was everyone supposed to believe? Biden’s misleading assurance, or CNN reporter Clarissa Ward’s compelling report from outside the Kabul airport that she was threatened with a whip for not covering her face and her producer nearly pistol whipped? Ward said it was “mayhem” and “a miracle that more people haven’t been very, very seriously hurt.”

The complaints from the

administration and its most committed journalistic supporters that the coverage has been unfair and the product of a press biased toward interventionism ring hollow.

It is certainly true that the East Coast media has more cosmopolitan attitudes than the rest of the country, but it’s hardly full of committed foreign policy hawks. The press didn’t notably dissent from President Barack Obama’s pullout from Iraq in 2011 or his nuclear deal with Iran. It has steadfastly favored the so-called peace process in the Middle East.

It’s not as though only the American media has noticed Biden’s ineptitude, either. If anything, our foreign allies have been harsher about the humiliating mess Biden has stumbled into (former British prime minister Tony Blair called



it “imbecilic”) than journalists here at home.

Since he won the Democratic nomination last year, Biden has been the subject of relentless favorable press coverage forgiving his lapses and enthusiastic about his alleged accomplishments. It was hard to see what he could do to lose media support, even for a time, and then he botched his withdrawal.



# Stopping the tyranny of medical mandates

In Patrick Henry’s June 4, 1788 speech, “A Wrong Step Now and the Republic Will Be Lost Forever”<sup>1</sup> he pleaded for less power to the federal government and the preservation of states’ and individual rights as a condition for ratification of the Constitution. We got our Bill of Rights, including freedom of religion, speech, assembly and to petition the government for a redress of grievances. We also have the right to be secure in our “persons, houses, papers, and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures.” And we cannot be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

Despite the Constitution’s admonitions, fear and anxiety have led to an increase in federal powers. The Great Depression gave birth to some 70 new agencies and programs<sup>2</sup>. The mother of all programs was the Social Security Act, constitutionally justified under the Congress’ Constitutional taxing power<sup>3</sup>. We have been so irrational as to deem it constitutional to place American citizens in internment camps<sup>4</sup> with no due process.

COVID-19 is the latest justification for government overreach in the name of public health. There is little reason for confidence given the CDC’s faulty COVID-19 tests<sup>5</sup>, the conflicting information on the usefulness of wearing masks, and censoring of effective treatments that were not on the infallible Dr. Fauci’s personal favorite list. (Note: the World Health Organization recommended against the use of his favored drug, remdesivir<sup>6</sup>). Adding to the erosion

of trust is the change in definition<sup>7</sup> of a COVID-19 “case.” Prior to the vaccination rollout, any positive COVID-19 test – with or without symptoms – was a “case.” Now, a positive test in a vaccinated person is only considered a “case” if the patient was hospitalized or died.

The federal health bureaucracy is encouraging businesses and local governments to mandate vaccines, despite the growing list of adverse effects, their modest effectiveness<sup>8</sup> against the predominant Delta variant, and the imminent need for booster shots<sup>9</sup>. According to data gathered<sup>10</sup> from the Vaccine Adverse Events Reporting System<sup>11</sup>, as of August 23, 2021, there have been 13,068 deaths, 154,142 hospitalizations, 5,617 cases of anaphylaxis, 4,681 cases of Bell’s Palsy, 1,607 miscarriages, 4,861 cases of myocarditis/pericarditis, 13,812 life-threatening reactions, and 17,228 permanently disabled, among other issues. On one hand, it is arguable that this is a pittance given that 360,634,287 doses of Pfizer, Moderna, or Johnson & Johnson/Janssen (J&J) vaccines have been given. On the other hand, a 2011 Harvard study<sup>12</sup> concluded that only 1 per cent of adverse events are reported to the government system.

Other drugs have been removed for less. The 1976 H1N1 (swine flu)<sup>13</sup> vaccine was rapidly developed over fears that the flu would overtake the nation as did the 1918 Spanish Flu. The vaccinations were halted after 45 million doses and 450 cases of Guillain

Barré Syndrome (ascending paralysis). As it turned out, millions did not die.

