

# Law school in El Paso County could be a reality by 2030

EL PASO COUNTY – The University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP) is the leading Hispanic-serving university in the United States. Eighty-four percent of its students are of Hispanic descent, and more than half of those students are first in their families to go to college.

This school year, UTEP enrolled more than 26,200 students, a record number. UTEP's student enrollment has incrementally increased each year for the past few years. The growth is attributed to a variety of reasons including the enhancement of its multi-disciplinary programs, the expansion of engineering.

next move is to establish a law school on the Texas-Mexico border. Because of its location on the border and its demographics, UTEP and community leaders agree that the university is poised to establish a law law and the preparation of bilingual attorneys.

To look into the law school possibility, the state legislature approved \$250,000 in early 2023 for UTEP to conduct a law school planning study, which was led by Andrea Cortinas, UTEP vice president and chief of staff. The preliminary study indicated that there is an anticipated growth in the need for lawyers in El Paso and surrounding counties of one percent annually and 12 percent through 2034.

law school; that the closest law program is at the to this goal when conversations continue with the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque; that the University of Texas System Board of Regents and closest one in the state is at Texas Tech University in Lubbock; and that the last law school to open in Texas was the University of North Texas Dallas College of Law in 2014.

With that in mind, El Paso State Representative Vincent Perez, during the last legislative session, sponsored House Bill (HB 3475), a bill that would establish a law school to serve the West Texas region. HB 3475 asked the state for \$20 million over 10 years to establish a public law school in El Paso County. The bill was approved by the House and advanced to the Senate, where it was never brought up for a vote.

Nonetheless, Rep. "Clearly there is not enough home-grown school that would focus on international business attorneys here available to meet the demand," Perez said, adding that there also is a great need for bilingual attorneys. "There's just not enough attorneys available locally."

To demonstrate to state legislators that the borderland community is committed to establishing a law school at UTEP, efforts to raise \$20 million in start-up funds have begun. Wilson acknowledged that any construction would need funds from the UT System. She pointed out that to earn American Bar Association accreditation, the law school would need a law library, moot court classrooms, and a student study/gathering space and added that the estimated costs, to include such things as project management, insurance, legal fees and the like, would range from \$60 million to \$110 million.

- · Hispanics make up about 20 percent of the U.S. population and over 40 percent of the Texas population.
- In the U.S., there are more than 1.3 million active attorneys with 6 percent of them being Hispanic.

Karen was an avid gardener and obtained







# Moments

- On Nov. 17, 1991, Fox aired the first condom ad on network TV during the teen sitcom "Herman's Head," inspired by increasing anxiety about the spread of AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases.
- On Nov. 18, 1996, exotic bird expert and protector Tony Silva was sentenced to seven years in prison for heading an illegal parrotsmuggling operation one of many people to be arrested during Operation Renegade, a three-year international investigation into bird smuggling by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Division of Law Enforcement.
- On Nov. 19, 1969, Brazilian soccer star Pelé, considered one of the greatest players in his sport, scored his 1,000th professional goal in a game, against Vasco da Gama in Rio de Janeiro's Maracana stadium.
- On Nov. 20, 1866, Pierre Lallement received a U.S. patent for the country's first pedal bicycle. Unfortunately, he wasn't able to capitalize on his invention. Failing to acquire enough funds to open a factory, he sold the rights to the patent in 1868 and died in obscurity in 1881.
- On Nov. 21, 1934, a teenage and terrified Ella Fitzgerald stepped on the stage at Harlem's Apollo Theater to participate in Amateur Night after her name was drawn from a hat. At the time an aspiring dancer, she spontaneously decided to sing instead, not only winning the competition after a rough start, but unknowingly setting her feet on the path to becoming a music legend.
- · On Nov. 22, 1986, 20-yearold Mike Tyson knocked out 33-year-old Trevor Berbick in only five minutes and 35 seconds to become the youngest titleholder ever. He had won all 27 of the matches he'd previously fought, knocking out 26 of his opponents.
- On Nov. 23, 2002, John Herrington became the first Native American in space when he set out on a mission to the International Space Station. In honor of his heritage, he brought along several eagle feathers, a traditional wooden flute, a few arrowheads and the flag of the Chickasaw Nation.



This time of the year, every year, is the time that Frenship. El Paso high school football teams turn in their uniforms and equipment to their managers because the season has come to an end.

For some schools, it ends because they had a losing season and didn't qualify for the playoffs.

For El Paso schools that do qualify for the playoffs, they usually get slaughtered by those out-of-town straight losing seasons before getting back to their bullies.

Last year, of the 16 local teams that made the playoffs, only one team, the Del Valle Conquistadores, won a playoff game. But that's as far as they went, losing in the second round.

And when El Paso teams lose in the playoffs, it usually isn't close.

Some of the playoff results this year were West Plains 85, Irvin 0; Abilene 84, Bel Air 25; Tascosa 84, Parkland 13; Dumas 83, Riverside 35; Canyon 66, Ysleta 13; Legacy 62, Franklin 42; Palo Duro 56, Hanks 7; Permian 56, Eastlake 7; Monterey 50, Americas 32 and Randall 49, Austin 0.

The three close losses were Cooper 45, Del Valle 42; Central 24, Pebble Hills 14 and Cooper 42, Chapin 35.



## Ivermectin not proven for cancer treatment

I was diagnosed with stage 4 high-grade ovarian cancer in September 2024. I underwent a major surgery in March

after the tumor shrank. I see a top doctor at a renowned hospital, and I trust him. I went through seven rounds of chemo with three different meds. I handled it well as I am very fit and 64 years old. I am now on maintenance medications (Avastin and Lynparza). My numbers are going up. I know my prognosis isn't



good, but I try to live my best life. I have a lot of different things to look forward to (marriages, grandbabies, etc.). I have many friends who keep suggesting ivermectin as a treatment. (These people are also anti-vaxers.) I don't fall into this group of people as I believe in modern medicine and have trusted my doctor. So, my question is: What are your thoughts about this treatment, and what have you heard about it within the medical community? -L.N.

I am sorry to hear about your diagnosis, but I congratulate you on your good attitude. The treatment for ovarian cancer has changed dramatically in the past few years. There are many treatments, and although they are often not able to cure cancer, they can keep cancer at bay – sometimes for many years, even decades. Having an important life event to look forward to is important to maintaining a good attitude.

As far as ivermectin goes, there is a small possibility that it will turn out to be a useful treatment for cancer. I have read some preclinical studies that suggested some benefit. However, no studies that were done on actual people have proven it to be useful for any type of cancer so far. Many promising treatments turn out to be failures after the initial clinical trials.


There are people who feel that there are hidden treatments for cancer and that there is a massive conspiracy to keep successful cancer treatments from being used. Having known many doctors and research scientists who unfortunately died from cancer themselves, I can assure you that this isn't the case. Many scientists across the globe are working hard to find new treatments, and every year brings incremental benefits.

Ivermectin is the most recent "miracle treatment" that I have heard about. I can recall easily at least a half dozen miracle treatments in the past 20 years that haven't turned out to be useful. Some of these are not only useless but are actively harmful. While ivermectin is generally safe when dosed appropriately for its indication of treating parasites, it can be dangerous at high doses.

I respect the use of alternative treatments to manage the symptoms that are caused by cancer treatments such as chemotherapy. However, people who rely on alternative treatments for treatment of their cancer do not do as well as people who are getting the best care that modern medicine currently has to offer.

I recommend that you thank your friends for their advice and tell them that you trust your medical team and will follow what your doctor recommends.


