Military retirement

With May being Military Appreciation Month and the U.S. sending additional troops to NATO countries in the wake of Russia's invasion of Ukraine, the personal-finance website WalletHub has released its report on 2022's Best & Worst States for Military Retirees, as well as accompanying videos, along with its Memorial Day Facts infographic. To help our troops plan their years after service, WalletHub compared the 50 states and the District of Columbia across 29 key indicators of retirement-friendliness toward veterans. The data set ranges from job opportunities for veterans to housing affordability to quality of VA hospitals. Texas was rated 31st in the report, ranking(1-Best; 25-Avg.):

- 43rd Veterans per Capita;
- 5th Number of VA Health Facilities per Number of Veterans;
- 30th Percent of Homeless Veterans;
- 40th Veteran Job Opportunities;
- 21st Housing Affordability;
- 21st Percent of Veteran-Owned Businesses;
- 13th Number of VA Benefits-Administration Facilities per Number of Veterans; and
- 27th Percentage of Residents 12+ Who Are Fully Vaccinated.

- 3 Million Number of people expected to travel by plane over Memorial Day weekend (up 25% over 2021).

Fair-minded legal analysts long ago abandoned this slighting view and have acknowledged the originality, consistency and influence of Thomas's work. 

Both Thomas and Alito also dissented when the Court turned away a suit filed by Nebraska and Oklahoma to prevent Colorado from legalizing marijuana, and in another such case, Arizona v. California.

The Biden inflation hits homeless elders hard

They're called the "invisibles" – the homeless elders election campaign. in hiding. These seniors may have a fear of homeless shelters or are just too proud to ask for help and so they has been with us for decades but has been underreported for the most part. The invisibles are a part of a much larger problem that is clearly exacerbated by the Biden inflationary spiral – currently at 8.5% – that makes it difficult, if not impossible, for older folk on fixed incomes to afford adequate housing.

So, who are the invisibles? You can see their faces and hear their stories at a website appropriately named, Invisible People. It reveals the fact that when you're homeless, whether you are, young or old, it doesn't matter, "People avoid eye contact. They step away from you. They don't answer you if you address them - even if you wish them a good day! It's painful. It's debilitating. Over time, it gets worse, not better. There invisible is the worst!"

As regards their stories, they are heart wrenching. Take Monica, for instance, who tells of how she lost her legs as the result of having to live in a tent in Los Angeles. Temperatures were below freezing and she didn't have enough blankets. Her legs turned purple and she waited too long to go to an emergency room. They amputated both her legs and in time turned her back into the streets "without any support." To live like that is particularly hard on homeless seniors. Their numbers are growing rapidly as Kendra hide and take refuge on the streets. It's a problem that Hendry, a caseworker at Arizona's largest shelter, recently told the Associated Press (AP): "We're seeing a huge boom in senior homelessness. These are not necessarily people who have mental illness or substance abuse problems. They are people being pushed into the streets by rising rents." She reports that homeless elders make up almost a third of the residents in her shelter.

It appears that the conclusion reached in a study conducted by the University of Pennsylvania in 2019 is coming true. It projected that homeless men and women over 55 years of age will grow to 225,000 by 2026 mainly due to the fact that the numbers of Americans over the age of 65 are growing at the rate of 10,000 a day. And, says the AP, "Academics project their numbers will nearly triple over the next decade, are a lot of bad things about being homeless but being challenging policy makers from Los Angeles to New York to imagine new ideas for sheltering the last of the baby boomers as they get older, sicker and less able to pay spiraling rents. Advocates say much more housing is needed, especially for extremely low-income people."



Moments in time

- On May 23, 1960, a tsunami caused by an earthquake off the coast of Chile travels across the Pacific Ocean and kills 61 people in Hilo, Hawaii. The massive 9.5 magnitude quake had killed thousands in Chile the previous day. The Pacific Tsunami Warning System, established in 1948, worked properly and warnings were issued to Hawaiians six hours in advance, but some people ignored the warnings and others actually headed to the coast to view the wave.
- On May 24, 1883, after 14 years and 27 deaths during construction, the Brooklyn Bridge in New York is opened, the largest suspension bridge ever built to that date.
- On May 25, 1977, the communist government of China lifts its decadeold ban on the writings of William Shakespeare. Mao Tse-Tung's 1966 revolution had banned any cultural work that did not have the required ideological content.
- On May 26, 1940, President Franklin Roosevelt makes a radio appeal for the support of the Red Cross. Belgian and French civilians were "running from their homes to escape bombs and shells and machine gunning, without shelter, and almost wholly without food," FDR told Americans.
- On May 27, 1894, Dashiell Hammett, author of "The Maltese Falcon," is born in Maryland. He worked as a Pinkerton detective for eight years and turned his experiences into fiction. The novel was filmed three times, the last in 1941, starring Humphrey Bogart.
- On May 28, 1902, Owen Wister's "The Virginian" is published. It was the first serious Western and one of the most influential in the genre. The book became a sensation and inspired four movies and a Broadway play.
- On May 29, 1932, the socalled Bonus Expeditionary Force, a group of 1,000 World War I veterans seeking cash payments for their veterans' bonus certificates, arrives in Washington, D.C. One month later, that number had swelled to nearly 20,000 strong.

of Champions, better known to the community as the "Paseo de Campiones", in honor of the SEHS Boys Cross Country team. They brought another state title home in November 2021. The Pathway is located in the front of SEHS along Socorro Rd., where all can

see it as they drive by. SEHS is located at 13981 Socorro Rd, San Elizario, TX.