We all remember the limb deformities at birth caused by the 1956 over-the-counter anti-nausea drug, thalidomide<sup>14</sup>. It took four years to make the connection. Another hidden dragon was diethylstilbesterol (DES)<sup>15</sup>. Believed to reduce miscarriages, DES was given to pregnant women for 30 years. In 1971, after it was discovered that DES could cause genital abnormalities and vaginal cancer, the FDA withdrew approval for pregnant women. It took 5 years to discover that the anti-inflammatory drug Vioxx may cause heart disease. One report estimated that some 140,000 people<sup>16</sup> suffered from coronary artery disease because of Vioxx.

We do not know all the risks of the current COVID-19 vaccines available in the United States. Yet the vaccines are given in drive-through parking lots with little to no discussion.

Moderna’s<sup>17</sup>, Pfizer’s<sup>18</sup>, and J & J’s<sup>19</sup> fact sheets warn that the “vaccine may not protect all recipients.” The Moderna and Pfizer fact sheets give special mention to myocarditis and pericarditis reported “during mass vaccination outside of clinical trials.” J&J specifically notes the large vein blood clots. Additionally, all the fact sheets note that “additional adverse reactions, some of which may be serious, may become apparent with more widespread use of the Moderna [Pfizer,

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# Moments in time

THE HISTORY CHANNEL

- On Aug. 30, 1963, a “hot line” between Moscow and Washington goes into effect to speed communication between U.S. and the Soviet Union and help prevent the possibility of an accidental war. Although never used, it did provide a useful prop for movies about nuclear disaster, such as “Fail Safe” and “Dr. Strangelove.”
- On Aug. 31, 1959, Brooklyn Dodgers left-hander Sandy Koufax strikes out 18 batters, setting a new National League record for most strikeouts in a single game.
- On Sept. 1, 1983, Soviet jet fighters shoot down a Korean Airlines passenger flight in Russian airspace, killing all 269 passengers and crew. The KAL flight had veered into a course that was close to one being simultaneously flown by a U.S. spy plane.
- On Sept. 2, 31 B.C., at the Battle of Actium, Roman leader Octavian wins a decisive victory against the forces of Mark Antony and Cleopatra, queen of Egypt. Antony and Cleopatra broke through the enemy lines and fled to Egypt, where they would later commit suicide.
- On Sept. 3, 1935, a new land-speed record is set by Britain’s Sir Malcolm Campbell on the Bonneville Salt Flats of Utah. Campbell and his 2,500-horsepower Bluebird motorcar made two runs over a 1-mile course at speeds averaging over 301 mph.
- On Sept. 4, 1972, U.S. swimmer Mark Spitz wins his seventh gold medal at the 1972 Summer Olympics in Munich in the 400-meter medley relay. He set world records in every event. Spitz’s record would stand until Michael Phelps took home eight gold medals at the 2008 Beijing Games.
- On Sept. 5, 1666, firefighters in London begin blowing up homes in a desperate attempt to halt the spread of a great fire in the city. By the time the fire was finally extinguished, more than 100,000 people had been left homeless.

J&J COVID-19 Vaccine.” It appears that we are nonconsenting participants in the final phase of the vaccine trials.

Given that no one knows the risks, how can physicians (much less the “provider” in the drive-through window) give the patients the information needed to decide whether the potential benefit of taking the drug is worth the risk?

Drunk with power and preying on our fears, the federal government is having corporations do its bidding. Mandates unsupported by medical science could be the greatest threat to our lives and liberty.

Take heart. The spirit of Patrick Henry is alive. A professor – using the science – won a medical exemption<sup>20</sup> from vaccination because his antibodies from a prior COVID-19 infection are longer lasting than those of a vaccine. Airline pilots are suing for a restraining order<sup>21</sup> against mandates until “the science/medicine is more fully developed and better understood.” Teachers, health care workers, first responders are demanding choice<sup>22</sup>.

Since the establishment of our republic, we have taken some very wrong steps. Let’s not let the COVID-19 response become another one.

# UTEP dismantles NMSU, looks forward to home opener

In common everyday math, it’s quite simple, *more* is greater than *less*. And an even simpler mathematical fact is that *some* is greater than *none*.

The college football-scheduling honchos must be on UTEP’s side for the first time in decades as the Miners open the 2021 football season.

First, the Miners, who played eight games in 2020, opened the season against a New Mexico State Aggies team that didn’t play a single game last season.