SEISD is composed of six schools located off Socorro Rd. in San Elizario, near the Mexico border. As a school located along the international border, the consistent success proves the strong resiliency of the student-athletes representing the district of San Elizario and the community.

SEISD has been winning state championships since 1977 when Ray Johnson won the state UIL Track & Field at 1600M and defended that state title again in 1978. SEHS has 34 state wins between individual and team efforts to date. Since 2007, SEISD has welcomed consecutive state championships in Skills USA and Athletics, even garnering a 2013 Texas Elementary Teacher of the Year state win. Each win proves that the district's small size and the zip code location are not barriers to success.

The state wins, and the Texas-size monuments inspire future students to see their potential as true champions. Discipline is the strength of the programs that consistently cultivate championship after championship. Cross Country Head Coach Cesar Morales said, "A question everyone asks is, what is the formula?" He continues, "Well, there is not one. The key is consistency and motivation with a grounded belief to trust the process."

SEISD believes in every student, and the entire team commits to bringing out the best in all students. It truly is the place where eagles soar. The construction of the Pathway of Champions to honor the 9 UIL State Athletic Titles earned by athletics now consists of six monuments representing the multiple state championships in cross country and three monuments representing the boys' state soccer titles. 

Of course, we won't know how good of a job they've done until next season comes around, but Golding has already signed nine new players, leaving the Miners only one short of the 10 scholarships they had to hand out.

Mario McKinney Jr. is a 6-1 transfer from NMSU who averaged 3.8 points per game on 44.2 percent shooting while also grabbing 2.1 rebounds per contest.

SMALL FORWARDS

Otis Frazier III is a 6-6 transfer from George Mason who appeared in 34 games and averaged 2.6 points and 1.8 rebounds per game. He has three years of eligibility remaining.

Calvin Solomon is a 6-6 junior and a two-year starter for Stephen F. Austin who appeared in 82 games, including 56 starts and averaged 9.3 points, 5.8 rebounds, 1.9 assists, 1.7 steals and 1.0 blocks while starting all 32 games played in 2021-22.

POWER FORWARD

Jonathan Dos Anjos is a 6-7 transfer from Florida Southwestern State JC, who averaged 12.1 points and 5.5 rebounds per game. He started 27 of 30 games and has two years of eligibility left.

CENTER

Derick Hamilton is a 6-10 transfer from Bossier Parish Community College. Originally from Baton Rouge, La., Hamilton averaged 11 points and 5.6 rebounds per game on almost 70 percent shooting in 30 games (23 starts) in 2021-22. He has three years of eligibility left.

As you can see, UTEP fans will be greeting an almost entirely new team in 2022, but there are definitely some new players arriving who can play at the D-1 level.

The only sure fire starter returning for the Miners is Jabari Sibley, who can battle inside and has shown signs that he can shoot from distance.

What the Miners need the most is a very good big man. They have a lot of backup types, but no star like a Bryson Williams.

If Joe Golding can fill his final scholarship with one of those... 2022 can be a very special year.



Cause of chronic cough has doctors stumped

DEAR DR. ROACH: I picked up a cough while traveling in Europe more than two years ago. No other symptoms have ever presented.

Since that time, I have received everytestimaginable, including spirometry, multiple breathing tests, CT scans, X-rays and most recently a bronchoscopy. *Nothing* was discovered through any of these tests. Other than the cough, I am very healthy. The cough is driving me crazy, however. I have been prescribed every type of medication, and nothing helps.



My doctors are at a standstill and have nothing further to offer. I don't know where to go from here, but I know I can't live my life with this cough. I avoid a lot of personal interaction because it is so disruptive to constantly be coughing. I would greatly appreciate your help with this, and any advice regarding what steps need to be taken next. -P.M.

Chronic cough (lasting more than several months) is most frequently a result of acid reflux, asthma or postnasal drip, although there are many more causes, including infection, which would be a concern given that you have a clear idea of when it started.

Despite an extensive evaluation for cough, it is not that uncommon that people are left with no explanation but with a persistent cough. There are other, less-common treatments at this point, some of which your doctors might not have tried.

The first is the medication gabapentin (Neurontin). This is used for a condition called laryngeal neuropathy, and I have had a few spectacular cases where the cough disappears entirely. People have written saying that their doctor prescribed the medication for them after reading it in the column and they also had relief, even after decades of persistent coughing, so I think this condition may be more common than I have ever thought.

A second has been a cough suppressant. I am very cautious about using opiate drugs, and it is certainly not appropriate for some people, but cautious use of tramadol in selected patients has been successful in reducing, but not eliminating, cough.

Just yesterday in the clinic, one of the residents I supervise had a patient with chronic cough who had dramatic improvement through the use of speech therapy. Looking it up today, I find trials showing significant improvement, if modest, with this approach, as well as several ongoing trials. Given the potential side effects of gabapentin and tramadol, I think I will be making more referrals to my speech and language pathology colleagues, and suggest you speak with your doctors about some of these options.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a postmenopausal woman with osteoporosis. My physician has just prescribed Calcitonin Salmon nasal spray. Is this treatment very effective rebuilding bone mass, and how long does a patient use the drug? Also, are there any serious dangers using this drug? -M.L.

Calcitonin, usually derived from salmon, is not typically used long term for osteoporosis. Other drugs, such as those in the alendronate (Fosamax) class, are more effective. The Food and Drug Administration advisory panel has recommended its use be limited to less than six months due to concerns about possible increased cancer risks. It also can cause allergic-type reactions, including swelling of the lips and tongue. I seldom see it prescribed anymore outside of short-term use for pain relief in vertebral fractures due to osteoporosis.