This Saturday, when UTEP opens its home season in the Sun Bowl, it’ll take on a Bethune-Cookman team that also didn’t play a single game last year.

And that’s okay, after years of having

to travel to Oklahoma and Texas and Tennessee and Wisconsin and Arkansas, it’s about time the breaks starting going the Miners’ way.

UTEP took full advantage of NMSU’s inexperience last Saturday by dominating the Aggies 30-3 in Las Cruces.

It isn’t often that El Paso fans get to witness the Miners play the role of the big bully on the block – but that’s exactly what they were.

With NMSU not even being able to practice together last season, there was no reason UTEP shouldn’t have won this game handily.

And as it is with every football team, it all starts with the quarterback. UTEP’s Gavin Hardison didn’t disappoint.

The redshirt sophomore connected on 11 of his 16 passes for 249 yards and a touchdown, before sitting out the entire

fourth quarter.

If there is a legitimate NFL prospect on this team, it’s wide receiver Jacob Cowing, who caught five passes for 158 yards and a touchdown, including a one-handed circus catch that should’ve been a part of ESPN’s top ten plays of the day.

But the most damage the Miners inflicted on the Aggies was on the ground.

UTEP ran for over 200 yards on the Aggies, controlling the game five yards at a time.

The Miners have a four-headed running attack made up of Deion Hankins, Ronald Awatt, Quardraiz Wadley and Willie Eldridge.

And any of them could lead the Miners in rushing in any given game.

Against the Aggies, Awatt rushed for 74 yards, Wadley had 51, Hankins had 50 and Eldridge, who came into the game

late and only carried the ball four times, had four yards.

But maybe the biggest contribution was turned in by the Miners’ defense, which allowed NMSU only 190 total yards.

In fact, the Miners outgained the Aggies 452 total yards to 190.

UTEP’s defense recorded three sacks and only allowed 2.8 yards per play. The defense is going to have to play that well when it goes up against Conference USA opponents later in the season.

As for this week, the Miners will not only be playing a team in a lower division, but as I stated earlier, like the Aggies, hasn’t played a football game in nearly two years.

The Bethune-Cookman Wildcats last played a game on November 23, 2019, when they beat Florida A&M 31-27.

The Wildcats cancelled their entire 2020 schedule due to the pandemic and will be at quite a disadvantage against the Miners.

The Wildcats will have a lot of new players on the roster who haven’t taken a single snap with the team, including at quarterback.

Because of this, the Miners have an excellent chance to start the season 2-0 for the first time since 2005, when they started 3-0, en route to an 8-4 year and a chance to play in the GMAC Bowl.

With the impressive win over NMSU, one would expect the Sun Bowl crowd to be near 40,000. Which would really boost the athletic department budget after being forced to play with either no, or limited fans, a year ago.

Let’s face it, the Miners played eight games in 2020 and have already played a game this season. UTEP has everything going for it this week, player experience, game action and home field advantage. Not to mention a rabid fan base that is starving for a winning season.

All the pieces seem to be falling in place for UTEP football this season.

Coach Dana Dimel is in the fourth year of his five-year plan, let’s hope that good things come to UTEP fans – they have waited.



Can Lyme disease lead to Parkinson’s

DEAR DR. ROACH: Can Lyme disease send a person into Parkinson’s disease? I tested positive for Lyme – I had the bulls-eye rash, fever and terrible headaches. After a month on doxycycline, my left arm started shaking and my neurologist diagnosed me with Parkinson’s. The doctor said it had nothing to do with the Lyme disease. What is your opinion? – S.M.



I can absolutely understand why you might suspect that the neurologist could be wrong. The coincidence seems too much to believe. However, I think your neurologist is probably correct. The different types of neurological complications of Lyme disease are many and varied. The most common are any combination of meningitis symptoms (inflammation of the lining of the brain, with headache, fever, stiff neck and light sensitivity); disorders of the cranial nerves (especially the facial nerve, so people with neurological Lyme disease can look like they have Bell’s palsy); and damage to peripheral nerves, causing pain and weakness or numbness, often resembling sciatica (but may include other parts of the body). A detailed neurological exam by a neurologist would look for signs of Parkinson’s disease – not just the tremor you describe, but also muscle rigidity and changes in gait. These would be very unusual in Lyme disease. I did find cases resembling some aspects of Parkinson’s disease, but they improved with treatment. It is possible that the stress of the Lyme disease hastened the onset of Parkinson’s disease you were destined to get. I say your neurologist is “probably correct” because what I found – absence of data to support a correlation – does not mean that there is no correlation, and it is possible that time may prove Lyme disease is connected to Parkinson’s. However, I think it’s unlikely.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Ever since my mother became ill, my father’s health has gone downhill. He has trouble walking and getting up from a sitting position, and he has hardly any feeling in his hands. It has gotten so bad that he has to pick things up with the webbing of his fingers then manipulate it to the correct position. His doctor claims that this is old age, but I fear it could be a bone issue. A friend of mine many years ago found that she could not raise her arm past her shoulders and subsequently had neck surgery at the age of 80 to correct it. My father is 77 and was fine until recently. Is this really “old age,” or could something else be wrong? – J.P.


It is NOT “old age.” It’s a problem with his nervous system, but I can’t tell you what exactly without a more comprehensive evaluation. There are several likely possibilities, including carpal tunnel syndrome, but many others as well. He should have an evaluation. A neurologist would be an excellent place to start.

DR. ROACH WRITES:

A recent column on itchy ears generated a lot of letters from readers, mostly asking whether this was due to allergies. One person found that it was the dye from shampoo that seemed to cause the symptom. Several people wrote in that treatment with medicated selenium shampoo helped solve their problem. As always, I appreciate helpful suggestions from readers.

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VA tells health staff they must get vaccine

If you're still digging out frThe Department of Veterans Affairs recently announced that they will require their frontline medical staff to get the COVID vaccine. Specifically, they listed "physicians, dentists, podiatrists, optometrists, registered nurses, physician assistants, expanded-function dental auxiliaries and chiropractors who work in VeteransHealthAdministration facilities, visit VHA facilities or provide direct care to those the VA serves."

In other words, anyone who touches you in a VA medical setting, breathes on you or handles something they're about to put in your mouth has to get the vaccine.

Thank you, VA.

It was unnerving going to the VA and asking whatever medical person was about to

touch me or breathe on me, "So, which vaccine did you get?" only to be told they hadn't had the vaccine and didn't intend to get it.

Even waiting for the vaccine was difficult. When my age group finally came along, I ended up at a civilian pharmacy because it was faster. Nobody there had gotten the vaccine either.

And now, unfortunately, we discover that the vaccines don't work as we thought they would. There are breakthrough cases where fully vaccinated people are still getting the virus, the variants have gained strength, and we're likely going back to Step One, complete with masks.

If you need to go to a VA facility for health care, call ahead or use the VA health appointment app. You'll no doubt be met at the door, asked COVID screening questions and have your temperature taken. Have your vaccination card with you and wear a mask. You also might be able to get a telehealth appointment.

Meanwhile, if you've gotten lax about safety, get smart again. Do one full minute scrubbing your hands under warm water with an antibacterial soap, including your nails. Hang a mask on the front doorknob so you'll see it each time you go out.

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• Stuck zippers can be loosened with graphite powder, or simply by tracing a pencil lead over the zipper.

• "The best way to get a bloodstain out of clothing is by dousing the stain with hydrogen peroxide and washing as usual. For clay stains, you absolutely must have a Fels-Naptha bar. It looks like a bar of soap, and you wet the material and rub in the soap. It's magical. This, coming from a softball mom whose daughter loves to slide." – A.A. in Florida

• Clear bins make it easy to group like items in your pantry. You can remove the bin, get what you need and replace it, rather than digging through cans and boxes on a shelf and having to straighten it back up when you're done.

• A better use for soda: Use it to scrub your pots and pans. If you have grime and slime, try letting the acids in soda pop work it out for you. Pour enough soda to cover the bottom of the pots or pans and let soak for 5-10 minutes. Then scrub away.

• "If you have a retractable cord on your vacuum, try this trick. Clip a clothespin at the optimum length, and the cord will not retract past that point. So, no more snapping right out of the outlet, which used to happen to me." – P.L. in Tennessee

• Use rubbing alcohol to clean window frames. It evaporates quickly with no residue left behind.

• Remember that, typically, the higher shelves and the lower shelves at the grocery store house the better deals.


